LATEST RATION BOARD INSTRUCTIONS

Households which had excess amounts of sugar and were not issued War Ration Books have been advised by the Office of Price Administration to police their own use of sugar in accordance with the designated consumer sugar allotment. At the present time, no family or individual should consume sugar at a greater rate than one pound a person each two weeks, which is the current consumer allotment. No books will be issued to persons who registered excess amounts of sugar until a sufficient number of ration periods have expired during which the consumer—if he had stamps—might have purchased an amount of sugar equal to his excess. The OPA has received reports that some people who registered excess amounts of sugar think they can obtain war ration books as soon as the excess is gone, regardless of the length of time in which it is consumed. Families who do not restrict their use of sugar to the prescribed allotments will only be penalizing themselves since a time may come when they have no sugar and will not be permitted to purchase any.

POULTRY CLINIC DRAWS LARGE CROWD SATURDAY

Poultry raisers of this area will produce bigger and better chicks from now on after attending the free Poultry Clinic held at the R. L. McClellan Gr. Co., last Saturday by Gordon Beall of the Mayfield Co., Dalhart and Otto Russell of Russell Remedy Co., Kansas City, Mo. One thing that causes a big percentage of baby chick deaths is "Laryngotracheitis" this disease causes a clot of blood to form in the trachea (wind pipe) and chokes the chick to death. Coccidiosis, another disease of chicks causes the bird to bleed to death internally. High powered microscopes enabled producers to see exactly what was causing sickness in their flocks. Sick birds were literally and physically cut into small pieces and different diseases pointed out by Mr. Beall. Mr. Beall comes to the R. L. McClellan Grain Company each week and he invites customers of Mr. McClellan to bring him their poultry troubles. by street cars instead of using valuable rubber tired cars. He added that in the six years he had been auditing these books the business showed an increase each year. He said that the local Farmer-Owned Consumers Sales Company was one of the strongest businesses in the Panhandle of Texas and told those present they should be proud of the able management of Simeon Caldwell. The company has assets of nearly \$50,000.00. Over \$10,000.00 was paid the past year in patronage dividends. This amounts to about 10 percent.

Homer Allen, the only director present said "I know the company is getting along alright are we would have more present. I wish to convey the thanks of the directors to Mr Caldwell and his fine staff of assistants for making this one of the biggest ears in our history."

An unusual thing about the report showed that more tires and tubes had been sold the first 4 months of this year over last year. Sales of all kinds were up over last year about \$17,000.00 with the small increase of only \$300.00 in operating costs. Sahli warned members present that the only way to keep up this record would be to continue giving 100 percent cooperation to their farmer-owned company. Less than 10 percent of the business came from non-stockholders.

Stiff regulations controlling the installment purchases and charge accounts were issued recently by the Federal Reserve Board last week.

The law went into effect May 5th, made in compliance with the President's plea that people pay off their bills and stay out of debt.

Charge accounts must be paid by the 10th day of the second month following purchase, but no down payment is required. For instance, an article bought any day up to the end of this month must be paid for by July 10th. That date also is the deadline for charged articles on the list which were bought on or before May 6th.

It is absolutely necessary that all customers comply with the regulations. If a merchant does not stop an account, but lets it run longer than the time specified his license is revoked, his merchandise is cut off, and he is fined up to \$5,000.

The charge account rule allows between 40 and 70 days for payment, according to the date of purchase.

Any person buying a listed item on the installment must pay 1-3 down and the balance in 12 months, except that cars and trucks may be bought 1-3 down and 15 months to pay and furniture and pianos 1-5 down and 12 months to pay.

The merchant has no choice, unless your account is paid in full; or a signed agreement to pay not less than \$1.25 per week or sign 10-d and an agreement to pay in regular payments within 12 months you cannot buy on credit.

ACCOUNT IS IN DEFAULT, THE VENDOR CAN-
NOT SELL TO THE PURCHASER ON CREDIT
UNTIL ONE OF THE FOLLOWING STEPS ARE
TAKEN TO CURE THE DEFAULT.

CURING DEFAULTS:

1. By Payment in full of the amount in default.
2. By the purchaser entering into a written agreement in good faith to pay the amount in default within a period of 6 months or less from the date of such agreement by substantially equal installment payments of not less than \$5.00 per month or \$1.25 per week at substantially equal intervals not exceeding one month: or
3. Government Regulations Prohibit Special Deliveries and Call Backs after May 31st
Your Ice Serviceman

To save rubber, Office of Defense Transportation Order ODT No. 6 limits regular deliveries to not more than one a day per customer

To conserve rubber, the Office of Defense Transportation has issued Order ODT No. 6, restricting deliveries by rubber-tired vehicles, whether motor-driven or horse-drawn. Effective June 1 and applicable to any person or firm delivering any commodity within any community, the order specifies that:

No special deliveries may be made, except to hospitals, military forces or in cases where public health, life and safety are imperiled. A special delivery is one made at the request of a particular person or firm other than as part of a regular scheduled delivery service.

No call backs may be made, a "call back" being defined as any call made subsequent to the first call on any one person or firm on any given day, regardless of the purpose of the call.

Not more than one delivery per day may be made to any one customer, except as authorized under special deliveries.

The order further stipulates that, beginning June 1, each local carrier must reduce his total monthly vehicle mileage 25% below total for same month of preceding year, exclusive of mileage eliminated as a result of other requirements of the order.

Under the foregoing provisions, we shall no longer be able to make the special deliveries and extra calls that we have gladly made in the past as a convenience to our customers. We shall continue to make regular scheduled deliveries, however, and you can help us keep you well-supplied with ice by anticipating your requirements and making arrangements to receive deliveries at scheduled times. Commercial customers, who formerly required more than one delivery per day, can cooperate by providing larger storage facilities or arranging to pick up additional ice at our dock. There are no restrictions on dock sales.

We are sorry that circumstances make it impossible for us to continue to make deliveries without limitations as in the past, but we know you understand the necessity for conserving rubber and will be glad to cooperate until victory comes and unrestricted delivery service can be resumed.

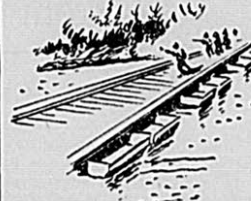
