## Bank Deposits Reach All Time High Friday July 10 County Average May Exceed Twenty Bushels

Only a small part of the wheat crop marketed, deposited in the First State Bank of Spearman, reached an all-time high Friday July 10th.

For the first time in the history of the bank, organized in 1917, deposits went past the \$3,000,000 mark.

Deposits July 10, were \$1,480,000. The figure was increased to \$3,579,000 July 14. Several hundred dollars more will be deposited within the next ten days.

At the close of business, Tuesday July 14th, total assets of the bank were \$1,253,994.86, according to D. D. Moore, cashier of the First State Bank.

There has not been a lull in the rate of deposits, according to C. A. Gibner, president, who stated in a statement issued Monday July 14th, that the bank is now buying the war bonds you can possibly afford.

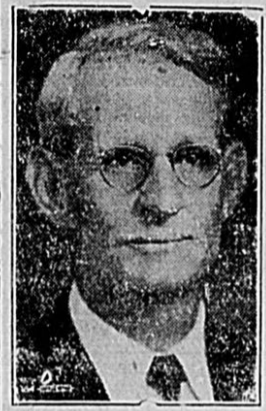

### FARMERS MAY GET 100 PERCENT PARITY ON 1942 CROP

There's a possibility that congress will approve a payment of 100 percent parity on the bumper wheat crop this year. A representative of the Commodity Credit Corporation stated yesterday that if 100 percent parity was paid, it would increase the Hansford loan rate to \$1.30 per bushel.

The representative also stated that farmers who had already made loans on their 1942 crop would be paid the difference and that the farmer would not lose.

Wheat producers will lose almost one third of their income if they sell their wheat for cash if the 100 percent parity law passes.

Elevator operators of Hansford county are not urging producers to sell. They want to see their customers get every possible cent from this crop.

### DO NOT SAVE TIN CANS, WPB SAYS

DON'T START SAVING TIN CANS. That is the advice in a WPB memorandum to chairmen of all county salvage committees, pointing out that while a plant is being opened in Dallas to take care of the salvage of tin cans this plant can only take care of salvage within a 100-mile radius of Dallas, and as yet there are no facilities in the Panhandle to take care of a tin can collection.

Many people have inquired of Matthew Doyel, chairman of the county salvage committee, as to whether they should save tin cans, and there seems to be a good deal of confusion on the subject, the chairman says.

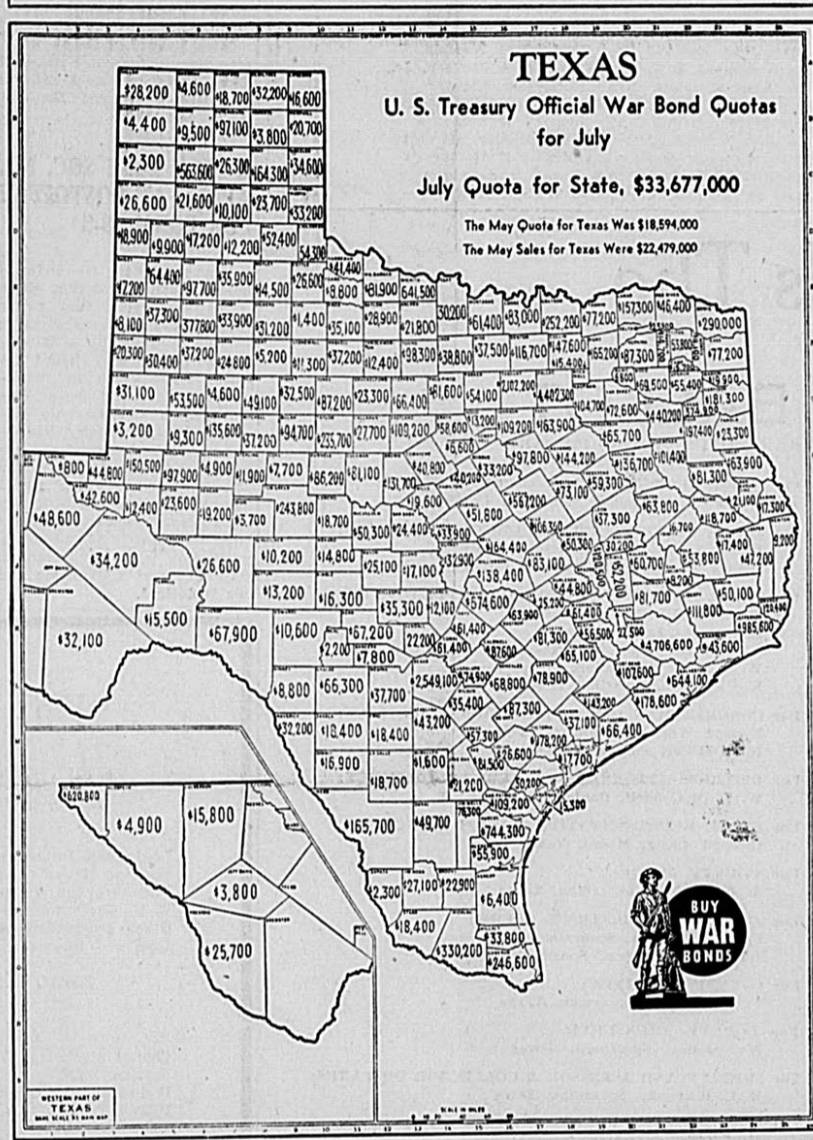
At present, the War Production Board instructions are, Do Not Save Tin Cans unless you live within a 100-mile radius of DALLAS, TEXAS.

