SCHOOL OCT. 20

At Demonstration  
Club Room, 2:30 p. m.

How to feed the family for  
optant health, physical stamina  
and morale, how to save food  
and keep down the family  
budget, and how to use house-  
hold equipment efficiently and  
economically and make it last  
for the duration" are among the  
topics which will be covered in  
the Victory Cooking School and  
Home Demonstration Clinic, to be  
held in the Home Demonstration  
Club Room, formerly the Main  
Aurature Co. at 2:30 o'clock on  
Tuesday, Oct. 20. This program  
sponsored by Community Public  
Service Company, will be in  
charge of Miss Isabel Herndon  
of the company's home service  
department.

The educational program will  
begin with the Consumers' Pledge  
adopted by the United States Govern-  
ment to be signed by Consumers.  
"As a consumer in the  
total defense of democracy I  
will do my part to make my  
time, my community, my coun-  
try, ready, efficient, strong. I  
will buy carefully. I will take  
good care of the things I have.  
I will waste nothing."

Miss Herndon will tell how to  
purchase foods wisely, how to  
store them to preserve vitamin  
and mineral content, how to cook  
and serve them to save  
these perishable food elements  
which are vital to health, how  
to plan meals based on an op-  
timum diet or daily food pattern  
recommended by the government  
and proper nutrition. She will  
make numerous suggestions for  
the care of electric appliances  
which will keep them in good  
working order and extend their  
usefulness indefinitely. She will  
also make suggestions for using  
these appliances so as to get a  
maximum of service for a mini-  
mum expenditure.

Sugar-saving suggestions and  
sugarless recipes will be given  
visitors, and vitamin charts  
which show at a glance what food  
contains each vitamin. The food  
which is prepared during the  
demonstration will also be given  
away.

The public is cordially invited

### FARM TRUCKS, ALL VEHICLES EXCEPT CAR MUST HAVE WAR CERTIFICATE

Committee Appointed  
For County

In view of the critical shortage  
of rubber and automotive equip-  
ment, rigid conservation measur-  
es must be adopted in order that  
essential transportation require-  
ments be maintained throughout  
the Nation. As a definite step  
toward this, the Office of De-  
fense Transportation issued Gen-  
eral Order ODT 21 requiring that  
all trucks to be operated after  
Nov. 15, 1942, have a Certifi-  
cate of War Necessity. Be-  
cause of the importance of mov-  
ing farm products to processing,  
storage and consumption centers,  
the Department of Agriculture  
will, through State and County  
USDA War Boards, establish  
County Farm Transportation  
Committees and otherwise make  
its facilities available to assist  
the Office of Defense Transpor-  
tation and the Office of Price  
Administration with the regula-  
tion and rationing program as  
they effect transportation of  
farm products.

Under authority and approval  
of the State USDA War Board,  
each county USDA War Board is  
authorized to establish a County  
Farm Transportation Committee.  
State USDA War Boards are to  
notify County War Boards as to  
the time and procedure to be  
followed in setting up these com-  
mittees, the membership of which  
will be as follows.

Goss said "as long as our land  
produces food enough for all the

ness. We must never quit fight-  
ing soil erosion. We must never  
quit harping on correct farming  
methods. We should start teach-  
ing soil in the first grade and  
carry thru every year of school  
the same teaching. A big gully in  
a field is not a thing of beau-  
ty."

### USDA WAR BOARD ISSUES WARNING

No Construction May  
Be Started Without  
Permission of Board

The Hansford County USDA  
War Board warns this week that  
some residents of the county may  
not be following the provisions  
of Conservation Order L-41, is-  
sued on April 9, 1942, and  
amended Sept. 7th.

This order was issued to con-  
serve scarce materials by allocat-  
ing them to essential construc-  
tion and restricting their use in  
non-essential construction. All  
construction which is not essen-  
tial, directly or indirectly, to  
the successful prosecution of the  
war, and which involves the uti-  
lization of labor, material, or  
construction facilities urgently  
needed in the war effort should  
be deferred for the duration of  
the emergency. Only construction  
which is specifically exempted  
from the restrictions of the Order  
or which is specifically author-  
ized by the War Production  
Board can be undertaken.

