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
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

Spring Festival, Friday & Saturday MAY 13 14

All of the West part of Hansford County is busy this week dust- in entertaining an appreciative audience. With one of the Gruver Spring Festival and rodeo, This year the lads West of the Palo Duro are determined to stage a Bigger and better cele. bration than ever before, and with the interest in the preparations that is manifested, it looks as though the entire population would live up to the advance publicity. More prizes, more contestants, and a bigger parade is assured. A much more appropriate place to hold the annual dances, and three contestants registered in the Rodeo Queen contest.

One of the attractive features of this years Festival is the big free barbecue to be staged Saturday at noon May 14. This year will mark the first time that Goodwell College Barbecue class will handle the barbecue. The class, which is anxious to gain experience will butcher and prepare the entire free meal for the celebration Members of the student body of the college will also serve the big dinner next Saturday.

Steers for the barbecue have been donated by Dutch Clawson Perry Hawkins and other ranchers of the Gruver area. The barbecue committe is Willard Shapley, Pete Maupin and Gene Fletcher

The Spring Festival will officially open with the first Rodeo on Friday afternoon, May 13. when the salty stock of Claude Hayes take the amateur contestants, perhaps as many as 100, to a hard and grueling task. Tom Hadley will be the popular announcer for both days of the rodeo, and it is expected that the army public address system used at Spearman will be in operation at the rodeo both days of the Festival.

Squire Maupin is planning for a large parade this year, with attractive prizes of \$25,00 for the first prize; \$15,00 for second prize and \$10,00 for third prize in the band division, A special list of prizes arranged by M. McMillian is planned for the bicycle division of the parade. In the individual entries in the parade the prizes will be: \$10.00, \$5.00 and \$3.00 for first, second and third honors respectively. Judges suggested, and likely arranged for are; Lee Little, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Perryton; Benny Benjamin, prominent business man of Borger; and Pat Ryan, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of Spearman

The first official feature of the Festival Saturday morning, May 14, will be the Pilots Breakfast at the Gruver air port. This has become one of the truly popular features of the celebration each year. If the breakfast follows the plans of the past two years, the pilots and their friends from over the Panhandle of Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas will arive in Gruver at about 7:00 a. m. to be greeted by the reception committee usually some of the attractive Gruver girls who will unload the planes after they have been parked and bring the visitors up to the air port building for a typical western breakfast of sourdough biscuits, ham, eggs, doughnuts and preserves will feature the breakfast menu. While the pilots and visitors are eating there is usually a program of music arranged for the breakfast hour.

Arrangements call for a series of street entertainment in Gruver prior to the big parade, Last year this entertainment featured the boxing matches of juniors from over the area. The street contests will be open to all teen age children who attend the Festival.

Both the modern dances and the old time dances will be staged at the Hansford County Memorial building, The modern dances will feature the music of Guy Neal and his orchestra from Amarillo. The time for the Modern dances both nights of the Festival is 10:00 p. m. to 1:30 a. m. The old timers will dance to the music of Gam. bles Ramblers, and in difference to their age the dances will begin at 7:00 p. m. each evening of th Festival. Oldsters are expected to clear the floor at the Memorial, home by 10:00 p. m. each evening. Of course if they have not had enough of the light fantastics they can join with youngsters at the modern dance and put the little foot forward until 1:30 a, m,

It is expected that the rodeo queen appear on a radio program with a national hook-up. Votes for the favorite cost 1 cent each. Apparently the American Legion Boys and VFW members are depending on a whirlwind end of the campaign as neither organization have placed jars for votes in Spearman or Gruver. Contestants are registered from Phillips camp, Gruver and Spearman, and it is expected that a lot of money will change hands before the Queen is elected and crowned at the Rodeo grounds in Gruver Saturday May 14. All of the money derived from the rodeo Queen contest is divided equally between the VFW and the American Legion. Both organizations plan to use the money for furnish-

Calcium for Adults



Soap Bubbles Prove Useful In Experimental Studies

Scientists have resorted to blowing soap bubbles in an effort to find out what makes metals strong, says Sir Lawrence Bragg of Cambridge university, England, Nobel prize winner in physics in 1915.