## 96,065 lbs. Rubber OVER 35 POUNDS PER CAPITA FOR COUNTY TOTAL

President Roosevelt's Scrap Rubber drive ended July 10th in Hansford county with 96,065 pounds of rubber collected.

Spearman totals from seven stations amounted to 70,665 lbs. Gruver, total from four stations 17,400 lbs.

Morse, total from two stations 8,000 lbs. The grand total of 96,065 lbs. gives our county a little over 35 pounds per capita, (some counties, Deaf Smith, are bragging about 20 pounds per capita). That's enough scrap rubber to retread every tire in Hansford county and throw in a few thousand pounds for cassetts.

Salvage Committee Chairman, N. M. Doyel said he was extremely satisfied with the rubber drive, although he had hoped our county would gather 100,000 lbs. "I am sure there is 4,000 lbs. of scrap rubber in the county somewhere," Doyel said.

In the near future farmers and citizens will be called on to get in Scrap Metal. Announcements will be made soon of the details for scrap metal drive.

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### ROOSEVELT SUMMONS GENE WORLEY



Congressman Eugene Worley of Shamrock, has cabled friends he will return to Washington as soon as possible in compliance with a directive issued by President Roosevelt, calling all members of the House and Senate now on active war duty, back to Congress.

Worley's cablegram came from far-away Australia, where he is aboard an Aircraft carrier. The identity of the part and the name of the ship cannot be disclosed.

Friends of the Congressman who are in charge of his campaign for re-election do not expect Worley to reach the continental United States until after the July 25th primary. They point out the President's directive, issued June 17th but not made public in Washington until last week, asked Representatives and Senators on war duty to report on July 1st or immediately upon returning to the U. S., but that at least a few weeks would be required for Worley to make the hazardous and circuitous trip home.

Immediately on reaching American shores, Congressman Worley plans to head for his district to discuss the war with his constituents before resuming his duties in Washington. Worley will bring a wealth of first-hand information which will be helpful in shaping the future course of America in the far-flung battle for freedom.

Worley enlisted in the Navy shortly after the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, in keeping with a campaign promise to volunteer his services if he voted for a declaration of war. He said then he would return to Congress when the President called him.

Gene was elected to Congress to represent 28 counties of the Panhandle in 1940. He had previously represented the counties of Gray, Wheeler, Collingsworth and Donley in the Texas legislature for six years.

Gene will not be able to get back to his district in time to ask your support in his race for re-election, but his friends are conducting a quiet campaign in his behalf. His slogan is "Let's Make It A Landslide For WORLEY This Time."

### MORE THAN 95 PER CENT OF BUMPER CROP HARVESTED

The 1942 wheat harvest in the Spearman area is fast drawing to a close.

