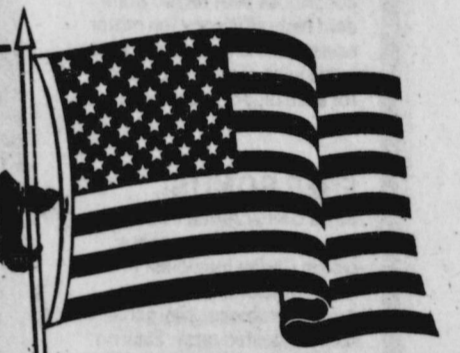

# Tax appraisal office sets Open House

After almost two years a-borning under state statute, the general public will get a look, Friday, at the Hansford County Appraisal District office and staff.

The occasion will be an Open House, tomorrow, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at 13 West Kenneth Ave., Spearman.

The office will assume the functions of the tax office of the city of Spearman and the city of Gruver, the Spearman and Gruver Independent School Districts and Hansford County government. It will be manned by a chief appraiser, deputy appraiser, secretary and bookkeeper.

Function of the office will be overseen by a board of directors comprised of Jimmy Shieldknight, chairman; Lynn Hart, Joel Lackey, Thane McCloy and Everett Tracy.

These were elected by the five taxing entities within the county. Votes were prorated to the taxing entities on a formula established by statute. First, there was a nominating procedure. Then, lacking any objections or further attempts to nominate other candidates, the nominees were voted the official board.

Alice Peddy, CTA, RPA, will be the chief appraiser. In that capacity she will marshal the forces of the office.

Pat Cates has been employed as deputy appraiser, Marsha Kuehl, secretary and Nell Bagwell, bookkeeper.

The institution of this form of handling the taxing function of all taxing entities in the county came by act of the legislature and will be a part of each county in the state. There are no exceptions.

The move was greeted with mixed responses when it was first a matter of law. There are still some counties that are having trouble accepting this form of handling taxing matters within a county but the transition is going smoothly, apparently, in Hansford County.

The only problem was that the statutes did not allow for the preparation of the takeover. Opening date was specified and that was it. Each chief appraiser across the state had to "play it by ear" when it came to setting

