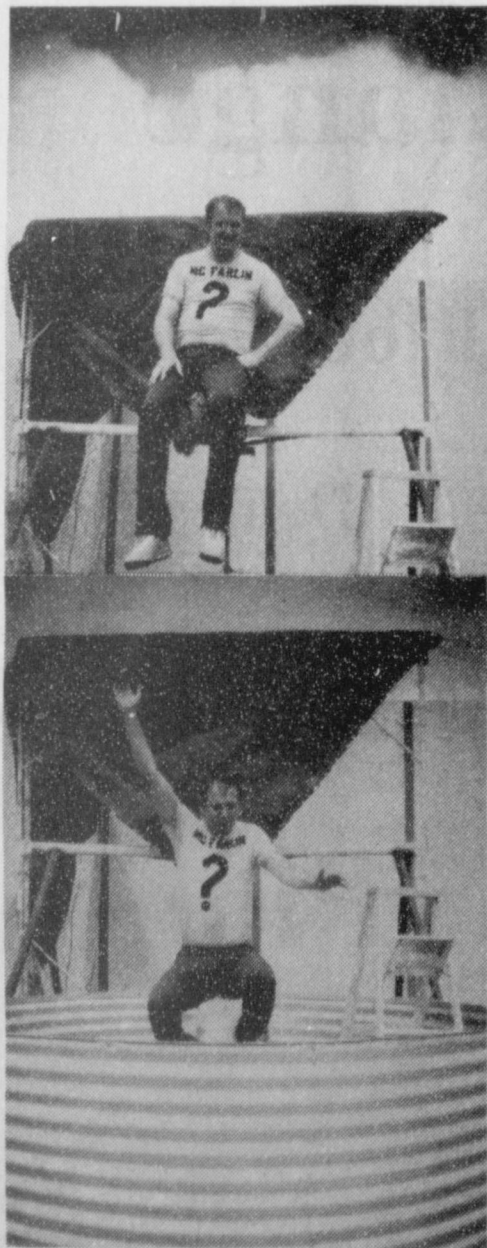

Ben Harris of Gruver won first place in the Talent Contest, J.W. Jines was second, and Anne Sheets was 3rd.

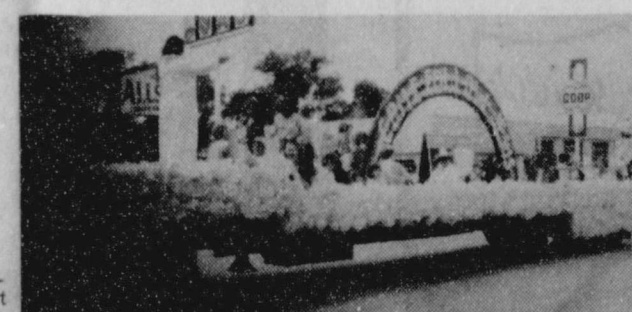

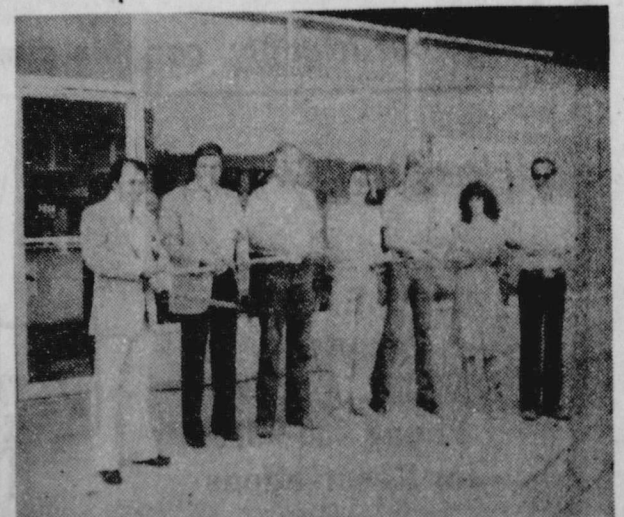

## FNB schedules anniversary events

*It's Diamond Jubilee time*

The First National Bank of Perryton will be celebrating its 75th year with a summer-long series of events planned. The first event of the big FNB diamond anniversary celebration is set for next Monday, June 7.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony and official anniversary statement is planned for 9 a.m. June 7. It is set for the new main entry to the bank. This event will open the bank's new addition and welcomes the community in for a preview of "First Place."