Soap bubbles, Sir Lawrence explained, have proved more useful than anything else tried so far in constructing a working model of the crystal structure of a metal. A cluster of bubbles, he said, behaves much like the cluster of atoms making up a metal crystal, and lasts "an hour or so," which is long enough to permit experiments.

The bubble-blowing studies were undertaken, according to Sir Lawrence, because science as yet has no satisfactory theory of metal strength, despite the enormous amount of empirical knowledge about the mechanical properties of metal which has been obtained through countless investigations of the metals and alloys so important in modern technology.

"On the theoretical side, we know the way atoms are arranged in the perfect structure of metal crystals, and the theoretical physicists can tell us much about the forces of attraction and repulsion which keep these structures together," he stated. "There is no bridge, however, between theory and the empirical knowledge of mechanical properties. We cannot calculate from first principles the point at which a metal ceases to respond elastically and vields with consequent permanent deformation."

Queer Facts About Spider Revealed by Entomologist

Ticks smell with their front legs. Spiders digest most of their food before eating. These are some of the peculiarities of one of earth's oldest and most widely distributed animal classes, as described by R. E. Snodgrass of the U.S. department

of agriculture in a report issued by the Smithsonian institution. It is an exhaustive description of the feeding organs of the group which includes spiders, mites, and

In rocks laid down about 500 million years ago, geologists find fossils of sea animals known as trilobites-very remotely related to the spiders and crabs of today. They were the dominant form of life in their age. They were essentially jawless creatures, having only a mouth through which they probably sucked mud into the alimentary tract. They depended for their nutriment on whatever organic matter might be contained in this

Since then jaws and other accessory mouth parts for grasping, tearing, crushing, and chewing have been developed in the processes of evolution. The spider and tick groups, however, have followed a line apart and remain about as jawless today as their most remote ancestors.

This is one of the ways in which they differ most strikingly from the insects, it is pointed out in Mr. Snodgrass' report.

First Steam Engine Ran Through Cornish Streets

In 1801, a 31-year-old Englishman named Richard Trevithick successfully demonstrated an invention which was to revolutionize world economy. It was the first workable self-propelled steam engine and it pulled passengers through the streets of a Cornish town. Stationary steam power had been in use for a hundred years, but this one and those shortly afterward built to run on rails by George Stephenson actually moved.

In this day when the most fantastic scientific advances are taken as a matter of course, it is difficult to realize the skepticism toward the moving engine. They didn't believe it until they saw it; even when they saw it, some didn't believe, notes R. G. Henley of the N. and W. Ry.

Lamb Overeating Disease Combatted by Medicines

Science has come to the rescue

of lambs that get deathly sick from eating too much. Ovine enterotoxemia, usually called overeating disease, can now be combatted by three effective medical weapons, veterinary research men told a national convention of the American Veterinary Medical association in San Fran-

Lambs sent to feedlots to be fattened for market often get sick and die from stuffing themselves on grain. An organism present in their digestive tract begins to pour forth poison under the influence of heavy grain feeding, with death often resulting.

Since the object of feedlot operations is to get lambs fat as quickly as possible, it is not practical to reduce the ration. So, instead, sheep owners in cooperation with veterinarians are now using one or more of the three following means of cutting down losses: A bacterin, which confers im-

munity against the disease. An antitoxin, which also confers immunity and has been found valuable in stopping explosive out-

breaks.

Sulphur, fed in small amounts along with the grain ration, as a preventive measure.

All of these methods have been tested under field conditions on many thousands of lambs, the research men said

Lespedeza Plantings Urged To Feed Quail in Winter

Shrubby lespedeza plantings on land that might otherwise produce little or nothing can give a great boost to quail hunting for sportand for game that can be kept long as frozen food. The soil conservation service recommends these shrubby lespedezas strongly for soil conservation and to feed quail They are legumes, and after the first year supply their own nitrogen on infertile soils. For the South, the SCS particularly recommends lespedeza bicolor: farther

north other hardier lespedezas will

do better.

