Local Baptists on the way



Mayor Ralph Blodgett and Jim Fowler hold the key to Spearman. This key will be presented to the Mayor of Quetzaltenango.

(The missionaries leave Thursday for Guatemala).

Jim and Virginia Fowler along with a team of six Gruver people will be representing the First Baptist Church of Spearman on an International Crusade to Guatemala. These people will be among 40 teams in the crusade which will be co-ordinated by Calvin Beach, vice president of International Crusades. Mr. Beach was in Guatemala January 23-27 where he met with two thirds of the pastors in a time of final preparation. The word he brought back is that the Guatemalan people believe that they can win the country to the Lord. Beach said he had never seen this in any other country that IC has coordinated crusades in.

Jim and Virginia Fowler will be in the city of Quetzaltenango with the balance of their team from Oklahoma.

The Gruver people, Gene & Josephine Fletcher, Les Barkley, Bart Brown, Sharon Seigler and 82 year old, Eva Boyd, will be going to Guatemala City.

Guatemala has an area of slightly more than 42,000 square miles, only 1/18th the size of Mexico. It shares borders with Mexico, Belize (formerly called British Honduras), El Salvador and Honduras. There are two coasts—a Pacific one and a spot on the Gulf of Honduras, which opens up into the Caribbean Sea.

For several years Guatemala has suffered from internal unrest. In March of 1982 a military coup toppled the newly elected president and replaced him with Efraim Rios Montt, who has attracted much attention because he is an evangelical. Rios has succeeded in restoring order in the capital, but has not been able to do so in some remote areas. Some of his critics say he is unable to control the army, which they charge is sometimes guilty of the same misdeeds as the leftists.

Guatemala still has a mostly agricultural economy, but the chief crops are coffee, cotton, bananas and sugar.

Nickel and marble are Guatemala's chief mineral products. There is small scale mining of lead, zinc, silver, antimony, tungsten and copper. They export considerable amounts of minerals and manufactured goods to other Central American nations.

Guatemala has about 3.5 million inhabitants. The average density is only four persons per square mile. Over half the people are of pure Indian descent, making Guatemala one of Latin America's most Indian nations. Some 10,000 Americans live in Guatemala, mostly in the capital.

Almost all Guatemalas are at least nominal Roman Catholics, although relatively few are active members of the Church. As in many other countries, the Church is considered mainly the province of women and children. In some areas the Indians have only a very thin veneer of Catholicism, alternating their ancient pagan rites with the Mass.

Evangelicals are increasingly active in Guatemala. There is a strong Pentecostal movement. The nation's first Baptist, Frederick Crowe, arrived about 1840 but was later expelled. In 1946 Paul C. Bell, Jr., Southern Baptist missionary in Panama, helped organize some independent evangelical congregations into Baptist churches. The next year Guatemala was included in the Foreign Mission Board's list of nations. In the capital are a Baptist theological seminary and a book store. In 1980 there were 69 Baptist churches and 161 missions and preaching points with a total of about 7000 members. There were 128 Guatemalan pastors and a total Southern Baptist missionary staff of 26. Many pastors must hold a regular job besides their pastorate.

Convenient pay plan offered by electric company

Texas-New Mexico Power Company has announced a new program that will provide a convenient payment plan for those persons 62 years of age and older who receive Social Security or other pension benefits.

Robert Elliott, TNP manager in Spearman, said the program calls for special handling of the billing for qualifying residential customers. The program allows for payment of a bill on a designated date regardless of when the statement is received.

Mr. Elliott noted that those

on Social Security normally received their checks on or about the 3rd of the month. Many find it most convenient to pay household bills at the time they receive their check. But paying bills before regular Social Security or retirement checks arrive can be a problem for some people.

The new program provides for a qualifying customer to be able to pay the bill at the more convenient time.

Mr. Elliott said that customers interested in the program should go by the Texas-New Mexico Power Company office to establish their qualifications.

Joe Venneman buys Brangus bulls at PSU Sale

Oklahoma Panhandle State University beef bull testing program held its performance tested bull sale on Wednesday, February 23, 1983 at the testing facilities on the University farm.

Forty-four bulls sold consisting of 17 head of Angus, 11 head of Herefords, 6 head of Polled Herefords, 5 head Brangus, 4 head Charolais and 1 head Polled Shorthorn. The top selling bull consigned by Andrews Herefords of Olney, TX sold a 1/2 interest to Bill Thomason of Red Rock, OK for \$1,500.00. The second high selling bull, an Angus, brought \$2100 and was purchased by Sandhill Angus of Holly, CO. This bull was consigned by Rusk Ranch of Sun City, KS. Two Brangus bulls brought \$1800 each. They were consigned by Blake Prather of Goodwell and were both purchased by Joe T. Venneman of Spearman, TX. The next selling bull consigned by Rusk Ranch brought \$1600 and was purchased by Circle L Angus Ranch of Hugoton, KS. A Hereford bull consigned by Bryant Herefords brought \$1500 and was purchased by King Bros.

