'God of The Atom' Show To Be Held At Gruver Church

Proof that atomic energy is not too technical to understand or too dangerous to talk about will be presented at a free showing of "God of the Atom," natural-color scientific film, at 7:30 P. M. Saturday, October 30, at the First Baptist Church of Gruver, according to the Rev. Herbert Hughes, pastor of the church.

"God of the Atom" has been shown to church and school audiences averaging more than 85,000 a month since its release a year ago.

The film is one of a series including "Voice of the Deep" and "God of Creation," produced by Moody Bible Institute.

It will be shown by a special Moody representative, Mr. Percy A. Bagger.

Approved by the American Scientific Affiliation and commended by the Atomic Energy Commission, "God of the Atom" includes actual photographs of the Nagasaki and Bikini explosions, as well as scientific apparatus used in the atomic research. Narration is by preacher-scientist Irwin A. Moon, famous for his "Sermons from Science" demonstrations during World War II.

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R. V. Converse For County Judge.

Mr. R. V. Converse has yielded the solicitations of his friends and allowed them to place his name before the voters of Hansford County as a candidate for County Judge.

Mr. Converse took a law course at LaSalle University at Chicago; has seven years experience as a banker, owner and operator. J. D. Floyd Stars In Panhandle Game

The Panhandle Panthers evened things up with the Spearman Lynx Friday night, by passing, running, and holding Spearman to a net 20 yards gained from rushing.

This devastating defense and a smart bit of kick-off work beat the Lynx. The Panthers kicked to the Lynx from kick off position 4 times and recovered the ball the first two times, as the baffled Lynx forward wall tried in vain to field a short 10 yard "on side" kick off.

For the Lynx, J. D. Floyd stole the show. He took a partially blocked kick, and ran 45 yards for the first Lynx Touchdown, with the Lynx trailing 19 to 0.

J. D.'s vicious tackling saved the Lynx several times, and by far he was the star of the game for the Lynx.

The loss was the second conference setback in a row for the Lynx, and virtually tossed them out of the running for the District 1-B title they won last year.

The Panthers opened with a first half passing attack which netted one touchdown and set up another to give them a 13 to 0 halftime lead.

The final Panther scoring was done in the third period and came as a direct result of a Spearman fumble on the 45 yard line. Joe Knapp whipped through the right tackle for the tally.

With a score of 19 to 0 in the 3 quarter, the Panthers tried a quick-kick on first down deep in their own territory. The strategy backfired as the ball barely cleared the line of scrimmage and settled in the charging arms of J. D. Floyd, who was running hard when he got the ball, and never stopped until he had scored from the 45 yard line.

Windom set up the second Lynx touchdown early in the final stanza by intercepting Knapp's pass in mid-field and running it back to the Panhandle 30, Cayton then tossed one to Windom who was down on the one-yard marker. Two plays later Cayton went over for the T. D.

The difference between these two teams was the Panhandle line. Spearman did not make a first down in the first half, and only made two the whole game. Panhandle made 21 first downs, and a total of 300 yards of the line of scrimmage rushing, to 20 for the Lynx. The Lynx' fought hard the last quarter, and had over four minutes after their last touchdown to try and tie the ball game, but Panhandle took the ball, and drove 65 yards, to a sure touchdown, with the whistle stopping them on the 11 yard line.

Still you'll have to admire the Lynx. Coming from behind a 19 to 0 score, and almost catching a team that rolled up 300 yards from rushing, to 20 for the Lynx. It was a great game, and the last half was all Spearman's.

Ran Wilde Dance To Be Held Here November 5th.

The parents of Ran Wilde, who brings his orchestra to the Spearman Memorial Building on Friday November 5, didn't realize when they named their offspring that a tune called "Runnin' Wild" was to be written some years later. And thus it was inevitable that Randall should be shortened to "Ran" when the young man began his musical career.

