## Hansford Agricultural Association In Important Called Meeting

President Homer Allen, of the Hansford County Agricultural Association has issued a call meeting of all committeemen, officers and chairmen of all Agricultural Associations of Hansford County to be held in the District court room at Spearman Monday night June 7th. All members interested in the future of agriculture in this section are invited to attend this meeting.

An organized drive over Hansford County will be conducted during the week end to urge land owners and farm operators to attend the district meeting at Amarillo, June 8th. At the Amarillo meeting a competent representative will discuss in detail the new AAA program, and make suggestions relative to the influence Agricultural Association may have in perfecting the new program.

The Committee of the Texas Agricultural Association has just returned from Washington where they have taken active part in co-operation with other farm organization leaders throughout the U. S., in framing the National and improved Farm Program.

The Directors of the Texas Agricultural Association, in conference with leaders of other farm organizations of Texas on Friday May 28, adopted the principles incorporated in the bill and the Texas Agricultural Association is putting on a State-wide educational program to explain the fundamental principles of the new AAA bill.

Frankly, it is the opinion of this Association that this bill is the greatest thing ever proposed for us farmers and it is the duty of each of you to attend and to bring with you everyone possible. Particular attention should be given to bringing business men with you. The consumer should be no less interested in this than the producers. Let us show a solid front!

Ft. Worth, May 27—Billy Rose has swung back the curtain at last to reveal the carefully-guarded secrets of the Casa Manana Revue of 1937, outstanding attraction of the great array of amusement which will form the Fort Worth Frontier Fiesta, opening June 26.

The spectacular scope and magnificent sweep of the little idealist's plans actually had an audience of 400 leading citizens from all parts of Texas enthralled and, at the conclusion of the graphic description, Broadway's Barnum was cheered for five minutes.

Last year, the Casa Manana was a Cavalcade of World's fairs. This year, the scenes will have a background four "best sellers": "Gone with the Wind," "Wave Up and Live," "Lost Horizon" and "It Can't Happen Here." In the "It Can't Happen Here" the biggest stage-set ever built. The scene, a stirring onslaught against "ism," is thus depicted by Rose:

## Pioneer Of Hansford County Dies In Calif.

Word was received in Spearman by Judge A. E. Townsend announcing the death of one of Hansford County's older pioneer citizens, Gus Ward, who lived in this section for 42 years. Mr. Ward died at his home in Long Beach, California, Thursday May 20, 1937. Funeral services were held Friday, May 21, interment was at the Sunny Side Memorial Park of Long Beach.

Stephen Gus Ward was born at Tazwell County Virginia in 1860. The deceased moved to Missouri while a child, later coming to Brown County Texas with his parents. At the age of 19 years, he came to the Panhandle of Texas and spent 42 years of his life in this section, living the wholesome life of a rancher and cattleman. Mr. Ward owned the section in Hansford County known as the Old Richardson place until 1921, when he sold out and moved to California. In 1895 he was united in marriage with a pioneer girl, Ada B. Freeman, living a life of love and devotion to his helpmate. The pioneer couple adopted a niece, Florence Ward, whom they reared and loved as their own daughter.

Survivors are the widow, Ada; a sister, Mrs. Nan Stallings, Oklahoma; a brother, Robert; and a niece, Mrs. Florence Tarne, Long Beach.

## A Joint Resolution

proposing an amendment to  
 Article 3, Section 52, of the Con-  
 stitution of the State of Texas by  
 adding thereto a new section to be  
 known as Section 52d; providing  
 that the Legislature may author-  
 ize by law, after a majority vote  
 of the resident qualified electors  
 owning taxable property therein,  
 the adoption of a plan for the  
 construction of paved roads and  
 bridges or both in Harris County

**International Sunday School Lesson**

By Dr. J. E. Nunn

General Topic: — Joseph's Readiness for Service.  
Scripture Lesson:—Genesis 41: 33-44.

33. Now therefore let Pharaoh look out a man discreet and wise, and set over the land of Egypt.

34. Let Pharaoh do this, and let him appoint overseers over the land, and take the fifth part of the land of Egypt in the seven plenteous years.

35. And let them gather all the

food of these good years that come, and lay up grain under the hand of Pharaoh for food in the cities, and let them keep it a store to the land against the seven years of famine, which shall be in the land of Egypt; that the land perish not through the famine.

37. And the thing was good in the eyes of Pharaoh, and in the eyes of all his servants.

38. And Pharaoh said unto his servants, Can we find such a one as this, a man in whom the spirit of God is?

39. And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, Forasmuch as God hath showed thee all this there is none so discreet and wise as thou:

40. Thou shalt be over my house, and according unto thy word shall all my people be ruled: only in the throne will I be greater than thou.

41. And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, See, I have set thee over all the land of Egypt.

42. And Pharaoh took off his signet ring from his hand, and put it upon Joseph's hand, and arrayed him in vestures of fine linen, and put a gold chain about his neck:

43. And he made him to ride in the second chariot which he had; and they cried before him, Bow the knee: and he set him over all the land of Egypt.

44. And Pharaoh said unto Joseph, I am Pharaoh, and without thee shall no man lift up his hand or his foot in all the land of Egypt.

Joseph In The House Of Potiphar In Egypt. Gen. 37:36; 39:1-12.

When the Midianite purchasers of Joseph, traveling in this large caravan of Ishmaelites, came into Egypt, they immediately sold the slave they had bought to a high Egyptian official in the court of Pharaoh by the name of Potiphar. The promise fulfilled so continuously in every age in the life of so many faithful servants of God, "Them that honor me, I will honor" (I Sam. 2:30), is now fulfilled in this young man's life. Potiphar saw that there was something in Joseph's life which gave him a character, and ideals, and principles, nobler and higher than any possessed by his other servants and officers. The result was that his master trusted him with everything that he had.

Joseph's Great Temptation. Just as things were beginning to come easier for Joseph, and he was on his way to a great career in the court of Egypt, temptation came pounding at the door of his heart in a most powerful and subtle way, for the wife of his own master began to tempt him to an act of sensual indulgence which would have made both of them guilty, not only of a terrible sin, but of the betrayal of Potiphar, the husband of one and the master of the other. "The glorious victory which Joseph won in this terrific battle for moral integrity and cleanness of character was the result of three factors in his life: first, his loyalty to his master; his absolute faith in God, which made him realize the sinfulness of the sin and the fact that to commit it would be to provoke God and separate him from the presence and blessing of God; and his decision to flee from the tempter."

Joseph In Prison. Gen. 39:13-40:23.

The immediate consequences for Joseph were terrible. As the common saying goes — "Heaven has no rage like love to hatred turned, nor hell a fury like a

woman scorned." She told it all over the court. When the master heard it, he at once, had Joseph cast into prison. Here again Joseph was faithful in doing every thing that came to his hand. While he was in prison, the butler and the baker of the king of Egypt were brought in as prisoners, having in some way not mentioned offended Pharaoh. These two men baffled them. Joseph immediately interpreted to them the significance of what had been given them in their sleep, both of which interpretations came true. Though the chief butler promised to remember Joseph after he left the prison, the promise was never kept.

Pharaoh's Dreams. Gen. 41:1-40.

This dream was followed by another, somewhat similar, in which he first saw seven good ears of grain come up on one stalk. And then seven thin and blistered ears on another stalk, which swallowed up the full ears. Joseph was brought into the presence of Pharaoh, and, in a spirit of true humility giving all the glory to God, he at once told Pharaoh that the dream predicted that there would be seven years of plenty in Egypt to be followed by seven years of terrible failure of crops. Joseph advised Pharaoh what to do, with a wisdom which surely came from God.
