



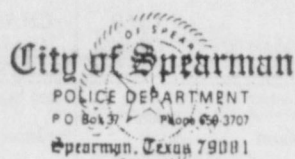

Fire guts Spearman city hall Monday nite



PRESS RELEASE

JANUARY 11, 1983

At 8:59 PM, January 10, 1983, a fire was reported at Spearman City Hall. The Spearman Fire Department went into service at 8:59 PM and they were at the scene at 9:00 PM. The fire was under control at 9:27 PM.

Extensive smoke damage was sustained by the City Hall. The fire started in the Computer room, which housed an IBM System 32 Computer. The Computer is a total loss. The estimated damage is in excess of \$200,000.00. The City is insured for the building and the contents.

The State Fire Marshall's Office out of Lubbock will be at the scene at 8:00 AM, January 12, 1983, to further investigate the blaze.

No further information will be given until the Fire Marshall's Office has completed their investigation.

At 10:00 AM, January 11, 1983, in an emergency meeting of the City Council, the City Hall was declared in emergency operations. The City Hall has been temporarily relocated at 514 Collard Street and should be in operation at 8:30 AM, January 12, 1983. If there should be any type of emergency involving the City utilities, contact the Spearman Police Department at 659-3707.

The regular City Council meeting will be held in the B & B Office Building at 7:30 PM, January 11, 1983.

The roofing repair that is taking place on the City Hall and Police Department is being done to repair damage which was sustained in the Hall storm which took place this past summer. The fire was unrelated to the roofing procedures, and the roof repairs are being completed at this time.

City Hall moved to Speartex

Fire of undetermined origin gutted the interior of Spearman City Hall Monday evening.

While all of the administrative offices were apparently severely damaged, the vacant fire truck stalls—unused since the opening of the new fire station at another location—acted as a fire break saving the northern end of the building, which houses the police department, from significant damage.

The loss came as a surprise to most Spearman residents as they started their day Tuesday morning for the city-wide alarm system did not sound a fire call. This was because the fire was at city hall, a vital link in the alarm system.

Yet, firefighters of the city's volunteer department were at the scene beginning their job of tapping out the conflagration in just four minutes after a phone call went through upon discovery of the flames within the structure.

An unofficial assessment of probable cause said the blaze might have started in the computer room but does not

assign an electrical cause.

--As noted, this was an unofficial assessment. Nothing of any substance could be determined until the state fire marshal arrived. He is expected Wednesday.

Until his arrival, no one is permitted in the building by state law. City employees were not permitted to go in for important items needed for the continuing conduct of city business.

All members of the Spearman city council gathered in emergency session at 10 a.m., Tuesday, in the conference room of B & B Farm Industries to assess the situation and take those actions deemed necessary and permitted by law.

These included an emergency resolution changing the city's official business residence to 514 Collard. This is the address of the old Speartex office building which, according to Spearman Mayor Ralph Blodgett, appeared to be the only available location within the city reasonably capable of accommodating all the functions of the

city's administrative offices.

The mayor and the council put on record their gratitude to Carl Archer for making the building available and for numerous other kindnesses he had done since the fire.

The mayor lauded the phone company for "falling to" quickly to put service in the building -- even to the same city hall number.

In the emergency session a resolution was passed to conduct all regular council meetings during the temporary operations at 514 Collard. There were two exceptions: any meeting during that time with a crowd to large for temporary City Hall and the regular meeting already set Tuesday night. B & B Farm Industries will be the location in these two instances.

Mayor Blodgett noted that emergency provisions in the law dictating the location and function of Texas city governments allowed a move to an accommodating location if a very large attendance upon city council

meetings warranted it.

Both newspaper and radio media pledged all-out help in making the public aware of the emergency change in the seat of city government.

At the time of the emergency session Tuesday, an emergency format had been established: city government was considering only emergency phone calls and those through the police department. Even as the session acted, the telephone company was working on service to the temporary city hall site to meet a scheduled "open-for-business" Wednesday morning at 514 Collard.

Representatives of Brock Insurance Agency, which had the coverage on the building and its contents, were present at the emergency meeting and reported on a brief assessment of the coverage. J.L. Brock told the council he felt the city was in "very good shape" insurance-wise.

Subject an official adjuster's appraisal, a coverage figure of \$171,000 was set for the building and \$61,000 on its contents.

Two things were pointed out regarding the contents figure: there would be reasonable depreciation. (For a 10-year old typewriter the city would be reimbursed at the "going rate" for a 10-year old machine.) "And actual coverage on the computer and its "hardware" would be subject to an in-depth study.

