Power rate hike delayed for study

With battle scars still new from two telephone rate increase bids, the Spearman city council squared off in a new arena at the regular meeting Tuesday night: a possible increase in charges for electric to everyone in the city.

Local Power Company Manager Robert Elliott was present to explain his company's position. He pointed out that his firm's bid for increased revenues from Spearman customers was just a part of a statewide effort on the part of power companies with the effort moving along Public Utilities Commission (PUC) guidelines. He noted that the increase

proposed in the Panhandle--3.2 percent--was much less than the statewide bid: 7.46 percent. He forthrightly admitted that the highest increase would be levied on residential customers. In the Spearman area, residential rate increase would amount to 5.73 percent of the proposed hike as compared to 12.66 percent in the rest of the state.

With equal forthrightness, Spearman Mayor Ralph Blodgett informed him that, with no reflection upon Elliott nor his company, the city did not accept either recommendations or actions of the PUC without an independent study.

He also noted that, in the past, company-supplied figures regarding needed new revenues in the light of present company earnings did not always reflect the true company fiscal position. He reminded the larger-than-usual audience present for the meeting that the council's first obligation was to the citizens it represented.

He promised Elliott if the findings of the city study reflect a true need on the part of his company, the council would help take it to the public. If the independent study did not uncover such a need, the city of Spearman would oppose such an increase to the best of its ability.

Acting on the advice of the Texas Municipal League (TML) of which Spearman is a member, the council passed Resolution 1-82. This resolution suspends the operation of proposed rate schedules filed by Texas-New Mexico Power

Company for a period of 120 days beyond the date for such schedules to go into effect.
