Charges pressed on four

Four persons from Oklahoma were processed on two separate charges this week by the Hansford County Sheriff's Department.

Brenda Lindsey, Guymon, Okla.; Reno Jones and a juvenile--both from Optima, Okla.--were arraigned on a charge each of criminal trespass.

Russell Jones, Optima, was arraigned on a charge of criminal mischief.

Other than this activity, it has been routine in the department for a number of days. There is always the task of serving papers, of processing prisoners already in custody but the Oklahoma quartet made up the only new "business" for the department in some time.

We would like to echo a warning issued by Sheriff R.L. McFarlin shortly after the damaging hail, wind and rainstorm in June. He noted then roofers would be at work in the city and outlying areas--and they are still busy with the damage--and Sheriff McFarlin pointed out that roofing is a favorite "racket" of the seasonal "confidence" men who pass through each year preying particularly on the elderly.

At that time--and the warning is still valid--the sheriff urged persons with roof and other property damage to go through legitimate channels, both for insurance adjusting and for repairs, rather than to seek a dubious money-savings on the misfortune.

City 'drink' law told

During the weekend, the Spearman Police Department made seven alcohol-related arrests.

This was a reduction by almost half the 13 arrests made the previous weekend.

Friday night two adults were arrested for after-hours consumption of alcoholic beverages and the Saturday night police blotter held one adult arrest for the same offense and the arrests of four minors for possession of alcoholic beverages.

To be absolutely fair, the Police Department defined certain alcohol-related offenses. After-hours consumption is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$50.

"A person commits an offense if he or she consumes an alcoholic beverage in a public place at any time between 12:15 a.m. and 7 a.m. Monday through Saturday and between 1:15 a.m. and 12 noon Sundays. The only night that consumption is legal after 12:15 a.m. is Saturday night and that is extended to 1:15 a.m."

According to the Police Department--and prevailing stat-

utes--a public place means any place to which the public has access. Any private property that the public has use of is considered a public place.

A business parking lot that is not posted against trespassing meets the requirements of this definition.

Enforcement of these laws will be continued as long as necessary, according to local authorities.

Another problem with which local police often have to deal in the heat of the summer is the swimming pool situation. There are two important things here:

One, the Nurseanickel! Motel swimming pool is always closed to the public, operating for registered guests only. Anyone using it not as a registered guest will be prosecuted for criminal trespass.

The only swimming pool available to the public is operated by the YMCA between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m.

This means the pool is closed every evening unless it is rented for a party.

Two residents killed in 2-car accident

Two members of a Spearman family were killed and three others injured Friday in a two-car accident south of Lamesa.

Irma Limbocker, 21, and her niece Cynthia Diane DeLaCruz, 3, both of Spearman, were killed about 6 p.m. Friday in the collision at Texas 137 and Farm Road 828 about 15 miles south of Lamesa.

Troopers from the Department of Public Safety said the victims were passengers in a car driven by the infant's mother Dianna DeLaCruz, 23, also of Spearman.

Mrs. DeLaCruz' other daughter, Stacy, 2, and Doris DeLaRosa, 19, of Spearman, also were riding in the car. Stacy, Mrs. DeLaCruz and her sister, Miss DeLaRosa, were treated and released Friday at Medical Arts Hospital in Lamesa.

Mrs. DeLaCruz was driving south on Texas 137, troopers said, when their car was struck broadside by an east-bound vehicle on FM 828 driven by James Austin Fuller, 36, of Lamesa, who was not injured.

Services for Mrs. Limbocker and Cynthia DeLaCruz were held at 3 p.m. Monday in the Spearman Church of Christ with

Gaylord Cook officiating. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

Mrs. Limbocker was born in Big Spring. She had recently married Tommy Limbocker of Spearman.

Survivors include her husband; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert DeLaRosa of Spearman; four sisters, Doris DeLaRosa, Diane DeLaRosa and Angie DeLaRosa, all of Spearman and Mary Ann Farris of Homestead, Fla.; five brothers, Bob DeLaRosa of Stanton, and Israel DeLaRosa, John DeLaRosa, Daniel DeLaRosa and Andy DeLaRosa, all of Spearman; and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Luciano DeLaRosa of Menard and Refugio Dominguez of Corpus Christi.

Commissioners vote bids; review bonds

The regular final session of the Hansford County commissioners court treated with routine matters for the most part although it could not exactly be called a routine meeting...

Hansford County Judge R.L. McClelland was back in the presiding seat with a gavel in hand after a bout with surgery and that was a special occasion for all in the county.

There were two departures from the routine on the agenda for this second-session-of-the-month.

Commissioners were in accord with the move to advertise for bids for a mowing machine

for Precinct Four. This will be done and following the prescribed "grace" period, bids will be opened and considered.

