Victim's condition termed 'stable' Hunt expands for hit-and-run driver

Shortly after 10 p.m., Saturday, April 17, Spearman police officers responded to a call concerning a car-pedestrian accident at Ave. D and N. Brandt St.

Arriving at the scene officers found Jack E. Hanson, 17, 316 N. Hoskins, the apparent victim of a hit-and-run driver. An ambulance arrived with officers and transported Hanson to Hansford Hospital for emergency examination and treatment, then he was transported to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center.

There, his condition was reported as stable at press time.

He suffered facial injuries and multiple fractures of the pelvis and legs.

"Through witnesses, we have established that Hanson was in the roadway on foot," Spearman Police Chief Ron Robinson said. "The driver of the hit-and-run vehicle would be in a better position before the law if he or she contacted us personally."

Chief Robinson noted that the national average for drivers who panic and leave the scene of an accident is some 70 percent but the vast majority of these turn themselves in after when calm has begun to take over from their initial reaction.

"Do not misunderstand," the Chief admonished. "I am not saying this driver would get off because the pedestrian apparently was where he should not have been, but... it would be less difficult than it will be if we have to search out driver and vehicle. Under those circumstances, he or she will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the laws concerning leaving the scene of an accident."

"There were witnesses and we do have a description of the vehicle."

The previous weekend was marred by the shooting of an

18-year old Spearman man.

"An exhaustive investigation indicates the gunshot wound suffered by Ricky Shields at a home on Endicott, where he was living, was self-inflicted by accident," Chief Ron Robinson reported.

The Chief said the findings in the case will be presented to the grand jury for review as a matter of form but he felt the accidental verdict would stand.

Shields has been released from the Amarillo hospital.

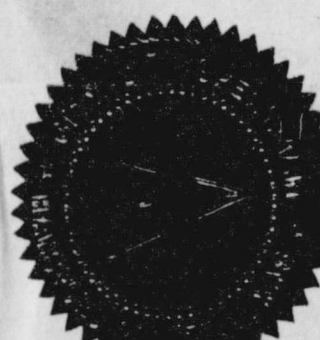

Primary Elections Set

The State of Texas primary elections will be held May 1, 1982.

In addition to the governor's race, attorney general and other statewide races, there are two contested positions on the Hansford County Democratic ballot.

Candidates on the Democratic ballot for Commissioner Precinct 4 are Gene Reynolds and J.W. "Wes" Whitaker, both of Gruver.

Val Winger, also of Gruver, is running on the Republican ballot.

The other contested race in Hansford County is for County Treasurer. Verna Gail Keim, incumbent, seeking re-election is opposed by Norma Jean Mackie. These are on the Democratic ballot.

Others on the Democratic slate running unopposed are Joe T. Venneman, Commissioner Precinct Two; Amelia C. Johnson, District and County Clerk; Johnny P. Vernon, Justice of the Peace, Precinct One; R. L. McClellan, County Judge; Tommy Gumfory, Gruver, Chairman, Precinct Three; J.L. Brock, Spearman, Chairman, Precinct Five; W.L. Johnson, Gruver, Chairman Precinct Seven; Carl M. Archer, Spearman, County Chairman.

Absentee voting will continue through April 27 in the county clerk's office at the courthouse in Spearman.

David A. Dean, Secretary of State, states that employers are required by statute to permit

employees time off from work with pay to vote and that voters may only vote in the primary election of one political party, not in the primary elections of both parties.

The flat-bed pick up service has been offered for several seasons, now. These trucks, driven by city employees, will

haul off discarded lumber and lumber scraps, tree limbs and the heavier twigs falling or trimmed from trees.

County Scales Check Show Good Accuracy Rate

Hansford County people can count on getting their money's worth in weight through the year if the products are weighed on local scales or gas pumps, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said today.

In the county there are 111 weighing devices of different types, ranging from 52 fuel pumps to 23 supermarket scales.

"Our Department regularly checks the commercial scales in the county and has found that they conform to our previous surveys across the state. Of those that were above or below tolerance, not many scales were off by significant amounts. Also, as many were giving the customer too much of the product as were giving too little. Because of frequent checks, scales are not out of calibration very long," Brown said.

