Wish you could meet the old German that takes care of the Orchid plants. His parents grew orchids before him and he grew up in an orchid house in Belgium and came to this country when he was about thirty and has worked for Furrow and Co. for years and thinks so much of his work that he has never been off for over one day at a time for years. The green houses are fixed with more alarms than any bank and he has been known to stay right on the job for 72 hours at a stretch taking care of the plants. Calls his plants his babys and I am sure that the plants get better care than some babies.
