EMT & EMC classes set

Beginning January 1, 1983, Emergency Medical Technicians and Emergency Care Attendants that are certified by the Texas Department of Health, will go to a four (4) year certification program. The program will require recertification by continuing education classes. At this time the state will be requiring twenty-five (25) hours per year or one-hundred (100) hours for the four year period. For those EMT's and ECA's that are interested, there will be a class held January 24, 1983, that will begin our local continuing education program. The class will be over Diabetic Emergencies and three (3) hours credit will be given. The class will begin at 7:00 pm at the Spearman Fire Department. There will be NO charge for this class. Snow more slick than wet

Hansford County residents reveling in the snowfall Monday night were those incorrigible optimists that believe any moisture at all is better than NO moisture at all... --And that was about what snow "precip" amounted to at presstime. Weather observers said that, because of a slow warm-up to a predicted 50-plus for the weekend, Hansford and neighboring counties might realize a tenth of an inch from the precipitation that began at this point on the High Plains, Monday night. Another front moving behind the one that dissected the state and brought our snow, promises considerably more moisture presently at its "going rate." That system is currently leaving moisture in a variety of forms—rain, sleet, snow—over a segment of the western states and is moving slow enough to allow heavier measurements and to avoid rapid dissipation of the system before it reaches the Texas Panhandle. Amarillo and points immediately west were the first to bear the brunt of the system "blowing through" Monday. Down on the Golden Spread, rainfall was brief, turning to sleet as colder temperatures that were the second stage of the frontal system, Monday, blanketed the area. Then snowfall came on top of the glaze ice base of streets and highways in the Amarillo area. A peculiar "split" in the system saved Hansford County the sleet coating. The moisture segment of the system was moving to the northeast encompassing both the Texas and the Oklahoma Panhandles but the severe cold wave took a southerly course toward Shamrock and Childress. Streets and highways were slick enough as it was to make travel hazardous. The layer of white that covered the county was the type that lays evenly thin for miles and miles but packs tightly beneath moving wheels and then defies highway department blades to clear it. So it was that roads between Spearman and Perryton and Spearman and Gruver looked barely coated but, in truth, wore a hard-packed slick surface that called for travel warnings in the area.

Tuesday morning, travel west to Gruver was uneventful if a safe, slow pace was kept. The return trip from Gruver to Spearman was a different story! The grades are longer and steeper for eastbound traffic over the Gruver-Spearman stretch of highway and an increase in acceleration for more up-hill traction often caused a vehicle to use up all the width there was to the roadway to get back in a straight line. The slightly-above-freezing temperature anticipated Wednesday could melt the packed

film just enough to make it an ice glaze Wednesday night and this melt-freeze cycle could go on until the forecast fifties of the weekend. Then, there is that new system on the way from the far west. Be careful! Y' hear?!?!?

City sales tax rebate down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent \$32 million to nearly 1,000 Texas cities as their share of the one percent city sales tax for January. "These payments are down 7.7 percent from last January's checks," Bullock pointed out. "Collections are down in every major city in the state except Austin. It is this trend that led me to reduce my estimate of available state revenue and it's affecting the finances of Texas cities even more drastically than the finances of the state," Bullock said. Citing depression in the Texas oil industry and the repeated devaluation of the Mexican peso, Bullock dropped his estimate of available state revenues by \$1.5 billion dollars this week. The estimate holds true for Spearman for the period ending 1-7-83 with the City receiving a net payment of \$10,925.14 compared to the 1982 payment of \$11,870.87, down 7.97%. Our neighboring city of Perryton sales tax rebate was down 37.33%. They received \$20,834.01 for the reporting period compared to \$33,242.79 last year.

PARENTING AN INDEPENDENT CHILD

Conflicts between parents and children are daily occurrences in many families, and understandably so. Rarely do two individuals approach the world from two entirely different perspectives without some differences of opinion.

Cooperation, communication and understanding are basic ingredients for family harmony, but all three behaviors need to be learned. As a child matures and develops "a mind of his/her own," parents may feel threatened. There are some basic techniques, however, for settling family disputes in ways that create warm rather than hard feelings between the generations.

When children are infants, communication takes place along well-defined lines. Most parents are closely attuned to their babies' basic needs—it's almost as if they were one person. Gradually, however, the child's separate personality emerges—along with the growing ability to move about on his or her own. Independence begins to assert itself!

It's often hard for parents to adjust their thinking to the growing child's need for autonomy and independence, especially when the need is expressed in the direct and forthright words of a young child's speech. Parents don't like to be "bossed" by their children.

"Empathy"—the ability to step outside yourself and share the feelings of another person—is the central concept underlying much of the recent work in parent-child communications. Empathy alone isn't enough unless it's translated into language easily understood by the child—and this doesn't come easy to the lips of most parents.

Pioneer, farmer, husband, father, friend
R.E. would have been 100 years old on 1/23, but almost 4 years ago he died. In the minds and memories of all who knew him he will always live. Being an in-law member of his family I had the opportunity to know him up close, and from afar. Up close he was a warm, friendly, loving, honest, good to everyone type of person. From afar, he was all of that and more—he was a friend.

