Funeral service for Eugene Clifford Barnes, 87, were at 10:00 a.m. Friday, May 29, 1981, in the Shattuck, Okla., Methodist Church with the Rev. Richard Cato, pastor, officiating and also officiating for the graveside services in Gruver Cemetery at 3 p.m. He died May 26, 1981, in the Newman Memorial Hospital. Burial was in the Gruver, Texas Cemetery by Mason Funeral home.

The musical selections for the service were, "I Saw a Man" and "In the Garden" sung by Robert Rodriguez, accompanied by Margaret Sherrill at the piano.

Casketbearers were A.J. Boudreau, Wayne Boudreau, Rex Boudreau, Don Gurley, Don Dietrich and Val Winger.

Eugene Clifford Barnes was born in Nebraska, July 26, 1893. He moved with his family to Hansford County in 1906.

Farming, Threshing and Water-Well drilling were his business interests. He drilled several of the first wells in Hansford County.

Eugene was a World War I Veteran. In March 1918, Eugene entered the service and went to bootcamp in San Antonio. Later he volunteered for overseas service with the 90th Division and 315th Supply Train. He served in the Army occupation of Germany, and at St. Mehiel and Meuse-Argonne Offensive, and in the Puvencello Sector of France.

On June 24, 1919, Eugene returned home to Hansford County.

Remaining in Hansford County he continued farming and carried on with his Water-Well drilling for awhile. He was a retired farmer at the time of his death.

Mr. Barnes was converted early in life and was a Charter member of the Gruver Methodist Church. He was a faithful member and attended services regularly at the Shattuck Methodist Church at the time of his death.

Eugene Barnes married Deana Barlow on February 26, 1922. She preceded him in death July 12, 1963. He continued to make his home West of Gruver until he married Henrietta Boudreau August 16, 1964, and the couple lived in Shattuck, Okla.

Survivors include his wife Etta and one brother John Barnes of California. His step-children are Mr. and Mrs. Rex Boudreau and Samantha of Midland, Tx; Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Boudreau, Janette, Michael of Austin; Michele and Chuck Barton of Austin; Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Boudreau, Annette, Cheri, and Greg of Crescent, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Staford of Shattuck, Okla; Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Swason Chris and Jason of Harper, Kansas; and Mr. Jim Earnest and Kathy of Colorado.

TENNIS *****

By Pete Fritchie

WASHINGTON, D. C. --- Bjorn Borg is proving today what Bill Tilden said and wrote about tennis many years ago. In general, what Tilden said was that the net-rushing power game--so fascinating and trendy when Tilden wrote twenty years ago--was not the be-all and end-all in men's singles.

Tilden might have been the best singles player who ever lived. And he warned then--and it's worth rereading today--that a top player

must be a complete player and have fine backcourt strokes, and that an all-round player of championship calibre would take the measure of the all-out attacking game of most of tennis' big stars in recent years.

In this sense, Borg might have reversed a trend, or at least altered the trend, back toward traditional tennis strategy thinking in the thirties and forties.

Spearman, Gruver Sales Reported Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has discarded the dirge of economic depression he was trying to teach Texans to sing at the close of 1980 for a paean of prosperity buy...it is not original.

Spearman and Hansford County were writing the music 'way back in las year when it was a waltz of easy confidence that has picked up the beat until it is stirring march of optimism.

According to the latest release from Bullock's office rebates of the one percent city sales tax for the first five months of 1981 are up more than 40 percent from the same period in 1980...with Spearman well in step with the state:

Sales tax rebates to Spearman are up 47 percent according to Bullock. More about that "according to" further along.

It is always necessary-to avoid a myriad phone calls-to point out again here that EACH PENNY REBATED REPRESENTS A DOLLAR SPENT AT A RENTAL BUSINESS OUTLET IN SPEARMAN.

Now, Comptroller Bullock's release says his office is using a rapid rebate system that should result in larger than usual rebate checks to the cities.

The total 1981 payments to date is \$282.3 million-compared to \$201.5 million at this same time last year.

The rapid rebate system may

be too rapid!

A neighboring Panhandle city showed 28 percent increase up to Dec. 11, 1980. Spearman showed a 32 percent increase at that same point. At the first reporting-April, 1981--the neighboring city was credited with a 38 percent increase and Spearman with 18 percent. Then...

FIVE AND ONE-HALF WEEKS LATER, the neighboring city is credited with an 85 percent increase and Spearman percentage-wise from 18 to 47 percent!

A quick computerization of the quick-rebate figures in the comptroller's report shows and error that sets the neighboring

city at an actual 54.2 percent and Spearman at an actual 48.3 percent!

This is not an attempt to belittle our neighbor. It IS an attempt to get accuracy in reporting these figures. We were for prosperity in the Panhandle...for any city--and even after corrections, our neighbor still had a whopping increase in across-the-counter sales for just a five-week period!