Herefords of La Junta, CO. Three Angus bulls brought \$1400 each. Two were consigned by A.G. Flint of Bard, NM and one was consigned by Phil Light of Turpin, OK. Two were purchased by Davison & Sons of Arnett, OK and one was

purchased by J.W. White of Mason, TX. Three bulls brought \$1300 each. A Brangus consigned by Blake Prather was purchased by Clifford Hitchings of Texhoma, OK; a Hereford consigned by Andrews Herefords was purchased by Wolgamott Dorset Farm of Hardner, KS.

The average on 44 head was \$1,107. Breed averages were as follows: Angus (17 head) \$1,153; Herefords (11 head) \$1,065; Brangus (5 head) \$1,425; Polled Herefords (6 head) \$908; and 4 head charolais \$1,212.

Volume buyers were Davison & Sons, Arnett, OK, 5 head; Danny Feerer, Fargo, OK, 4 head; King Bros. Herefords, La Junta, CO, 4 head; Bill Fisher, Liberal, KS, 4 head; and Joe T. Venneman of Spearman, TX, 3 head.

This Recession

Measured by most economic indicators, the present recession has been the most severe since the Great Depression. Unemployment statistics support this conclusion.

But other statistics show a surprisingly mild recession. Viewing the decline in industrial production, the 1981-82 recession has not been as severe as the 1973-75 or 1957-58 recessions.

Also, if one looks at unemployment as the percentage of jobless out of the entire work force, the picture is not so grim. A chart recently published by the Wall Street Journal, based on government statistics, shows that other recessions have been worse. A problem today is that there are so many more in the work force.

Business investment has not declined as sharply in this recession as in several postwar recessions. Figures show that in 1948-49, 1957-58 and 1973-75 there were greater declines in business investment.

Personal income shows a relatively modest decline in the current recession—contrary to expectations. Sharper reductions occurred, in fact, in many other post-war recessions.

All of which indicates that high unemployment totals may be part of a structural trend in U.S. society that will keep totals high for some time to come—even in the recovery. That's why the president and Congress are currently stressing job training and job education.

Copernicus

March 4 is generally accepted as the birthday anniversary of Nicholas Copernicus, Polish astronomer and father of modern astronomy. He was born in 1473; however, his historic discovery was published in 1543—seventy years later.

The revolutionary principle was that the sun, not the earth, is the center of our solar system. Copernicus concluded it was the center of the entire space system. That, of course, was not correct.

But he was the first to see that the earth revolved around the sun, not the reverse. This discovery had enormous implications for the future of astronomy, transportation and in many other areas.

Copernicus' discovery showed the way to Johannes Kepler, two centuries later, who expanded on the theme and laid down the foundations upon which modern astronomy is based.

The 4th is also the birthday anniversary of Count Casimir Pulaski, a hero of the Revolution. He was born in Lithuania, Poland, in 1748, the son of Count Joseph Pulaski. In Paris Benjamin Franklin persuaded him to volunteer to help the American colonies.

His service was so distinguished at Brandywine, Washington placed him in charge of a corps of cavalry, with the rank of brigadier general. He marched south, reaching Charleston in 1779, and that fall commanded the cavalry at the siege of Savannah, where he fell in battle.

The people of Savannah erected a monument in his memory, President Roosevelt and Congress set aside October 11 as a day of commemoration in his honor and a military order in Washington has kept his memory alive (membership being restricted to members of the Aryan race, descendants of Revolutionary era citizens who settled in this country prior to 1740).

JFK's Health

In the second volume of his biography of John F. Kennedy, out in March, Herbert Parmet tells the unknown story about the late president's health—and a coverup which hid his physical condition from the American people.

Parmet—and his biography is widely respected as probably the best yet and not a hatchet job—relates that Kennedy was on drugs because of pain, and that what he received caused a flap among doctors who knew.

He reports that Dr. Janet Travell, represented to be a sort of physical therapist, mainly shot the president with procaine—so much so that Kennedy's other doctors finally rebelled. Kennedy was also getting regular cortisone injections for Addison's disease.

In addition, it's said, he was secretly getting the "uppers" treatment from a New York doctor widely known as "Dr. Feelgood." Parmet writes, further, that Kennedy once traded drugs with a well known socialite just weeks before he hosted a White House conference on drug abuse.

This sort of revelation disillusiones some who cling to Kennedy and Camelot myths. But hard truth inevitably surfaces about U.S. presidents and their families. (The late president's wife and mother are also the subject of hard truth in the second volume.)