"Business owners are glad to see us come in because as often

as not, they have been losing money if their scales were not accurate," Brown said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has inspectors assigned to every county. They are trained to check all different types of scales -- from those for medicines in a pharmacy to those for livestock and grain.

The inspectors also spot check packaged goods, such as cereals and crackers, to make certain that the weight stated on the label is accurate. If on the average the weights of the packages are below the amount stated on the label, the shipment is put on a Stop-Sale order. The store owner then either returns the items to the processor or as is the case very often, gives them to charitable organizations. Meat packaged in the supermarket as well as processor packs are also checked by Department inspectors.

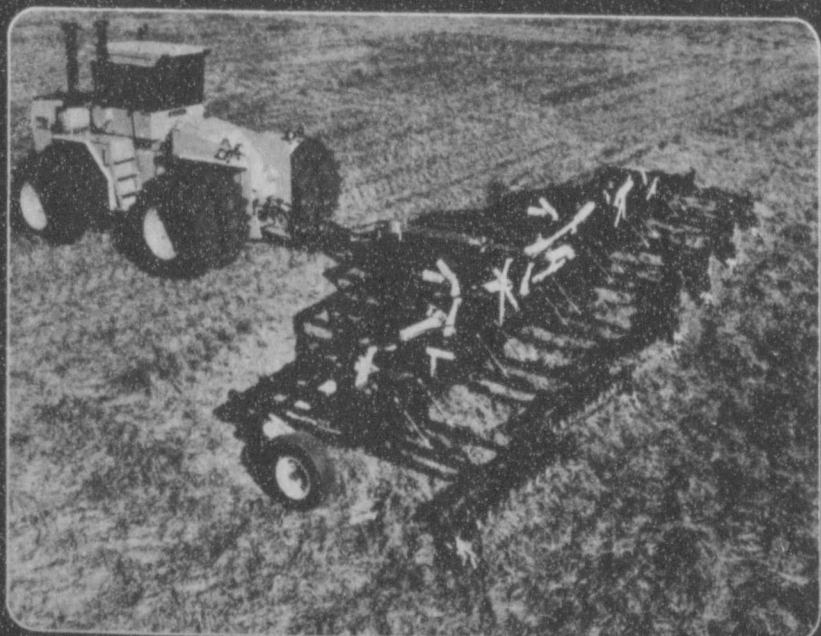

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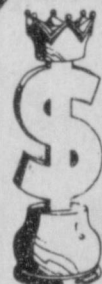

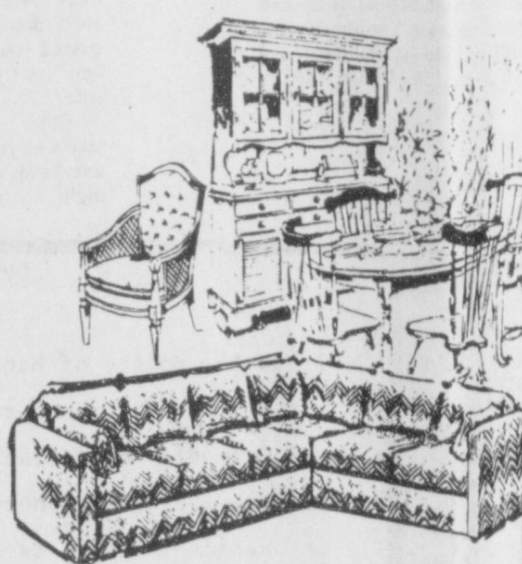
In addition to including business histories the book will include 547 family stories, more history of the county in general, and a section that is still open to include memorials and tributes dedicated to special loved ones.

