CANVASS STARTS MONDAY, AUG. 24

Sept. 5th Final Date To Bring In Scrap Metals

Every Citizen Urged To Cooperate

To meet the nation's war need for scrap iron and steel and other salvage material, an intensive drive has been launched in Hansford county, it was announced by Matthew Doyel, chairman of the Hansford coun-

ty Salvage Committee.

Plans formulated in a meeting Monday evening at the court house, attended by car, implement dealers and Salvage Committee members and War Board members, calls for a house-to-house canvass to begin Monday Aug. 24 and to continue until every family in this county has been contacted. This drive will be headed in given districts of the county by various car and implement dealers. Each dealer will choose one or more business men to help him make a house-to-house canvass.

Lester Blickenstaff, M-M rep-

representative for this area presented the above plan which was adopted by those present.

Blickenstaff in stressing the importance of this gigantic drive for scrap metal said "the steel industry uses scrap on a fifty-fifty basis, 50 percent scrap iron and 50 percent virgin metal, therefore one half of every article made by steel mills is made up of scrap from your attic, alley, behind-the-barn or scattered about the farm." He also said that experts agreed there was "enough scrap iron on farms to make twice as many ships as there is in the world today."

"It is a direct personal obligation to our boys serving in our armed forces to get in the scrap now!" he concluded.

The drive ends Saturday, Sept. 5th. All metal on farms and in towns must be in before Sept. 5th.

Price for scrap has been set at \$7.50 to \$8.00 per ton. The price per ton of scrap means little. An emergency exists and scrap must be brought in the same way as you cooperated in the scrap rubber drive. Let's lead Texas again, by bringing in every available piece of scrap iron.

Junk dealers, R. L. McClellan

and Dan Shrader said they do NOT want galvanized iron, tin cans, or tractor fenders.

SCHOOL TO HAVE 12-GRADE SYSTEM

Change Will be Made At Fourth Grade

Much work has been done in preparation for a 12-grade system in the Spearman Schools.

After getting the proper texts lined up for the various grades, the next problem was to segregate the grade school into 8 groups instead of 7 as it had previously been. After due consideration, the principals, superintendent and teachers have recommended a class for each pupil in the grade school. If a pupil fails to do good work he is subject to demotion, or if he proves that he can do work in another grade level he is subject to promotion. There will be new texts in practically all of the grades, above the fourth.

Supt. Gunn said most students will be given a chance to benefit from the 12-grade system.

TEACHER SHORTAGE IN MOST SCHOOLS: 2 SHORT HERE

Practically every superintendent in the State is searching frantically for teachers for the coming school term. According to Amarillo papers, they are six teachers short in the Senior Hi School alone. There are some teachers still available, but the problem is in finding those who are qualified to teach certain subjects. There are no experienced coaches or manual training teachers available; as those who do not have jobs which pay more than the average high school can pay are either in some branch of the service or in war work.

In spite of the fact that six teachers have recently resigned from the Spearman Schools, only 2 teachers are short at present, and it is expected to have these two vacancies filled by this week-end.

SUGAR STAMP NO 8 GOOD FOR 5 LBS.

Valid From Aug. 23 To Oct. 31.

War Ration Stamp Number 8 will be valid for the purchase of FIVE pounds of sugar during the TEN-WEEK period beginning August 23 and ending Oct. 31, R. E. Meek, chairman of the Hansford War Price and Rationing Board, announced today.

"This is a larger amount of sugar and the ration period is longer than has been assigned for any previous stamp. Each person will have to continue using sugar at the original rate of no more than a half pound a week to make the five-pound ration last ten weeks," he said.

Mr Meek said the allotment of five pounds on Stamp 8 will permit household users to buy sugar in larger packages, and also will help to dispose of five, ten and 25 pound packages.

Stamps No. 6 and 7 carry validity for the purchase of two pounds of sugar each until midnight of August 22.

GET IN THE SCRAP!

WILL CLASIFY ALL 20 YEAR-OLDS IMMEDIATELY

Immediate classification of Selective Service registrants of the Fifth Registration (June 30th) was announced today by General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director.

Local Boards throughout the State have today been instructed by State Headquarters memorandum to proceed immediately with the classification of all registrants of the Fifth Registration who have reached their twentieth birthday.

The men registered in the 5th Registration, General Page pointed out, were those between the ages of 18 and 20, inclusive, and in Texas affected approximately 132,000 men.

"The Selective Training and Service Act, as amended sets out that, except as otherwise provided, every male citizen of the United States and every male person residing in the United States, who is between the ages of twenty and forty-five at the time fixed for registration, or who attains the age of twenty after having been required to register, shall be liable for military training and service in the land or naval forces of the U. S.

Accordingly, all registrants of the Fifth Registration are, upon reaching their 20th birthday, subject to induction when their order number is reached.

No national lottery was or will be held for registrants of this age group, General Page stated, and order numbers have been assigned on the basis of birth dates of the registrants (and alphabetically as to registrants born on the same date.)