Ran's distinctive sweet swing style made west coast fans wild about Wilde from his very first professional engagement - a nine months record-breaker at McFadden's Ballroom in Oakland, California. But it was Oakland's Athens Athletic Club - the same club that started Horace Heidt, Tom Coakley, Carl Ravazza and Del Courtney - that definitely established Wilde's orchestra as a comer. Since then Ran has played the Hotel New Yorker, New York; Peabody Hotel, Memphis; Roosevelt Hotel, New Orleans; Chase Hotel, St. Louis; Palmer House, Chicago; Statler Hotels in Boston, Las Vegas; and countless other leading hotels and theatres, ballrooms and night clubs.

Ran Wilde couldn't make up his mind whether he wanted to be a band leader or a business man when he graduated from high school in San Francisco. Finally, he selected business and entered Williams Junior College, following his matriculation there with a course at Armstrong Business College. Then he promptly proceeded to form one of the most promising young bands in the country and has now completely forgotten all about his business training.

"It's very simple," explains Ran. Music was my first choice all along, but I just had to satisfy myself that I wasn't missing anything.

At any rate, it is generally conceded that Ran isn't missing a thing so far as the "music business" is concerned. For he has incorporated into his orchestrations all the finer features of sweet music, which, when played to a swing tempo, are a delight to the dancers of every taste. Ran writes all his own arrangements, and his imitable tangos and rumbas bring joy to the hearts of sophisticates.

Wilde set an enviable record for a beginner when, in his first three years as a professional baton welder, he played only 4 spots, without a single layoff.

