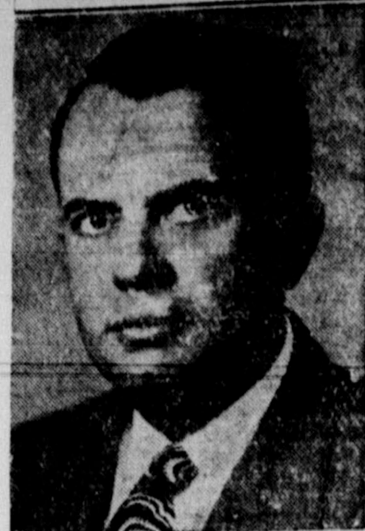

John Ben Shepperd, Gladewater attorney and former president of the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, has accepted the chairmanship of the recently organized Texas Committee for Redistricting. The committee, which is non-political, seeks to assure fair representation in the Texas Legislature for all counties by urging voters to support Amendment Two on the general election ballot November 2. Passage of Amendment Two will permit redistricting in Texas for the first time in 27 years, Shepperd pointed out.

Amarillo, September 30, about 4:00 P. M., men working on the bridge spanning the pavement between Morse and Pringle, had just completed pouring the last of the concrete on the bridge, and their part of the job was completed. The only remaining work to be done was the tying-in of topping and gravel on the actual highway as soon as the bridge has seasoned sufficiently. One man, Luke Edwards, about 28 of Amarillo, Texas, is a concrete finisher and he was standing with one foot on the track of the steam shovel while Lewis Reid, 48, also of Amarillo, Texas, was oiling the machine in preparation of moving it, when the drag line touched the high line wires above, and immediately the current was carried to the men electrocuting them. The current melted the spout of the oil can which Reid was holding, and his clothing was burned.

It is thought that his rubber boots may have saved his life. Edwards was more severely burned, and both men hemorrhaged at the mouth, nose and ears. They were taken immediately to North Plains Hospital at Borger. They were met at the Canadian River Bridge by an Ambulance, and the men were transferred from the back seats of the two cars to it. The cars were driven by Bob Mauldin and H. B. Heath. Heath was a co-worker, and Mauldin and H. B. was one of the foremen on the job. H. E. Martin is the other foreman. At this writing, the men are reported still alive but in critical condition. Mr. Edwards had been staying at Stinnett, and Reid had been residing at the Harris Hotel at Morse.

Incidentally the completion of the bridge on which the accident occurred, also completes the construction work on the paving linking Sunray, Morse, Pringle, Stinnett and Spearman. Lex and Maye Board have one of the cutest little houses you've ever seen. Last week the interior was papered (with kind assistance of Velma Board.) and they plan to move into it this week. The R. C. Berry's have already moved into their new house, and we have it that the Mitchells will move into Henry Davis' house formerly occupied by the Berrys. 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Fire Prevention Week

October 3-9

TO THE PUBLIC

Your attention is directed to the section of the new State Uniform Traffic code which became effective on September 5, 1947, as they will effect Texas fire departments en route to their work at fires. From Article XIII (Miscellaneous Rules) Section 100 reads as follows:

"FOLLOWING FIRE APPARATUS PROHIBITE.

The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm, closer than five hundred (500) feet, or drive into or park such vehicle within the block where the fire apparatus has stopped to answer a fire alarm".

SECTION 101 READS AS FOLLOWS:

"Crossing fire hose. No driver of a street car or vehicle shall drive over unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on any street, private driveway or street car track, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without the consent of the fire department official in command".

UNDER ARTICLE 16, Section 143, the penalties for violation of the code are set forth as follows:

"Penalties for Misdemeanors. (a) It is a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this act unless such violation is by by this Act or other law of this State declared to be a felony. (b) Every person convicted of a misdemeanor for a violation of any of the provisions of this Act for which another penalty is not provided shall be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar (\$1) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK PROCLAMATION

—We wish to call your attention to Governor Jesters Proclamation which designates the week of October 3 through October 9, as Fire Prevention Weew. We wish to add in passing that as valuable as Fire Prevention week in the Fall and Clean-up week in the Spring may be, nevertheless, fire prevention itself is a problem for very man, woman and child to work strenuously on a day by day, year around basis with help in the solution of this problem—Under the capable leadership of Judge C. F. Dohrn, President, State Volunteer Firemen and Fire Marshal Association for the Firemens Training school, together with the cooperation of Mr. E. L. Williams, Director, Industrial Extension Service, A. & M. College, the field training work for the firemen in this state has been placed under full time supervision of Col. H. R. Brayton, director, Firemens Training school, College Station, Texas, to whom all requests for public information should be made. This means that there will be more adequate and more concentrated effort made to accomplish worthwhile results in helping all Texans keep down their share of the 10,000 lives lost annually in the United States as well as lowering our share in the over one-half billion dollar annual fire losses.

