

Proposed Amendments To State of Texas Constitution To Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held Tuesday Nov.

S. J. R. No. 3-A
A JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by striking out Section 20 thereof; providing for local option on the question of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; providing for the sale of distilled liquors or spirits in whole or in part of products of distillation shall not be sold for private profit, except to the State; providing that the Legislature shall pass laws relative to the sale, possession, transportation and manufacture of such spirits and liquors, providing for the establishment of State dispensaries; providing for the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of all liquors which are exclusively products of the fermentation process; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered or exchanged for beverage purposes in any county or political subdivision wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20 thereof and substituting therefor the following:

Section 20: "The Legislature hereby declared to be the policy of this State that the sale of spirits, liquors, or wine, manufactured in whole or in part by means of the process of distillation and/or liquors for private profit, is prohibited within this State except when such sale is made to the State. The State of Texas shall have the exclusive right to purchase at wholesale and to sell at retail such distilled spirits, liquors, or wine. Such sale shall be made in broken packages and shall be consumed in premises where sold. The State shall pass laws relative to the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of such liquors and spirits and relative to the establishment of State dispensaries. Provided, however, the Legislature shall have the power to allow the sale for private profit of products of distillation, scientific and technical purposes.

The manufacture, sale, transportation, and possession of all liquors, the alcoholic content of which is entirely and exclusively the result of the fermentation process is hereby authorized under such restrictions as may be authorized by law.

The Legislature shall enact laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited within the precinct; and such laws shall provide for an election on the question of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, and various alcoholic content.

(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be prohibited to manufacture, sell, barter, or exchange for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent. alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 115, Acts of the 43rd Legislature.

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a state dispensary system having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

S. J. R. No. 18
A JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposing an Amendment to Sec. 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Sec. 48, a section to be known as Sec. 48a, and to read as follows: "Sec. 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the safe purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and in school districts, and shall in no year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the monies paid into the fund.

All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a unified amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools and colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools and in colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

A JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of premiums on such policies of insurance; providing the State shall never be required to purchase insurance for any employees; providing for the necessary publication and election; making an appropriation to pay for same.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 59, to read as follows: "Section 59. The Legislature shall have power to pass such laws as may be necessary to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for such State employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and to provide for the payment of all costs, charges, and premiums on such policies of insurance; providing the State shall never be required to purchase insurance for any employee."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State."

And all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of Workmen's Insurance for employees of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

S. J. R. No. 26
A JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposing an amendment to Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, composed of three members, whose terms of office shall be for a period of six years, one to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, such appointments to be with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present; and so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall have the power on the recommendation and advice on the majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons and to remit fines and forfeitures, and, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons with the advice and consent

of the Legislature." Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not include his desire regarding the above proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

in cases of treason; and to provide that the Governor shall have power to grant one reprieve in any capital case not to exceed thirty (30) days, and shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons; and to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to regulate procedure before the Board and to provide enact parole laws and to provide for an election for such proposed constitutional amendment, and to make an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended; so as hereafter to read as follows:

Sec. 11. There is hereby created a Board of Pardons and Paroles, to be composed of three members, who shall have been resident citizens of the State of Texas for a period of not less than two years immediately preceding such appointment, each of whom shall hold office for a term of six years; provided that of the members of the first board appointed, one shall serve for two years, one for four years and one for six years from the first day of February, 1937, and they shall cast lots for their respective terms. One member of said Board shall be appointed by the Governor, one member by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one member by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals; the appointments of all members of said Board shall be made with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present. Each vacancy shall be filled by the respective appointing power that theretofore made the appointment to such position and the appointive powers shall have the authority to make recess appointments until the convening of the Senate.

In all criminal cases, except treason and impeachment, the Governor shall have power, after conviction, on the written signed recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles or a majority thereof, to grant reprieves and commutations of punishment and pardons; and under such rules as the Legislature may prescribe, and upon the written recommendation and advice of a majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, he shall have the power to remit fines and forfeitures. The Governor shall have the power to grant one reprieve in any capital case for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days; and he shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons. With the advice and consent of the Legislature, he may grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason.

The Legislature shall have power to regulate procedure before the Board of Pardons and Paroles and shall require it to keep record of its actions and the reasons thereof, and shall have authority to enact parole laws."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed constitutional amendments at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1936, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the amendment of Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, and to make the Governor's pardoning power subject to recommendation of said Board, except in cases of treason the Governor may grant reprieves, commutations and pardons with the advice and consent of the Legislature."

Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and any papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars, and no more."

Sec. 5. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Attorney General at Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars per annum and the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars per annum."

And those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the State Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Attorney General at Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars per annum; and the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000) Dollars per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 7. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people.

Q—When was the first inaugural ball given in Austin? A. B. A. At the second inauguration of President Sam Houston in Dec. 1841.

Q—I am interested in the life of Tom Green. What about him? G. F. Ardmore, Okla.,

A. He was in charge of the "Twin Sisters" at San Jacinto; surveyor of Fayette county in 1838, engraving clerk in House and Senate and clerk of supreme court of Republic, in Indian raids in 1841, in border volunteer guard in 1842, with Gen. Taylor in Mexican war, clerk of U. S. court until beginning of Civil War, killed in 1864 leading Confederates against Union Army at Blair's landing on Red River, then ranking as major general. Lovingly called "Tommy".

Q—When did literature concerning Texas first come into large demand? A. G. Denton.

A. There was little obtainable about Texas until after the revolt against Mexico, after which, measured by the reading demands of the time, much was written and read about the country, in which the whole of the United States and much of Europe had become interested.