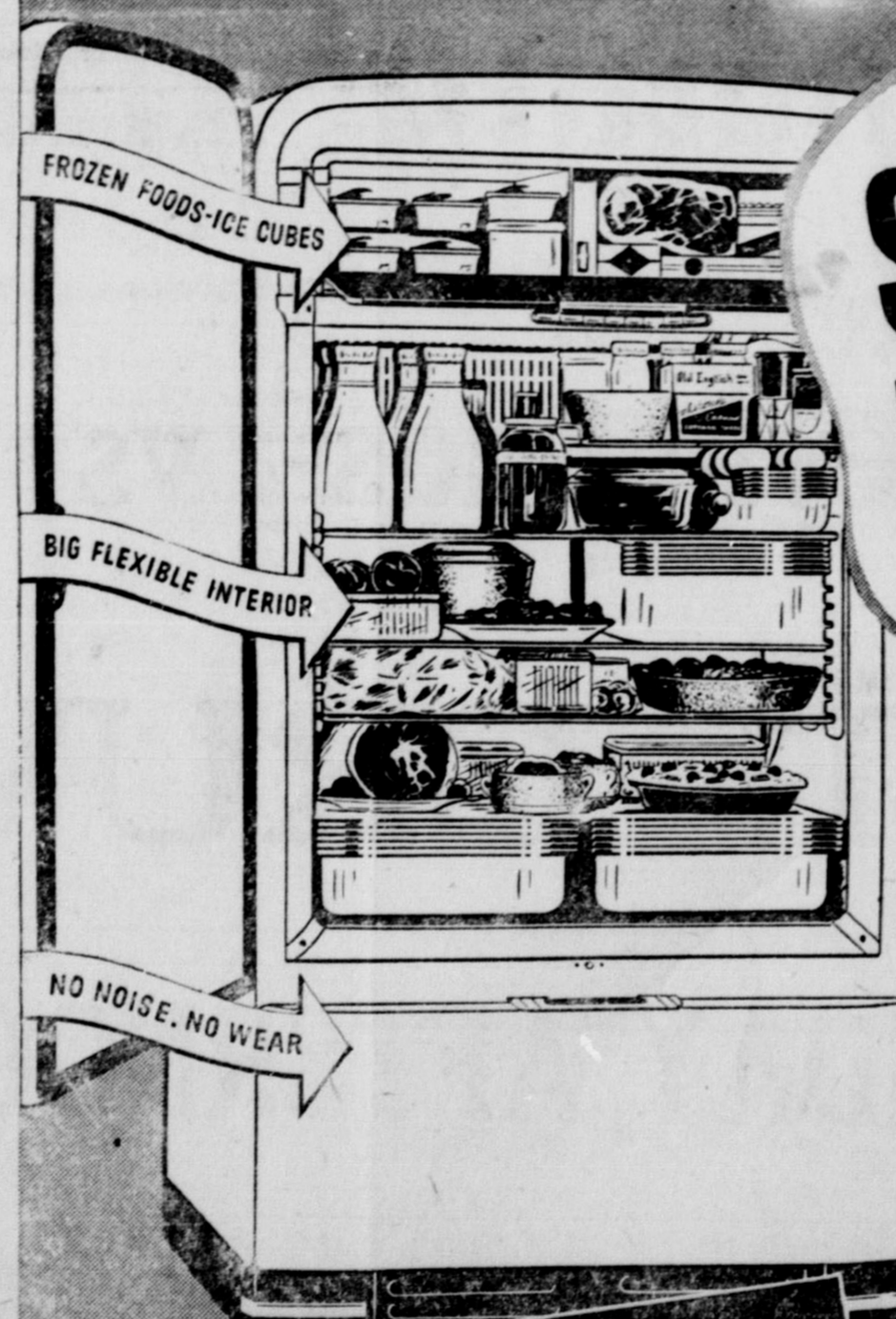

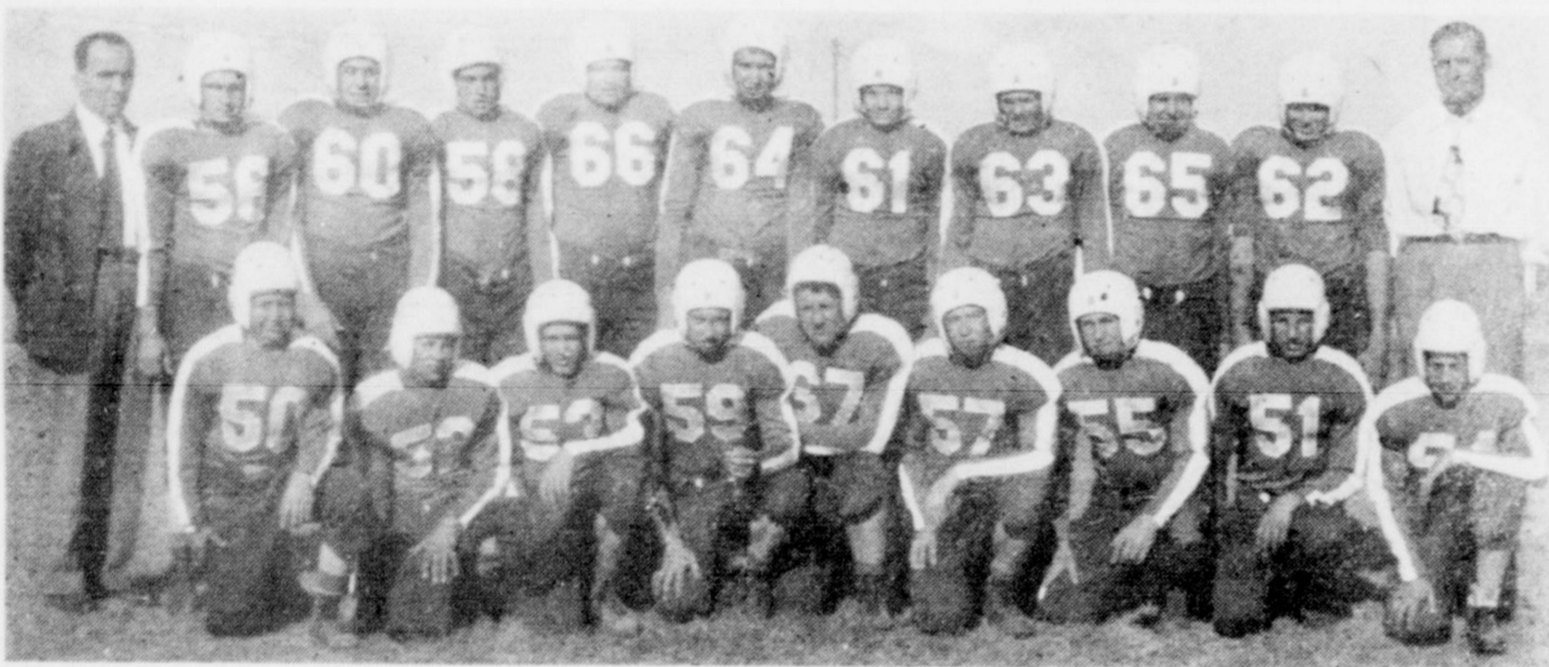

URGE VOTES FOR H. J. R. NO. 24 AMENDMENT

An appeal to voters to pass H. J. R. 24, a constitutional amendment which will repeal the 39 cent ad valorem tax for state purposes, to be voted on Nov. 2, is being made by County Judge Johnnie C. Lee. This will require a vote "FOR" the amendment No. 7 as it appears on the ballot.

Judge Johnnie C. Lee said:

"This is the first opportunity the county government has ever had to increase its own revenues without adding to the over-all tax burden of the people. 'The judge said.

"This is possible because it amounts to a diversion from the state. It will not increase individual tax bills because when referred for county purposes, the home-stead exemption still will be allowed.

"Therefore Hansford county will be allowed to keep this revenue at home for use in soil and water conservation and farm to market roads and municipal water supply development, just as many other counties are now being allowed to do through a remission of their state taxes. This diversion will not injure the state, which now has a surplus estimated at \$100 million because this surplus represents an amount equal to almost ten years collections of the present ad valorem tax, and there should be no necessity of creating a sales or any other type of tax for state revenue.

"This is of particular interest to West Texas counties, because they have such tremendous need for more local revenue and only 2 counties in West Texas are now receiving tax remissions now while 40 or more in other sections of the state receive all or part of their taxes back."

The amendment has been endorsed by the West Texas County Judges Assn., the County Judges Assn., of Texas and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The LETTER BOX

