Farm-ranch theft seminar is huge success

Area law enforcement officers attending the farm theft seminar here Thursday night were close in their attention during the program and loud in their praise of the entire evening at the end.

The seminar was organized and presented by the Hansford County Sheriff's Department; Chief A.J. Ratliff, Gruver Police Department and Department of Public Safety Officers Max Gunn and Richard Smart.

The seminar featured such personalities as Gordon Johnson, executive director, Texas Sheriff's Association, Austin; Potter County Sheriff T.L. Baker, president, Texas Sheriff's Association; Intelligence Officers Jerry Tolbert, El Paso and Dan Self, Amarillo and Officer Larry King, Potter County farm theft specialist.

Marshall Cooper, executive director, Girls Town U.S.A., was the featured speaker.

Those attending heard that there was a higher incidence of the theft of ranch property in

this immediate area than of grain, livestock or equipment. Officer King urged officers to get farmers and ranchers in their bailiwick to engrave or otherwise mark property items.

On the subject of marking, it was noted that a brand on an animal is no longer presumption of ownership making it more difficult to develop court proceeding against alleged thieves.

That was one key thread all through the seminar in dealing with any ranch or farm theft: development of the court case that would punish the thieves -- and in most instances, important to the recovery of stolen properties.

King pointed out that now the theft of one or more head of livestock -- cows, sheep, horses, etc. -- or any part thereof (leg of a cow!) constitutes a third degree felony and each animal can be a separate case. A herd of 25 head of livestock can mean 25 separate court cases.

He said any theft case needed

three verities: a confession, an eyewitness or for the thief to be caught in the act. Without these, defense attorneys "harp" on the "reasonable" doubt issue.

The highest incidence of theft in this general area of the nation is of heavy construction equipment and it is the hardest of all for ownership to be established.

It was pointed out that each new machine comes with a "paper trail" -- factory certificates, bills of lading, other required or attendant documents. In the course of the use of the machine, particularly one moved from location to location, the paper trail is lost, left behind at the main office or some central point in the owner's operation.

There is also the "PIN" -- the product identification number which can be the law enforcement officers biggest help in establishing whether a suspect machine is truly stolen. The main difficulty here is that there is not standardized location of this PIN, even among machines of the same make.

were urged to get with local or area implement dealers and learn from them the identification of various machines and the location of the PIN. Such is important, particularly in building a court case where semantics are crucial. For instance: a heavy unit on wheels is a vehicle while one on treads or "crawlers" is a machine.

The seminar concluded with the tour of a farm machinery exhibit.

Before the program got underway, following the introduction of Mayor Ralph Blodgett, CoC President Monty Blackman and CoC Director Mary Lou Wysong, Sheriff R.L. County jail use held at current rate

Members of the Hansford County commissioners court addressed the shortest agenda of the year Monday, resulting in the shortest session of the court year -- a welcome prelude to the Thanksgiving holidays.

There was only one item on the agenda that could be termed "non-routine" -- the matter of renewing the contract with both the City of Spearman and the City of Gruver for the housing of municipal prisoners.

Neither city has jail facilities of its own and so long as the

prisoner load from the two cities does not crowd the county jail facilities for sheriff's department prisoners, the arrangement is much more satisfactory than trying to establish city jail facilities that comply with state and federal standards.

The Hansford County facility, just this month, was granted another consecutive certificate of compliance from the state agency on jail standards.

County Judge R.L. McClellan proposed to the commissioners that both Spearman and Gruver

be offered an agreement for the coming year for the same cost as for the year just ending.

The remainder of commissioners court action was in the area of routine transaction of county business including the approval and payment of current bills.

Before adjourning, commissioners court agreed to conduct only one commissioners court meeting in December due to the occupation of both county employees and the general public with the traditional

Christmas season that extends heavily over the last half of the last month in the year.

So, the last commissioners court session for the current year ending will be conducted December 13.

All court session convene at 10 a.m., unless otherwise duly posted in advance, in the council room of the county judge's office. All meetings are open to the public.

