WAR BOND QUOTAS FOR AUGUST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today announced the August War Bond Quotas for 370 counties in the nation totalling \$315,000,000.

The August quota for the State of Texas is \$27,250,000. In arriving at the county quotas for August the Treasury Department took into consideration major factors affecting incomes which in turn cause significant variations in sales during the twelve-month period.

Hereafter actual Bond sales in the various states will be compared with quotas on a cumulative basis. The amount by which sales in excess of or below quotas in any month will be added to or subtracted from quotas for future months.

SURRENDER SUGAR BOOKS IF BOY GOES TO ARMY

R. E. Meek, chairman of the Hansford county War Price and Rationing Board, called attention to the fact that many persons either from lack of information or through negligence, are failing to surrender their War Ration Books to the local board when they are inducted into the armed services.

Heirs and next-of-kin are failing to surrender to the board the books of persons who have died, Mr. Meek said.

Mr. Meek added that the war rationing regulations are very strict in this regard and he expressed hope that the local board would not have to call on the Office of Price Administration to invoke penalty provisions against persons who fail to observe this regulation.

CROP INSURANCE DEADLINE SET FOR AUGUST 31ST

Big Saving Offered Growers This Year

Although few growers in this county are collecting on their Federal all-risk wheat crop insurance this year, growers know that every year can't be a good year and are signing up now for insurance on their 1943 crops, according to F. R. Wallin, chairman of the Hansford AAA committee.

"We're all mighty glad to make a big crop this year," Wallin said, "but at the same time we all realize that we can't make a good crop every year. Crop insurance is a guarantee that the insured grower will have an income in bad years as well as good."

Applications for insurance on the 1943 crop are now being taken at the county AAA office. Growers who want insurance must sign their application either before they seed their wheat or before Aug. 31, whichever is earlier.

Here are a few highlights in the Federal all-risk wheat crop insurance:

1. Insurance coverage is now being sold on a three-year basis assuring you an income from wheat for the next three years.
 2. If the rate and yield established for your farm next year or the year after would be to your advantage, you can cancel your old policy and renew for another three-year term under the new rate and yield.
 3. The FCIC cannot raise your rate or lower your yield during the life of the contract.
 4. When you have insured your crop for an unbroken series of years and the total paid in premiums, less indemnities collected, equals your premium rate will be drastically reduced.
 5. Federal all-risk wheat crop insurance insures your crop against all unavoidable hazards.
 6. You pay for the insurance by signing a commodity note which matures July 10 of the year in which the crop is harvested. This note is payable on or before maturity in wheat or the cash equivalent, or it may be deducted after maturity from AAA payments, proceeds from a commodity loan, or indemnity payments.

Lester Blickenstaff, of Garden City, Kansas, thoroughly acquainted with this national drive will be present to help organize this county. Mr. Blickenstaff is connected with the Minneapolis-Moline Co.

Hansford county's war board, in a meeting Tuesday morning endorsed the movement and pledged their cooperation to make this drive successful.

Scrap metal will be purchased by the R. L. McClellan Grain Company in Spearman and the Kimbell Grain Co. of Gruver.

CEMETERY ASSOCIATION REPORT

Treasurer Reports \$1,321.50 Received

The Hansford Cemetery Association was organized on July 2, 1941, at which time the following officers were elected: A. F. Barkley, chairman, Mrs. Alvino Richardson, secretary and Mrs. J. D. Hester, treasurer. It was the unanimous opinion of those present that steps should be taken to raise funds to improve and care for the cemetery.

It was found that Mrs. Hester and Mrs. McNabb had previously raised quite a sum of money for this purpose and they were continued as a committee to contact other interested persons, and the secretary was instructed to write to any and all other persons not residing here whose names and addresses could be ascertained by her, which she did and quite a sum of money was raised in this way. The treasurer reports that there was raised the total sum of \$1,321.50, and that there was paid out the sum of \$1,203.94, leaving a balance in the fund at this time of \$117.56.

With the funds expended the cemetery was fenced with good posts and woven wire; a well was drilled and windmill erected; a large storage tank, contributed by the Consumers Sales Company of Spearman, was set on concrete foundation; ditches were dug, pipe laid and faucets were placed, so that water is now available to all parts of the cemetery; and in addition weeds were cut and cleaned out and trucks were used hauling dirt and filling neglected graves.

The committee wishes to thank all those who contributed to this cause.

COUNTY OFFERS BOUNTY ON COYOTES

Citizens of Hansford county will receive \$2.50 for each coyote killed within the boundary of this county. This law was put into effect Monday by the Commissioners' Court. It further provided:

"Affidavit must be signed for each coyote killed, stating time, place and killed by a bona-fide resident of Hansford county.

Proof (scalp) must be brought to the Commissioners' Court not before the second Monday in September (Sept. 14) nor after the second Monday of each month. In other words ONLY 1 DAY PER MONTH WILL AFFIDAVITS BE TAKEN. DO NOT BRING COYOTE SCALP TO COURTHOUSE ON ANY OTHER DAY THAN THE SECOND MONDAY OF EACH MONTH!

CITY FARMER STOCKMEN NOT ELIGIBLE FOR CAR TIRES

Ruling Is Unfair, Reporter Will Ask New Ruling

Farmers who live in town are not eligible for passenger car tires or tubes. Several farmers that live in town had made application for tires. The local rationing board wrote the state office, Mark McGee and he said that these farmers were not eligible.