The ribbon-cutting will involve directors, stockholders, officers, city and county officials, Perryton Partners, and the area media. A tour of the completed expansion area, along with coffee and pastries in the North Community Room, follow.

Food will be served all day in the main lobby and the mini-bank facility. Pastries and hot beverages will be served in the morning and birthday cake and ice cream are to be offered in the afternoon. Banking hours will be extended from 9 to 5:30 that day.

There will be tables for customers and friends to select personal gifts and to register for prizes, including quarter-carat diamonds. Candidates in the Miss Perryton pageant as well as women of the community will serve as hostesses.

The birthday celebration is just one of three major events planned this summer by the First National Bank. On August 19, the international tour group, Up With People, arrives in Perryton. The group will be making personal appearances during the Wheatheart Celebration with a special paid performance scheduled for Saturday night, August 21, in the PHS auditorium.

The third event is the grand opening of First Place, when the entire \$1.6 million expansion project is completed. The opening celebration is planned for early September. It will be a week-long happening, with special evening parties and more.

It was back on June 7, 1907 that stockholders met and elected officers of the

First National Bank, then located at old Ochiltree. The bank had been formed by seven men, all of whom were elected directors. George F. Perry was elected the bank's new president. Two years later, First National would be consolidated with the Ochiltree National Bank and a year later it was ascertained that the value of the banking property was \$5,000.

By 1914, the First National Bank had joined the Federal Reserve Bank System, subscribing to 24 shares at \$100 each. The rest is history. Today, First National Bank is a leader of the Panhandle area, with a continued commitment to promote the growth of the city, the farming and ranching areas and the oil and gas production.

The current expansion of the bank, which will give FNB nearly double the room, was announced in August 1981. The bank has expanded onto the site of the former Perryton Office Supply building which adjoined the bank building on the south. In addition to

constructing a new two-story addition, a major remodeling of the interior and exterior of the current bank was planned. Part of that is already underway.

The First National Bank constructed its current building in 1963, a time when assets were at \$10 million and deposits had grown to \$8 million. The bank has grown seven-fold over the past 21 years.

Architects for the expansion are Lee and Associates of Denver, Colo. Cornerstone Builders Inc. of Greeley, Colo. is the general contractor with Frank Stetson as construction superintendent.

## Enough Courage?

Whether the economy begins to recover soon depends almost entirely on what action Congress takes in the next few months. The key question is whether enough members have the courage to do what must be done to stimulate recovery and put the federal budget on a sound footing.

The Latta Substitute was also amended prior to its consideration in order to add more funding for Medicare.

"When it became clear that the House might not pass any budget at all, I decided that however imperfect, the Jones proposal should be supported because of the potentially disastrous implications of the House

failing to decide on a budget for 1983.

"I did not favor the Jones version because I thought it cut the rate of defense increase too much, and it went too far in raising tax revenue at a time when we should be reducing the tax load on the American people. However, when the Latta plan failed to pass, it became imperative for a responsible Congress to pass something that could later be improved in a conference committee."

"I will continue to work for a responsible bipartisan solution."

# The Brown Recluse Spider

AMARILLO—The Texas Panhandle is on the western edge of the distribution of the brown recluse spider and for this reason residents in this area may not be as cautious as they should be about this poisonous spider, cautions an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The brown recluse often lives around human dwellings and is found in bathrooms, bedrooms and closets; as well as under furniture, behind baseboards and door facings or in corners and crevices, said Dr. Carl Patrick, the entomologist. It also likes cluttered cellars and garages.

"People are often bitten while they sleep, when they roll on a spider in bed. Others may be bitten by spiders trapped in the folds of clothing that has hung undisturbed for a long time," Patrick said.