Lespedeza seed is about all that quail need to carry them through the season of short feed in the winter. Most other birds do not relish the seed and leave most of it for the quail. The SCS suggests planting it in fence rows on the land that is not plowed, in thin spots and clearings in woodland, or at the edges of woodlots. It will yield far more quail feed than the weeds it will displace. A strip with an area of an eighth of an acre will supply a covey of quail and hold them through the winter. Eight strips of this size are better than a patch of an acre. As a hedge along a cultivated field the bicolor lespedeza has a season of beautiful bloom in summer, and bees find it a good source of honey. A fence

How to Avert Deadly Smog Revealed at Chemist Meet

Smogs like that in which 19 persons died in Donora, Pa., sometime ago, can be averted by a simple electrical device which filters factory fumes, Professor Frank T. Gucker, Jr., of the University of Indiana, declared at a meeting of the American Chemical society.

Explaining that the smog found so frequently in industrial areas results when water vapor condenses upon particles of dust and smoke in the air, Professor Gucker as-

"No fog or rain at all might form an atmosphere which was completely free of dust."

There are several methods of eliminating small particles from the air, the most obvious of which is passing fumes through a fine filter, according to Professor Gucker.

This would not be a practical way of removing commercial dusts, such as those put out by smelters and cement works, which may be a considerable economic waste and

health hazard. These aerosols may be removed rapidly and completely by means of a high voltage electric discharge, which charges the individual particles and draws them over to one of the electrodes where they are deposited. Such an arrangement, known as the Cottrell precipitator, will deposit tons of material in the course of a day

Still More Peary Tin Cans

To Be Found at North Pole Peary records recently found rock mound on Cape Sheridan by members of a U. S. navy-coast guard task force are not the first to come to light of those cached by the explorer in the course of his 1905-06 Arctic expedition. Nor are they the last to await discovery, says the National Geographic so-

> On Cape Thomas Hubbard at the northern tip of Axel Heiberg island, some 400 hard-hiking miles southwest of Cape Sheridan. Peary planted a tin can containing a small piece of the American flag and a paper bearing his name and the date-June 28, 1906. There it was found eight years later by Donald B. MacMillan.

> In mid-June, 1906, Commander Peary had placed records in a cairn at Cape Columbia, Ellesmere island, northernmost land of North America. The preceding April 21, he had built a cache for his records on the polar ice at 87 degrees, 6 minutes north latitude, farthest north attained by man to that time. While exploring Greenland's Arctic coast six years earlier, he had built a cairn on Cape Morris Jesup, northernmost known land.

Cape Sheridan, at the northeast corner of Ellesmere island, is west across Robeson channel from the Greenland coast. It marked the northern limit attained in September, 1905, and again in September, 1908, by Peary's Maine-built ship, the Roosevelt, the first vessel built Butter was one of Napolean's fa- in the United States especially for



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

When Gooking Sausages er when cooking bacon and sage for best flavor, tender texture and least waste, home econmists say. By keeping the heat low these meat products can be mal killer. ked thoroughly without drying. hardening, or scorching.

Slow cooking has another advantage. It saves the fat in these meats from reaching the smoking point where it becomes less digestible and changes the flavor.

Turn slices when partly cooked for even cooking on both sides. Pour off the fat from the pan as the bacon cooks. When done lift onto absorbent paper to drain before

Link sausage and sausage cakes may be pan-fried or oven-cooked. Take care not to prick the links when turning them with a fork because this lets out juice and flavor. To pan-fry links, place in a frying pan with a few tablespoons of water, cover and steam five minutes. Then remove the cover and cook over low heat, turning frequently until the sausage is brown and any water in the pan has cooked away. To pan-fry cakes, place in a cold frying pan and cook over low heat mtil cooked through and brown on both sides.

Cooking sausage in the oven takes longer but is convenient and economical if the oven is being used for other foods.

Questions About Freezing

Answered by USDA Experts Two home freezers may be cheaper than one in the long run. Or no freezer at all may prove more economical.

Families who are thinking about buying a home food freezer should make a well planned and businesslike approach to finding out what equipment will serve their needs best-and at the least expensesays the U. S. department of agriculture, on the basis of investigations by Dr. Earl McCracken of the bureau of human nutrition and

Two freezers of medium capacity -10 cubic feet-would cost more to purchase than one freezer of 20 cubic feet size. But when the stored food supply is reduced to 10 cubic feet, one freezer could be turned off. Also when food is being stored, one freezer could be used for freezing and the other for storage. If the family need was for 30 cubic feet capacity, a division of the equipment into one 10 feet and one 20-feet freezer, would allow still wider choice in operation with 10-, 20-, or 30-cubic feet capactty under refrigeration.

