sions: the right wing of the Republican Party, which did sions: the right wing of the Republican Party, which d

Actually, Mr. Reagan played astute politics in both cases. The tax reform bill he proposed was mostly just
that--more reform than increase. And what he proposed that-more reform than increase. And what he proposed
was fair and overdue. It appealed to the middle
spectrum of the electorate-which any Republican must win to be elected.
As to Taiwan and Red China: the agreement mostly a face-saving gesture for Red China, a major
Asian power Washington must keep out of the Soviet sphere. Under terms of the agreement, the U.S. would