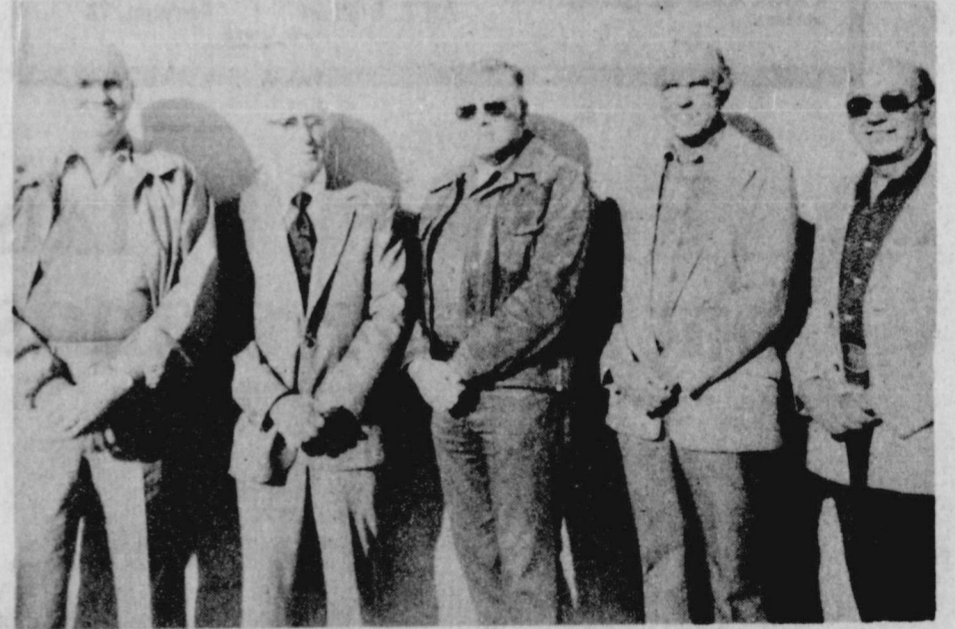

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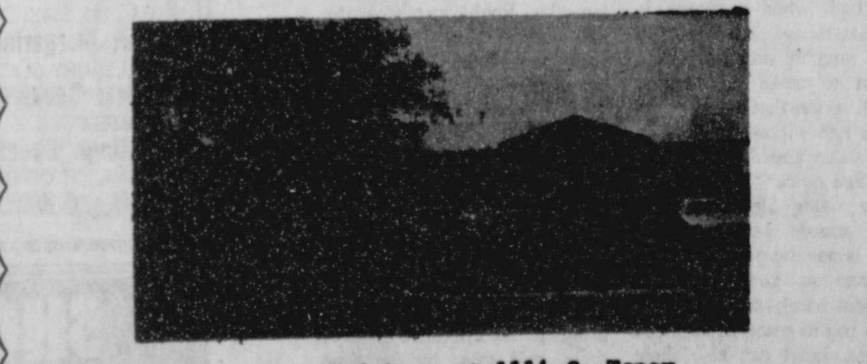

They both stand 5'6", and yet some opponents have said they get so psyched out that they usually guard the wrong one, even though they have different numbers. Jan and Jean did go to the State Finals in the Track. Jean is a little bit speedier with the ball, while Jan can steal the ball with so much agility that she keeps going until she lays the ball up for two big points. Both Jean and Jan are very fast and quick. Some folks say that "fast and quick" are the same thing, but not in basketball. In basketball, when a person is fast that means that they run fast to catch up with the pursuit or fast to make two points, QUICK means that a person can steal a ball without making an error. Jean and Jan are both "fast and quick"! Janet Reed is the other 5'8" Lynxette. Janet guards her opponent, which is usually down near the baseline, so good that her opponent barely scores enough points in the game to do much damage. Janet can also shoot the ball very well. # Everybody pays for 'hot' checks

Merchants and other persons accepting checks in the course of business should be extremely wary in doing so.

That is the word from Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin as the community moves into the Christmas shopping season.

"This is the time of year when 'hot check' artists play

Santa Claus ... to themselves!" Sheriff McFarlin pointed out. "In times past, these people 'Papered' Hansford County pretty well. However, the number of offenses and losses therefrom have been declining the past few years.

"I would like to see it stop completely but in the rush of the holiday season salespeople be-

come careless about identification or take a chance rather than miss a sale."

The sheriff had the following words for merchants and their salespeople:

The very first thing is to be wary of a person that becomes embarrassed or angry at being asked for identification.

"A person with a legitimate

bank account is not going to take offense at the identification request," the sheriff said.

He noted that the merchant, salesperson or cashier should read the number of the drivers license themselves. Do not let the purchaser read out a number.

Law enforcement people will not arrest a person on the

strength of a name alone. Date-of-birth and other pertinent information is necessary. The county attorney will not prepare an action without this.

There are too many people over an area as big as the state of Texas that have the same names.

"We must have some positive identification to go on."

Sheriff McFarlin warned.

He explained that calling the bank on which a check is drawn is not adequate protection.

"A professional at theft-by-check will open a bank account for -- say \$1,500. Friday evening, he or she may write bogus checks totaling \$500, draw out their money and close their account leaving the vendor

holding some worthless paper," the sheriff explained.

"Another thing," he added, "when a merchant gets a worthless check or checks, he should come to my department or go to the county attorney immediately. Do not wait weeks or months to follow up on a bad check. The people who write them work one area and then flee to another working ground far removed."

The sheriff warned of another problem: shoplifting. He sought to enlist the aid of other shoppers in stores this Christmas.

"The cost for losses through worthless checks and shoplifting are added on to the prices honest people pay for merchandise," the sheriff informed. "So, any honest persons seeing an act of shoplifting should report it to store personnel immediately."

--But loss problems are not over with the end of the holiday

season, according to Sheriff McFarlin. About that time news of forgeries begin coming in. These are checks that would have been good if the signature was not forged. Most of them go through and the act of forgery is not discovered until the legal account holder checks his or her cancelled checks.

The sheriff's final warning was to those who might be tempted to steal by worthless check: these are the penalties.

Worthless checks under \$5.00, a fine up to \$200; \$5.00 to \$19.99, a fine up to \$1,000 or 180 days in jail or both; \$20.00 to \$199.99, a fine up to \$2,000 or one year in jail or both; \$200 to \$10,000, a fine up to \$5,000, two to 10 years in the penitentiary or both; over \$10,000, a fine up to \$10,000, two to 20 years in the penitentiary or both.

