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



Known History of Moscow Dates Back 800 Years Moscow! That is the city to which Russians have looked most of the time through the centuries. It is the largest of all Russian cities, with a population above 4,000,000. The known history of Moscow goes back about 800 years. There probably was a village of some sort at the same spot on the Moskva river even longer ago than that, but we do not have clear records of it. For a time Moscow was the cen-ter of an area ruled by a prince. This prince was under the power of the Mongols. The emperor, or khan, of the Mongols was his "overlord." As the years passed, the princes of Moscow gained more power. A much larger area of land was placed under them, but the khan was still their overlord. Nobody paid much attention to it then, though. But, some 50 years later, it began to be adver-tised in a big way. People liked tooth paste — and they liked the way it was packed. No finger could be dipped into the air-tight tube. It was handy and economical, and it was unbreakable. So other pastes, creams, jellies, soaps and salves began to be put up in tubes, to be squeezed out a little

Desserts made from whole grain or refined cereals will have much food value if milk, molass-es, peanuts or other such nutri-tious foods are included, says Hazel Phipps, Extension Service specialist in food preparation. Some of the easiest to make cereal desserts are bread pud-dings. Practically any kind of bread may be used, along with dried fruit such as raisins, ap ples, pitted prunes, peaches or apricots. Having some of the whole

apricots. Having some of the whole ready to use by canning it, will wake serving whole wheat easier for the homemaker. This is how wheat was canned at HD Clubs during January.

Clean and wash wheat thor-oughly. Rinse several times. soak over night in twice the amount of water as wheat used. Drain off liquid and bring to boil add soaked wheat, boil for five minutes stirring constantly. Fill No. 1 cans with 9 os or about 1 cup of wheat. Add 1-2 teaspoon of sait and cover with water in which wheat was boil-ed. Seal while hot and process no. 1 cans for 30 minutes at 15 pounds pressure. Fill no. 2 cans with nearly 2

pounds pressure. Fill no. 2 cans with nearly 2 ucps add 1 teaspoon of salt, cover with water in which the wheat was bolled. Seal and pro-cess for 40 minutes at 15 lbs. Remove from (cooker and place in cold water. Whel cool, clean, dry label and store. For cereal add a little water, cook 4 or 5 minutes and serve with fruit.





New Army Meal Ticket Good News for Restaurant Owners

What may prove a boon to restaurant owners is the Army's new practice of issuing meal tickets instead of cash to soldiers for the purchase of meals while traveling. These tickets allow a soldier to spend a maximum of 75 cents a meal in restaurants and \$1 a meal in railroad dining cars—in many instances more than he would mend if he were resting cash. spend if he were paying cash.

The tickets (one of which is reproduced below) are slightly larger than a currency note, are white and must be filled out by the issuing officer. When a restaurant operator receives one in tender


