Machinist's Mate First Class Jimmy Cook, nephew of Mrs.V Buck Sanders of Borger, and former Spearman high school student and Miss Mercedes Harper, of Oklahema City, were married on June 23, while he was on a 30-day survivor's leave. They were married at the home of the Rev. Orville Ray, pastor of the Baptist Church. Cook's mother, Mrs. Elva Cook. lives west of Ok-Mrs. Elva Cook, lives west of Ok-lahoma City.

Cook, 20 years old, has parti-

cipated in seven major sea en-gagements as the silver star and the two bronze stars on his south Pacific ribbon indicate.
