





COLLEGE STATION--With fall at hand and winter on the way, quilts and comforters will be in the limelight as they are taken from storage and put to use

'Before using a quilt, check its condition, fiber content and age. An heirloom quilt, for example, should not be used on the bed where people will sit or pull on it." explains Dr. Peggy Owens, housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Start with the least complicated and damaging method when cleaning quilts, Owens advises. Airing will remove any musty smell acquired during storage. To remove dust or surface soil, vacuum with an upholstery tool. Cover the guilt with fiberglass screening--but

don't vacuum directly on the quilt. Stain removal is unwise on older quilts because it weakens the fibers. Dry cleaning solvents remove oily stains but are usually too harsh for older quilting fabrics, the specialist

warns.

### Groundwater declines cited by water official

COLLEGE STATION .- Continuing expected declines in area; Southeast Texas, especial-Texas groundwater were pinpointed in discussions at Texas A&M University recently by Tommy R. Knowles of the Texas Department of Water Resources.

For the first time since the devastating drouth of the 1950s. pumping of water in the 1980s is exceeding the recharge ability of the state's aquifers. Knowles said

Current groundwater use is about 10.8 million acre feet a year, while the recharge capability is approximately 5.1 million acre feet. At this rate, the wells will be dry someday in the not-too-distant future, or the water will be unfit for use since some salt is creeping into the water supply at present, he warned.

Knowles added that water usage in the future should be geared to the rate of recharge. and the quality of the water should be monitored.

### **Industrial Development Depends On Local People**

COLLEGE STATION--If communities expect to attract industry, it will depend on the local people.

That message came through loud and clear at a recent Rural Industrial Development Workshop at Texas A&M University.

About 80 percent of all industrial development and growth is due to the efforts of local community leaders, said Jack Jones. community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Texas A&M University System, which sponsored the workshop

Industrial development can generate jobs. increase personal income and the local economic base, and improve the environment and quality of life, Jones said.

Yet, many communities really don't want to grow and will block any efforts toward development. said Dr. James Copp. professor of sociology and rural sociology at Texas A&M.

"Small communities are surprisingly self-directing; they extras. Make sure the building control their own fate." Copp will accomodate a sprinkler said. "Many communities don't grow because local leaders don't have their 'act' together. Sometimes community leadership consists of the 'good ole' boys' who don't want 'new blood' in their group.

"What happens or doesn't happen in a community hinges around local leaders," Copp emphasized. "Community attitudes and the direction taken by community leaders must be in general agreement if a community is to prosper."

Copp listed these indicators of a good or bad climate for industrial development in a







## 1980-YMCA First Full Year

A rush of women joined the new wave of exercise by joining the YMCA's Fitness Fantasia, an aerobic dance program began in February 1980. Classes in the morning and evening were offered and have continued year around since then at the Hansford County YMCA. This was just one of the new programs added in 1980 by the YMCA. 




