

To meet the demand for qualified men created by the huge shipbuilding program of the Maritime Commission, the United States Maritime Service is training youths to become radio operators in the American Merchant Marine.

Decome radio operators in the American Merchani Marine. Physically fit American male cliteres 18 to 23 years of age with no previous experi-ence are being offered a 10 months' course in radio operation, maintenance, and repair. Youths accepted are paid from \$36 to \$60 a month while in training. Food, quarters, and clothing are furnished by the Government.





States might be cut off from the Far East, our Government, in co-operation with the rubber in-

dustry, began more than two ucstry, began more than two yorrs ago to build up a reserve supply. After Pearl Harbor, it became necessary to take drastic steps to protect this precious store of rubber and on December 11 our Government issued an order prohibiting the sale of tires and tubes to anyone not having a priority rating of A-3 or better. These temporary restrictions will end on January 5, and they will be superseded by new regulations which are now being formulated.

How long such restrictions will remain in force will depend upon the course of future events. Naturally, when our allied forces are victorious in the Far East. shipments of rubber to the U. S. will be resumed. But in the meantime, steps are being taken to relieve the present situation.