Overland with the Ownbeys
Mrs. Robert James Ownbey Sunday, October 17th Campo, Colorado

Sunday morning is church-time in Campo, Colorado, which is a small town of false-front buildings with 17 loitering men leaning or bunkering on the 10-foot length of sidewalk before the only drug store and post office. It was much to my surprise after thinking 3 of the men were more "Americanized" than the others, to remove my colored glasses and find that only 14 of them were of Mexican or Indian descent. The weather is warm with eleven o'clock sunshine, but a stiff north-east wind has the men in their coats. Once a canvass covered truck stopped, and 23 men and boys climbed out to smoke and fill two water sacks, men possibly enroute to maize-harvest fields farther north. We have spent Saturday night with my parents and had a lovely Sunday dinner and thus on up the Arkansas Valley from Lamar thru LaJunta to Pueblo. Saw our first flock of sheep and mile after mile of hay rick and stacks. Crossed graveyard creek, so named because an original cemetery was made when all the members of a wagon were found massacred by Indians and buried there. Radio Station KOKO spans the Valley, and most of the programs are in Spanish for the Spanish Menonites who live there. Rocky Ford melons, tomatoes, sugar beets, honey, and fruit are the trademarks of this area.

Monday, October 18th
Spent last night at Pueblo and attended a drive-in theatre which had curb-service and free bottle warmers for babies. Wonderful. Off came shoes with no groping for them when the picture was over; and the kids could yell to their hearts content bothering no one except their mamas and papas. First mile out of Pueblo passed a Crosley Station wagon which looked small enough to run completely

