

Every so often we hear the prediction made that the horse will vanish from the American scene in a few years. Most of the prophets are fond of saying that their grandchildren wll be able to see horses only in zoological gadens. But right on the heels of these dire forecasts, there always pops up some new evidence that the day of the horse is not yet over.

It is human nature, we suppose, to imagine that the new must always displace the old. Not long ago it was electricity that was going to displace steam. More recently the belief was current that internal combustion motors were going to make steam engines obsolete.

But along comes the United States Navy wth the anbuilt will be powered by steam-engines wthout any elec tric driven mechanism, although five of Uncle Sam's capital ships have electric drives. And in spite of the excitement and publicity about Diesel-engined locomotives on some of the stream-lined trains, the newest highspeed locomotives being built for important railway systems are steam engines.

Coming back to horses, it is true that there are not as many being used as there were twenty years ago, but there are more than there were 5 years ago. The highest count of horses on American farms was in 1918 when the census enumerators found 21 and 1-2 million. By 1931 the number had dropped to 13 million, but the most recent count shows more than 15 million horses now at work. "interior is a barti

New York state has just announced that its farmers will have to import 19,000 horses from the West this year to provide the motive power they need on their farms. Good work hoses are no cheaper than they ever were. An average of \$200. each is about the ruling price in the East.


Horseshoe makers have just reported a heavy drop in sales snce 1933, but a good deal of that is accounted for by the growing practice of farmers using unshod horses. Where horses are used only for field work and their hoofs do not have to hammer on the hard highway, horseshoes are unnecessary. Modern concrete has driven the horse off the highways, but he is coming back on the plowed fields.

OUR NATURAL RESOURCES

There is a widespread interest in the subject of conservation of natural resources. It is emphasized by the dust storms and floods, which are probably attributable in some degree to the recklesssness of humanity. Doubtless the plowing under of the buffalo grass in pats of thegreat Plains has contributed to the erosion of the soil by wind, while the cutting off of the virgin forests probably have had some effect in making it easier for rain to wash away the fertile soil and to flow unchecked into flooded rivers.

Any program of conservation to be effective, must go below the surface. There is serious talk of repossession by the state of Pennsylvania of the anthracite coal mines, whose owners say they cannot operate them pofitably, but which are being mined by "bootleggers' who have no legal right to the coal. Some such talk is heard about our oil resources, believed by some to be in danger of exhaustion.

The time may come when the whole question of who actually owns the natural resources of the nation will have to be reviewed. One of the greviences of the New England colonists against the British, which resulted in the Revolution, was the British contention that all forests were crown property, and no colonist might cut timber fit for frames, masts and planks of the Royal navy without permission of the government. If that principal were carried to its logical conclus-



ion, then all of the timber and mineal wealth of the nation would be government property to be extracted onlly by government permission and under government regulation. Perhaps that might work out as badly as did the system under which the government owned land of the West were given to anyone who would comply with regulations.

There is no doubt but what much of our natural wealth has been depleted, and can never be restored. More and more the population of the United States will have to depend upon industrial labor to create new wealth rather than upon taking wealth directly from the land. This is going to mean a progressive shifting of nouncement that the two new battleships about to be population toward industrial centers and that will bring a new set of social problems with it.

The question is how far any government will ever be able to deal wisely and effectively with these social changes.

Every employer who, during any calendar month beginning after December 31, 1926, employs one or more individuals in a busi-ness not specifically exempt from the tax, is required to make a re-dy turn on Form SS-1. The returns for the month of January, 1937, must be filed not later than the end of February. All possible efforts were made to place a blank in the possession of every potential taxpayer. How ever, it was explained by the Bur-eau of Internal Revenue that fail-ure to receive blank return form did not excuse a taxpayer for failure to file his return and pay the tax on time. The law provides penalties both for delinquency in filing the return and for failure to pay within the required time.







FOR TRADE WITH PROPERTY Red Cross Aid For Flood **Relief Drawing To Close** 

As o fnoon today, Feb. 24 Na-tional Headquarters reported col-lections for the Ohio and Mississ-ippi Valley flood relief of \$21,-120,000. The manner in which the chapters in the Middlewest have responded to this appeal has been a source of inspiration to the officials of the national or-ganization who are directing the relief operations, and to every member of the national staff a-signed to duty in the field. — On behalf of the flood refugees whom we are serving, I should like to convey to all chapters by means of this letter an expression of appreciation and recognition of this accomplishment. May I wask that chapter chairmen com-municate this expression of ap-preciation to other chapter offic-ials and to the many loyal volun-ters who have contributed to the successful results of this appeal. The reports from the field calerly indicate that there will be contributed in response to the ap-peal that has been made. I would suggest that all chapters that have reached or exceeded their min-ium goal allow the campaign to come to a natural conclusion, ac-cepting additional contributions that may be offered without soli-citation. Please report additional contributions and make remittan-ces of funds received to this of-fice as promptly as possible. — In addition to the generous of the flood refugees large quan-ties of clothing and food now have been donated and shipped to the flood area. We now have on hand an ample supply of servic-able garments. The collection of additional supplies of used cloth-ing should not be encouraged as such collections are not needed and may deprive local relief ag-encies of a resource upon which they have been accustomed to rely. — By courtesy of the railronad companies, freigh shipments of Red Cross relief supplies have been transported free of charge.
