

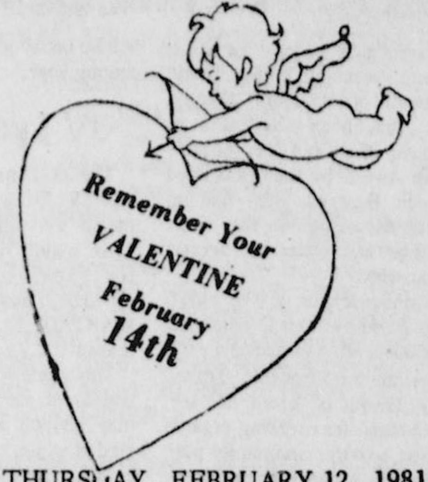

## Commissioners have busy session

Monday, the first February session of the Hansford County commissioners court had an agenda comprised of considerable good news and the promise of more.

County Judge R.L. McClellan told members of the commissioners court that the deadline for filing for federal aid for agricultural operations stricken with drought conditions has had a six-day extension--until April 13.

Across drought-plagued areas of the nation declared eligible for federal aid by the previous administration, applications and administration of that aid is being handled by the nation's Small Business Administration (SBA).

The SBA office at Lubbock is the focal point for seeking advice and aid for High Plains farmers. The Papers had previously run a story regarding the making and the processing of such applications with the then deadline.

Farmers eligible for the aid and needing same can get explicit details for application and further pursuit of such federal aid from the county judge's office.

IMPORTANT NOTE: It is not the work of the county judge's office to PROCESS such applications. The county judge's office is simply a source of information as a service to farmers in this area.

According to word passed at the Monday meeting, the new man for this senatorial district, Bill Sarpalis, announced that the state senate had passed SB 151 and was working with the house on a possible final bill in this session of the legislature that would give back to Texas counties their lateral road funds.

The judge noted that it was time for the court to decide on further support of the Panhandle Alcoholic Center at Amarillo. With the good news of most

being done at this facility, commissioners approved further support from Hansford County.

Commissioners also approved the crossing of a county road in the Gruver area by Trans-Western Pipeline.

The remainder of business transacted by the court had to do with the routine business of county operation.

Commissioners also devoted considerable attention to reports by Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and members of the Department of Public Safety.

It was noted that the commissioners court and other offices of the county had an unusually good working relationship in these areas.

## Blizzard strikes county

Monday afternoon, the droplets of a misting rain lightly coating the Spearman area vaporized into thick fog about 5 p.m. and a few daring souls predicted snow.

"Anybody who predicts weather in the Texas Panhandle is either a newcomer or a fool!" recited the less venturesome.

In the early morning hours of Tuesday, Mother Nature, without proper respect for tried-and-true regional sayings, laced the High Plains area in general and Hansford County in particular with blowing snow.

At Spearman, the unofficial temperature reading was "right degrees at 11 a.m., Tuesday.

About the same time it was THREE degrees at Gruver.

While press time was too

early for OFFICIAL reports, men who live by the land regularly said that, while the snow was blowing too steadily to melt into any moisture, the misting rain that preceded it gave the soil about four-hundredths of an inch of registerable moisture.

Predictions for Tuesday night--as The Papers went to press--was for sub-zero lows at both Gruver and Spearman but no additional moisture was foreseen at press time and a warming trend was forecast for the weekend.

The Panhandle High Plains area--which usually gets the blame for bad weather anywhere in Texas--was the victim, this time, of violent weather elsewhere in the state.

Monday night, an area east and west of the Bryan-College Station area experienced weather that ran the gamut from tornadoes and hurricane-force winds to freezing rain. This part of the state was under tornado alerts until 6 a.m., Tuesday. Official weather observers stated that the freezing rain that turned to snow at Amarillo and the blowing snow across the top tier of Texas Panhandle counties, was simply the northern fringe of the serious weather downstate.

By mid-morning, Tuesday, that weather system had moved easterward into Louisiana and official forecasters said the prevailing weather Monday and Tuesday across the Panhandle would move on out in its wake.

# Congressman criticizes Reagan administration

Congressman Jack High-tower today sharply criticized the Reagan Administration's tentative decision to maintain the U.S. embargo of grain sales to the Soviet Union. In a speech on the House floor this afternoon, the Congressman spoke of a presidential campaign commitment and the future of agriculture policy.

"I was very disappointed to learn that apparently a campaign commitment President

Reagan made to American farmers to life the ineffective grain embargo against the Soviet Union is, in effect, being overridden or at least postponed by the State Department. For the last four years, a major voice in the creation of agricultural policy for this country has been the State Department, not the Agriculture Department. I had hoped that with the change of administration, we would revert to the tradition of having agriculture policy developed by the Agriculture Department. During his campaign, President Reagan indicated this would be the case.

"Now it appears that Secretary of State Haig has prevailed in a cabinet argument, persuading the President to maintain the ineffective grain embargo a while longer. I understand that Secretary of Agriculture Block made a very strong case for lifting the embargo to both the President and the cabinet but to no avail. I was glad to hear that the new Agriculture Secretary is indeed starting out as a true spokesman for American agriculture. I would hope that if President Reagan does not follow through on his commitment at this time, he will at least immediately come out loud and clear for a very strong farm bill this year.

"However, I hope that this latest policy decision will not be an example of what is to be the rule in the future. In the recent past, everyone has been heard from on food policy except the most important people in the process: the food producers. It is not enough for Congressmen from food-producing states and districts to speak out on behalf of the farmer; a strong agriculture in America must have the support of the State Department, the Treasury Department, Interior and other key departments but actual agriculture policy must be formulated by the Agriculture Department. A strong agriculture is of the utmost strategic importance in world affairs.