What is important, perhaps, is the contrast of this picture and of that during the Eisenhower presidency. Mr. Eisenhower insisted the American people be given the full details of his condition, and that was done regularly.

President Reagan began his first term at age 70, Eisenhower at 62 and Kennedy at 43. If there should be a question about Mr. Reagan's health, the lesson in the second volume of the Kennedy biography is that the public should be given full details. For Kennedy's physical condition, in the view of friends who remember his pain, obviously dictated some of his reactions.

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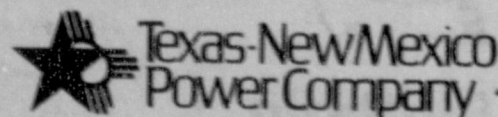

A proper understanding of world history is necessary if citizens in self-governing countries are to pass intelligent judgment upon issues of the day.

An understanding of history is not to be obtained through TV or a passing grade on a compulsory course on the subject. It takes personal interest and a desire to understand the past conduct of human beings and nations.

WW II & 'Winds'

What came of the much-heralded British resolve to go to war over Poland? Poland is still enslaved. The war greatly expanded communism and its geographical empire. Germany had been for centuries the European bulwark against the slavs in the east, and most westerners would agree a strong Germany is preferable to a strong Russia (except a Hitler Germany).

Hitler, of course, would eventually have died. And had we not gone to war against Hitler Germany, the Jews might have fared better-for the democracies would have been able to exert great pressure on a Germany at war with Russia. Hitler publicly warned the world and Jews in January, 1939, that if Germany was dragged down to defeat by the West in another world war he would make the Jews pay for it. That was eight months before the invasion of Poland and before the British pledge to fight for Poland. He did just that.

As for Japan, her government was also aggressive, arrogant and threatening, and there were fewer grievances. But when President Roosevelt (and England and Holland) cut off oil to Japan in the summer of 1941, it was clear to all who knew the facts Japan would have to fight or surrender-in effect. She had to have oil. Japan chose to fight, and began her war with a sneak attack, which can't be justified.

There are those now in England and elsewhere who feel Churchill's determination to fight Germany might not have been the wisest course for the West, for democracy, for Jews and for the world. It was an idealistic course and the world was outraged at Hitler.

But was it the most realistic self-interest course? And, of course, there was no way Hitler could ever have reached the United States. His navy was very small and no army could be transported over 3,000 miles to attack us. Nor can the Russians occupy us today-for the same reason.

Emotional myths, however, survive. How could Germany have possibly policed the vast United States, even if Hitler could have somehow gotten an army across the Atlantic? Two impossibilities. Russia might destroy us with nuclear weapons today, or vice versa, but neither superpower could occupy and police the other. The distance and total area are too vast.

The Alamo

On the sixth of March, 1836, Mexican General Santa Anna committed an error which made almost certain the independence of Texas. Texans had proclaimed a revolution (with an eye on later admission to the United States) and Mexican soldiers were seeking to put down the insurrection. The Mexican Government had a good legal case.

General Santa Anna arrived before the Texas-manned mission, which had been converted into a fort, with several thousand troops ten days before he assaulted it. During this time he bombarded the Texans but failed to breach the fort's walls. During this time, also, thirty-two volunteers arrived to bolster the defenses.

On the 6th, the Mexicans attacked in overwhelming force. The Texans and other U.S. defenders turned them back. The Mexicans attacked again and were repulsed a second time. But Santa Anna persisted and his third wave of attackers overran the fort. Only five defenders were taken alive, one of them being David Crockett. Santa Anna ordered them executed.

The cold-blooded and brutal order infuriated Texans and U.S. residents everywhere and six weeks later a revenge-minded force of Texans and others met Santa Anna in the battle of San Jacinto, sweeping his forces from the field to the cry of, "Remember the Alamo," and winning independence for Texas.

balance drops below the amount, the account will earn only the 5/4 percent interest applied to regular NOW accounts.

Both accounts are also federally insured up to \$100,000, and they allow check writing and telephone transfers. However, money market accounts limit the number of transfers and checks you can write each month.

Banks are allowed to guarantee an interest rate on both these accounts for up to one month. Some of the banks are planning to tie their rates to a market index.

The security and convenience of these accounts might entice you, but keep in mind that neither account is ideal for everyone. Unless you regularly maintain a checking balance of \$2,500, for example, you would probably do better with a regular NOW account.

But money market accounts could be the right move if your savings has been idling away in a 5/4 percent passbook account. It may also be attractive if you have invested in a regular money market fund, but prefer the federal insurance and personalized service provided by the banks.