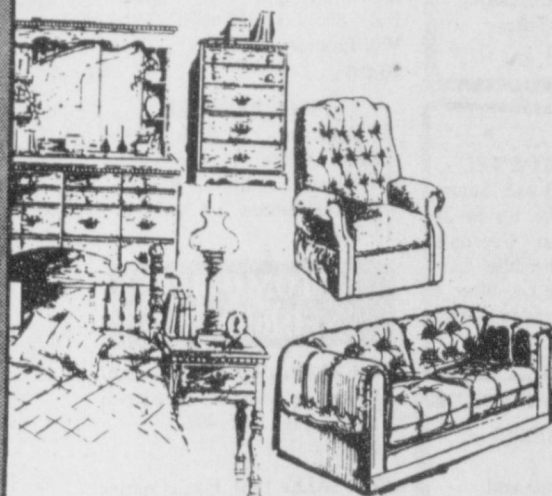

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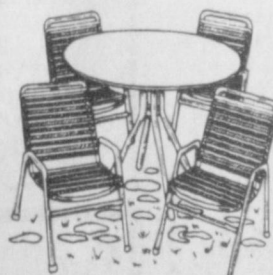
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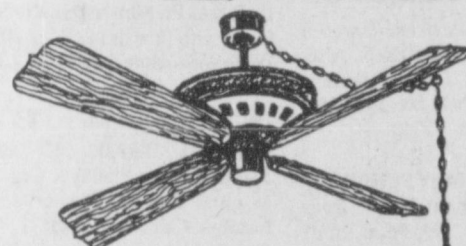

Staff members of the Panhandle Area Agency on Aging will conduct a hearing concerning the needs of the elderly in Borger on Tuesday, May 11. The hearing will be conducted in the Opportunities Center, 930 Illinois from 1:00 until 4:00 p.m.

PAAA staff member Perna Strickland said her agency "wants to hear from anyone who has an opinion about the needs and problems of elderly citizens. Of course, that means

for senior citizens programs in the Panhandle area in coming years.

"This will be a very important week for us. We're looking forward to a big turnout," Ms Strickland said. "It's a chance for those who are concerned about the elderly to have direct influence on planning in this region."

Emergency Reactions
How much time do you have to react when you're faced with an emergency traffic situation? Researchers at the University of Southern California studied more than 900 motorcycle accidents to learn that riders, on the average, had less than 1.9 seconds to respond. And, during that 1.9 seconds they had to see the threat, decide how to handle it and carry out their decision properly.



What can you do to

be better prepared? The Motorcycle Safety Foundation offers these tips:

- Constantly scan the road up ahead for possible problems. Never let your eyes rest for more than a few seconds on any one spot.

- Maintain a two-second following distance to allow yourself a better view, more maneuvering room and a chance to be seen by others in traffic around you.

- Play a mental game with yourself. Map out, in your head, how you would handle emergency situations that might crop up as you ride.

Photography the topic of PBS' 'Media Probes'

It's not difficult to make a case for the pervasiveness of the media. The striking thing is that we know so little about the ways we shape them and they shape us.

The role and impact of mass communications is explored in "Media Probes," an eight-part, half-hour series premiering April 21 on PBS. (Local times may vary; check listings.)

The series is designed in a magazine format that entertains and informs about a different subject each week: photography, soap operas, TV news, language, political spots, design, sound and the future.

Celebrity hosts offer analysis and commentary about each subject. Model Cheryl Tiegs is the first. She takes viewers inside the world of photography and reveals the power of images — self-images, preconceived images and images of world events.

Each sequence introduces us to a photographer whose work conveys one or more of these themes. The first portrait unfolds in the Georgetown home of Pulitzer-winning photojournalist David Hume Kennerly. As Kennerly sifts through boxes brimming with his photos from Vietnam, the Ford White House and Jonestown, he explains that being a good photojournalist

requires more than taking pictures.

"You have to be something of a con man," he says as he recounts stories of fast-talking his way into and out of places in order to get the picture — those images of world events that somehow become our collective image of the events themselves.

From the controlled chaos of the Kennerly archives, we switch to the frantic pace of a staff photographer for the New York Daily News, Mary DiBiase. We follow DiBiase through the daily rigors of her hurry-up-and-wait routine. She is described by the newspaper's photo editor as a "gutsy little gal," and viewers see why as Mary recounts her coverage of a gangland shooting.

To some photographers, timing and access are essential; to others what is essential is attention to detail. To top commercial photographer Michael O'Neill, a 10-hour workday may yield a single

finished photograph.

Photo-essayist Bruce Davidson uses his camera to go beyond the surface image of people and places. By totally immersing himself in his subject matter over a period of months or years, Davidson catches the emotional reality and essence of a Harlem neighborhood, of the Civil Rights movement and of the people of New York's subway. "I tried to record the quiet dignity of the people," explains Davidson.

Created by independent producers Kit Laybourne and Mickey Lemle, "Media Probes" is presented in association with WQED/Pittsburgh. Funding for the series is provided by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, the Ford, Rockefeller and Alfred P. Sloan Foundations, the National Endowment for the Arts and other public television stations. "Photography" was produced and directed by Mickey Lemle.