During computer discussion, Mayor Blodgett stated he had an IBM System 32 computer in storage that he was donating to the city.

All in all, both the insurance agency and the city council were encouraged by this assessment but it did not lighten the burden of an emergency transition.

Mayor Blodgett summed up this part of the emergency session with a definitely absolute assurance to the citizens of Spearman:

"City hall will be restored at its present location!"

So, at press time, city employees were performing "over and beyond the normal call of duty" to afford citizens the least possible inconvenience. The council was facing a regular meeting Tuesday night under the new conditions, and...

--The morning emergency session closed with a rousing vote of commendation for Spearman's volunteer firefighters for both their quick response under handicapped conditions and for their skill in holding losses down in the manner in which they fought the fire.

Salaries established at court

Hewing to the published agenda, members of the Hansford County commissioners court made quick work of the business at hand for the first regular session of 1983.

Salaries were about the furthest from the routine.

First, salaries were established for a new dispatcher for the sheriff's office then commissioners considered another change.

"For years in Texas," Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan explained, "certain county people have been paid by fees.

"Then came provision 3912-K allowing, under specific conditions, for this type of official to be paid on a salary basis.

"This is what we moved to, Monday."

The commissioners court moved through the routine matters of the treasurer's report, payment of claims (bills) and approval of bonds for all new employees requiring bond—chiefly in the clerk's office.

Commissioners had an informal discussion with Sheriff R.L. McFarlin concerning operation of the jail. Both the sheriff and the commissioners are always alert to needs or changes to keep the Hansford County jail in compliance as it has been for a number of years now.