The effects of a brown recluse spider bite may be immediate or delayed, depending upon the amount of venom injected and the victim's sensitivity. Usually, the bite causes a stinging sensation and then intense pain. Within 24 to 36 hours, a systemic reaction may occur, characterized by restlessness, fever, chills, nausea, weakness and joint pain. The bite also produces a small blister surrounded by a large congested and swollen area.

The venom usually kills the affected tissue, which gradually sloughs away and exposes underlying tissues. The edges around the wound thicken, while the exposed center fills with dense scar tissue. Healing may take six to eight weeks, leaving scars of various sizes.

The brown recluse is a nonaggressive spider that spins white or grayish, non-descript

webs. Its body and legs together cover about the same area as a quarter. The coloring of the recluse varies from an orange-yellow to dark brown or almost black.

"The most distinguishing characteristics are the spider's eyes and back markings," Patrick said. "It has three pairs of eyes arranged in a semicircle on the forehead of the head. The eyes also form the base of a violin-shaped marking on the back. The neck of the 'violin' is formed by a distinct, short median groove.

The spider's eggs are deposited in dark, sheltered areas in off-white round silken cases approximately 1/8 inch in diameter. After 24 to 36 days, 40 or more spiderlings emerge from the egg case. Their development is slow and is influenced greatly by ecological conditions and nutrition.

As a precautionary measure, become familiar with the appearance and habits of poisonous spiders, Patrick advised. Since spiders nest in quiet and undisturbed areas, frequent cleaning in closets, cellars and other such areas helps keep the spiders away.

"Where possible, use a water hose to wash off outside areas, particularly under roof eaves," the entomologist said. "When chemical control is necessary, he advised use of products containing Diazinon, Dursban, Baygon, Pyrethrins, Sevin, Resmethrin, Vapona or Malathion.

"Spray or dust outside under roof eaves, window ledges and porch and patio roofs. Inside, spray around windows, door facings, baseboards, basements, attics and storage places," the Extension entomologist advised.

