





Old-timers of Dalhart this morning just casually glanced at leaden skies and occasional mic-roscopic grat of snow as they re-called the Big Snow that just 25 years ago today buried the Plan-handle under a chill blanket. "The only difference between that snow and these black dust storms was that the snow was white," Judge A. M. Rese of Dal-hart declared. Most of the time that day it was impossible to see the next house across a vacant lot, he said.