The "no-freezer-at-all" policy is more economical for some families, Dr. McCracken points out. This may be true for a family that has access to a community locker plant-cooperative or commercialconveniently located. With a good refrigerator at home including a compartment for freezing and storing small lots of fresh fruits and vegetables, the family may find it more economical to depend on the central plant for large quantity storage and for the heavy freezing jobs connected with butchering of farm animals or the freezing of poultry and of fruits such as peaches that ripen all at one time.







Going to the movies may be good for your vision, according to the American Optometric association. "Looking at motion pictures under proper conditions gives val-uable training to the eyes and muscles and nerves used in seeing," says Dr. Elmer M. Soles. "In fact, visits to the movies are recommended as an aid to correction of some visual problems."

Following motion on the screen helps develop quick perception, which is one of the objectives of scientific visual training. Adaptation to varying degrees of light intensity on the screen and in the theater may also be beneficial to those who suffer from night blindness, one of the serious hazards of automobile driving.

Dr. Soles accompanied his endorsement of movies from the visual standpoint with three warn-

1. Have your vision thoroughly examined if the movies give you a headache or any similar discom-2. Insist on sitting at the distance

from the screen which permits you to see clearly without consciousness of your vision. 3. Because movies require effi-

cient distance seeing, be sure that the glasses you wear are prescribed for that purpose and are not only for the ordinary office or industrial jobs, which usually require near-point visual skills.

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

Treat Poultry for Lice

Unless hens have been treated ex of all organic for lice and mites within six months, they may be infested with these harmful parasites, according to P. H. Gooding, leader, Clemson poultry extension work. An infestation of either may cause the loss of several eggs per hen during a month, and this greatly lowers the income per hen during the season when eggs are selling for good prices, he points out. Lice stay on poultry at all times. To destroy them Gooding advises growers to treat their birds with sodium fluoride dust or to apply a nicotine sulphate base compound to the perches one hour before the birds go to roost. Within 10 days another application should be given the roost to destroy the lice from the eggs that have hatched during this

Marketing Fresh Vegetables If prepackaged fresh vegetables are kept at a temperature of 42 degrees during marketing operations they will keep from two to three times longer than if no attention is given to refrigeration.

That is the digging of ditches. Dynamite can be easily carried through the woods, swamps and other country impassable to horses or machines and, once there, can quickly do more work than dozens of laborers or several machines.



But always the words "safetyfirst" must be kept in mind. The farmer should know his explosive, know the type of soil in which he is operating and should not trust his own judgement. If there is ever any doubt, he should consult an expert.

Ditches are dug by dynamite not by placing one charge, blowing out a hole then using another charge. Figure 3 shows the dynamite planted stick by stick at regular intervals so that whole sections are blown out at the same time. In this way, the earth does not fall back into a part of the ditch already dug One of the advantages of digging ditches with dynamite is that there are no "spoil banks."

No Crystal Ball Needed To Tell Needs of Soil Tests Will Give Farmer Answer to Question

You don't need a crystal ball to tell you whether your soil needs A soil test will give you the yes or no answer. Where a deficiency exists, a test will indicate how much lime your soil needs. County agricultural agents, vocational agricultural teachers or agronomists at state colleges and experiment stations are glad to cooperate in making such tests.

Testing is always the safest course in applying lime. Some soils have plenty lime. Adding more might be harmful rather than helpful to crop production.

Plowing Under Organic Matter Aids Oxidization

Plowing under some organic matter in the field or garden is a good way of disposing of crop residues because the microbes "burn" or oxidize them.

They do this slowly, yet the process of microbial combustion of such materials may have disastrous effects on a crop planted soon after plowing, in which case it is said the crop was "burned out."

Microbes need more than energy "go" foods. They need the "grow" foods, too, just as humans do. They do not demand that the nitrogen be given them in the complete proteins or the more complex compounds of this element as humans do; nevertheless, they are just as exacting in their needs for nitrogen, at least, in its simpler forms.

Dr. William A. Albrecht, chairman of the department of soils, University of Missouri college of agriculture, in discussing how soil microbes get their food, points out that they get it before growing crops get theirs.







"No one, sir," replied the frog, "I pulled myself out."