With their urging, she was sent to school in New York, at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. She had to quit before graduation when she was offered a major touring role in "Oklahoma."

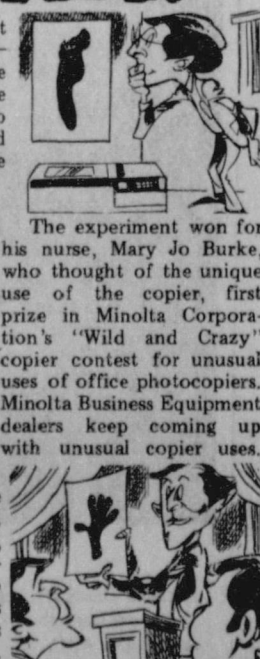

'Tomorrow People':
Some serious sci-fi

What do you get when you make a kids' science-fiction series that has elements of "Space 1999" and "Mission Impossible"? Nickelodeon's British-produced "Tomorrow People."

Four teen-agers with super-human powers (telepathy, the ability to disappear, etc.) do good deeds — you know, like trying to save the world and all that. They take orders from a master computer that converses with them and projects mug shots and detailed instructions on a video screen. Just a bit more elaborate than the "Mission Impossible" tape recorder.

The tone of the series is serious, even sedate — much closer to "Space 1999" than to "Star Trek." The four young protagonists are adults in teen-age bodies — they display no obvious teen-age characteristics. They announce their lines with careful British accents that would make the adult thespians of "Brideshead Revisited" envious.

In the four-part segment called "The Doomsday Men," which concludes on April 18, the youngsters must infiltrate the ranks of a college where "doomsday" recruits are trained. This secret society advocates war and seeks to disrupt disarmament talks. Since the do-gooders won't use their special powers violently against the bad guys, each mission is that much harder. "Star Trek's" Captain Kirk certainly never had that problem.

Another Nickelodeon program, "Wild Rides," will get you in the mood for summer as it takes you to amusement parks across the country in search of the ultimate

roller coaster.

The show is like one big, half-hour cola commercial, with scenes of young people laughing, squealing and whooping it up on careening coasters — the only things missing are the requisite cola bottles. But don't drink or eat before watching the show — at times you'll feel as if you're actually riding the coasters. The camera gives you a passenger's-eye view of the vertical drops and spinning tracks at dizzying speeds.

Actor Matt Dillon, who looks and acts like a young "Fonzie," hosts the show, airing April 18 and 28. Most of the footage is puffery, though at one point Dillon narrates a brief history of roller coasters and amusement parks, from Coney Island's Steeplechase Park in the late 1800s to Disneyland in the 1950s. The "ultimate coaster," which has three 360-degree loops, is viewed at a Six Flags park in Georgia.

Betcha didn't know there's even a bunch of fanatics, the American Coaster Enthusiasts, who traverse the nation in search of thrills, but not necessarily spills.

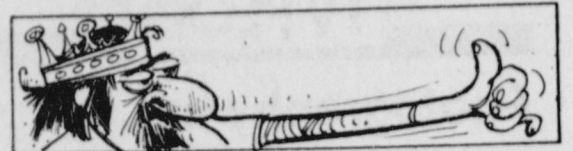

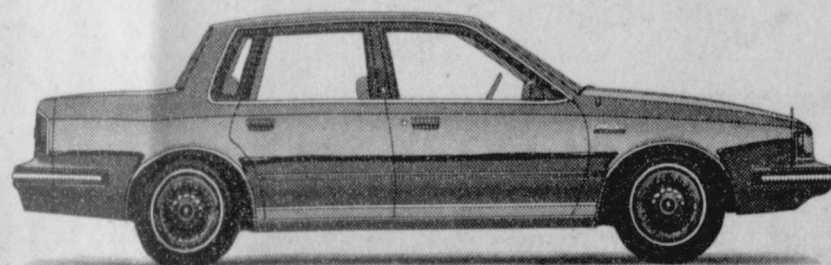

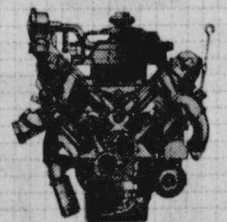