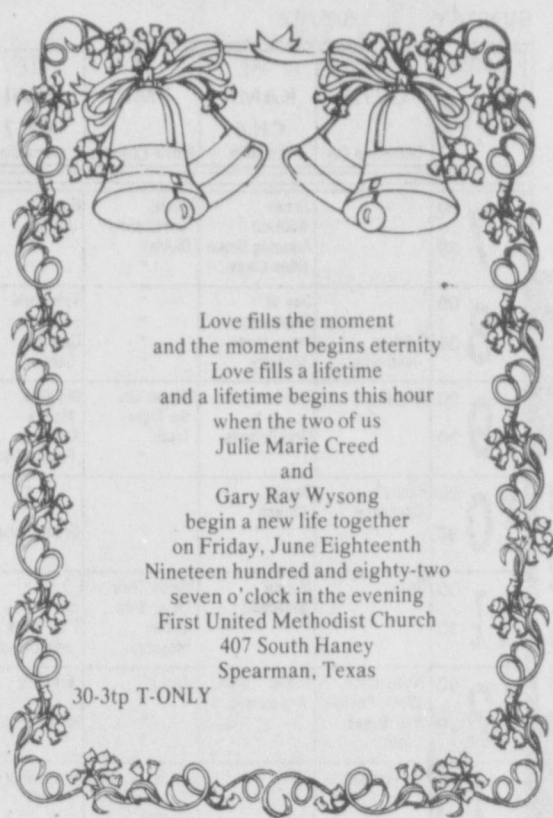

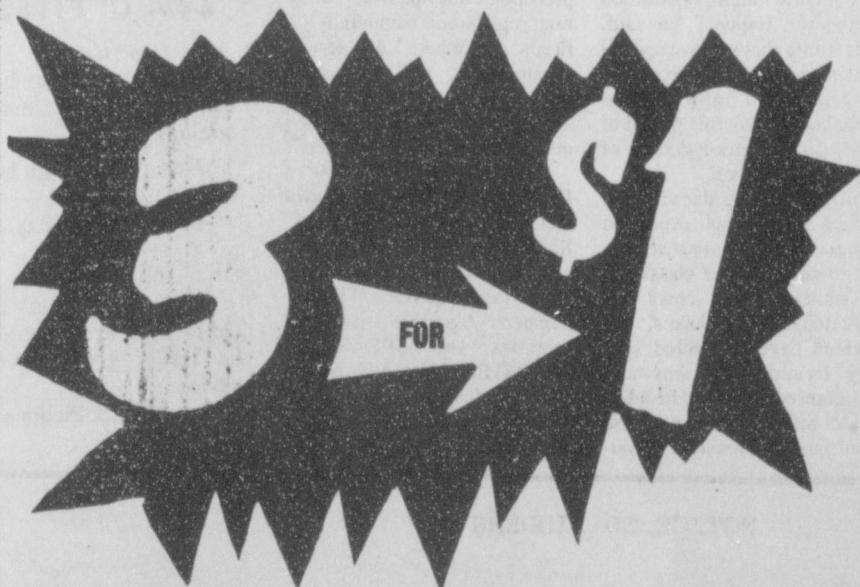

Karen Reppond was arrested and processed for disorderly conduct Friday night.

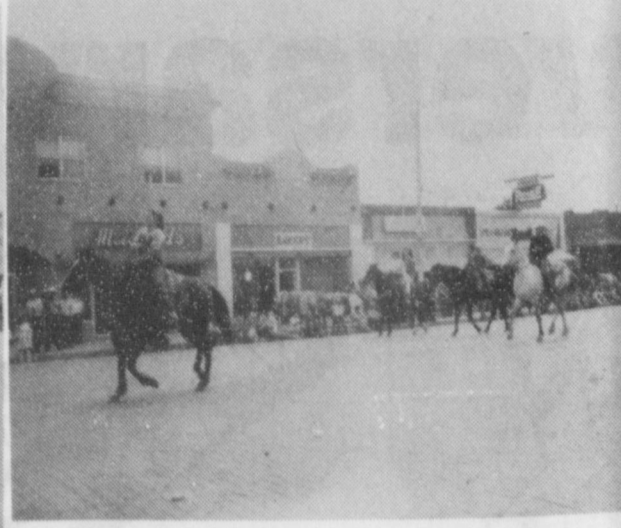

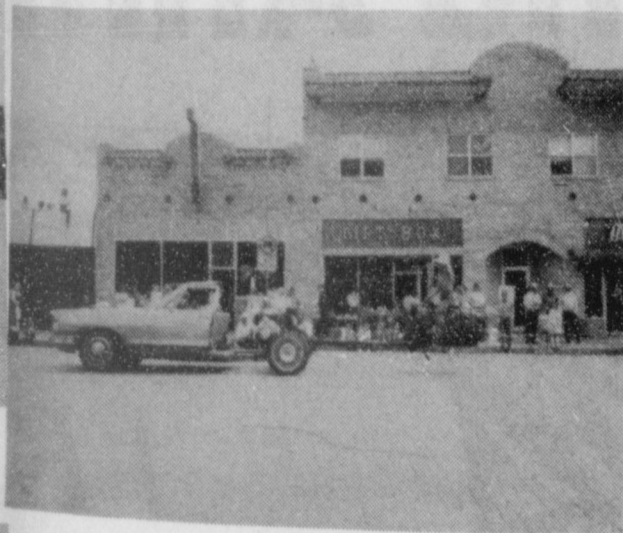

## Seal Coating Project For County Road

AMARILLO--Work in Hansford County is included in the 1983 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program recently approved by the Texas State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The Hansford County project involves seal coating Farm to Market Road 520 from the Sherman County line east 10 miles to State Highway 136. The program sets aside \$71,500 for this project.

The seal coating helps preserve and protect the riding surface as well as improving the skid resistance and riding qualities.