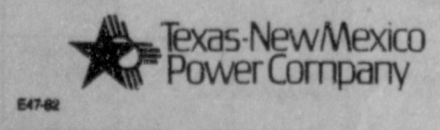




The vehicle sustained two scratches approximately 6 to 8 inches apart on the passenger side, starting at the rear of the front door and continuing to midway on the rear fender. Investigation is continuing at this time.

On November 15, 1982, at approximately 10:04 p.m., one of our officers was on routine patrol when he was stopped by a passing motorist and advised him of an accident at north Bernice and Court streets. Upon arrival at the scene, the officer observed 2 vehicles that had been involved in an accident, (at 100 N.W. Court and 100 N. Bernice). When the officer began interviewing the subjects involved, he became aware of one subject smelling of alcohol and upon further investigation, the subject was unsteady in gait and had difficulty standing without support. At this time, the subject was placed under arrest and another officer was requested to obtain further information from the other driver. The subject that was arrested was transported to the Police Department for processing.

Once inside the Police Department, the subject was observed holding something in his left hand. The subject was told to place the contents on the desk. The subject complied and placed a plastic bag containing a green leafy substance on the desk. The substance was confiscated and is believed to be marijuana. Due to the subject's intoxication, processing was discontinued and the subject was transported to the County Jail and booked into jail pending completion of processing to Judicial proceedings. On November 16, 1982, the subject was arraigned and plead guilty and was fined for Public Intoxication and Driving on the

FOOT NOTES
Proper foot care can pay "big dividends" in how you feel. Good care of the feet is particularly important for persons with special problems--such as being overweight. And by conservative estimate, more than 30 percent of the adult population is overweight. While we hear about numerous health problems associated with being overweight, few of us consider the consequences of those "extra pounds" to our feet. Some ways that feet show the "abuses of obesity" include swelling, calluses, corns, in-

grown toenails, heel pain, and arthritis joints. Overweight people often tend to perspire more readily, and bacteria can thrive on this excess foot moisture trapped between the toes. This situation increases the risk of infection. So, take a load off your feet! Keep them and yourself fit--not fat. You can ward off a lot of foot frustrations by "holding the line" on extra pounds. If you already have serious foot problems, ask your doctor about special treatment for these situations. Diabetes is a major cause of foot troubles and requires special attention.

Practice foot care "know-how" and wear high-heeled sandals with comfort.
HIGH-HEELED SANDALS
Although dancing in the highest of high-heeled sandals isn't the best thing in the world for feet, it's not necessary to discard every pair you own. Just avoid wearing the same heel height all day, every day. When wearing high-heeled sandals, try putting your full weight firmly in the center of the heel. If this is not done, the narrow heels will bend in toward the arch and ruin the shoe and dance appearance.
IDEAL SHOE
The ideal shoe has a heel that is no more than two inches high with plenty of space for toe movement. Try wearing a comfortable shoe similar to this at least 50 percent of the day. To help when walking on hard surfaces, apply rubber lifts to shoes.
EXERCISE FEET
Feet also need exercise. Stretch the arches by walking barefoot on tiptoe.

CONDITION FEET
To help keep feet soft, use a foot buffer to smooth away rough, callused spots. Follow this with an emollient lotion to replace oils removed by scrubbing.
Try not to irritate the skin because irritation increases blood flow to this area and creates calluses.

 - 1 c marshmallows
 - 1 c pineapple, (crushed) drained
 - 1 c sour cream (optional)
- Drain the fruit well, then add the sour cream and nuts. Mix and arrange candied cherries on top, if desired.

