School's Energy Saving Project Successful

In April of 1980 the Spearman Independent School District applied for a grant from the Department of Energy to complete a number of projects for the conservation of electricity and natural gas.

An extensive energy audit was done. This included many potential energy saving projects. Many areas were investigated, including the use of solar energy.

The grant was approved in August, 1980. The total project amount was \$99,600. Federal funding and school funding each paid equally. The school district thus paid \$49,800 for the projects.

The projects approved included a complete re-working of

the heating and air conditioning system controls for the high school. This consisted of automatic control of heating and cooling circulating pumps to allow operation only when required; automatic variance of room temperatures during normally unoccupied hours; and a system to use outside air, as needed, to meet room temperature requirements.

Complete insulation of the attic space, in the high school building, was also included.

Work done on the elementary/junior high campus included the partial closing of the windows on the North side of the elementary and junior high building. This was done with insulated material to further

reduce heating costs.

Equipment was also installed in the elementary and junior high buildings to automatically vary the room temperature during unoccupied hours.

The final project was the changing from incandescent lamps to other type lamps that would be more efficient. This included a different lighting system in both gyms plus some other changes on the elementary/junior high campus.

The bottom line question to all of this is "what did all of this do?" Did it save in the consumption of natural gas, and/or electricity? Was the expenditure reasonable for the savings realized? Was there actual dollar savings realized?

The answer to all of these questions, concerning savings of energy and/or money, is "yes".

We made comparisons for a full year for 1981-82 with the same period in 1980-81. Due to the increases in utility rates we felt the most accurate comparison would be in the consumption of natural gas and electricity. The consumption of electricity for 1981-82 was down 24% from 1980-81. The consumption of gas was down 6.5 percent for the same period.

The actual cost difference for electricity was down from \$61,316.82 (for 1980-81) to \$51,825.79 (for 1981-82). This was an actual cost savings of \$9,491.03 (15.5 percent) during

a time when the rate increased about 11 percent.

The actual cost difference for gas was up from \$21,540.99 (for 1980-81) to \$24,829.95 (for 1981-82). This was an actual cost increase of \$3,288.96 (15.3 percent) during a time when the rate increased about 23 percent.

The actual dollar savings from 1980-81 to 1981-82 was \$6,202.07. If you apply the 1980-81 consumption to the 1981-82 rates the savings to the school district is \$18,041.80. It is reasonable to assume that the consumption would not have decreased had the energy savings projects not been done.

The total cost of the project will be recovered, in energy

savings, in slightly over 3 years if the cost of energy remains constant. Should rates increase then the payback time will be decreased.

The Spearman I.S.D. experience would certainly indicate that selected energy saving measures should be considered. Considerable energy can be conserved along with some dollars saved.

Porter gives rebuttal

R.C. Porter, local farmer who is also the Republican candidate for State Representative, District 88, today dropped by our office to request the chance to make a rebuttal to what he referred to as "the free front page story given my opponent by the newspaper, recently."

Porter, noting Buchanan's claim to being a conservative, said, "The Legislature as a whole is rather conservative. Texas Conservative Union recently published a tabulation of votes on key conservative legislation in the House which showed that about half the members voted more conservatively than Mr. Buchanan did."

Asked about Buchanan's "pointing with pride" to his return of \$25,000 of office expense funds to the State Treasury, Porter observed "I've been saying all summer that the main problem of this district has been the incumbents' inactivity in office—when you don't do anything it doesn't take much money."

On the positive side, Porter agreed with Buchanan that water would be an issue in the next session, but disagreed with the projected plans to bring water to the High Plains for irrigation. He cited a recent Corp of Engineers study on the project to bring water to the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles showing a cost of \$23.6 billion dollars to build the

system to serve about 4 million acres. "That's about \$5,000 PER ACRE initial cost," he said, "and cost of moving water from the source to the Panhan-

dle will be \$700 - \$800 per acre per year according to C.O.E." "Farmers certainly cannot afford such a plan", Porter noted, "and anyone who thinks taxpayers will subsidize such a project in their present mood, is not in touch with reality. And it should be noted, the cost of energy has done more to conserve the Ogallala than anything Congress or the Legislature could do."