No person shall begin construc-  
tion, or order, purchase, accept  
delivery of or in any manner  
secure or use materials to be-  
gin construction in violation of  
the order. No person shall sell,  
deliver or cause to be deliv-  
ered, materials, if he has reason  
to believe they will be used to  
begin construction in violation  
of the Order. Violations of the  
provisions of Conservation Order  
L-41 will be reported to the  
Special War Board Assistant to  
the Secretary of Agriculture if  
there is reasonably certain evi-  
dence of willful violation.

Construction which was be-  
gun, as defined in paragraph  
a, 8, of order L-41, before Apr-  
il, 9, 1942. Ordinary maintenance  
and repair work needed to re-  
turn the structure to a sound  
working condition without dam-  
age of design. Construction of  
farm residences where the total  
cost is less than \$200 over any  
continuous 12 month period.

The reconstruction or restora-  
tion of "Residential Construction  
damaged by act of God, etc."  
Construction of farm building  
fences, and other facilities ex-  
cept residences serving a single  
farm where the total cost is less  
than \$1,000 over any continuous  
12-month period.

Junior Texas Rangers of this

metal. Each child in the Spear-

to bring in scrap equal to his  
weight.

Spearman Lions have donated  
prize money for Spearman stu-  
dents. \$5.00 first prize, \$3.00  
second, \$2.00 third and 15 one  
dollar prizes.

Reports from Hansford coun-  
ty's two scrap dealers show that  
more than 424,000 pounds of  
metal has been turned in with  
perhaps another 100,000 pounds  
ungathered.

Dan Shrader reported about  
150,000 pounds and R. L. Mc-  
Clellan 264,000 pounds.

Inclement weather this week  
slowed down the drive, but with  
today clear and warmer, many  
tons of metal should be turned  
in this week-end.

This scrap metal drive will  
never end until after the war is  
over. Remember, one half of  
every gun, tank, and ship is  
scrap from your farm. Won't you  
go over your property one more  
time for scrap metal. Soldiers  
don't mind marching an extra  
mile to get after the enemy. Help  
him be ready by turning in all  
scrap metal.

### GAS RATIONING REGISTRATION TO START NOV. 9

The office of price adminis-  
tration formally announced today  
that motorists would be limited  
to 5 tires per car beginning next  
month, and at the same time  
disclosed that registration for  
gasoline ration books would  
start Nov. 9 in the 31 states  
where gasoline is now unrationed.

Every car owner will be en-  
titled to slightly less than four  
gallons per week, or gas enough  
to drive 2,880 miles per year.  
It had been previously thought  
that rationing would start Nov.  
22.

The car owner must swear he  
has no more than five tires. He  
must agree to periodic inspec-  
tion of his tires.

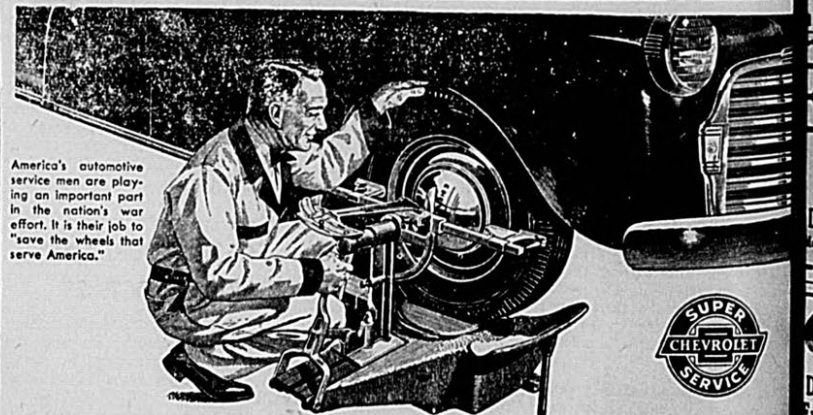

**PRICE CEILING REMOVED FROM SEVERAL FOODS**

Price Administrator Henderson announced a new alternative pricing formula, effective Oct. 15, for the following groups of food products: breakfast cereals, canned fish, coffee, sugar, cooking and salad oils, canned vegetables, dried fruit, lard, rice, hydrogenated shortenings and other shortenings. The action, which will result in slightly higher prices for consumers, was taken to relieve pressure on wholesalers and retailers caught between March quotations under the general regulation and the amounts they must pay producers. Mr. Henderson said the groups of food affected represent about 15 percent of all food purchased in the nation's food shops and stores. Mr. Henderson said American housewives should check the prices of food bought under price control last week by making a list of the prices paid from Sept. 28 to Oct. 2 for the various items of the same quality and quantity.