Producers of the McBride community, because of a big rain have not finished their harvest. The rest of the county is at least 95 percent through, said Joe Haton, county agent.

Based on a survey of dozens of producers, grain buyers and elevator men it now appears that the county will average 20 bu. per acre. This average would give a grand total of more than four million bushels for this county.

Hansford county will probably end this season in third place in production in Texas. Deaf Smith and Ochiltree counties will be in first and second place.

Largest Income Due to the fact that nearly every wheat producer has a good size herd of cattle, pigs, etc., and having harvested the best crop in a decade, the income of the county for 1942 should be an all time high running into the millions of dollars. Bank deposits already show that money is very plentiful.

May Be Biggest Crop The famed crops of '26 and '28 may go out of the picture if predictions for the '42 crop hold true. Several big producers say that they have never before seen a bigger crop in this county. No officials records have been found of either the '26 or '28 crop.

W. U. Cook raised wheat that made 53 bushels per acre. Frank Wallin reported 44 bu. per acre.

Much credit for the perfect labor situation goes to the United States Employment Service, who under the management of Mr Griffin found jobs for nearly 800 men in this county.

Storage Still Problem It's the same story... If we only had a place to store the wheat. Everything within human power has been done. The local Chamber of Commerce, elevator managers, farmers, and just plain John Doe have called, wired and begged storage since the first load of wheat arrived.

Only 20 car loads of granaries have been received to date. Not one-fifth enough to house this crop.

Twelve 3,000 bushel bins and forty 1,610 bu. bins are now being erected in Spearman.

Gruver has received 20 two thousand bu. steel bins and 15 1,610 bu. bins. These storage bins are being built by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Because of the storage problem several producers are selling their wheat at 20c per bushel under loan value.

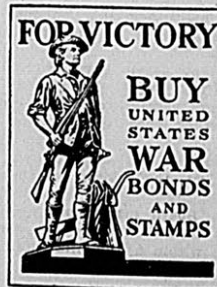

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Vernon left last week for a trip to Alabama. They came out to this country from Alabama 21 years ago and have not been back since. They left the family with them and expect to be gone about 30 days.

For the past two or three weeks Gruber has looked like a town. Literally hundreds of people came to help with the wheat. Housing was a problem for men being forced to sleep in their trucks. Feeding the great number of visitors was a problem also. But somehow they managed to get fed. The grocery stores, drug stores, cafes and other businesses were forced to stay open until after midnight every night. It has slackened up a little now as the harvest is practically complete. The

great problem here as elsewhere is that of storage. A number of temporary metal storage bins have been erected near the edge of town. These were furnished by the government. The Gruber's expect to move about 40,000 bu. of old wheat into them, thus making room for that much new wheat. Another problem is that of Wheat Thieves. Several thefts have already taken place. All in all it was a good harvest and everyone is happy.

Limiting Extensions of Utility Service  
In order to conserve materials for the war effort, the government, through the War Production Board, has issued new rules regarding service extensions by public utilities, effective June 23 and expiring September 30, 1942.  
Under these new WPB regulations, we will not be permitted to build extensions to our distribution system to serve customers, except under the following conditions:  
(1) The extension must not exceed 250 feet in length. (Including service line from distribution system to building to be served.)  
(2) Building to be served must have been piped or wired ready to receive service prior to July 1, 1942.  
(3) In case of new construction, foundation under main part of building must have been completed prior to July 1, 1942.  
(4) Cost of material for extension must not exceed \$1,500 for underground jobs or \$500 for overhead extensions.  
The above regulations apply only to ordinary non-defense extensions. In case of new consumer building projects bearing a preference rating of A-5 or better, we are permitted to use such rating in placing orders for material necessary to serve such projects without prior approval from the War Production Board, although this does not guarantee that the material will be immediately available.  
Nothing in the above regulations applies to buildings already connected to our distribution system and which are piped or wired but are not now receiving service because of vacancy or for other reasons. Service to such buildings may be resumed at any time upon application at our office.  
However, if you are planning to move into a new home or other building which will require an extension of our system to receive service, we suggest that you consult us before making any commitments or taking any action. We can assist you in determining whether or not service can be provided under the new government regulations.