"But, I'm not pessimistic", Porter stated positively, "The same Corp of Engineers studies show that although we are presently overdrawing on the Ogallala Aquifer, there are 3 gallons recharge for every 4 gallons we pump out. This

points the way to the solution to our problem. We have to balance the outgoing with the incoming water, by strictly enforcing present regulations on wasting water (no more pumping water down the bar ditches, for instance). --And by building surface reservoirs to trap water that falls from the sky, such as the proposed Palo Duro Dam in Hansford County.

If it appears our needs would still exceed the supply, then perhaps a more modest realistic importation scheme might be implemented.

If we take these steps, we can extend the life of the Ogallala Aquifer indefinitely."

School district tax value increases

The Hansford County Appraisal District produced the certified tax values for the Spearman School District, showing a total taxable value of all property in the school district of \$235,248,655. Total appraisal value of property is \$258,755,831, with homestead exemptions of \$4,175,224. This is a net increase in taxable value from 1981 of 8%.

Not all property values went up due to reappraisal. Single family residences, vacant lots, business and commercial real estate and personal property and utilities increased in value while the total value of rural

land and mineral properties went down. Additional taxable value was lost due to the exemption of all livestock and privately owned vehicles.

The Board of Trustees is proposing a tax rate of 78 cents per \$100 valuation, the same rate that was used in 1981, to meet the requirements of the budget adopted in August. That budget reflected an increase in costs of 8%.

The Hansford County Appraisal District has contracted with Spearman Schools to collect the taxes beginning with the 1982 tax roll, and statements will go into the mail in the near future.

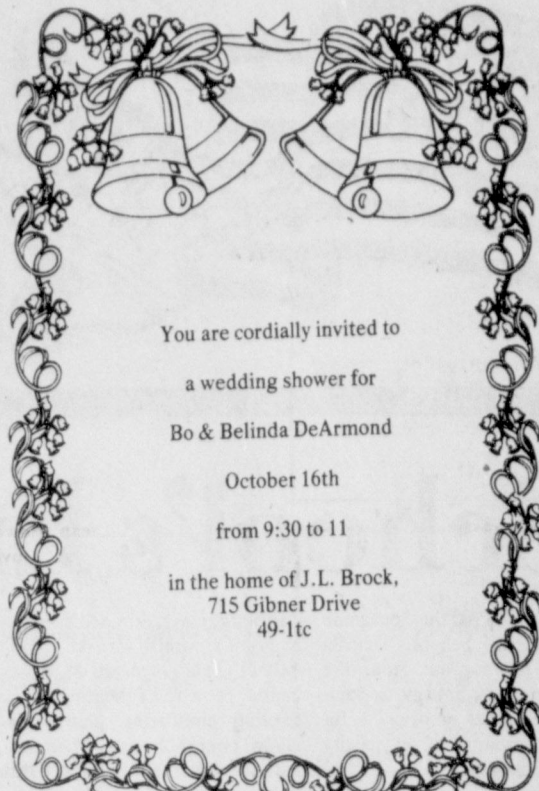

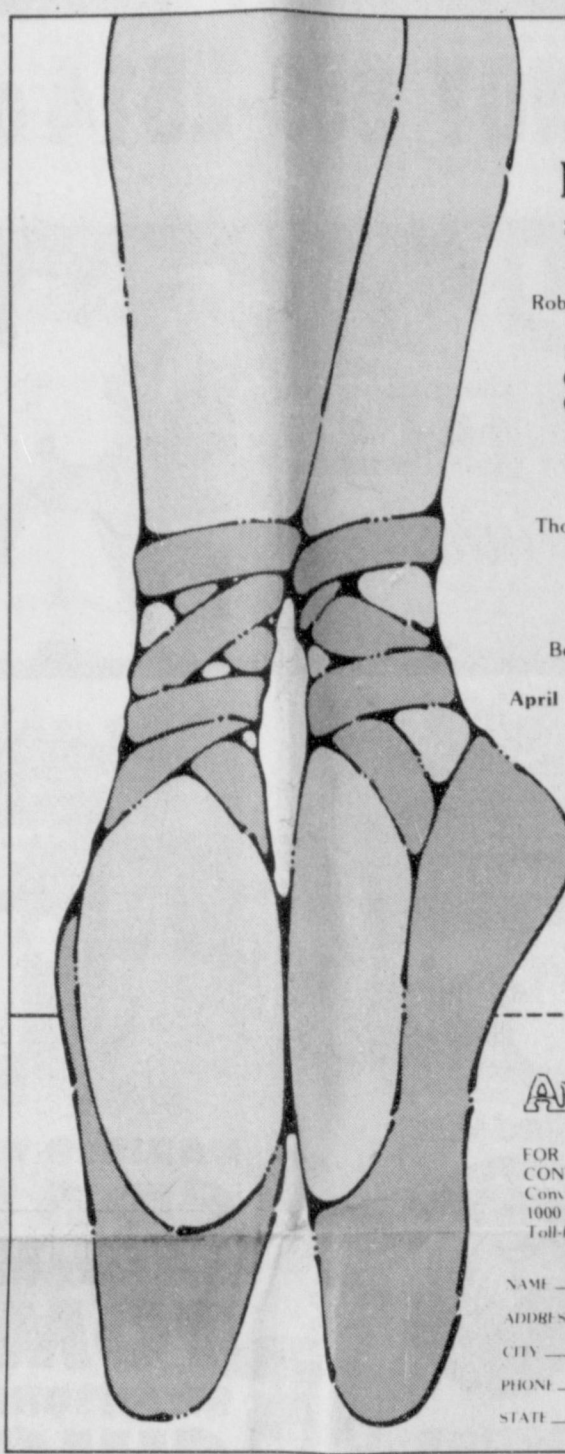
Cub Scout Annual Father & Son Cake Sale Set

