From where I sit ...

by Joe Marsh

Nebraska certainly is a great State. I like Nebraska. I like those immense cornfields that seem to stretch from horizon to horizon. (Plenty of wheatfields in Nebraska,

But the thing that interests me most about Nebraska right now is the very important social experi-ment the beer people started there several years ago.

Beer itself is naturally a beverage of moderation. Yet, all too often, people are inclined to blame beer wrongly for any misconduct of the customer or the proprietorin a place licensed to sell beer.

So, the brewers got together to see what they could do about this. They weren't really responsible for their retailers... in fact, they're not allowed to control retailers. But the brewing industry worked out a plan by which it cooperates with the public authorities to eliminate bad conditions in the minority of places whose conduct would reflect on the law-abiding majority.

The beer people urge proprietors of retail places to conduct them properly and to obey the law. They urge consumers to cooperate, and ask the public generally to report law violations to the authorities. They send warnings to careless retailers and if conditions are not corrected they take the case up with the authorities. Naturally the authorities and the public have welcomed this as an added force in building respect for law and order. building respect for law and order

That program is now operating in many states — and with the Nation at war, brewing industry organizations cooperate with civil and millitary authorities to assure good conditions in beer outlets around the army camps and naval stations.

Somehow, to me, that's a mighty important, public-spirited effort. I don't know of anything like it ever having been tried before. If people really help the brewers with that program they'll be doing a great thing for the country.

When you're munching a hot dog, what do you think about? Probably whether you should have another. Certainly you don't open up your red-hot and start looking for hidden taxes. But an enterprising tax expert has done that for you—with surprising results!

Here's the dope on the tax problem as it relates to Coney Island red-hots: There are 67 separate taxes hidden in the average hot dog. And the foot-long but the dog comes wrapped in has at least 53 tax payments milled and baked into it. The taxes, it seems, start with the

ments milled and baked into it. Ine taxes, it seems, start with the farmer and continue adding up ev-ery step of the way from the pro-ducer to the consumer. The pack-ing house, the retail butcher, two sets of supply houses, the railroads and the truckers all pay taxes that eventually are incorporated in the dog you love to eat. And a penny out of each nickel you pay, when you stand at the hot dog counter, goes to the tax collector, according

goes to the tax collector, according to the expert.

What will you think about the next time you eat a hot dog? Well, prob-ably just what you thought about be-fore. That's why politicians prefer hidden taxes.

Report Proteins Used to **Build New Body Material**

Successful test tube combination of amino acids, the so-called building blocks of protein, into more complicated body substances, has been reported at the Stanford university conference on protein re-

These amino acids were added to a solution containing a little salt and either some extract of the papaya fruit or of animal tissues. The result was the formation of a substance which was neither an amino acid nor a protein, but rather something in between.

This gives scientists a substantial "break" in the long-standing attempt to unravel the mysteries of proteins.

Animal and plant digestive systems break down their food into simple substances and rebuild them into the particular kinds of pro-teins needed in their tissues, but nobody ever has been able to dupli-cate this feat by laboratory meth-

cate this feat by laboratory meth-ods.

Some animo acids have been put together by purely chemical means, but the results fell far show of be-ing proteins.

'Royal Guest' of Duce

King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, formally accorded the title of emperor in 1936 after the Black Shirt legions strode through Ethiopia, is one of the last kings on the European chessboard. He was 72 years old November 11.

He was honored philatelically in 1938 by Italian East Africa, which included Ethiopia and the former colonies of Italian Eritrea and Somaliland. This area has been conquered by Britain.

The king has been called the "troyal guest" of Mussolini, since most of the world knows that Il Duce tolerates the pint-sized septuagenarian solely because the personal popularity of the unprepossessing monarch is greater than that of the Black Shirt leader.

Dr. Simpson warned the nation's Dr. Simpson warned the nation's parents against allowing children to eat too much candy. Declaring a limited amount of sweets may not be harmful, the professor said "the candy habit is bad for the health and the teeth." Chewing gum, however, was recommended as beneficial

The doctor recommended as a corrective and preventive measure an annual X-ray examination of ev-ery child's teeth after the sixth

Excess Rations Trip Killer in Double Murder

Poisons Bigamous Wife and Child; Gives Victim's Ticket to Another.

LONDON.—A death verdict came in 20 minutes recently at London's Old Bailey when a jury retired to consider the case of Lionel Rupert Nathan Watson, 30, of Greenford; a molder, father of four children by his estranged wife, who had murdered by poison a woman who supposed she was his wife, Miss Phyllis Elizabeth Crocker, 28, of Perivale, and their daughter by this bigamous marriage, Elleen Watson, 18 months. Watson first met Miss Crocker in the factory where he was employed at

that year, and they occupied her hat in Goring-way.

Digs in the Garden.

Above the flat lived a Mrs. Brown, her son-in-law, Mr. Thomas, and her daughter, Mrs. Thomas. Miss Crocker and Mrs. Brown frequently hade as with each other, and Mrs. Brown was perplexed when told by Watson that Miss Crocker and her child had gone to Scotland. She was further puzzled when she saw Watson dignig in the garden, and he remarked that he was burying old rags. That was on May 20, the date that Miss Crocker and the child disappeared. On May 28 Watson was again seen digging a hole in the garden, and on this occasion he said that he was "cleging for victory."

Mrs. Brown and other neighbors became suspicious, especially as un-pleasant odors were coming from the direction of the garden.

On June 30, the police wrenched up flagstones in Watson's garden. In a pit two feet deep and six feet long they found the bodies of Miss Crocker and the child. They were wrapped in sheeting. They had been poisoned.

One evening after Miss Crocker was dead he took Miss Philby to the flat. He offered her some shoes and a coat which had belonged to Miss

Miss Philby did not stay nor did she take the shoes. Next morning Watson brought the shoes and a frock to the factory and gave them to her.

That act told against him, because although Watson was suggesting that Miss Crocker and the child had gone away, he was using a ration book which they would of necessity have had to take with them.

When arrested, Watson had hi When arrested, Watson had his defense against a charge of murder prepared. He told the police that, returning home from the cinema one evening, he found Miss Crocker dead on the floor of the bathroom, and the child dead in her cot. His suggestion was that Miss Crocker murdered her baby, and then killed herself.

Watson declared that it suddenly watson declared that it studently occurred to him that the best thing he could do was to bury the bodies in the garden. After he had done so, he murmured, "Gad bless you!" Then he went to bed, but could not

sleep.

Watson was unmoved when the judge donned the black cop to pass the death sentence.