Disadvantages can occur with both types of accounts too. Some may pay simple interest, have minimum on deposits and checks, make frequent changes in interest rates or have heavy early withdrawal penalties.

Other fees or penalties may be created in the near future as banks attempt to compensate for paying higher interest rates by charging for services which were once provided free.

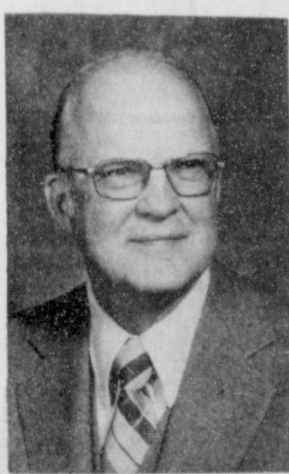

LOOKING back on major spectacles like *Winds of War*, one wonders why characters like Pug Henry, the star (Robert Mitchum) are so well received.

MITCHUM is very watchable, enjoyable. He has much of that same attractiveness that John Wayne had, or Gary Cooper. None was much of an actor, really.

WHAT the public liked about them was that they were slow-talking, he-men, honest and hard-hitting. Few he-men of that calibre are still around today.

HE-MEN get by with much silence. Wayne had that little squint-eye expression he gave us when he was supposedly touched or moved. Mitchum stays deadpan when one would expect good acting or expression.

BUT he gets by with it and is attractive. What the American public was led to like and admire by western

and he-man films for forty years was that Wayne, Cooper, Mitchum type.

AND that probably reflects the longing in our society today for a cowboy-type good man, incorruptible, strong and unflappable. Too many of our modern-day male actors are either comedians or weak characters, mildly obeying momma or wife. Who needs them? Neither women nor men.

ROCK Hudson could have been a he-man type but his roles are not those of a rugged man. He weakly makes himself the butt of jokes and exhibits little personal power or strength. That still goes over big—even when the stars, like Mitchum, aren't the greatest of actors.

ROBERT Redford, Paul Newman, Marlin Brando, etc., are all fine actors—but of another breed.

RECIPE

Fruit-Cocktail Cake

- 1 1/4 c sifted regular all-purpose flour
- 2 t double-acting baking powder
- 1/4 t salt
- 3 T butter or margarine
- 1/2 c packed brown sugar
- 1 1/2 oz. can fruit cocktail
- 1/2 c shortening, softened
- 1/2 c granulated sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 t vanilla extract
- whipped cream

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Melt butter in an 8 inch by 8 inch by 2 inch cake pan over low heat; remove from heat and sprinkle with brown sugar.

Drain fruit, reserving 1/2 cup syrup. Arrange fruit on sugar mixture.

In bowl mix (with electric mixer) at medium speed, shortening with sugar, then with egg and vanilla, until light and fluffy—about 4 minutes. At low speed, beat flour-mixture in thirds, alternating with syrup. Spread batter carefully over fruit.

Bake cake 1 hour or until cake tester inserted comes out clean. Remove from oven; cool on rack 10 minutes. Loosen cake from pan and invert serving plate onto pan, turn over and remove pan.

Serve cake warm with whipped cream.

* Makes 6 to 8 servings.

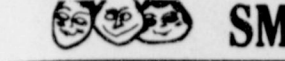

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- The new U.S. Football League may get off to a rocky start. But then that's the way all new football leagues begin.

A recent exhibition game between the Boston Breakers and the Tampa Bandits, in the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, was played before an almost empty house.

The weather was bad, and had been bad for hours before game time. But it looked like good football. A surprising number of players had performed in the N.F.L. A few rookies might make it in that league today.

The new league isn't as shaky as some new leagues have been in the past. It has millions in TV money, a solid

contract. The question is whether these teams can develop fans and loyalties and keep interest, in time.

They need not develop all that in one year—which would be impossible. But good TV money won't forever flow to the U.S. football League if the annual progression isn't promising.

And can football compete successfully in spring and summer?

The age of television makes it more likely than it would have been a few years ago. The best feature about it is that a greater number of players will now be able to earn a living in the sport after graduation from college.

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Know THE Weather

Can one foretell anything about the weather by carefully noticing the color of the clouds above?

The answer is that only limited weather information can be detected from observation of cloud colors. The truth is, in fact, clouds have no color. It may be hard to believe but clouds are colorless.

Their apparent color results from reflection. The particles of moisture in a cloud reflects so much light at so many angles, they give a white appearance. Take away the sun, and clouds become darker objects on the earth below, too.

Little can be learned from watching the apparent color changes in clouds. Dark clouds on bright sunny days in summer do indicate a concentration of moisture so heavy as to blot out the light of the sun, and may indicate rain. But other color hues may mean only that certain clouds are at the moment reflecting colors from below on the earth.