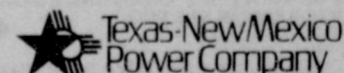

Saving the vitamin C in foods is a delicate matter--and important, too, so you get the vitamin you've paid for--especially in orange juice.

Vitamin C, a water-soluble vitamin, can be completely destroyed in some cases by air, light, alkali and heat--when the vitamin is in liquid.

That includes orange juice, the beverage from which many people get most of the vitamin C they need each day, so be careful about the way you treat it.

Vitamin C in orange juice has a "short life"--only one-third or one-half is left after just two or three days in the refrigerator.

If you get your orange juice from a frozen concentrate, prepare only the amount your family will use within one or two days, and store it in an air-tight container. If you drink already-bottled orange juice, buy only the size your family will drink in one or two days after you've opened the container.

Put the orange juice in the refrigerator promptly after meals and cover it with an

air-tight lid.

Another way to be sure you're getting the vitamin C you're paying for is by eating at least one citrus fruit plus three other servings of fruits and vegetables every day.

If you cook the vegetables, remember you can easily destroy their vitamin C by overcooking. To save the nutrients, cook vegetables quickly in a small amount of liquid with a tight-fitting lid on the pot or pan.

Store all canned fruits in a cool dry place for no longer than one year in order to save the most vitamins and ensure a high-quality food.

Finally, read the labels on foods you're buying: do they really contain the vitamins you want, or are you merely buying flavored water?

A Winter Garden

This is the time to plan and begin a winter garden. It's not all that difficult.

As one example, one can break branches off outdoor tomato vines and replant them indoors in gallon containers, placed near windows or light.

With good potting soil, water and a shake every day or two (to spread pollen from blooms), tomatoes will arrive during the winter on schedule.

The nearest library will have books on indoor gardens and greenhouses, and that's where to start, if not knowledgeable about indoor gardening.

Many edible things can be easily grown indoors and often provide attractive greenery.

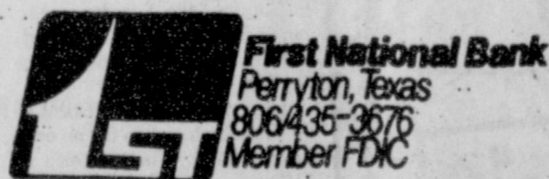

Amarillo Livestock Auction Changes Ownership

AMARILLO-AMARILLO LIVESTOCK AUCTION--The world's largest cattle auction company, and the nation's leading source for livestock market information--has changed ownership.

This cattle marketing facility, which serves a seven state area including Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Kansas, has sold as much as \$300 million in cattle annually. Nearly one-half million head of cattle clear the sale ring each year.

The Texas Panhandle, which surrounds the city of Amarillo is considered the cattle feeding capital of the nation. The Amarillo Livestock Auction Company has and continues to play a large role in the supply of feeder cattle to the area.

Today, the feedlots are major purchasers at the auction. It's not ordinary for up to 1,500 head of cattle to be purchased by a single buyer in one day. There are over 80 feedlots within the Texas Panhandle and these facilities have the capacity to house over 1.6 million head of cattle.

facility. These include a full-fledged commodity firm that operates five days a week, a restaurant, a USDA market news service and several offices. Also on the premises is a full service gasoline and diesel facility. To a first time visitor, it gives the appearance of a town within a city.