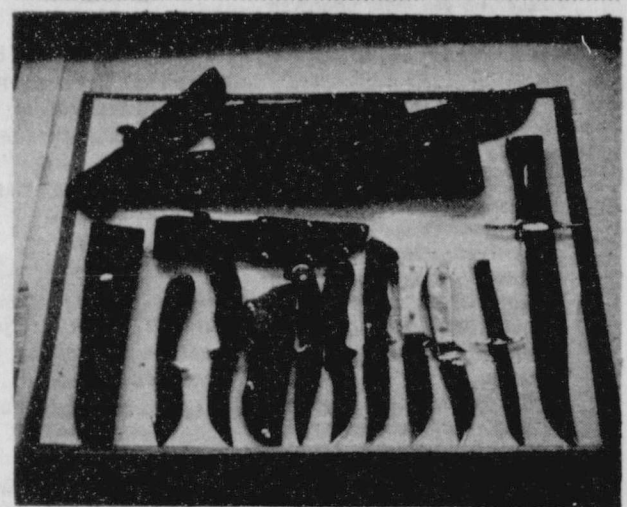

## Buchanan To Seek Second Term

State Rep. J.W. "Buck" Buchanan of Dumas declared this week that he will seek a new term in 1962 elections in his new and enlarged 88th Texas Legislative District.

In redistricting of legislative districts this year, Buchanan had three new counties added to his former 10-county 64th district, the counties of Wheeler, Carson, and Oldham.

These join the 10 across the top of the Texas Panhandle that he presently represents: Hutchinson, Moore, Ochiltree, Dalman, Sherman, Haasford, Hartley, Hemphill, Roberts, and Lipscomb.

"We were able to keep the upper Panhandle district pretty well unified in the re-districting," Buchanan points out, and adds: "This is important because we can more effectively care for the interests we share geographically and economically."

"With the legislature changing through re-districting, I believe that it is important for our area to have experienced representation in Austin, to get done those things we need in the Panhandle," Buchanan points out. "I enjoy serving the district, with which I am well acquainted, and will appreciate everyone's support in the 1962 elections."

Rep. Buchanan has long been a leader in Texas water programs and worked in the development of a long range Texas water plan, he has been active in civic and regional affairs and has been selected "Man of the Year" by several organizations, ranging from his local Chamber of Commerce to state and regional groups.

"We just have to regroup and try again for a water program," Buchanan says. "All of Texas needs a water plan, and a system for financing it, and we'll have to do it with our resources because federal money probably will not be available as it has been."

He adds: "My record is one of husbanding taxpayer money, of looking ahead to needs of our area, and of having the experience to get things done in Austin."

He plans a person-to-person campaign in 1962, Buchanan declares, "because the way to know your needs firsthand -- and to be able to get them met."

A native of Haasford county, Rep. Buchanan has lived in Dumas for 26 years, 25 of these years as manager of the North Plains Water Conservation District. After retiring from the Water District he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1960. He and his wife, Millie, reside at 115 Plans in Dumas.

## Sarpalius Announces Amarillo Meeting

AUSTIN -- The fourth of seven planned meetings of the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee will be in Amarillo December 17, Sen. Bill Sarpalius said today. Sarpalius is chairman of the subcommittee.

Sarpalius said the panel will hear testimony on six topics he described as "vital to the Panhandle economy, as well as the state as a whole."

"We will hear testimony on grain elevator explosions, grain elevator bonding, water availability for crops and livestock, farm labor, the state loan guarantee program for agricultural land and on transportation of agricultural commodities," he said. "We will have a busy day."

"All these topics are important to Texas. In fact, it would be difficult to decide which is the most important. Water, certainly cannot be replaced. But these days, transportation is becoming a real problem."

"On the other hand, with interest rates so high, the loan guarantee program is essential," Sarpalius said.

Grain elevators speak for themselves, and frequently speak for themselves in a very loud voice, he said.

"We have heard a lot of testimony on grain elevator explosions in our Fort Worth and Corpus Christi hearings. We have heard expert testimony that has told us we need more research into the cause of the explosions."

"No one seems to know, right now, how much research we need or how much it will cost. It does seem certain that the research will be cheaper than a big explosion in a big elevator," Sarpalius said.