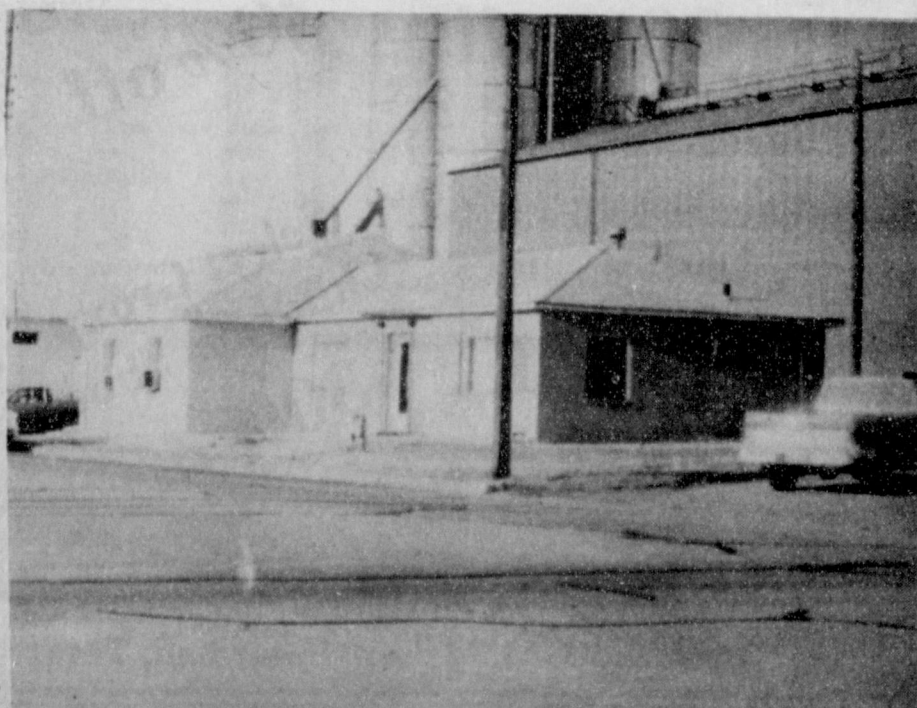
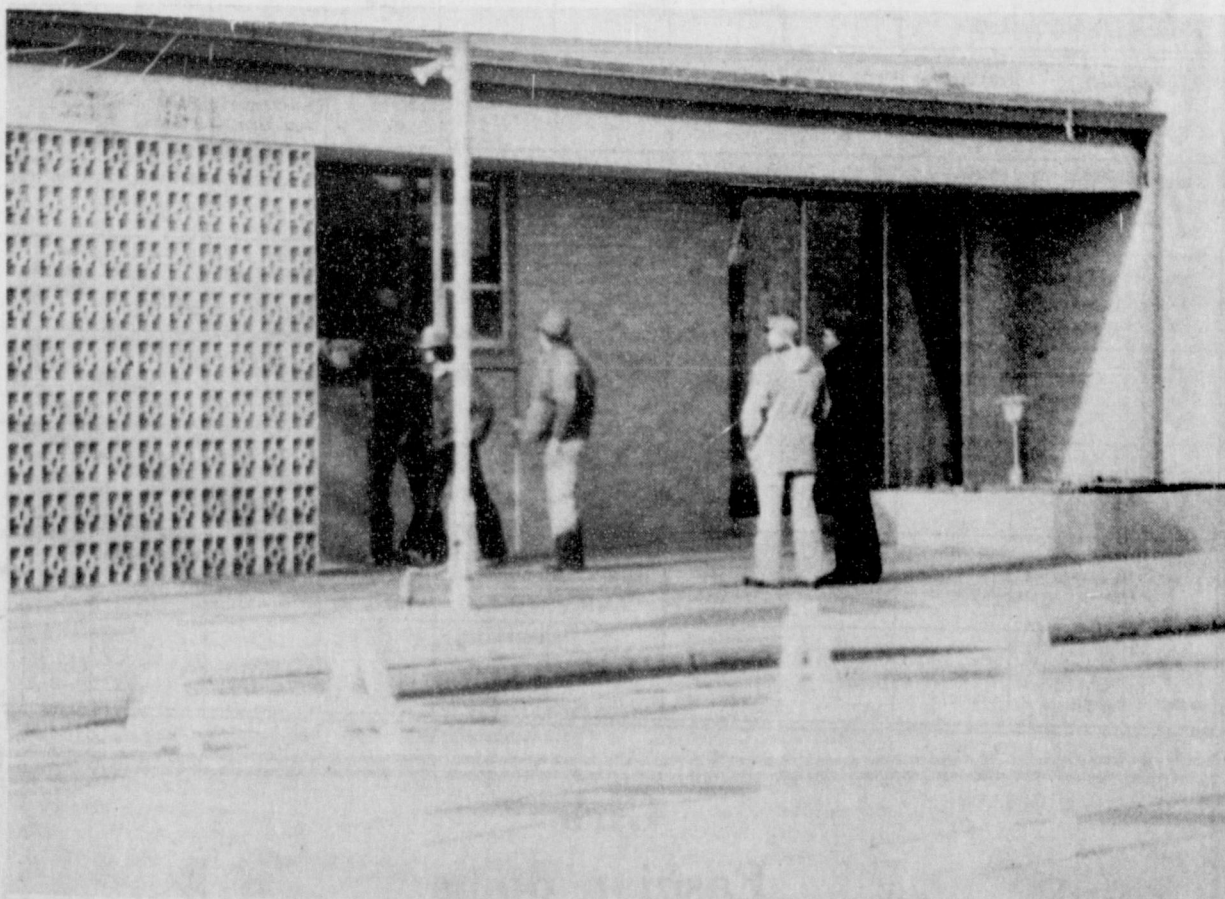
A grievance committee was appointed as provided by statute. It is comprised of five elected county officials and four persons from previous grand jury service with four alternates provided.

Function of this committee is as its name implies: to hear grievances on the part of any official or any employee. Over the state, about the only function for which such a panel has been used is to arbitrate salary disputes.

So far, Hansford has such a panel simply to comply.

Next regular session of the commissioners court will be at 10 a.m., Jan. 24 at the courthouse.

As always, these meetings are open to the public.

Wildlife management

Ducks and geese provide good hunting states Royce Siebman, SCS Range Conservationist, who assists Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District. The duck and geese hunting season opened November 2nd and will close January 23rd this year. Both duck and geese make tasty meals when prepared right.

Two types of ducks are common to this area. They are diving and surface feeding ducks. Diving ducks are those which can dive for food and protection. They are usually found on large bodies of water and therefore are not very numerous in Hansford County. Surface feeding ducks are those which will end to feed on the bottom of the ponds. They include species such as mallards, wood ducks and some teal. These ducks need shallow water to feed in. Duck have been determined to feed upon three basic plant groups; smart weeds millets and pond weeds. In addition surface ducks use domestic grain. These ducks are very common to our area play lakes.

Most ducks and geese only winter in Texas. They will nest in the north particularly in the pothole region of South Dakota.

Therefore providing winter food and cover is the main item applicable to waterfowl management in our area. The planting of millets around play lake shores is one way to increase waterfowl food production. The protection of play lake basins from wildfire and overgrazing by livestock will help improve waterfowl cover.