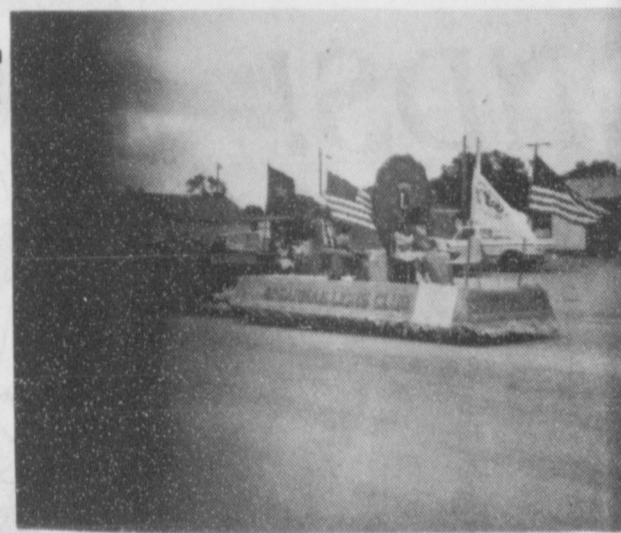

About 61 per cent of the financing included in the program is on U.S.-and State-numbered highways, 37 per cent is for FM and RM roads and two per cent is held in reserve.



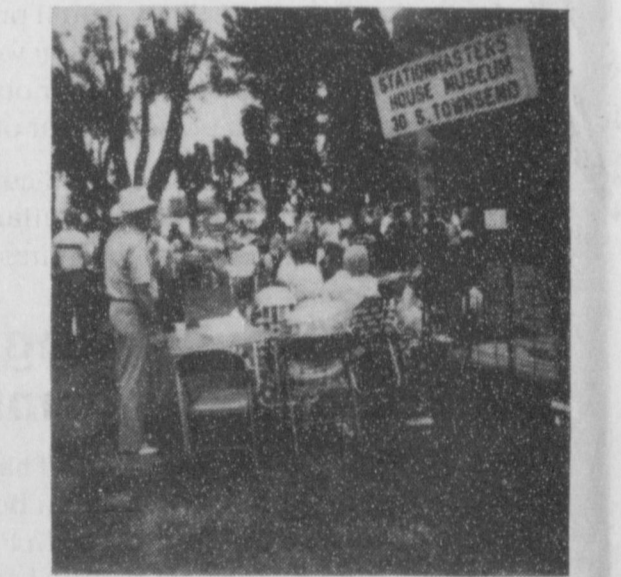

## State 4-H Roundup Set

COLLEGE STATION--The Texas A&M University campus will be a hive of activity June 8-10 when some 2,000 4-H members from across the state gather for the 1982 State 4-H Roundup and State 4-H Congress.

Roundup is traditionally held on the A&M campus each year, but this year the State 4-H Congress, a leadership event for senior 4-H members, has been scheduled to coincide with Roundup activities.

Theme for the three-day event will be "Discover Your Tomorrow," says George McArthur, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, the Extension Service is the parent organization of 4-H.

Activities will begin with the State 4-H Food Show the first day followed by a special assembly that evening at 7 p.m. in Rudder Auditorium. Five individuals and businesses will be honored for their long-time support of 4-H and 72 outstanding 4-H members who will be awarded scholarships totaling \$350,000.

Competition in 39 different contest areas begins bright-and-early Wednesday, June 9. These range from method demonstrations in agronomy and clothing to judging of horses, livestock and soils.

State 4-H Congress, with some 800 participants, begins at 8 a.m. that same day with a general assembly in Rudder Auditorium. Congress participants will be involved in a number of special seminars the

remainder of the day dealing with educational and career opportunities.

And the State 4-H Project Show gets under way at 10 a.m. in Rudder Exhibit Hall.

A special luncheon that day will honor 29 outstanding 4-H adult volunteer leaders from across Texas who have been selected from the 14 Extension Service districts.

Roundup contest winners will be recognized at a special assembly that evening at 8 p.m. in Rudder Auditorium.

The final day's program will include special activities for Congress participants, including tours and visits in various academic departments at Texas A&M.

State 4-H Roundup is a highlight of the 4-H year for many members, points out McArthur. Those who qualify to compete in the various contests have worked long and hard to sharpen their skills. They must have won at the county and district level to qualify for state competition.

Those who compete in the Project Show are demonstrating their expertise in certain project areas which they have developed over the years, he adds.

And Congress participants are working to expand their leadership skills and knowledge bases as they prepare to make choices relating to continued education and careers.

This year's Roundup combined with Congress promises to be a highlight in the lives of many 4-H'ers, contends McArthur.