On another topic, Sarpalius

said the recent defeat of the Water Trust Fund is a setback, but the extent of that setback is not fully known.

"We know we are running out of water, and we can predict with some degree of certainty the rate we will use water. What we want to do at these hearings is to refine our projections and determine what we can do to slow water use, and maybe find a way to get more water."

"For example, there is some important work going on at the Bushland Research Center that involves using wind energy to pump up irrigation water. We hope to find out more about this and other methods at our meeting," he said.

The meeting will be at the Texas A & M Research Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, on Thursday, December 17, at 9:00 A.M. It is a public meeting, so any interested person may attend.

## Social Security News

The elimination of the special minimum benefit from social security will create many new SSI recipients. If you are going to be affected by this legislation, and if you are considering making application for Supplemental Security Income, you should be aware that disposal of your resources in order to meet the requirements for SSI may affect your eligibility to that program.

Resources include both real and personal property which a person owns and can apply either directly, or by sale or conversion, to meet the basic needs of food, clothing, and shelter. This includes money in financial organizations in addition to real property, such as automobiles, land or equipment.

If you sell or give away any resources for less than fair market value for the purpose of establishing SSI eligibility, you will be charged with the difference between the fair market value and the amount you received for a period of 24 consecutive months. It will be assumed that you disposed of the resource to establish SSI eligibility unless you present convincing evidence that the disposal of the resource was for some other purpose.

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STAMPS AND STORIES

Two commemoratives honoring James Hoban, Irish-American architect of the White House, were issued recently by the U.S. Postal Service.

There's an 18-cent issue (pictured above) which is

available only at philatelic centers or by mail order from Postal Service headquarters in Washington, D. C.

The 20-cent commemorative which has the same basic design as the 18-cent is available at post offices throughout the country. Both Hoban stamps were issued publicly on October 14, 1981.

Architect Hoban, born at Desart, County Kilkenny, Ireland in 1762, studied architectural drawing during his youth. He was involved in the design and construction of several Dublin buildings before emigrating to the United States after the

American Revolution. Hoban first established himself in Philadelphia and later moved to South Carolina where he designed the state capitol building. In 1792, he moved to the District of Columbia to seek opportunities in the new city being built. He submitted entries in design competitions for the U.S. Capitol building and the President's mansion. He won the latter.

After the British burned the White House during the

War of 1812, Hoban rebuilt the structure. He is said to be responsible for painting the mansion white to obliterate the smoke marks from the name "White House" for the presidential residence.

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- Of all NFL teams, one of the most disappointing, to fans, has been the Atlanta Falcons. Touted as perhaps a Super Bowl squad on the basis of a 12-4 record last year, the Falcons this season won three and then lost six of eight, before evening the record on a recent Monday night, beating the Vikings 31-30.

What is the background of Atlanta's so-so season this year? One answer is that there have been too many mental lapses, by both players and coaching staff. Atlanta has the personnel. But the Falcons haven't played exactly smart football in too many games. They've done the obvious, often played too conservatively or without

enough imagination in play calling. Field decisions have often been lacking. They have thrown short passes on third down, time after time, not enough for a first down. They have fumbled and fumbled. They have run on first down time after time after time.

There have been too many breakdowns against the pass. The defense against the run has been

solid. When this team, of which so much was expected, lost six out of eight, confidence seemed to be replaced with some self-doubt and some let-down in effort.

Yet the Falcons lost many of their games by two or three points. With luck and smarter football, they could have been 12-4 again.

**RECIPE**

By Sarah Anne Sheridan

Here is a good recipe for those who are planning a dinner party and want to serve two meats.

**Ham & Turkey**

- 1 4 lb. all-white-meat turkey roll
- 1 5 lb. canned ham
- 1/2 c peach preserves
- 1/4 c currant jelly
- Paprika Onions

Roast turkey roll as label directs the day before. Cover and refrigerate. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Remove any gelatin from ham; slice ham 1/4-inch thick. Use center slices only; refrigerate end slices for later use. Slice turkey roll into 1/4-inch thick slices. In foil-lined shallow open pan, alternately secure turkey slices and ham slices through center of long skewer. If skewer isn't long enough, start with another one from the other end. Roast 30 minutes.