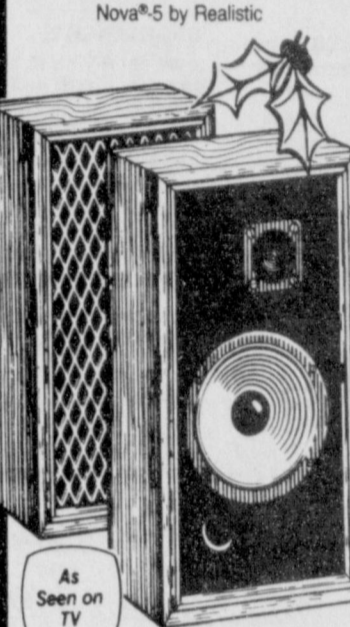

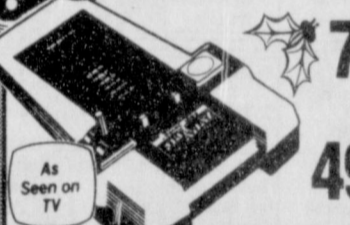

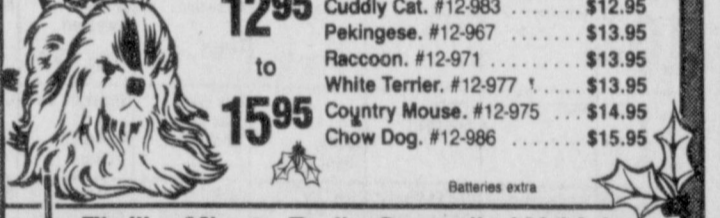

A programming history of the YMCA

The summer of 1979 began the first programming series offered by the Hansford County YMCA. Through arrangements with the City of Spearman and the old "Little League" organization the YMCA began the summer with managing the swimming pool and administering the youth baseball, tee-ball and youth softball programs. Interest was shown in forming both a men's and women's softball program and those were started as well. When fall came, other programs were added, including: men's flag football, men's basketball, women's volleyball thanks to the cooperation with the Spearman schools.

The construction and renovation of the old community building had progressed along enough to open the youth game room, with video games; the gym for basketball, skating, and the like; the fitness center for men and women, with extended hours for the YMCA building.

The end of 1979 showed the growth of a new organization, serving people for leisure and exercise in Hansford County, with a membership of 942 persons. There were 119 different teams and classes and those participants attended 27,321 times in six months. The fitness center, game room and open gym had 198 sessions and was

attended a total of 11,909 times by boys and girls, men and women.

The YMCA had begun and was serving 942 members that first year. Next week we will share the second year 1980 and programs added for the members that year.

DPS Plans For Thanksgiving

Major C.W. Bell, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "As we approach Thanksgiving Day weekend, all of us are making plans of one kind or another for observance of this traditional season of the year. Many DPS officers will make plans of a different kind. They will be on duty to stimulate safety-consciousness throughout this festive holiday."

During the last Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas experienced 53 fatal accidents and 57 traffic fatalities. Major Bell said, "Speed and alcohol are the main contributing factors in the majority of traffic deaths in Texas."

A total of 4,701 fatalities was recorded on our streets and highways for 1981 and statistics show 923 fatal accidents caused 1,082 deaths and 17,343 injury accidents that caused 27,907 injuries in Texas that involved a drunk driver, according to Major Bell.

"Many drivers are not tested," Bell said, "because Texas has no law requiring chemical test on drivers in fatal accidents and it is probable that more than 50% of the deceased drivers in Texas were driving while intoxicated and were not reported as DWI."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol when driving. Let's all slow down a little and live a lot.

Thanksgiving, 1982

Our American Thanksgiving Day dates officially from 1863 when the nation was locked in a sectional struggle. Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, who had been proposing a national day of thanksgiving for decades in Boston and Philadelphia as a magazine editor, wrote to President Abraham Lincoln--who in October of 1863 issued the first Thanksgiving Proclamation.

There had been earlier thanksgiving days; some date the American observance to the days of the early settlers of the nation--who gave thanks for their food supply and the opportunity America offered. The first probably occurred in the Plymouth Colony in 1621.

There have also been observances in other lands but few countries had adopted annual thanksgiving days prior to the American custom. An international thanksgiving day was held in Washington in 1909, having been conceived by the Rev. Dr. William Russell of St. Patrick's Catholic Church.

Thus, Thanksgiving Day, the 25th this year, is uniquely American. We can all give thanks for the many blessings all Americans enjoy. In doing so, we can resolve to build a better community and a greater nation--for in spite of our blessings and accomplishments, there is still much to be done.