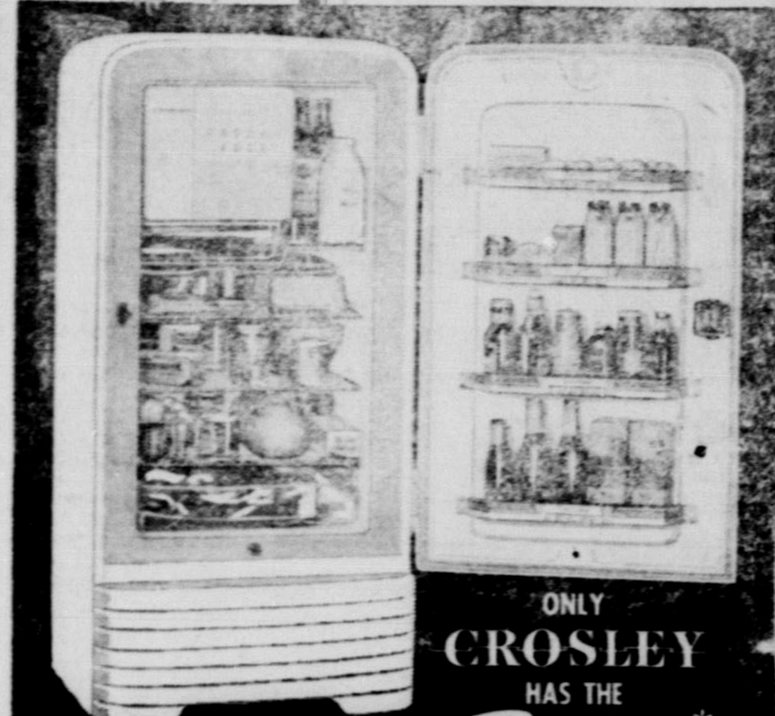

IS THE BIBLE INSPIRED? By L. H. Andrews

Sermon Topics for October 10: 11 A. M. "Worshipping God in Giving" 7:30 P. M. "How does God Reveal Himself to Man?" Is The Bible Inspired of God? Why do we ask the above question? Because everybody does not believe the Bible to be a book given by the inspiration of God. The view, widely advocated in the intellectual circles of today, is that man wrote the Bible. Some say that man has improved on the Bible from generation to generation as he continued to search for God. Therefore, the Bible is regarded as the best of other books written by man, according to this theory, the Bible is not a Divine book, but a human product, depending on the ability of the writer. The Bible is inspired of God in spite of what critics have said and done to discredit the inspiration of the Bible. I will believe with all my heart, that it is inspired of God. The purpose of these short articles is to increase your faith in the inspiration of the Bible, and help you to help

others to believe in God's word. I believe that God himself dictated the words of every book of the Bible. I believe that God used men to write the Bible, but I believe that these men were completely controlled by the Spirit of God, so that they could not write anything but what God wanted them to write. I believe the Bible is the inspired word of God and there is no other book like it. I want you to believe in the inspiration of the Bible. Therefore, I will give, in brief, some internal evidence to prove the Bible is inspired of God. Some External Evidence of the Inspiration of The Bible: 1-Archaeological Discoveries This science is becoming more recognized as the years pass. The findings of the scientist, as they study pre-historic men and relics, are very profitable in the proof of the inspiration of the Bible. Cities were built before, and during Israel's time. Their way of writing by picture and character told the story of their time. These cities were destroyed and the ruins leveled out and another city built thereon. The mounds grew some as high as twenty feet. Some of their history in their form of writing was buried with these cities. The archaeologist has taken his space and uncovered many of these, going even to the bottom and finding many proofs that have verified the inspiration of God's word. Some Sources of Information: Holley's Pocket Bible Handbook, Harry Rimmers Books, and many others. 2-Geology The scientists who have made an investigation of the earth's structure, and its physical changes, have added much to the

proof that the Bible is inspired of God. The Bible does not fear the test of Geology, but rather speaks to this science. Job said: "Speak to the earth and it shall teach thee." A conscientious study of geology in connection with a prayerful study of the Bible should lead one to say with David: "The earth is full of thee." Mr. F. H. Capron has shown how the very first words of the Bible are in accord with the very last conclusions of Science. Mr. Herbert Spencer an Agnostic, having as a desire to confirm the truth of the Bible, gave a scientific theory confirming the Biblical record of creation. Speaking of the "Manifestation of the unknown," he says that such a manifestation must, on a scientific basis, take these five different forms: Space, time, matter, motion, force. The Bible gave these five things long before the geologists were born. In the beginning, Time, God created the heaven, Space. And the earth, Matter. And the Spirit of God-Fore. Moved Upon the face of the waters-motion. The great men of science who have used the powerful telescope to examine the heavenly bodies, have given us much to prove that the Bible is inspired of God. 4. The Age of the Earth Gives No Room for Doubt: The Bible and scientist can agree as to the age of the earth Prof. Tate says that the earth is ten million years old. Prof. Ramsey says the earth is ten thousand millions years old. Others give different ages.