"Now is the time to life the grain embargo because the immediate effect on the grain market would be minimal; if we delay until harvest time, a lifting then could have a more pronounced effect on the market. Now is the right time to avoid any market disruptions and prepare for a stable market at harvest time.

"I still believe that if our government is to engage in economic warfare, it should be total rather than a situation where we just take potshots at those we disagree with to the detriment of the agricultural producer. In such total economic warfare, the voice of the State Department should be heard first, but only then.

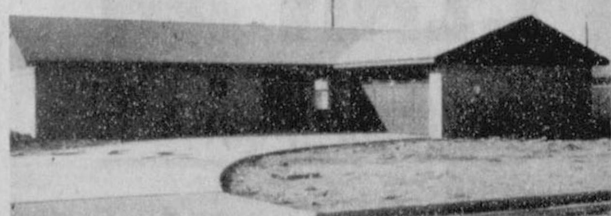

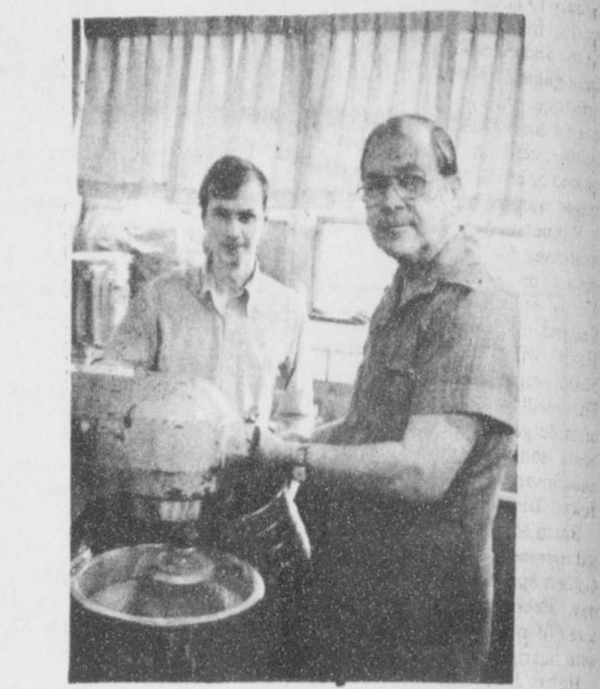

#### VALENTINE COOKIE SHAPES

##### Materials Needed:

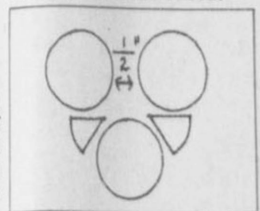
1 roll refrigerated sugar (17 oz.) or chocolate chip (16 oz. or 27 oz.) ready-to-slice cookie dough, blue and pink pressurized decorator icing, ready-to-spread vanilla frosting

##### General Directions:

For easier cutting and shaping, work with part of the dough at a time and refrigerate the rest until needed. Slice cookie dough as directed for each shape. Shape cookies on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at or until golden brown 350° F. as directed for each shape. (Do not overbake.) Cool on cookie sheet 1 to 2 minutes; remove. Cool completely before decorating.

##### Cookie Shapes:

**Sweethearts** 1) Slice cookie dough into 1/4-inch slices. Cut 5 of the slices into quarters. 2) Use 3 whole and 2 quarter slices for each cookie. 3) Arrange slices on cookie sheet as shown. Let stand 4 minutes to soften. Press slices together gently to form heart shape, leaving 1/2 inch between top slices to insure indentation when baked.



4) Bake for 9 to 11 minutes around edges. (Do not overbake.) Cool 5) For lace edge on cookie use a doily minutes; remove. Cool completely before decorating.

of cookie with ready-to-spread frosting. Center frosted cookie on doily; gently press. 6) Using decorator icing make decorative edges with star or leaf tip. Make written words and arrow with a writing tip.

**Love Letters** 1) Slice cookie dough into 1/2-inch slices. 2) Use 1 slice for each cookie. 3) Arrange slices 3 inches apart on cookie sheet. Let stand 4 minutes to soften. Press each into a rectangle about 3 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches, using a knife or spatula to form straight edges and smooth top surface. 4) Bake for 10 to 13 minutes or until golden brown around edges. (Do not overbake.) Cool. 5) Spread some cookies with ready-to-spread frosting, leave others plain. Using decorator icing make decorative edge, stamp, hearts and written words with a writing tip.

### IRS NEWS

Federal income tax returns must be signed and dated, the Internal Revenue Service said. In the case of married taxpayers who file jointly, both spouses' signatures must appear on the form.

When married taxpayers file joint returns, lack of income or absence from the home of one spouse is not a valid excuse for a missing signature on the return. Both spouses must sign regardless of their individual incomes. If one spouse is away from home, the return should be sent to him or her prior to

filing, according to the IRS. Spouses who cannot sign due to disease or injury may have their husbands or wives sign for them. After signing the infirm spouse's name in the proper space, the words "By (name of the spouse who signed), Husband (or Wife)" should be added.

The spouse who signed should also attach a dated statement to the return that includes the following information: the name of the return, the tax year, the reason the other spouse cannot sign, and that the ill or injured spouse has agreed to having their name signed. If a spouse cannot sign the

joint return for any other reason, the husband or wife can sign only if given a valid power of attorney.