In small saucepan over medium heat, stir peach preserves and currant jelly until blended; use to generously glaze meat; continue roasting 30 minutes. Place meat on warm platter; remove skewers. Garnish with Paprika Onions. Makes 10 to 14 servings.

**Paprika Onions**

Drain one 15 1/2-ounce can whole white onions. In small skillet, saute onions in 1/4 cup butter, melted, 5 minutes or until heated. Sprinkle with paprika and 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley.

When he died, the bank gave me the \$2,200 he had in his savings account. If he had bought the life insurance policy I would have received \$50,000.

I loved my husband dearly, but I can't help felling resentful. After all, the children and I were HIS responsibility. He should have looked out for us. I hope you will print this letter. Maybe somebody will learn from it.—HIS WIDOW

DEAR WIDOW: Your husband made a mistake, which, unfortunately, you and the children are paying for. Put aside your resentment and accept the fact that he was not inconsiderate. He was ignorant.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I have read with interest several letters in your column from widows whose husbands had very little life insurance, or in some cases none at all. Some of those widows were bitter because their husbands had not "planned ahead." But in my case, I was the guilty party.

Every time our agent suggested that Mel increase his insurance, I came out with that stupid remark, "We're insurance poor." The truth was that I, like so many other wives, thought my husband would live forever. Widowhood was something that happened to other women. Today, I'm that other woman.

Last week, while going through my husband's desk drawers I came across an insurance proposal for \$40,000 of life insurance. It was dated five months before Mel died. It was a good plan and we could have afforded it. Our agent was trying to help and I knew it, but Mel was in perfect health and I figured I could use that \$21.57 a month toward a new color TV.

Today, I'm working in a steak restaurant trying to keep my family together. Believe me, it's tough. I hope you will print this letter for the benefit of all those wives out there who don't appreciate life insurance as much as widows do. Sign me—KICKING MYSELF IN WINSTON-SALEM.

DEAR FRIEND: Twenty-twenty hindsight is easy. The family that looks ahead and makes provisions for the long shots is the one that sleeps better at night. I'm sorry your husband didn't override your veto. Good luck to you, dear.

3 to 4 cups Flour  
¼ cup Sugar  
1 t. Salt  
1 pkg. Yeast  
½ cup Milk  
½ cup Water  
¼ cup Margarine  
1 Egg

Confectioners' Sugar Frosting  
In a large bowl thoroughly mix 1 cup Flour, Sugar, Salt, and undissolved Yeast.

Combine Milk, Water, and Margarine in a saucepan. Heat over low heat until liquids are very warm (120 - 130 Degrees). Gradually add to dry ingredients and heat 2 min. at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally. Add Egg and ½ cup Flour. Beat at high speed 2 min. scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in enough additional Flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover: let rise in warm place, free from draft until doubled in bulk, about 1½ hours.

Punch dough down: turn out onto lightly floured board. Roll dough out to a 20/15" rectangle. Spread with Pecan Filling (below). Starting at wide side of dough, roll up as for jelly roll. Seal edges. Gently pull dough to make a 25" roll. Form into a snail shape on a large greased baking sheet. Cover: let rise until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Bake at 325 Degrees 40 to 45 min., or until done. Remove from baking sheet and cool on wire rack. When cooled frost with Confectioners' Sugar Frosting.

PECAN FILLING: Mix together ¼ cup Margarine, ½ cup Brown Sugar and 1 Egg. Stir in 2 t. Milk and 1 t. Orange Extract. Blend in 1 cup finely chopped Pecans.

CONFECTIONERS' SUGAR FROSTING: Mix 3 t. Margarine, 2½ cups Powdered Sugar, 1 t. of Milk and 1 t. Vanilla. Beat with mixer at low speed. Add more Milk if you need to make frosting easier to spread.

### CREAM OF BROCCOLI SOUP

¼ tsp. Celery Salt

### HAM QUICHE

Serves 6  
Preheat Oven to 375 Degrees  
Basic Crust: 1 ¼ cups All-Purpose Flour  
Pinch of Salt  
3 Tb. Butter  
3 Tb. Shortening  
3-4 Tb. Cold Water

Sift the Flour and Salt together into a bowl. Cut the Butter and Shortening into the Flour with a pastry blender or two knives until the mixture resembles coarse meal. Add three Tb. Water and mix with a fork and then your fingertips until the Dough can be gathered into a ball. If the dough is very crumbly, sprinkle a few drops of water over the dough, adding only enough to make the dough stick together. Wrap the dough in wax paper and chill in the refrigerator one hour before rolling out.

