Group B includes: Corn and Cotton plnters, Potto plnters, Listers, Beet drills, Garden planterrs, Broadcast seeders, Mold-board plows, Disc plows, One-way Disc plows, Subsoil plows, Spike tooth harrow, Spring tooth har-rows, Soil packers, Stalk cutters, Cultivators. 