under a truck. Some of the trees have been touched with frost and others standing beside them are still green and fresh. Drove on over to Colorado Springs and spent the day sight-seeing. Found the statue of General William Jackson Palmer, founder of Colorado Springs. Visited the Garden of the Gods. The Garden was given to the city of Colorado Springs by the children of Charles Elliot Perkins in 1909 in fulfillment of his wishes that it be kept forever free to the public. An observation tower and museum known as "Hidden Inn" offered curbs for sale and had a lunch counter. Visited Manitou Springs and saw where the Sunrise Easter Services are held each year. Saw the scared Indian (which they call the petrified Indian) which was first excavated from Mesa Verde district. We climbed down into the interior of two Indian hogans and saw the designs and patterns on the interior walls that were in colored chalk. We then saw the Manitou and Pike's Peak Railway express which was in constant use for 46 years and was 9 miles long with a maximum gradient of 25 per cent reaching an altitude of 14,105 feet. We drove thru Williams Canyon to the cave of the Winds. We saw Indian trails along the sheer cliff walls, and visited the cave itself which is a miniature Carlsbad Caverns covering three quarters of a mile and has 19 rooms. In the cave we saw pieces of ragonite crystal which is found in only 3 caves in the world and which looks like melted glass just ready to drip. This cave was discovered in 1880 by the lads, John and George Pickett of Colorado Springs. The cave derives its name from the Indian superstition that the God of the Wind lived in the cave.

Along the road to Seven Falls and the original grave of Helen Hunt Jackson, author of Ramona, we found the sign, "The grandest mile of scenery in Colorado". We saw Prospector's dome, Devil's Slide, Old Indian trails, Pillars of Hercules, the Settling turkey, the Lonesome Pine, and scenery of South Cheyenne Canyon. Seven falls can also be seen at night when

28 floodlights with alternating white and colored beams are cast upon the falls. It is the only completely lighted canyon and waterfalls in the world. Eight underwater lights reveal rainbow trout gliding in a pool of water.

Tuesday, October 19th
Spent last night in Denver at the Shangri-La Courts which means "Chinese Heaven". Friends of our came in and we left the youngsters with a baby sitter and took in the town. Today we have visited the zoo, the capitol buildings, the library, and museum, and drove by the U. S. Mint. Driving on north from Denver after lunch we saw the little town of La Porte which only lacked one vote in becoming Colorado's state capitol instead of Denver. All this area is truck-farming with small patches of hay, with flocks of poultry and dairies.

Wednesday October 20th
Spent the night in Cheyenne at the Minnehaha Courts. Saw a real cuto supper club named the Shy-Anne. Saw the gold plated capitol dome. On our way out east, visited the Wyoming Hereford Ranch -- a place so large that it has 2 fire trucks ready for immediate use at any time. There are a hundred head of Holstein cows for nurses for the baby calves which are put on the nurse-cows until they are big enough to turn out into pasture or special feed lots. Across Nebraska, we met truck after truck coming west transporting International trucks. Have noticed many Krause and Jeffrey plows which are manufactured in Amarillo. Pine Bluff, Wyoming is on the line between Wyoming and Nebraska and is so named because scrub pines overlook the city. Okalala, Nebraska is wheat country. We passed the Haythorn Quarter Horse Stables. At a small cafe we saw the sign: "Kwitchebelyaken and SMILE."