Commissioners also made the final review of the AGCO bid to issue industrial revenue bonds for expansion of its wheat-storage facilities.

This should leave the Spearman firm ready for the final state of approval of the bonds at Austin.

Industrial revenue bonds have long been a source of funds to industries starting up or expanding. They just have not been used in the Texas Panhandle extensively, hence the unfamiliarity of many peo-

ple with them--not just here in Hansford County but also in Amarillo where there have been a number of bids for approval for this means of growth in a community.

The next regular session of Hansford County commissioners court will be Aug. 9.

Rotary Goal: Immunize World Against Polio

The Board of Rotary International agreed to set a goal worldwide to immunize all of the world's children against polio by the time Rotary International reaches its 100th birthday in 2005, according to a report given by Rotary's District 573 Governor John R. Collard, Jr.

Collard visited his home club, the Spearman Rotary, on Sunday and Monday to review plans the club has for the year 1982-83. Mike Schnell, local club president hosted the Club Assembly at the Gibner Ranch on Sunday where plans and ideas were exchanged. Following the meeting a dinner was served to Rotarians and their wives. At the regular meeting of the club on Monday, July 26 at Cattleman's Restaurant, Governor Collard reviewed the goals of the club and shared some work of the International rotary movement.

One program connected with the polio immunization is the

Rotary 3-H Project. This project, which stands for Health Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Rotary is fulfilling vital needs of developing countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America through immunization programs for not only polio, but also red measles and early malnutrition detection and prevention. Two specific programs are in Bolivia and Haiti.

In Bolivia a five-year antipolio program in 11 major urban centers will immunize more than 150,000 children. Expenses are being paid by another Rotary Program, a Rotary Foundation Grant.

In Haiti the objective of the first year is to inoculate 300,000 children against polio and other diseases and 300,000 women against neonatal tetanus.

Other programs of the rotary International organization include student exchanges, college scholarships in foreign countries, young businessmen's exchanges, scholarships for

graduate degrees in working with the handicapped and in journalism, all made possible by Rotarians contributing to the Rotary Foundation. Proceeds from the Foundation are used to provide these exchanges and scholarships to youth throughout the world.

Rotary is in 157 countries throughout the world and boasts 19,736 clubs with a membership estimated at 906,750. It is felt that with this kind of "peace power" and an emphasis by the President of Rotary International, Dr. Hiroji Mukasa, the challenge for 1982-83 is for all Rotarians to "Build Bridges of Friendship throughout the World." By doing this, distrust and suspicion will be eliminated, barriers will be overcome, and world peace and happiness will emerge.

PERRYTON--General Telephone business customers who do not pay their telephone bills on time will be charged a late charge fee on past due amounts effective Aug. 4.


The charge will apply only to business customers in accordance with Public Utility Commission of Texas rules.

"It is not fair to customers who pay their bills on time to have to pay higher monthly local basic rates because of customers who do not pay on time," Meyers said.



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

Ranch Day Set At TT

LUBBOCK--The true-life cowboy of the American West and the legendary silver screen cowboy will be celebrated together during Ranch Day, Sept. 18, at the Ranching Heritage Center.

Les Adams' internationally known collection of Western film memorabilia, representing the fantasy West portrayed from the 1930s through the 1970s, will be displayed throughout the David M. DeVitt and Mallet Ranch Building at the center.

Western film and recording star Rex Allen will participate in the opening of the special exhibit this Ranch Day. Part of The Museum of Texas Tech University, the 14-acre outdoor exhibit center commemorates the development of American ranching through 33 authentically restored structures. The annual Ranch Day brings to life the ranching era through traditional ranch craft demonstrations, frontier activities, period costumes, music and dancing.

The Adams collection includes press books, posters, prints, film yearbooks, film newspapers, motion picture almanacs and various publica-

tions, including Adams' Western fan magazine, "Yesterday's Saturdays," and his book, "Shoot-Em-Ups," a reference guide for Westerns.

Adams of Lubbock has been interested in Westerns since childhood when choice films were Westerns or Judy Garland/Mickey Rooney pictures. At that time, about nine theaters in Lubbock featured Westerns only. Most shows were about nine cents except at fancy theaters which charged a quarter.

About 1966 Adams began collecting Western film memorabilia when former Texas Gov. Preston Smith was in the movie business in Lubbock. Adams asked Smith what he did with the pressbooks piled in his office at the Arnett-Benson Theater. When Smith said the items would be thrown away, Adams cashed in and cleaned out the office.

From Lubbock theaters, he branched out to Dallas, New Orleans and Kansas City, collecting unwanted film materials. As a result, Adams had facts and information some film companies didn't have.

average Western historian," Adams said. "I also lucked into a complete run of 'Film Dailies,' which announced who was being cast in which movie."

