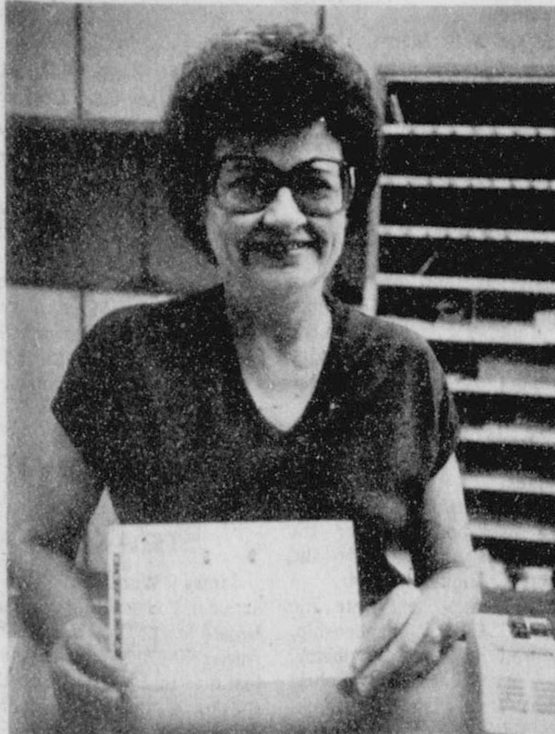

County Sets Budget Of \$1,555,999

Other than routine matters necessary to running the county business, the new budget occupied almost the whole of the agenda of the Hansford County commissioners court meeting, Monday.

The budget had been tabled at the last meeting so some study could be given to salary ratios between employees of some departments. Monday, commissioners voted unanimously to adopt a budget of \$1,555,999 for the coming fiscal year.

Other than the ratio adjustments -- which distorted the figure very little -- the new budget held an average 7.5 percent raise for all county employees.

Anticipated revenues for the coming fiscal year were set at \$1,176,300.

Local Man Injured In Wreck Near Guymon

Donald E. Wirsdorfer, 23, was reported in critical condition Monday night at St. Anthony's Hospital with head and leg injuries suffered in an accident near Guymon at about 2:45 p.m. Monday.

The wreck occurred when the pickup he was driving plowed into the rear of another car four miles east and 2 miles south of Guymon on a county road, according to Oklahoma Highway Patrol officers.

Officers said Wirsdorfer was driving north and did not see the car in front of him slowing down to make a turn.

Amarillo Firm Buys Hospital Bonds At 6.13

Work scheduled to begin by October 1st

The Hansford Hospital series 1980 bond issue of \$1.4-million drew five bids from money firms ranging from First State Bank, Spearman, to a banking house at Dallas.

Bids were opened at 1 p.m., Monday, at a special called meeting of the hospital board for sale of the bonds.

Fred Baker and Associates of Amarillo, was the successful bidder with an interest rate averaging 6.1316 over the 10-year bonding period.

This will amount to an interest payment of \$485,423 over the 10-year span of the bonded indebtedness. There was only about \$5-thousand difference in this figure between all five bids submitted.

Even as the bids were being processed, phone calls were

coming in from interested persons and firms in the money mainstream seeking to know the successful bidder and the interest rate bid.

After the board had officially voted to accept the Amarillo financial consulting firm's bid, Bob Davis, representing Baker, was asked why the bonds drew so much attention. He told them the answer was simple: the short term.

Hospital Administrator Jerry Taylor had predicted a more favorable market for the bond issue back when the bonding period was changed from 15 years to 10 at the cost of some five cents to the tax rate.

Payments on the bonds and interest will be made semi-annually on Feb. 1 and Aug. 1 each year. Repayment monies

will come from ad valorem taxes assessed and collected within the hospital district.

The hospital will receive the money from sale of the bonds about Sept. 1.

Construction of the new nursing home and attendant changes in the existing hospital building--for which the bond issue was sought--has been put on a final schedule by the approving agency.

The architect will meet with the hospital board Friday to review pre-final contract documents. The board must finalize those contract documents between Aug. 4-8. Reproductions of those contract documents must be executed between Aug. 11-15.

Aug. 20, contract documents are to be released to bidders

with Sept. 17 the designated date to receive bids.

Between those dates, on Aug. 27 Addendum One must be ready and on Sept. 10, Addendum Three must be completed.

After receipt of bids Sept. 17, the board will conduct a bid analysis and a contract will be awarded Sept. 26.

Construction must start Oct. 1.

That is the schedule laid down by the authorizing government agency and must be adhered to without exception, according to Administrator Taylor.

No completion date can be anticipated until bids are opened and a contract awarded. A part of each bid will be the number of work days required under the bid schedule.

Peggy's Pointers

Pay careful attention to clothing contaminated by pesticides.

Some pesticides can enter the body through the skin.

Wash clothes worn while applying pesticides daily, or store them in a plastic bag to await laundering. Do not mix contaminated clothes with other laundry.

Normal heavily soiled laundry procedures will remove pesticide from clothing.

Follow this procedure:

- Use hot wash water, 130-140 degrees F. and normal or full water level. Pre-soak or prewash for extra heavily soiled garments.
- Use the manufacturer's recommended amount of heavy-duty detergent for heavily soiled laundry.
- Use chlorine bleach to aid in sanitizing and deodorizing if garments are bleachable. Check permanent-care labels for warnings against bleaching.
- Thoroughly rinse with cold water.
- If possible, thoroughly dry in an automatic dry at the regular fabric setting.
- Remove any leftover pesticide from the washer by running the machine through the complete laundering cycle, using detergent but no clothes.

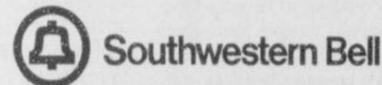