Roll the dough out on a floured board and fit it into a 9 x 10" quiche tin or nine inch pie plate. Cover the pastry with a sheet of aluminum foil, pressing it firmly around the sides and over the edges of the pastry. Fill with uncooked rice or dry beans and bake in a preheated 400 Degrees over for 7 minutes. Carefully remove the rice or beans and aluminum foil. Prick the bottom of the crust with a fork and continue baking 5 minutes more. The crust should not brown but should be only

partially baked unless otherwise directed in the specific recipe. Let the pastry cool before filling and baking the quiche or pie.

¼ lb. Cooked Ham, cut into small cubes  
1 cup grated Swiss Cheese  
2 Tb. Madeira (optional)  
BASIC CUSTARD: 4 Eggs  
¼ cup Milk  
¾ cup Heavy Cream  
2 Tb. melted Butter  
1 Tb. Flour  
Pinch of Salt  
Pinch of Cayenne Pepper  
Pinch of Nutmeg  
(freshly grated, if possible)

Beat all ingredients together with a wire whisk until blended. Scatter the ham and cheese over the bottom of pastry shell. Stir optional Madeira into the Custard & pour over ham and cheese. Bake 375 Degrees over 40 min. until custard is puffy and brown. Serve as luncheon with chilled wine.

## Veterans' Health Care Guidelines

The Veterans Administration today announced proposed guidelines for carrying out provisions of the "Veterans' Health Care, Training, and Small Business Loan Act of 1981" which was signed into law on November 3, 1981. The act, Public Law 97-72, authorized the Veterans Administration to provide certain health care services to any veteran of the Vietnam era (Aug. 5, 1964 - May 7, 1975) who, while serving in Vietnam, may have been exposed to dioxin or was exposed to a toxic substance in a herbicide or defoliant used for military purposes.

The guidelines which VA will furnish to its medical facilities, on an interim basis, will be published in the "Federal Register" and public comment

will be invited. Health care services may not be provided under this law, the guidelines point out, for the care of conditions which are found to have resulted from a cause other than the specified exposures.

Health care services authorized under this provision of the law are limited to hospital and nursing home care in VA facilities, and outpatient care in VA facilities on a pre- or post-hospitalization basis or to obviate a need for hospitalization. These services will be provided without regard to the veteran's age, service connected status or the inability of the veteran to defray the expenses of such care. Veterans furnished outpatient care under this authority will be accorded priority ahead of non-service-connected veterans and equal to former POWs receiving care for non-service-connected conditions.

Congress made it clear that this law provides for health care only. A determination that a veteran is eligible for such care does not constitute a basis for service connection or in any way affect determinations regarding service connection.

VA guidelines provide also that a complete medical history, physical examination and appropriate diagnostic studies will be developed for each veteran who served in the Republic of Vietnam and who requests VA medical care. For those who have been examined within the prior six months, only those procedures which are medically indicated by the current circumstances will be repeated. Where the findings reveal a condition requiring treatment, the responsible staff physician shall make a determination as to whether the condition resulted from a cause other than the specified exposure. In making this determination, the physician will consider that the following types of conditions are not ordinarily considered to be due to such

exposure:  
a. Congenital or developmental condition, e.g., spina bifida, scoliosis;  
b. Conditions which are known to have pre-existed military service;  
c. Conditions resulting from trauma, e.g., deformity or limitation of motion of an extremity;  
d. Conditions having a specific and well established etiology, e.g., tuberculosis, gout;  
e. Common conditions having a well recognized clinical course, e.g., inguinal hernia, acute appendicitis.

"On occasion," the guidelines continue, "The responsible staff physician may find that a veteran requires care for one or more of the conditions listed (above), but that the case presents complicating circumstances that make the provision of care under this authority appropriate. In such instances, the physician should seek guidance from the chief of staff regarding authorization for treatment. If treatment is so authorized, the reasons will be clearly documented in the medical record. Veterans who are not provided needed medical care under this circular may be furnished care if they are eligible under any other statutory authority."

## Shop Early-Mail Early

"Don't take a chance on disappointing someone you love. Send your gift parcels and cards early enough to insure their delivery before Christmas, not after," the postmaster advised today.