Finding mistakes in several books on Westerns, Adams decided to publish a magazine, "Yesterday's Saturdays," designed to list every B-movie ever made--the date, cast and company that released it.

In addition, Adams contributed research material and earned credit lines in books about Gene Autry, Tex Ritter, Tim Holt, Buck Jones, Yakima Canutt and W.C. Fields. He provided information for books, articles, interviews and columns about John Wayne, Roy Rogers, Bob Steele, Buster Crabbe, Andy Devine, Ritter, Iron Eyes Cody, John Ford, Smiley Burnette and others.

Then, in the late '70s, Adams and a friend, Buck Rainey of Oklahoma, put together their own reference guide for Westerns, "Shoot-Em-Ups."

At Texas Tech Adams teaches a one-hour course in mass communications on "Yesterday's Saturdays: The Action Films and Serials of Yesteryear and Today." For the class, he has interviewed Bill Whitney, (Rex Allen's director on many films), Pat Buttram, Victor Jory, Ray Whitley, Hank Wor-

den, Marshall Reed, Terry Frost, Oliver Drake, Joan Woodbury, Kay Aldridge, Leon McAuliffe, Rand Brooks, Don "Red" Barry, and others.

Westerns have only about three or four different plots, Adams said, but the people in them make them fascinating.

"The old independents were brought in on shoestring budgets, with major stars walking from one movie to the next, earning three dollars here and five there if they had a line of dialogue," he said. "Major stars played bit parts and extras."

Bits and pieces of dialogue or action, throwaway and ad-libbed lines, bad and good cutting and editing, or the things Adams knows happened off-camera and still end up reflected on screen are what make some Westerns interesting or out-of-the-norm, he said.

In a scene in one Western, three major actors, Johnny Bond, Jimmie Wakely and Scotty Harrell can be seen in three separate groups of people riding out of town--cowhands, the posse and the outlaws.

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Acreage Reduction Program Announced

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block today announced a 20 percent acreage reduction program for 1983 crop wheat and advance wheat deficiency payments to those farmers who participated in the program.

"The reduced acreage program should strengthen wheat prices by limiting next year's harvest and the buildup of stocks," Block said. "At the same time," he said, "the program will increase long-term conservation on wheat land."

"Participation is voluntary, but only those farmers who enter the program will be eligible for price support loans, target price protection and eligibility for the farmer-owned grain reserve," he said.

Block also said the U.S. Department of Agriculture is intensifying its wheat export efforts and expanding its export credit sales program.

Block announced additional credit financing under the export credit guarantee (GSM 102) program. This will expand credit to countries buying U.S. farm products. The additional authorization of \$300 million will increase the GSM 102 level to \$2.8 billion from the currently authorized \$2.5 billion.

While high interest rates have discouraged the use of the guaranteed loan programs this year, this funding increase will allow creditworthy countries to expand borrowing once financial or other conditions change.

Block also announced these other 1983 wheat program provisions:

Farmers will get an advance payment equal to one-half the estimated 1983-crop deficiency (target price) payments at the time they sign up. This will help farmers who have tight cash flow problems. Signup will begin Sept. 7 for winter wheat producers and later for spring wheat farmers.

a target price of \$4.30 per bushel.

a loan rate of \$3.55 per bushel for grain placed under the regular loan program and \$4.00 per bushel for wheat placed into the reserve. Reserve storage payments will remain at 26.5 cents per bushel.

acreage taken from production must be devoted to conservation uses.

Farmers participating in the 1983 acreage reduction program must reduce their wheat acre-

age for harvest by at least 20 percent from an established wheat base. If the farmer participated in the 1982 wheat program, the 1983 wheat acreage base will be the same as the 1982 base. For producers who did not participate in the 1982 wheat program, their 1983 acreage base will be the average acreage planted for harvest of the 1981 and 1982 crops.

To meet the conservation uses requirement a farmer with a 1983 acreage base of 100 acres can plant no more than 80 acres of wheat for 1983 harvest. The remaining 20 acres must be devoted to conservation uses.

If farmers plant fewer than the permitted 80 acres, they will be permitted to devote fewer acres to conservation. For example, if only 50 acres are planted, only 12.5 acres (25 percent of 50) will have to be devoted to conservation use.

The land taken from production and devoted to conservation must be eligible cropland protected from wind and water erosion. Acreage designated to meet the conservation requirement may not be mechanically harvested and grazing will not be permitted during the six principal growing months.

In addition, Block also announced an incentive to divert eligible cropland for permanent conservation practices. If the producer incorporates permanent conservation practices, such acreage will be eligible as conserving use acreage for a three-year period. The permanent conservation practice will be eligible for cost-share payments through the agricultural conservation program. This approach will permit farmers more flexibility in managing their total farm base for future year participation. It also reflects the secretary's intent to introduce more conservation incentives into the annual commodity program.

Other details will be announced later.