Registrants who have not reached their 20th birthday will not be mailed a Questionnaire, but immediately upon attaining their 20th birthday they will be mailed a Questionnaire and classified in accordance with current Selective Service Regulations and policy for filling calls.

GET IN THE SCRAP!

With all confidence that his appeal to Texans to elect a real war Senator is winning through, JAMES V. ALLRED is closing his drive with the same four-point program he started with.

H. J. R. No. 1—

A Joint Resolution
Proposing an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 49-a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49a, to read as follows:

"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury, at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) percent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature & Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature & Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

S. J. R. No. 21—

A Joint Resolution
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College;" and

"Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. First pub. 7-30-42.

H. J. R. No. 23—

A Joint Resolution
Proposing an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building; providing for repayment to the Permanent School Fund; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows: "Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas to the Permanent School Fund for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund therein. Such bonds shall be executed on behalf of the State of Texas by the Governor and Comptroller, and shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three (3) percent per annum, payable annually; they shall be of such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall be payable in not to exceed twenty-five (25) equal installments beginning one (1) year from date of issuance; and the State Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside into a special fund annually at the beginning of each fiscal year until all of said bonds shall have been paid off and discharged, a sufficient amount of the first moneys coming into the Treasury for the use and benefit of the General Revenue Fund not otherwise heretofore obligated to the payment of bonds and interests, a sufficient amount to pay the interest becoming due and the bonds maturing during such fiscal year. From said Fund the Treasurer shall pay the interest on said bonds as it comes due, to the credit of the Available School Fund; and shall pay off said bonds as they become due and deposit the amounts so paid to the credit of the Permanent School Fund. The power hereby granted to issue bonds is expressly limited to the amount stated and to five (5) years from and after the adoption of this grant by the people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the third day of November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

A Joint Resolution
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following: "For the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Those voters opposed to such Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election therefor; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 22-a and reading as follows: "Section 22-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by local or general law (without the necessity of advertising any such local law), in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants according to the then last federal census, to create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "For the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Those voters opposed to such Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. First pub. 7-30-42.

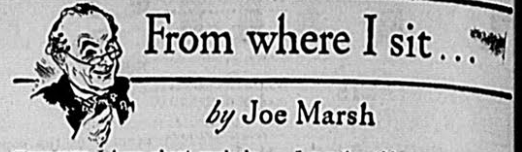

Rent Control Effective In Hansford County Sept. 1st.

Federal rent control will become effective in Hansford county, September 1. Price Administrator Leon Henderson announced today in Washington.

Beginning on that date tenants are to pay no more rent than they were paying on March 1, 1942, the maximum rent date for this area. Under the maximum rent regulations which are to be issued within the next day or two, landlords cannot accept nor can the tenants pay more rent than that fixed by the freeze date. Because of peculiar problems involved in each type of living accommodation, two separate maximum rent regulations will be issued, one covering housing accommodations other than hotels and rooming houses and another covering hotels and rooming houses.

Administration of federal rent control will be handled through a federal rent office with personnel selected from this area.

First step toward rent control in this area came in May when Price Administrator Henderson designated this community as a defense-rental area and recommended that rents be voluntarily cut back to the March 1 level. OPA granted 60 days for action by local authorities, but at the end of that period an investigation showed that rents generally had not been cut back as recommended. Thirty-seven other areas in the United States will also feel federal rent control on September 1.

If no change has been made, then the rent to be paid on September 1 reverts to what it was on March 1. The tenant needs NO APPROVAL from his landlord to make this cut, nor does he have to consult with his landlord before making it. Such a reduction, where one arises from the roll-back date, is automatic with the issuance of maximum rent regulations.

NO ASPHALT AVAILABLE TO PATCH HIGHWAYS

Due to "freezing" of asphalt material by Federal Agencies, resulting in curtailed maintenance of Highways, Mr James G. Lott, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department, requests the co-operation of County Officials, County Agricultural Agents, the Department of Public Safety and the Press in providing the public with the following information.

In order to provide the necessary asphalt for construction of Army Training Camps, Air Bases, Defense Plants and other War activities, the Petroleum Co-ordinator has restricted the use of asphalt to military installations and the Strategic Military Highway Network.

As a result of this restriction, no asphalt is available for patching of holes, cuts or other damaged conditions developing on the major portion of the highway mileage in this District. Therefore, the Texas Highway Dept. will not be able to maintain the highways at the standard to which the traveling public has become accustomed in the past. The attention of the traveling public is directed to these conditions and it is urged that the highway users be patient and that they exercise the fullest care possible in driving over our

highways so that wear and tear to tires as a result of precluded road conditions held to a minimum.

The particular attention of farmers and other who find it necessary to port equipment or travel along or across highways affected to these conditions is directed to the fact that the fullest co-operation is needed in handling equipment in a manner that damage to ways will be avoided. In handling equipment, care should be taken to avoid asphalt surfaces throughlessness or unlawful operation not only subject to legal and fine, but is detrimental to the patriotic.
