FARMERS OF COUNTY HARVESTED NEAR \$3,000,000 CROP

Today Hansford wheat farmers have pocketed \$2,435,297.72 as proceeds from loans on 2,154,589 bushels of 1942 wheat.
Of the above amount \$906,563.15 has been loaned on 843,416 bushels of farm-stored wheat and the balance is loaned on wheat stored in warehouses.
A number of loans are still in process of completion, and many farmers still have wheat on which a loan will be taken at a later date.

Harlan Wilson Parsons son of Mrs. Mattie O. Windom of Spearman, Texas has been selected for training as a Naval Aviation Cadet and will be ordered to active duty shortly. He finished high school in 1941. Was captain of the basketball team and was a member of the football team. When order to duty he will report to the U. S. Navy Pre-Flight School, University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia, for 3 months of physical conditioning, instruction in naval essentials, military drill and ground school subjects. After completing this course, he will be sent to one of the Navy's numerous reserve bases for primary flight training.

Santa Fe System carloadings for the week ending Oct. 3, 1942 were 25,648 compared with 22,712 for the same week in 1941. Cars received from connections totaled 13,305 compared with 9,649 for the same week in 1941. Total cars moved were 38,953, compared with 32,361 for the same week in 1941. Santa Fe handled a total of 38,436 cars during the preceding week of this year.

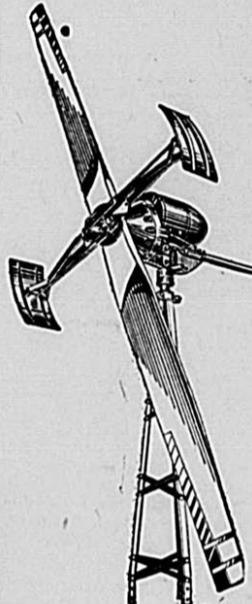

Schools May Have Half Holiday To Help

Columbus discovered America October 12, 1492! Scrap will save America Oct. 12, 1942!

Columbus Day in 1942 will be Texas Scrap Metal Day by proclamation of Gov. Coke Stevenson and on that day will be marshalled all of the forces in Texas for a gigantic scrap collection effort.

Texas Scrap Metal Day will be proclaimed throughout the State as a Texas holiday and in addition the Junior Texas Rangers and other students in the public schools of the State will have a half holiday to assist in the scrap collection on Texas Scrap Metal Day. State Supt. L. A. Woods has announced.

Thornton Hall, State Director of Texas Newspapers' Scrap Drive in commenting on the designation of Columbus Day as Texas Scrap Metal Day said "This anniversary of the discovery of America should furnish an opportunity to redouble our efforts to see that sufficient scrap is obtained to fill all the needs of America's gigantic armament production, because none of our boys on the fighting fronts should suffer because we failed them at home."
