## in Texas And Oklahoma Will Not Accept Wheat Much Moisture Content

Wheat storage promoters all over the nation this year, does not appear to be so bad in Hansford county as it was first thought. Farmers of this area have been putting up granaries at a terrific rate in recent months, and according to some estimates, a million bushels of farm storage has been added since last year.

A preliminary survey shows that there are approximately 8 million bushels of storage space available for this area, with 2 million on farms, 2 1/2 million in elevators, and the 2 million bushels of space in the Union Equity at Enid being held for the Equity.

This leaves the amount of wheat to go on the ground dependent upon how much wheat is harvested and how much terminal space opens up this year. Some have estimated a 7 million bushel harvest this year, the more optimistic say 10 million.

One dealer in this area stated that he has been "swamped" with erecting granaries since the first of the year, and that he has 20 granaries to erect before harvest, with 11 more on order when those are put up.

Elevator storage will be more plentiful than at first thought, too. Government wheat from the 1948 crop has been moving steadily out of the local elevators since the expiration of the loan period on April 31. In fact, most of the elevators are clean out of wheat now.

The emphasis on storage has become more acute this year because storage and price are closely tied together. When the new wheat started moving to market last week, the cash wheat price plummeted all over the country. In Spearman the cash wheat price dropped 51 cents from Saturday to Tuesday of this week, and cash wheat was \$1.52 per bushel in Spearman Wednesday.

While the government interim loan rate is \$1.85 per bushel, adequate storage, either in the elevators or on the farm, must be available in order to get the loan. Without storage, the wheat producer who has to sell his wheat at harvest time is certain to take a lower price.

Aldon Bell, manager of the Equity elevators, stated Wednesday that the Equity is in better shape for storage than at any time in the history of the company. With a new 270,000 bushel elevator at Farnsworth and additional storage space constructed at other elevators, the Equity can take approximately 2 million bushels of grain for storage in this area, and another 2 million bushels of storage space is available at the Union Equity in Enid.

Bell stated that the Equity will take grain for storage just as long as there is space available, and that no one will have to bring in cash wheat unless he wants to do so. This policy is general with all county elevators.

Wheat products of Ochiltree County met in a mass meeting at Perryton Saturday, June 4th to pledge agreement on prices to be paid during the 1949 harvest. The meeting resulted in a price of \$3.00 per acre being set for payment straight across the board for combining. The labor scale was set at \$8.00 per day and board. Prices for hauling was set at 5 cents per bushel for the first five miles and one-half cent per bushel per mile additional. It seems this price has been accepted throughout the Panhandle area, however, so far as we can learn the wheat producers of Hansford County have not set a standard of prices but we judge the prices will be in line with those adopted by adjoining counties.

## Bond Election To Be Held This Saturday June 11

Qualified voters of Road District No. 3 of Hansford county will vote next Saturday June 11th on issuing bonds to raise \$275,000 for the purpose of paving roads in the district.

Voting places named will be the Gruver Elevator and the Oslo school house.

Election judges for the Gruver Elevator voting place are: J. C. Harris, presiding judge, L. E. Morris, judge. Voting officials for the Oslo voting box are Gordon Stedje, presiding judge and J. I. Powell, judge.

Benjamin Wright James, son of Alexander and Mary James, was born February 12, 1861 in Blunt County Tennessee. # Cross Begins Re-building Program For Victims

Madison County Illinois, where one of the storm's funnels leveled 60 city blocks of Wood River, and in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, where 70 blocks were devastated by the other half of the storm. At the peak of the emergency on the night of May 21, the organization volunteers were feeding 5,000 persons, Wilson said. For several days thereafter when refugees had gone to the homes of relatives and friends, the volunteers fed about 3,000 cleanup workers and around the two worst hot communities.

Added to the unprecedented destruction of a little more than two weeks in May was tornadoes in Mississippi and Pikes in Arkansas which destroyed six homes and 100 others in the two states. In Missouri, 177 homes were destroyed or damaged. Advisory groups are being set up in the five states to be aided by the Red Cross. Disaster workers, who are already on the scene helping chapter workers, Wilson said. Among them are skilled workers who can advise stricken families regarding their plans for rebuilding. They are aided in other ways and are now in similar advisory care of the organization, and expert building advisors who inspect and help families in rebuilding and repair in which Red Cross assists.

**Britain's Farms Mechanized**  
News that the meat ration in Britain is to be cut to the all-time low of 17 cents' worth a week, mainly due to the lack of promised supplies from the Argentine, means that an even sterner effort will be called for from Britain's farmers. Only 13 cents' worth of butcher's meat will be available each week on the ration—the other four cents' worth will have to be in canned corned beef. The farms of Britain have already achieved phenomenal results in Britain's drive for recovery. Britain is now the most highly-mechanized farm country in the world, producing as much from its soil per acre as any other nation, but still more must be achieved to grow more food.

**Too Much Game**  
Too much game in an agricultural country can be as troublesome to the sportsman's permanent interest as too little game. Too many grazing-browsing game animals, such as deer or elk, can not only cause conflict with other interests but destroy their own food plants and make it impossible to rebuild the herds for years following an eat-out and a starvation reduction of the herd.





which said petition was heretofore filed in this Court; and WHEREAS, heretofore on the 11th day of April, 1949, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said petition, to-wit: May 3, 1949, and directed the County clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their rights to appear at such hearing and to contend or protest the ordering of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Road District No. 3, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors of this state and of this County who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper having general circulation in Hansford County Road District No. 3 for three successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said District, and one at the courthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

7. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election executed by the duly authorized election officers, are received by this Court.



**Give Poinsettia a Chance**  
There is no need to throw the poinsettia plant away after it blooms and the leaves begin to fall. Allow them to become dry, place the plant in a warm basement and let it rest for three or four months. In April or May cut the plant back and repot it in a good leafmold soil. Give the plant light and sunshine. During the light and summer months the pot may be removed outdoors. The new growth may be used for cuttings or the old stalk which was cut off may be cut in eight-inch lengths and the lengths rooted in sand or water.