## Compare Products Before Buying

Considering a major product—a car or appliance—that costs a significant amount of money? It's wise to search for information about the product before buying.

Gathering information about a product can be rewarding for several reasons.

- 1) You can increase your purchasing power by making the best buy for your wants and needs (not always the most expensive.)
- 2) You can make an intelligent decision and be pleased with the consequences.
- 3) There is a social payoff. Not only will your purchasing power be increased but also your intelligent search for information may have a disciplinary effect on sellers, inducing them to offer better products on better terms to all buyers.
- 4) You may influence others to look for information.

### PRODUCT INFORMATION

For objective information concerning features, operating procedures, use and care, look at Extension Service FACT Sheets on various products. Brand names and prices will not be included, but the sheets will give general guidelines explaining how the product works.

For price comparison, brand names, and ratings, consult "Consumer Reports," "Consumer's Research Magazine," and specialized publications such as "Popular Photography."

To determine if a product will do what you want—and whether you can care for it, read the use-and-care booklets available and labels attached.

If objective information is not available, answer these questions:

- 1) Are prices for the product fixed by the manufacturer or retailers—and is there any way to buy the products more economically.

- 2) Is the product the same at a discount store as it is in a specialty store or a more conveniently located store? It's possible that the SAME product may have different brand names and prices.

- 3) Have I made valid comparisons on prices and qualities of different brands.

### READ WARRANTIES

Other sources of information you may want to consider are the warranties of a product. Is the seller offering a full or limited warranty? Obviously, a full warranty is a quick way to know you're getting a lot of protection.

### BUYING-TRIP

Deal in a market with the largest number of sellers, so you'll have a better chance to compare answers to questions, prices and quality.

When there is a trade-in, always ask the seller to make you a favorable price.

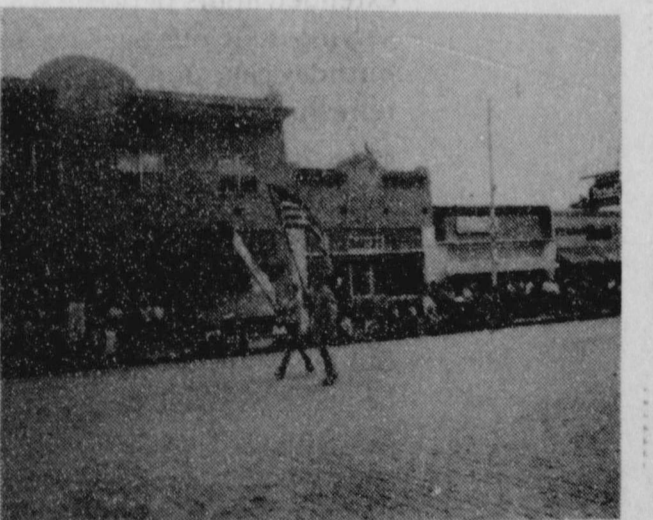

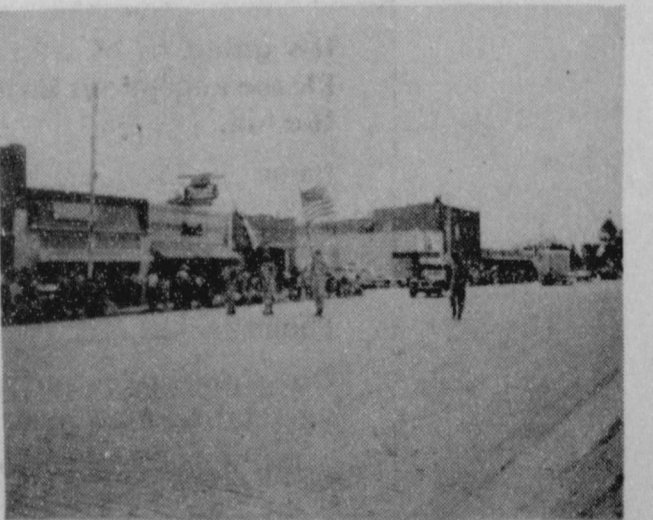
## Prizes To Be Awarded