The leasing of hunting rights on a well managed waterfowl area can also bring in a few extra dollars for area landusers.

For more information on waterfowl management call your local Soil Conservation Service office in Spearman.

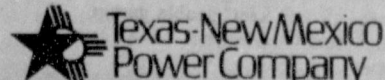

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT DURING UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment frustrations are compounded every time another bill arrives in the mail. Worries of whether there will be enough money to keep the "wolf away from the door" are being experienced daily by millions of Americans.

What can be done to make ends meet during unemployment? Which bills should be paid first? Will a "family plan" help ease members through the crisis?

There are some things that can be done to ease the anxiety of family members during the unemployment period. Here are some guidelines.

1. List all the money owed to others. List both the amount of money owed and the dollar cost of finance charge being assessed. Read the fine print in all credit contracts so you will know what will happen if you miss a payment. What is the penalty or fee for late payment? Are "grace periods" offered before action is taken? What will prompt the creditor to repossess the goods or turn off the utilities?

2. From your list, try to determine which creditor you should pay first. Your first priority should include utility companies, landlords or mortgage holders, insurance companies and auto loans. Second priority payments should include credit card billings and

finance company loans. Third on the priority list should be health care bills, hospitals and retailers. Your priorities should be determined by the amount of money owed, whether some service can be cut off, whether you are behind schedule in rent or mortgage payments, and whether an item can be repossessed.

3. Make a plan to contact your creditors. Never wait for creditors to contact you when you owe them money. Always call them before the bills are due. In dealing with creditors, you need to indicate:

(a) Monthly take-home income from all sources, including unemployment compensation, you will have.

(b) Amount of fixed expenses for housing, car payment and other debts.

(c) What you anticipate your flexible expenses to be for food, clothing and other expenses.

(d) How long you expect to be unemployed. Present to the creditor what you think is a reasonable plan for repaying the debts you owe. Together you may be able to work out an acceptable plan for debt repayment with lower monthly payments. Any agreements should be put in writing to protect both you and the creditor.

4. While unemployed, you will probably have to adopt an austerity budget, buying only what is necessary to keep the

household going. The temptation to use credit cards and thus "postpone" the inevitable payment will be great, but it can further complicate an already fragile money situation and should be avoided.

5. Main adequate insurance coverage during unemployment. Without it, a crisis situation could mean a financial catastrophe. With Auto insurance, keep the liability coverage. Cost of the insurance may be reduced by increasing the amount of the deductible on collision and comprehensive coverage. If health insurance is not covered by your former employer, you may be able to qualify for Medicaid. You may want to change your life insurance policy to a less expensive form.

If you have life insurance with built-up cash value, now may be a good time to borrow against that policy. Interest rates are low and schedules for repayment are flexible. If you borrow against your life insurance, you have reduced the amount of insurance protection, so seek alternate ways to insure your life. Don't risk dropping your insurance when you are unemployed. Your policies are vital during periods of unemployment.

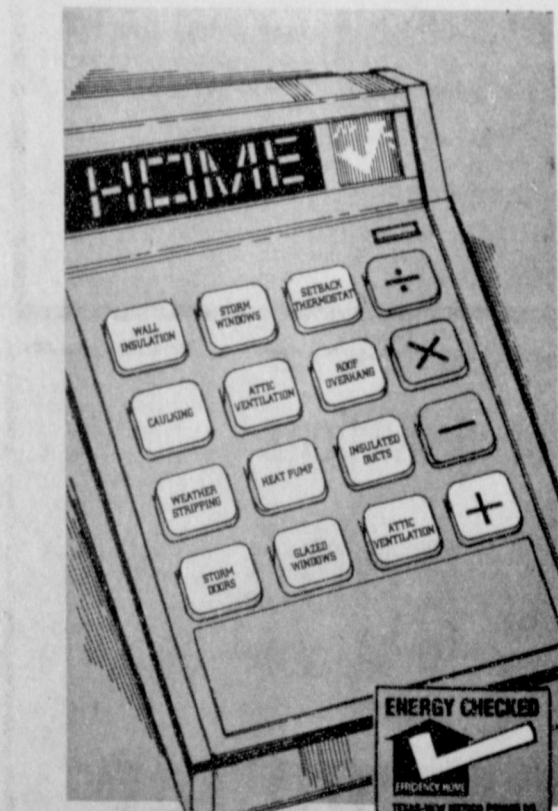
JV Lynx & Lynxettes to travel to Canadian

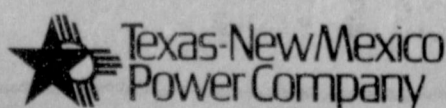
and Heather McRee. This team has a lot of talent, and they can go to Canadian and beat them good, all they have to do is play together as a team and they will win together as a team.