The only way for any farmer to be eligible for passenger car tires is "transportation of produce and supplies to and from the farm if an applicant operating such farm does not own or possess a truck or other practicable means of transportation." More about this next week.

SUGAR INCREASE TO DRUGS AND CAFES

Increases in the sugar allotments of industrial and institutional users of sugar for the months of July and August, which were announced previously will be extended to cover the allotment period of September and October.

Authorization for the increases in both allotment period is contained in a new amendment to the sugar rationing regulations, Mr Meek explained, which was made effective, Aug. 7.

Industrial users will be given a 10 percent increase, thus raising their allotment to 80 percent of their sugar "base" for these four months, while institutional users will be granted a 25 percent increase, boosting their allotment to 75 percent of their base.

Sugar purchase certificates for these additional allotments will be granted the institutional and industrial users when they apply for their regular allotments for the September-October period.

The board has been authorized to accept applications for this period any time after August 7, and no special application is required to obtain this increase.

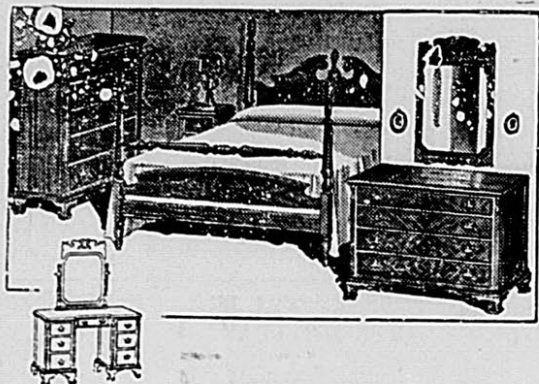

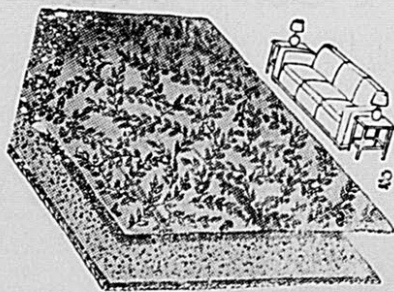

H. J. R. No. 1.—A Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 49-a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto...

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49-a, to read as follows:

"Section 49-a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury, at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) percent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature & Comptroller of Public Accounts with

reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

S. J. R. No. 21.—A Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College;" and

"Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. First pub. 7-30-42.

H. J. R. NO. 23.—A Joint Resolution

Proposing an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building; providing for repayment to the Permanent School Fund; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas to the Permanent School Fund for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund therein. Such bonds shall be executed on behalf of the State of Texas by the Governor and Comptroller, and shall bear a rate of interest

not to exceed three (3) percent per annum, payable annually; they shall be of such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall be payable in not to exceed twenty-five (25) equal installments beginning one (1) year from date of issuance; and the State Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside into a special fund annually at the beginning of each fiscal year until all of said bonds shall have been paid off and discharged, a sufficient amount of the first moneys coming into the Treasury for the use and benefit of the General Revenue Fund not otherwise heretofore obligated to the payment of bonds and interests, a sufficient amount to pay the interest becoming due and the bonds maturing during such fiscal year. From said Fund the Treasurer shall pay the interest on said bonds as it comes due, to the credit of the Available School Fund; and shall pay off said bonds as they become due and deposit the amounts so paid to the credit of the Permanent School Fund. The power hereby granted to issue bonds is expressly limited to the amount stated and to five (5) years from and after the adoption of this grant by the people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the third day of November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

S. J. R. No. 20

A Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the

H. J. R. No. 24.—A Joint Resolution

Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election therefor; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 22-a and reading as follows:

"Section 22-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by local or general law (without the necessity of advertising any such local law), in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants according to the then last federal census, to create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

AUGUST CAR STAMP NOW ON SALE If You Lose Stamp Write Revenue Dept.

Postmaster Marvin Chambers announced today that August Federal Car Stamps are now on sale. The cost is \$4.59. You are eligible to buy this stamp if you DID NOT use your vehicle during the month of July.

If you drove your car or truck thru July and did not purchase the Federal stamp you are liable to a \$25.00 fine and 10 days in jail. July stamps must be purchased from the Internal Revenue office, Dallas, Texas.

In case you lose the federal stamp you must make written affidavit to the Dallas Internal Revenue office.

JESTER SAYS BETTER TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM NEEDED

Corsicana—Texas today needs a transportation system more thoroughly geared to its needs than at any time in the past. Beauford Jester, runoff candidate for the unexpired term of railroad commissioner, believes.

Opening his campaign for the second primary here, Jester declared he was familiar with the problems facing Texas consumers, farmers, ranchers and small-town residents.

Pledging his efforts, as a member of the commission, to procure a better transportation system for all parts of the state, Jester announced he would work for coordination of bus, truck and railroad systems of the state to provide a closely-knit system of schedules which would serve all sections.

"Rates must be regulated so as to provide the farmer, rancher and poultry-raiser with transportation for moving his products to market at reasonable cost," Jester declared. "That is where the railroad commission comes into such close relation to the farmers and ranchers of the state."

Jester also pointed out the place of the commission in preserving the safety of the state's fresh water supply through its regulation of oil well waste disposal.

"The safety of the people of Texas, on the highways, while traveling and in the security of their water supply is thus left to the railroad commission, Jester pointed out.