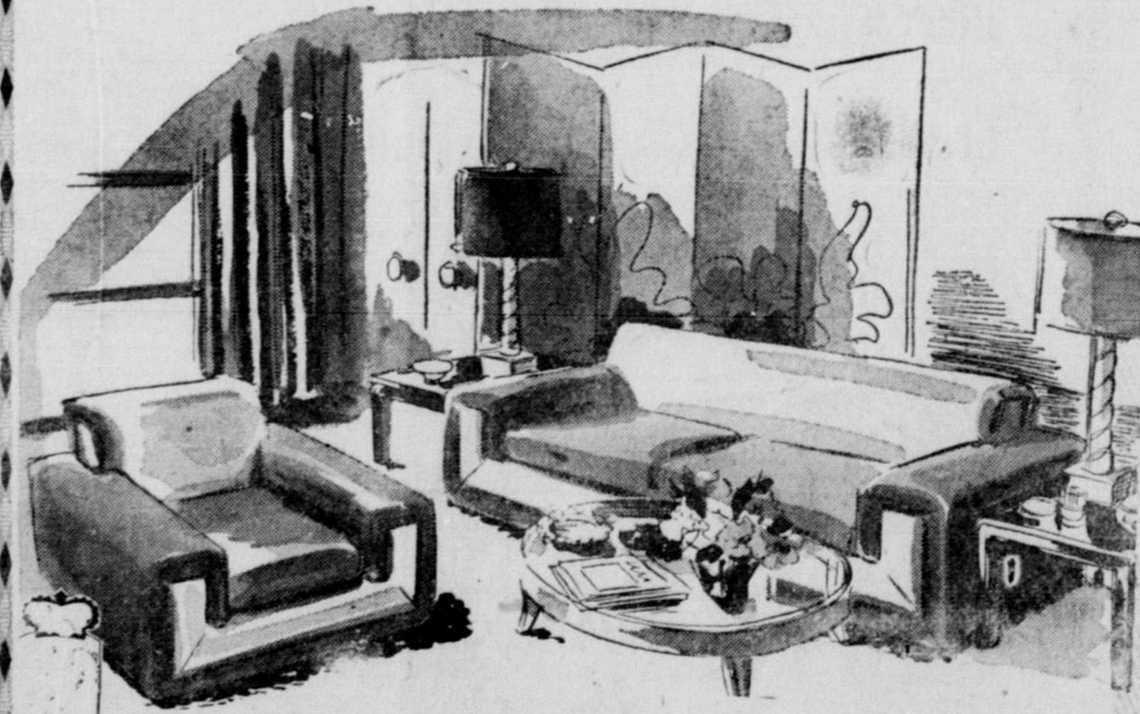

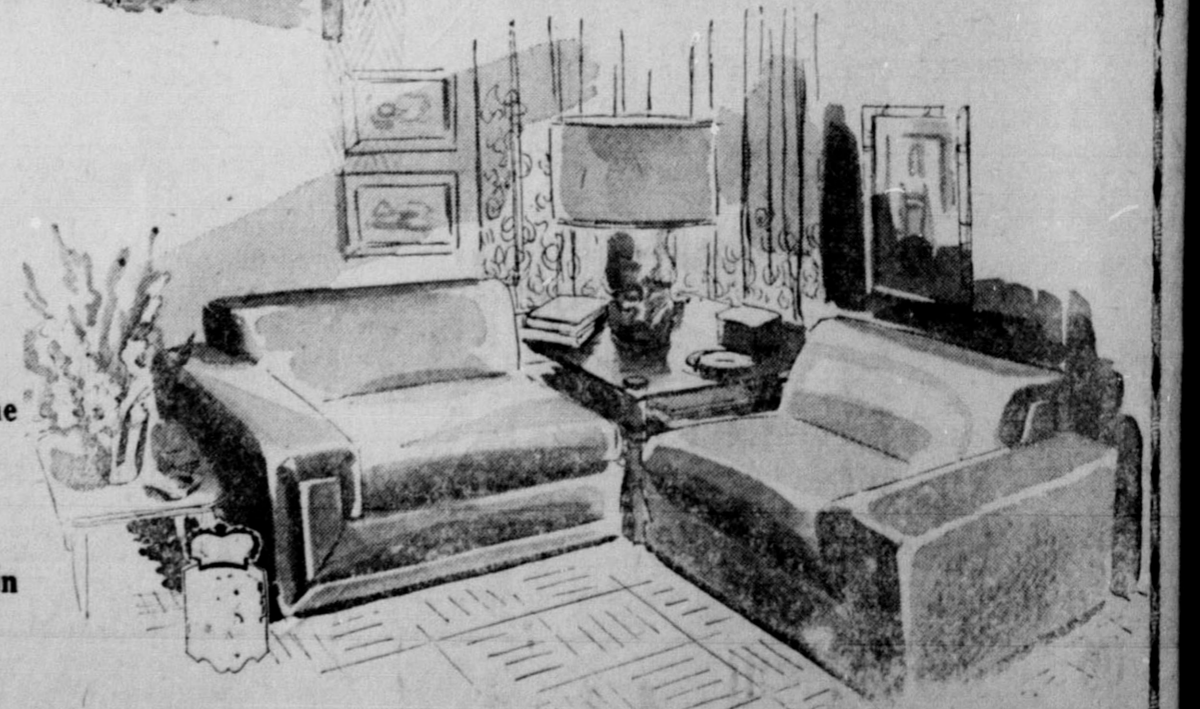