Such disappointments can be avoided if Christmas mailers will observe the following mailing schedule:

1. Gift parcels going to distant states should be mailed by December 11th.
2. Parcels going to local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 14th.
3. The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.
4. Greeting cards going to distant states should be mailed not later than December 14th. Cards going to local and nearby areas should be in the mail by December 18th.

The postmaster also emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It takes only a couple of extra

seconds, but pays big dividends.

ZIP Codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of illegible or incomplete address will be returned to the sender. "A return address might not seem very important," the postmaster noted, "but last year over 32 million pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because the mailing address couldn't be read and there was no return address on the envelope. If you estimate the worth of each of these pieces at 25 cents, including postage, postal customers lost over \$8 million last year to dead letter offices. None of this would have happened if the envelopes had contained a return address."

## Texas FB Adopts Policies

CORPUS CHRISTI -- Reflecting a conservative mood among Texas farmers and ranchers, voting delegates to Texas Farm Bureau's 48th annual meeting Nov. 29 - Dec. 2 approved resolutions expressing little need for government intervention.

The 1,164 voting farmers and ranchers re-elected Carrol Chaloupka, a grain and cattle producer from Dalhart in the Panhandle, to his eighth one-year term as president of the farm organization.

New state directors elected include Paul Macina, Shamrock; Leonard Schaffner, Henrietta; Henry Burton, Lufkin; and David Fochner, Boling. Directors re-elected are Wayne Cranfill, Hooks; Roy Johnson, Desdemona; and James Ray Adams, Odem.

In a meeting of the board of directors following adjournment of the convention, S. M. True, Jr., Plainview, was re-elected vice president. A new secretary treasurer, Wayne Cranfill, Hooks, was elected to replace retiring board member Donald Hebert, Waller.

Other state directors leaving the board were Marvin Pfenster, Weinert; Jack Osborne, Pampa; and Bill Guldry, Nacogdoches.

Delegates reaffirmed a national farm policy that calls for letting the law of supply and demand work in the marketplace, allowing producers to coordinate supplies with markets using farmer-owned and controlled reserves.

Carrying out a move toward the right that has been progressing over the past years, delegates voted policies that would "cut the umbilical cord" between government and the farm and ranch industry.

Delegates said that the dairy price support program should be discontinued. They also said the Commodity Credit Corporation, the federal agency that buys farm surpluses, should be abolished to do away with government's tendency to dump surpluses and depress market prices.

Delegates also voted to discontinue the emergency food program and all other programs for wheat, cotton, grain sorghum and other commodities.

Considering national monetary and fiscal policies, the farmers and ranchers favored abolishment of the Federal Reserve System.

"The Federal Reserve is a milk machine," said J. Anderson County al Reserve.

In an effort to hold down government spending, the main cause of inflation, the delegates said, they recommended that "automatic cost of living increases be eliminated for all government pay scales and programs."

In other national policy action, delegates favored: letting of imported meat products; stronger immigration laws; adoption of an alien worker program; adoption of a gold and/or silver standard for the U.S. monetary system; and immediate repeal of the federal estate tax. Delegates opposed court-imposed biling education.

These national policies passed by Texas farmers and ranchers will be sent to the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation as recommended resolutions. The AFBF annual meeting will be in San Diego, Jan. 10-14.

State policies adopted by the organization include support for: the present vaccination program for brucellosis elimination; a voluntary producer-financed promotion program for dairy products; states' rights to regulate and restrict the movement of commodities, produce, or livestock into Texas from other states in the case of threat of infestation or disease, as was the case with the Mediterranean fruit fly.

Delegates opposed attempts to teach "animal rights" philosophy in public schools, and opposed requiring employers to determine the citizenship or legal immigration status of their employees, or "penalizing employers for hiring illegal aliens."

In other activities, state winners of various young people tests were chosen.

Steven and Bearden, young farm couple from San Rosa in the Rio Grande Valley were chosen as the "Outstanding Young Farm and Ranch Couple for 1981." Other finalists were Monty and Cindy Henson of Meadow in Terry County, and Mayfield and Brenda Sue McCraw of Telephone in Fannin County.

In the annual Young Speakers for Free Enterprise contest, Kevin Wells of Mt. Pleasant in Titus County, won with a speech extolling the free enterprise system. Runners-up were Catherine Pawlik, George West, Live Oak County; Danny Hunter, Roscoe, Nolan County; and Jerry Ayers, Crowell, Ford County.

