NEWS FROM HD AGENT

Plant Bluebonnets now. Persons who desire to beautify their yards or flower beds with Texas' state flower next year should plant bluebonnets now. To grow and bloom successfully, bluebonnets should be planted in a sunny, well drained spot. Bluebonnets do not like to be disturbed by cultivation. They can be transplanted, but it is better to plant them where they are to grow. In this part of the state where it is too cold during the winter months for them to grow in the open, they should be started in flats, cold frames, or small pots and set in the open as soon as the ground thaws. The state flower is very resistant to cold and will thrive during spring freezes.

The possibility that a year-round cotton wardrobe for women might become popular is good news. For cold weather, apparel, made of velveteen and corduroy may be substituted for wool garments as a war-time measure. Outing sleeping garments and water proofed cotton raincoats will be high-style for the seasons to come.

When possible take a day out and prepare the soil for a fall garden. English peas, radishes, and stringless green pod beans may be planted now.

Two new books on Yard Improvement have been added to the Library for your convenience. They are "Landscaping The Home Grounds" and "The Outdoor Living Room".

LETTERS MAY BE SENT TO MEN MISSING IN ACTION

Red Cross Has Made Arrangements To Deliver Letters

The American Red Cross has developed a "hopeful" plan for dispatching messages from relatives and friends to members of the armed forces missing in action but not yet reported by the Japanese as prisoners of war.

The Red Cross plan was developed jointly by the Red Cross the State, War, Navy and Post Office departments, the Office of Censorship, the Board of Economic Warfare and the Office of War Information.

"Person in this area who have received notification that their relatives are missing in action but have not been notified that they are prisoners of war may go to the Chapter headquarters at Spearman, R. L. McClellan, and be assisted in the preparation of the message.

"Hopeful as this procedure is the Red Cross can give no guarantee of delivery. However, the early departure of a diplomatic exchange ship is anticipated and has prompted the Red Cross and the other organizations involved to do the utmost to get messages through the enemy lines."
