

Banking Services

A constitutional amendment to provide Texans with aroundthe-clock basic banking services at convenient locations has gained the backing of a 1,500member statewide organiza-

Don Cavness, Austin businessman and coordinator of the public education campaign for Proposition 1 on the November 4 ballot, announced today that the citizens' group has been formed to assist the three statewide banking associations

in support of the amendment. Cavness said: "Proposition 1 has only one purpose, and that is to provide unmanned teller machines at locations more convenient to bank customers so that they can withdraw or deposit money whenever they wish without going to their bank. It is the most important time-saving and energy-saving

development in Texas banking in recent history. The Texas Bankers Association, Independent Bankers Association of Texas, and Texas Association of Bank Holding companies--representing more than 1,400 banks--have united

in support of Proposition 1 by forming the Convenience Banking Committee. 'While there is no organized opposition to Proposition 1," Cavness said, "we want to be certain that Texans realized that the amendment will benefit them directly by offering a convenient banking choice for

those who wish to use unman-

ned tellers away from their

banks." He pointed out that bank customers will have full control of their own accounts and strong consumer protections under federal law if they use the unmanned tellers. Proposition 1 also provides that off-premises unmanned tellers must be shared by banks within a county on a non-discriminatory basis. The tellers may also be shared with credit unions and savings and

"The Constitution at present does not permit banks to install unmanned tellers except at banking locations," Cavness explained. "Credit unions and savings and loans institutions do have this privilege, and Proposition 1 merely extends the same opportunity to state and national banks in Texas for competitive equity in providing customers with another convenient choice.'

A state law has already been passed, subject to approval of the constitutional amendment. which limits unmanned tellers to five functions: cash withdrawal, deposits, loan payments by the customer to the bank, transfer between a customer's accounts within the same bank, and balance information for the customer. "The law makes certain that

County Attorney John Hutchison explained the nine constitutional amendments that are on the ballot in the November 4 election to the Spearman Rotary Club Monday noon in the garden room of the Cattleman's Restaurant. Singing was led by Ed Freeman. Durane Castleberry led the pledge of allegiance. Frank Oglesby gave the

prayer of invocation. Attorney Hutchison explained that none of the nine amendments are self-enacting amendments. All nine propositions give the legislature permission to enact legislation on these propositions if they want to. The nine propositions are:

1. Permits banks to have machines for banking not connected physically with the bank building anywhere in the same county. This would be a form of branch banking.

2. Affects felony cases and would have the affect of delaying trials.

3. This would require a single appraisal for taxing districts. It does away with a board of equalization.

4. Permits local option bingo. 5. Permits authority to the leglislature to pass a law to let the governor have some budget setting powers.

6. Would allow the governor to remove an appointive officer with the consent of the legisla-

7. Would grant small counties (under 5,000) population) permission to do private contract road work

8. Would change the court system and reduce the case load of the court of criminal appeals in Austin by allowing criminal cases to be tried in fourteen appellate courts throughout the state. The present system requires all criminal cases to be appealed to nine judges in Austin who have such a heavy case load that they are two years behind in their docket.

9. Concerns community pro perty laws. This primarily affects divorced couples who remarry and widow and widower marriages.

For a number of reasons, this selection of jurors has been delayed but....the trial--or trials -have not been postponed.

Pretrial proceedings are moving on apace but seemingly all aspects of the actions underway have been hampered by "galloping virus" sweeping the area. At least one attorney involved in the proceedings has been attacked by the "bug." In addition to the rumor that

the trial had been postponed, there was some confusion regarding the nature of the trial itself. Certain folk, glancing at headlines only withoutreading the accompanying story, thought Hansford County's escapees of some time ago were being tried. They have been disposed of for some months

The proceedings, moved to Hansford County on a change of venue from Hutchinson County by presiding Judge Guy Hazlett, involve Michael Clyde Jones and George Marshall Hall who fled the Hutchinson County jail several months ago and killed a jailer in the course of their jailbreak.







