

## Find Resources Lie Idle in West

#### Public and Private Lands Cover Materials Now In Demand.

WASHINGTON. — The publicly and privately owned lands of the West hold untapped natural resources sufficient to provide a plentiful supply of most critical defense materials now under priorities and also the normal needs of the civilian population, a senate public lands subcommittee reported.

In a lengthy resume of prelim-inary studies, Senator O'Mahoney, chairman of the subcommittee, urged that prompt development of these resources be started.

"Announcements from leading executives in the organization which has been created to co-ordinate the industrial defense effort all indicate that the rationing of raw materials is just around the coner," the report said. "Instead of concentrating upon the production of raw materials and the development of new sources of supply the defense organization is thinking in terms of cutting down civilian supply.



She Threads Root Hairs

With Microscope Help AUSTIN, TEXAS.—Finer than any thread and any needle's eye ever handled by woman are the root handled by woman are the root hairs and capillary needles used by Prof. Hilda Rosene. She has just done a threading job

She has just done a threading job at the University of Texas that will place her name in scientific records for all time. The threads are the fine white hairs seen on some roots. They are so slender that in mass they appear like bits of mist. She has separated them individually and threaded them separately into capillary glass tubes that are so small the work has to be done under a microscope.

the work has to be done under a microscope.

The tubes contain water. Her experiment proves that the business of these root hairs is to absorb water. For 250 years the scientific world had assumed that the hairs were for water absorption but no one ever proved it before, probably because the job was too difficult.

Additionally, this proof promises to be the first step in some new, important scientific experiments in the electrical properties of these root hairs. Without her threading technique the experiments could not be done.

# Gaining, Doctors Say

That many types of cancer can be cured if properly diagnosed in early stages was the optimistic note struck by obsetricians and gynecologists at the opening sessions of the Pacific Coast Society of Obstetrics and Gynecology in Pasadena, Calif.

More optimistic approach was revealed by Dr. Frank W. Lynch, for

More optimistic approach was revealed by Dr. Frank W. Lynch, for 25 years professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of California in Berkeley, when he stated that cures during the past decade have doubled from 22 to 44 per cent of cancer sufferers have neglected warning signals until too late for anything but palliative treatment.

He said no definite relationship with heredity in humans can be established definitely, yet there are undoubted cancer families in which many cases of the disease will occur inside three generations.

On the other hand, he stated, there have been cures where cancer occurred in one generation and there was no recurrence.

The university doctor pointed out that next to heart disease, cancer is the second ranking killer disease in the United States.

Dr. Lynch also made note of the fact that the present generation of

Dr. Lynch also made note or une fact that the present generation of laymen is cancer-minded and that in the past many deaths have been attributed to cancer when some other disease was the cause of death.

#### U. S. Card Player Survey Reveals Popular Games

For coffee rich in flavor, as well as strength, one heaping tablespoon (or two level tablespoons) of coffee is recommended for each six-ounce cup (teacup size or three-fourths standard measuring cup) of water.

Mineral Losses

Avoid losses of minerals in preparing and cooking foods; refrain from scalding, parboilling and blanching. Don't soak vegetables in cold salted water to make them crisp. Don't peel or scrape vegetables. Long-cooking methods will deprive your vegetables of more minerals than by using shorter ones. The mineral losses are decreased when foods are baked, steamed or cooked in double boilers. The greatest mineral losses occur when foods are boiled and the more water used the greater the loss; as much as 10 to 40 per cent is lost in calcium and phosphorus and 20 to 50 per cent of iron when foods are boiled.

Origin of Fertilizer