This year, 1983, the winner in the District 1-AAA Boys Division cannot really be determined early. In the beginning of the season, the Dalhart Wolves were favored over the Perryton Rangers, and so on. 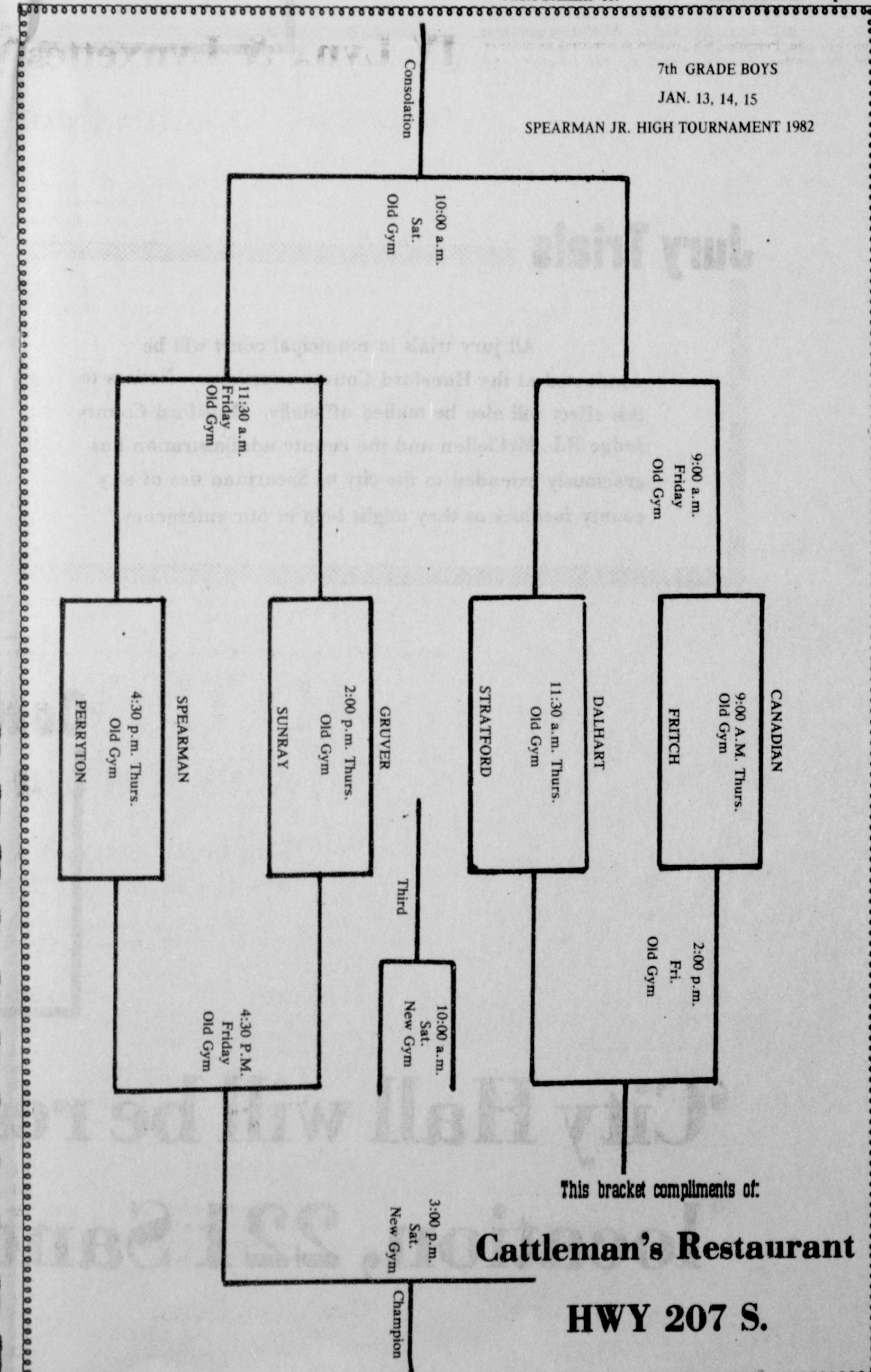