If you never had the chance to know this man it was your loss. Here was a man whose life and memory spanned the greatest period of time in our history. He rode the wagon caravans, his home did not have electricity, nor a phone till he was in his mid-60's, he farmed with mules and horses, a lot of his work on the farm was hand labor, he was in his 30's before he owned a car. He bought land for \$5-10 an acre, he traded a section away for a well drilling outfit. He told us of hauling a few 100 bushels of wheat—in wagons pulled by mules—to market. While he was gone he would buy groceries and supplies. Not by the pound, but by the barrel! The trips would take days. What a Life.

As you rode thru his country with him, he knew the history, of every farm, ranch, business and the people connected to them. Boy did he know the people! All of them and their families. He knew them and so much about them because he really cared about everyone. As he told you about the country it was like having a living, talking, history book sitting besides you. Yet for all of his years he was modern as a twenty year old. He could keep his kids, grand and great kids interested in the past as no teacher or book ever could. Then sit in front of that modern miracle-TV—watching wrestling or cartoons and laugh and slap his knees, just like the kid's. He was an aged man who never grew old. He always said "the good old days are today".

R.E. and his wife Ollie (she was a lovely person who died in 1980), had 65 years of the most happy, contented marriage I've ever heard of known. They had 9 children live to be adults, grandkids and great grandkids galore! Here was a man whose word or handshake were worth more than most signatures today. A man respected and loved by all, who only talked of the good in and of people, who LIVED all of his 96 years. He was a happy man.

It was my misfortune that he lived only 35 years after I met him. It was my good fortune that I was allowed to know and love him for 35 years.

Local ACS services available

The American Cancer Society in Hansford announced today that it has a variety of services available to cancer patients without charge.

"Many people are unaware of all the services we can provide right here in this town," said Mrs. N.F. Renner, Service Rehabilitation Chairman. "And all that is required in most cases is written permission from the patient's physician."

Loan equipment such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, commode chairs and walkers are available as well as expandable items including dressings, hospital gowns, bed pads, pillows and other items.

"These are all in addition to our basic information and referral services," said Mrs. Renner. "And, depending on location, we also have several rehabilitation programs including Reach to Discovery for mastectomies, esophageal speech lessons for laryngectomies, ostomy rehabilitation and related patient and family support groups."

The concept for these rehabilitation programs is the volunteer-to-patient relationship," added Mrs. Renner. "We have many volunteers who are themselves former patients and who are specifically trained by the Society to help other patients and even their families adjust to living with cancer."

Mrs. Renner cited that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they relate the name to cancer research. "While it is true the ACS funds millions of dollars

for cancer research, we are also a community-based organization providing many local services. These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

"Since September, an estimated \$354,000 worth of services to patients has been utilized in this town already this year, but even more could be done if more patients were referred to us," added Mrs. Renner.

4-H Horse Program Offers Many Activities

The 4-H horse program offers more than just competition. 4-H members in this program, conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and supported by the American Quarter Horse Association and the Insurance Company of North America, become involved in a broad range of projects and activities.

Members learn everything from tips on buying a horse to trail and endurance riding. They also learn horse anatomy and safe riding habits as well as how to train a horse for shows. says Jim Smith, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

More than 255,000 4-H'ers are enrolled in the national horse program, including more than 10,000 in Texas.

These young people learn much more than horsemanship. One 4-H'er discovered that "Showing my horse taught me to keep poised in a pressure situation, to show sportsmanship to others, and to do a good job. Judging taught me, above all, how to organize my thoughts. This program helped me decide to become a jockey like former 4-H'er Steve Cauthen."

4-H horse program members also put their skills to work by helping others in community projects. One 4-H'er, for example, organized a county drill team and conducted several shows for community groups and nursing homes.

Across the country, 4-H'ers also are working in special horseback riding programs involving disabled youth.

Plan An Arbor Day Planting

January through February is an ideal time to select shade or ornamental trees for planting so they can become established prior to spring growth. In fact, Texas Arbor Day, January 21, is an excellent time to plant a tree, says Jim Smith, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Tree planting should be done with care. To begin, select a tree that suits your particular landscape needs, suggests Jim. Before buying, ask yourself these questions: Will there be adequate room for the tree when it reaches maturity? Will it fit the existing landscape? Is it for shade, screening or wind

protection or just to balance the landscape? Choose a tree that is well adapted to area soils and weather extremes. Consider possible insect problems such as elm leaf beetles, common to various elm species, and disease susceptibilities such as anthracnose, common to sycamore trees and the Arizona ash. Choose between deciduous and evergreen trees. Deciduous trees provide shade in summer and shed their leaves to let sunlight through in winter. Evergreen plants provide shading and screening the year round but do not change color or texture in the fall. After selecting the tree, make certain it's planted correctly, emphasizes Jim. Make sure the planting hole is large enough for the root system. For a bareroot tree, make the hole large enough to allow the root system to spread out naturally.

The plant should set no deeper than its original soil level—slightly higher (1-2 inches) is even better. Next, trim broken or damaged roots and then form a mound in the bottom of the planting hole, letting the roots flow down the mound. Do not allow roots to dry out. For a balled-and-burlapped tree, dig the hole about 1-1/2 times the diameter of the ball. Plant it so that the top of the soil ball is at or slightly above the existing soil surface. Finally, prune the tops of transplanted trees to compensate for loss of roots, says Smith. As a general rule, prune about 1/3 of the top growth. Then fill the hole with a good soil mixture and water thoroughly. For a list of trees suited to various areas of Texas, get a copy of B-1237—"Trees for Texas Landscapes" available at the county extension office.
