Gunn has served as superintendent in trying times, but has been able to hire an able staff of assistants and keep the majority of them from year to year. ## COMMODITY CREDIT TO FREE POULTRY SUPPLY BINS FOR WHEAT STORAGE

Arrangements have been made whereby the Commodity Credit Corporation will purchase grain storage bins from available sources to be used in relieving the storage situation in heavy wheat-producing states. Provision is being made for the purchase of bins from 1,000 to 2,400 bushel capacity, with the combined capacity not to exceed 100 million bushels.

The bins will be used for storing wheat delivered to the Commodity Credit Corporation in payment of loans, and also will be made available to farmers who are unable to make other arrangements for storing the '42 crop. The procedure for making the bins available to farmers is now being worked out. Farmers in surplus wheat areas who will qualify for bins should contact their county AAA committee.

## RATION CARDS MUST BE RETURNED BY PARENT IF MEMBER DIES OR GOES TO ARMED SERVICE

"Within ten days after the death of any person having a war ration book, the book must be returned to the local rationing office for cancellation," says R. E. Meek of the local board. He urges citizens to cooperate with the board in this and the following regulations:

War Ration book must be surrendered upon entering any armed service or leaving the U. S. for over 30 days.

Home Canning Each holder of a ration book is eligible for 5 lbs. additional sugar per year for home canning when proper application is made at the rationing office.

Register Now If you do not have a war ration book, register Thursday, May 21st and thereafter, at the local office in court house.

One of these blows will be backed up by us rationing gas and giving up our tires from the cars that are not busy in war work. Do not get excited but this will come to pass. Gas rationing soon and the tires will be called for later.

They are talking about our inability to get supplies to our men why not build a railroad to the nearest point to Siberia and make a deal to land material in that country for transport to China. Then build roads to the coast of China across from Japan then we could have a base close enough to Japan to put her out of the war in a short time. We could ferry across the Bearing Strait or build a bridge if need be. 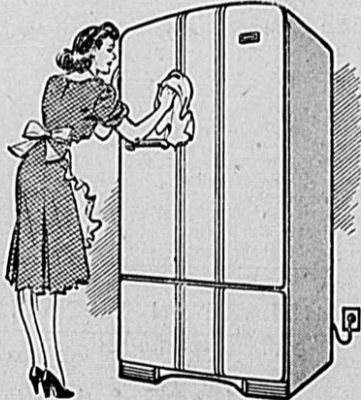

# Use and Care of Your Electric Refrigerator



Uncle Sam wants you to take good care of your electric equipment—to make it last. Here are some suggestions that will help you get longer life and better service from your always economical electric refrigerator:

Defrost whenever frost is about 1/4 inch thick. Frost acts as an insulator—retards cold making.

Be sure door gasket seals tightly. Wipe off any grease that falls on gasket as grease destroys rubber.

Wash inside of refrigerator, including freezer, with weak baking soda solution each time you defrost.

Wash exterior with cloth dampened in lukewarm water and mild soap. If non-porcelain, wax occasionally to preserve finish.

If an open unit model, keep oiled per manufacturer's instructions. Closed unit models need no oiling.

Remove dust from fins of condenser coils occasionally. Keep unit compartment clean.

Don't overcrowd shelves. Air circulation is needed for efficient cooling.

Don't set cold control for lower temperature than necessary. Forty-five degrees is safe.

Cover all liquids. Moisture drawn to freezer speeds formation of frost.

Don't put hot foods in refrigerator. Wait until they cool.

Don't clutter refrigerator with ketchup, canned goods and other items that do not need refrigeration.

Avoid quick freezing as much as possible. It increases running time of motor.

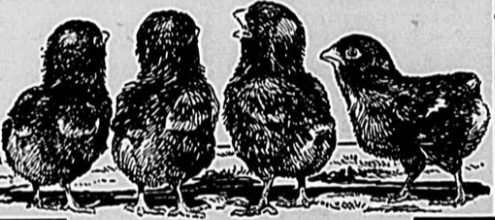