Reports from the comptroller's office for the city of Gruver was the "tip-off" something was wrong among the digits. Gruver was given a healthy 18 percent increase in the Dec. 4, 1980 tabulation. In the April, 1981 report, Gruver showed a 12 percent LOSS! Now, five and one-half weeks later, Gruver not only shows a healthy total percentage increase--18 percent--but a fantastic rise in rebates for the five-week period which reflects a serious increase in retail sales in that city.

This brought rebates--representing those retail sales--up from \$2,867.94 for the period last year up to \$6,256.27 for the period this year!

For the same period last year and now, Spearman rebates--representing retail sales--went from \$10,284.20 to \$28,828.20.

With Houston showing a 37 percent increase; Dallas, 35 percent; Fort Worth, 26 percent and San Antonio, 34 percent, Spearman's 47 percent (we have to go with Bullock's figure, right or wrong) looks pretty prosperous over last year.

In the light of the number and type of retail outlets in Gruver, that city's 18 percent is actually ahead of some other Texas cities like configuration commercially.

Too many of us waste too much time on petty matters.

Gardening News

PROPER EQUIPMENT FOR DEFENSE

It's safe to say that if insects and diseases are not a problem in your garden right now, chances are they will be before long.

You may or may not want to use chemicals for pest control. This is one of the read advantages of growing your own vegetables. You can do it any way you want to! Plant by the moon, sprinkle irrigate, choose your own varieties, or garden without pesticides. It's your garden and you make the decisions.

For the sake of today's column, let's assume that you're one of the large number of local gardeners who will choose to control garden pests using cleared and recommended chemicals. Proper use of chemicals poses no threat to you or the people who enjoy eating vegetables from your home garden. However, if the label on the chemical product you use says one teaspoonful per gallon of water, that's what it means. If the label says to wait three days after spraying before harvesting, it doesn't mean you have to wait a week or more. Follow directions on the container to the letter. If you do this, you won't have any problems with possibly dangerous chemical residues.

Using chemicals for pest control generally means "spraying" to most gardeners. Therefore, you are going to need a sprayer of some type depending on garden size, location, layout and intended use.

Sprayers used most often in local gardens are compressed air and hose-on sprayers. Compressed air sprayers are mobile, self-contained units that are pressurized by periodic pumping. They come in various sizes and are made of either plastic, galvanized steel or longer-lasting stainless steel. An obvious advantage of compressed air sprayers is that they are completely portable. However, this portability is directly proportional to your strength. In other words, a 5 gallon compressed air sprayer is heavy and unless you're physically able to lift and tote it around, don't try it. If your garden is small, a 2 gallon sprayer is probably all you'll need.

A hose-on sprayer is attached to the end of a hose, from which it receives its pressure. It's popular because it's light and doesn't need repressurizing by periodic pumping.

The main disadvantage of a hose-on sprayer is that it can only reach the length of your garden hose. Another problem arises in mixing ingredients. These sprayers operate on the principle of siphoning a concentrated amount of material and mixing it with a stream of hose water. To be easily siphoned, the mix must be liquid; yet many insecticides and fungicides are in the wettable powder form. Although these materials are meant to be suspended in water, thorough mixing is difficult sometimes. To avoid some of the problems of plugging up the sprayer, it's a good idea to pre-mix wettable powder pesticides in a small bowl. This helps assure that large particles are broken up and will not clog the siphoning hose.

Regardless of the type of sprayer you use, it's important that you keep it in good condition. Rinse it thoroughly after each use to avoid future problems. If you use a compressed air sprayer, store it bottom side up with the hose drained.

Safe and proper use of garden chemicals can help most of you have a more productive garden. However, you must always use only recommended chemicals, treat only when necessary, follow label directions, and remember to take care of your equipment.

Next time I'll deal with how to prevent and control common diseases found in your vegetable garden.

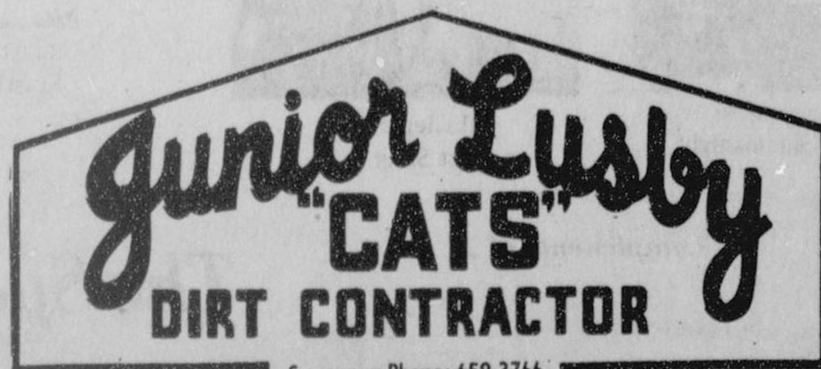