For the last 43 years, the business has been owned by the late Jay Taylor and Eddie Johnson, both prominent business and cattlemen in the area. J.R. Taylor joined the two men in ownership of the business in 1951, and has been general manager over 25 years.

New owners are John Templar and Buddy Jeffers. These

two men are both Texas residents. They both have wide ranging interests in the banking, ranching, and farming areas throughout Texas and New Mexico. They will be working partners at the business. At the present time, J.R. Taylor will act as manager.

Very few businesses, other than Amarillo Livestock Auction, in this Texas city of 153,343 people, has operated on this volume without changing ownership several times in the process.

The Amarillo Livestock Auction employs nearly 100 people, which if they combined their years of service, would amount to a tenure in excess of 1500

years. What will the future bring? Templar and Jeffers look positively upon their purchase. "This is within the scope of business that we both know and enjoy. It will be a challenge and an honor to be associated with it," said Jeffers.

Cattlemen who use the Amarillo Auction facility to market their cattle should view this change in ownership as a progressive move. Templar said the two men will look into ways of improving the operation. "In the future, we plan to seek new avenues of livestock marketing as well as look at the various aspects of marketing in an attempt to...make the best better."

Texas Excellence Award

Outstanding high school seniors across the state will be interested in a \$10,000 scholarship to The University of Texas at Austin. The Texas Excellence Award for Scholarship and Leadership is the first of its kind in the state. Funded by alumni through The Foundation for Texas Excellence of The Ex-Students' Association, the award is based solely on academic accomplishment and leadership in extracurricular activities. 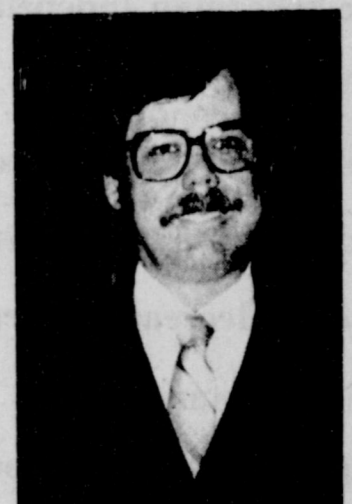