Helptul Hints

New advice and old advice-but all of it good advice--on how to keep your food and energy bills down appears in the November Reader's Digest. Some of the helpful hints

* When possible, cook with small electrical appliances-broilers, frying pans, grills, rotisseries. All generally use

less energy than the stove. * Don't preheat your oven unless you're cooking baked

* Use heat-retaining glass or ceramic dishes. They lower heat requirements by 25 degrees.

* Store leftovers in containers, rather than using expensive plastic wrap. When putting food away, assemble it in one place and store it all at once. Keep refrigerator openings and closmgs to a minimum.

Remove large items from the freezer and store in the refrigerator to defrost. In doing so, the meat or poultry will help cool down the fridge and may cut down running time.

* Scrape your plates before storing in the dishwasher--you can then skip the prerinse cycle. And turn the machine off before the drying cycly; the dishes dry themselves on the heat already generated.

* Try the "no-name" brands. These are usually priced 20 to 40 percent below national brands, 10 to 20 percent below store brands.

* Avoid convenience foods. Dishes are a lot cheaper when you put them together yourself. Also avoid empty foods--put your money in basics and eschew snacks.

* Sometimes bulk-meat sales aren't the bargain you think they are. Find out what the meat grade is, whether there is a charge for processing, and how much a loss there is after

amount of water in the Ogallala Aquifer and projections for future years in Hansford County has been completed by the Texas Department of Water Resources (TDWR).

Report 257, "Analytical Study of the Ogallala Aquifer in Hansford County, Texas' charts the impact and future course of underground water depletion through the next 41 years and its effect on irrigation water production. The study and report were made by TDWR staff members Ann E. Bell, and Shelly Morrison.

Copies of report 257 are available without charge from the Texas Department of Water Resources, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711.

Generally, the study shows that if present water use and irrigation practices are continued, the aquifer will decline by about 33 percent by the year 2000 and about 55 percent by Brenda Shieldknight, Michele the year 2020.

Most High Plains residents are well informed on the continuing decline of the region's ground water, and know that this is the lifeblood of the area's agriculture where some 70 percent of the State's irrigated food and fiber is

Guidelines provided in the report were obtained by the use of electronic computers that simulate the aquifer's behavior and should provide the groundwater user in the county with reasonably good estimates by which future management decisions can be made.

Hansford County had about 17.6 million acre-feet of ground water in storage in 1974. The computer study shows that 67 percent, or about 11.8 million acre-feet, will be left in storage in 200 if past water-use patterns and aquifer behavior are continued in the future. Only 7.9 million acre-feet, or 45 percent, will remain in storage by the year 2020.

Nowhere within the county is the water expected to be exhausted, but yields of wells will decrease, and the expense of irrigation pumpage will increase. Pumping lifts in wells, which now range between 50

AUSTIN, Texas--A study of the and 475 feet, are expected to range between 100 and 550 feet by the year 200 and to approach 625 fet in some local areas by 2020. The increased lifts will require more energy and thus greater cost in bringing the

water to the surface. With the thinning of the aquifer's saturated thickness, annual pumpage of water in the county will decline significantly. Compared to the 265,000 acrefeet of water produced in 1974, the amount expected to be produced in the years 2000 and 2020 is about 264,000 and 221,000 acre-feet respectively, an overall decline of 17 percent.

During the past three de-cades, the withdrawal of ground water has greatly exceeded the natural recharge of thw aquifer. If this overdraft continues, the aquifer ultimately will be depleted to the point that it may not be economically feasible to produce water for irrigation, the authors state.

These findings, the authors emphasize, are based on the continuation of past trends. Future events can be very different if these trends change. The most determinative factor may be the decisions of the water users themselves.

Report 257 contains maps, charts, and tabulations which reflect estimates of the volume of water in storage in the Ogalla Aquifer in Hansford County and the projected depletion of this water supply by decade periods through the year 2020. The report also contains estimates of pumpage, pumping lifts, and other data related to current and future water use in the

The maps in the report are intended for use as general guidelines only and are not recommended for use in determining water availability when buying and selling specific tracts of land. It is recommended that a qualified ground-water hydrologist be consulted to make appraisals of ground water conditions when such transactions are contemplated.