A new Texas Farm Bureau queen was crowned -- 18-year-old Marcy Langridge of Sinton, San Patricio County. Runner-up was Michelle Pettit, 19, of Jackville, Red River County. Musical pianist John Dujka, Stoenburg, Fort Bend County, was named winner of the TFB Talent Find contest.

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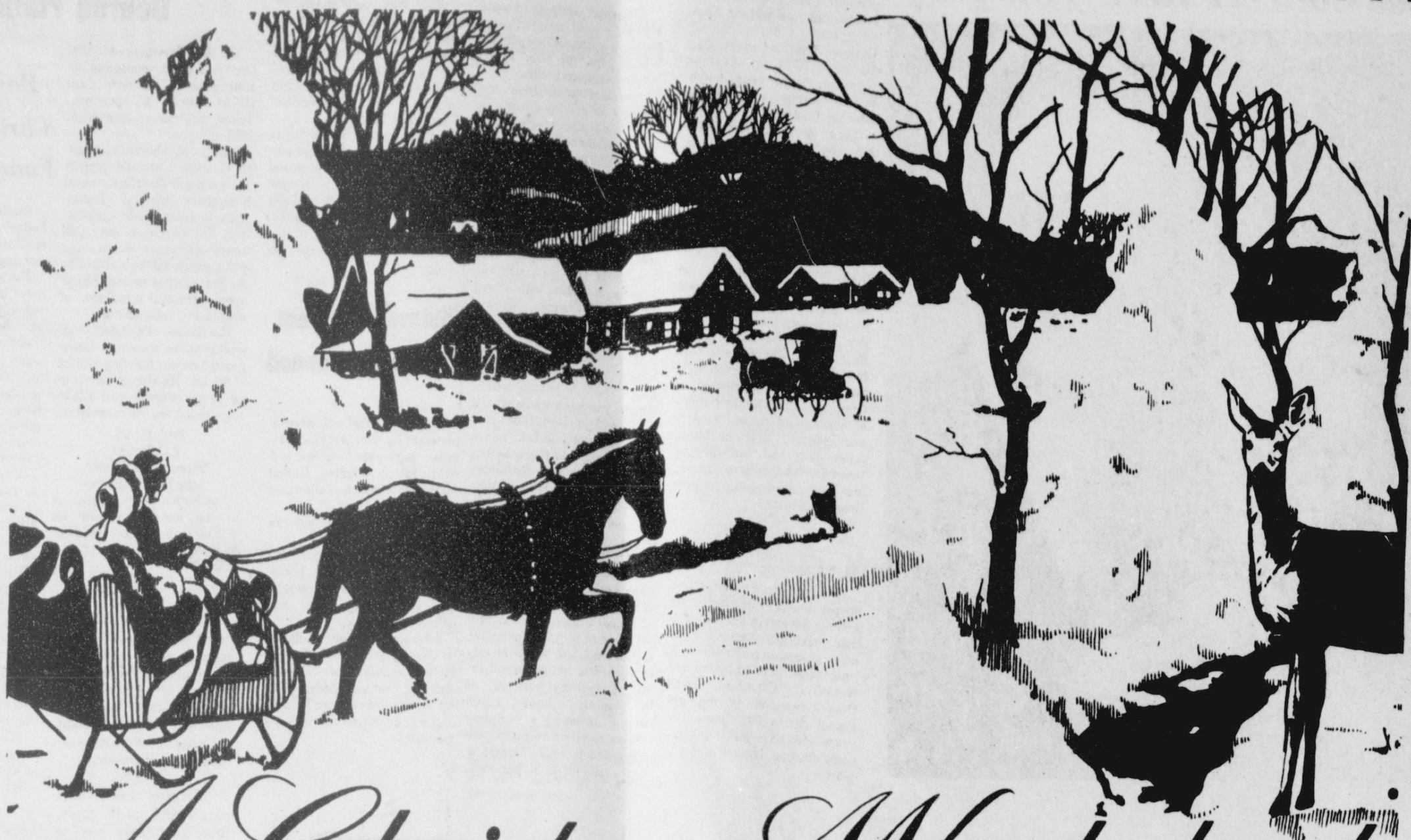
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