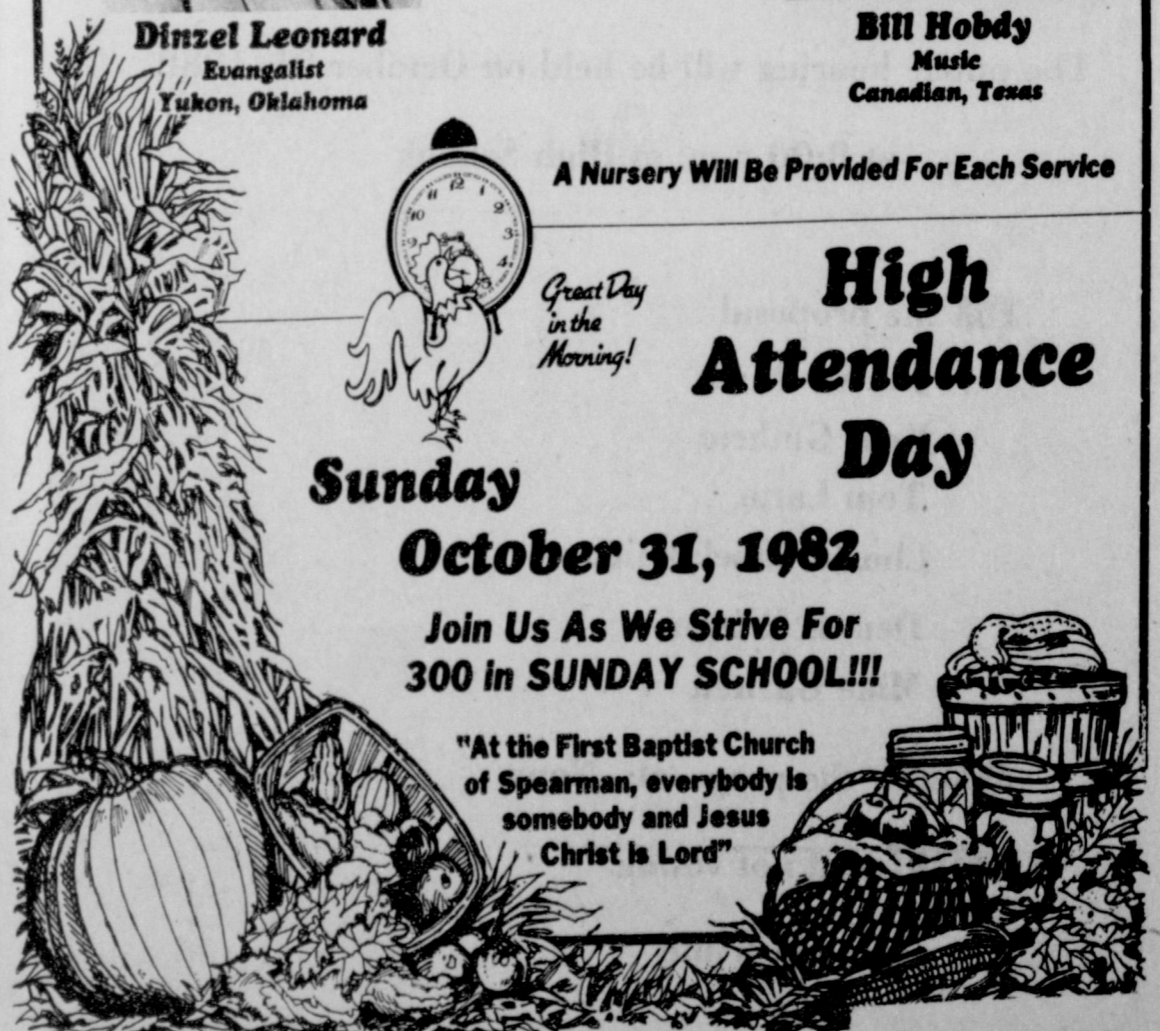

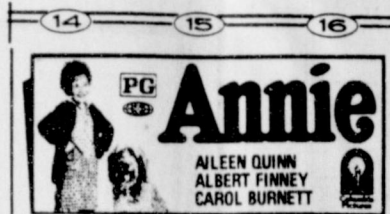

Dear Sir,

This letter is to inform you that Spearman City Animal Control has recently received complaints about your dog(s) barking excessively. Since it is our job to try to solve animal problems, we feel that if we can help you to understand why your animal is barking or howling so much, then we can help you to solve the problem.

Excessive barking in dogs is usually called "stress barking". This title covers three basic groups of barkers, the "lonesome barker", the "high-energy barker", and the "unsocialized barker". In the next three paragraphs, we will try to explain how to handle each of these problems. The "lonesome barker" is usually the highly socialized animal who is used to having his family near him, showering him with love and attention. The dog barks or howls in protest when left alone. Many owners of "lonesome barkers" do not realize that they have a problem since Fido is well-behaved when they are near. If you hear your dog starting to bark or howl when you back out of your driveway, chances are you are the owner of the "lonesome barker". Sometimes scolding helps, but usually it is easier to shut the animal up in the house or garage to minimize the noise. While it may seem mean or cruel to shut him up just for being lonesome, it is far better than having to face a judge on a charge of disturbing the peace.

The "high-energy barker" is perhaps the most common and most easily solved barking problem. This is simply a case of a dog or dogs who have more energy than they can expend in a small suburban yard environment. The "high energy" dog often displays other vices caused by his frustration such as digging, chewing, and fence jumping. To overcome the frustration both of you and the dog, all that you must do is give the dog frequent and vigorous exercise. Jog with your dog, play catch, or frisbee, or ride a bicycle leading him. If you are not physically active yourself, check out the neighborhood for teenagers who would be willing to exercise your animal for you, either for pleasure or play. A word of caution though, do not let the "high-energy" dog roam loose, not only is it against the law, but these animals can be very destructive simply because they have so much energy.

Last, but not least by no means, is the "unsocialized barker". This animal has perhaps the worst and saddest problem of all. He is given all the physical necessities, food water, shelter; but he received little or no human companionship. Many times these dogs belong to families who work all the time, or who have some family member who is afraid of the dog. Whatever the reason, this animal starts having problems adjusting to humans, and often becomes a fast biter. Dogs need more human companionship than any other domestic pet, and he returns in kind. If you think that you have an "unsocialized barker", you must either take the time to pay attention to your animal, or consider not having a dog. You can no longer have a "yard dog" than you can have a job and not go to it. All animals need love and attention from people, after all, we domesticated them, not the other way around.
