Saturday is "Big Day" for Round-up

The Annual Hansford Round-up will be held this week beginning with the carnival beginning Wednesday, May 26.

The annual Miss Hansford County Beauty Pageant will be held at 8 p.m. Friday night at the Separman High School Auditorium, sponsored by Xi Zeta Sorority. Also in conjunction with the beauty pageant will be the Little Escort Contest which has become a very popular part of the pageant. The newly crowned Miss Hansford County and the winners in the Little Escort Contest along with the four runner up beauty contestants will ride in a float in the parade Saturday.

Saturday will be the big day with a Sidewalk Sale opening activities at 9 a.m.

The Old Timers Reunion will be held at the Crawford Ford Building on Main Street beginning at 9:30 a.m.

Also, the Golden Spread Center will have an Arts & Crafts Sale at the Center beginning at 9:30 a.m. Members have been working for months for items that will be for sale.

There will be a Square Dance Exhibition on Main Street from 10 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. presented by the Rainbows and Ranglers Square Dancers.

The parade will begin at the Plains Shopping Center at 11 a.m. and proceed up Highway 207 to Kenneth Street and then to Main Street. The theme of the parade this year is "Magical memories". Features other than the floats will include the KHIVA band of Amarillo and antique cars.

A barbecue will be served at 12 noon on the Courthouse lawn sponsored by American Ag. Tickets will be \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for 12 and under.

Various clubs will have booths on the courthouse lawn. The Spearman Music Club will have a Bake Sale; Spearman Study Club will sell ice cream in the morning only in front of John Hutchison's office with Rho Rho selling ice cream in the afternoon. The Home Extension Clubs will be selling chances on a ceiling fan; Scouts selling snow cones and the Rebekah Lodge will have the drink concession.

A talent show will begin at 12 noon and last until 1 p.m. The fiddler's contest will be from 1 to 2 p.m. Both will be held on the courthouse lawn. Anyone wishing to participate in the talent show or fiddler's contest may contact Verlin Winegarner after 5 p.m. at 659-3633.

There will be live entertainment from 2 to 4 on the courthouse lawn featuring "Country Cookin'". There will

also be an arcade at the old White's Auto on Main Street.

Federal judge spending taxpayers money freely

"We learned of some strange goin's on while we were down there!"

That was the way Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin prefaced the report of his recent attendance of a meeting of the board of directors of the State Sheriffs Association at Austin.

He noted that one constant topic of conversation--official or not--was the recent closing of state correctional doors to prisoners from Texas counties. Housing of state prisoners came under the judicial guns of Federal Judge William Wayne Justice at Tyler, just as the

county jail situation became the shibboleth of Federal Judge Sara T. Hughes at Dallas.

"We learned that Mr. Justice Justice has employed special masters to oversee the efforts of the Texas Department of Corrections to bring better standards of living to its prisoners." The sheriff explained.

"Now, the use of special masters of the court is not an unusual move," he continued. "Except these special masters are attorneys from the state of Ohio without any status or privileges to practice law in Texas.

"They DO have salaries of \$95 per hour to perform as special masters. --Then there is the cost of employing staff people for this special corps of court masters.

"I am going to have to be drawn a picture, I guess, before I see anything right about this situation."

Sheriff McFarlin said many people in high places are just as incensed over the matter as the sheriffs of Texas but thus far no one has found a "take-hold" place to change it.

"I will tell you, the strongest thing to come out of this

meeting of the sheriffs association board was the 100 percent backing of every sheriff in the state for our prison systems director, Jim Estell.

"Everybody was of the mind that instead of spending money monitoring existing conditions, the prison system should be enlarged to handle the traffic.

"Until it is, I think some of these 'bleeding hearts' should take some prisoners home with them and make them comfortable! We have soldiers in the training field living and sleeping under worse conditions than Texas prisoners are and they

are patriots!"

The sheriff said he knew such expansion would surely raise taxes but pointed out that most citizens would rather pay this cost than have great numbers of convicted criminals probated or paroled in the midst of society once again.

"Compared to other states, we have been getting off light so far as prison costs are concerned," McFarlin explained.

"We have the best prison system in the nation and the inmates are virtually self-supporting. They plant and grow. They weave and sew. They

learn trades then practice them profitably."

The sheriff, a director of the association, said the board meeting was one of the more routine gatherings and the Texas prison system situation took precedence for the attention, the thinking and the talking of board members.

He also explained that there was nothing the association could do beyond expressing strongly their faith in and support for the prison system director.

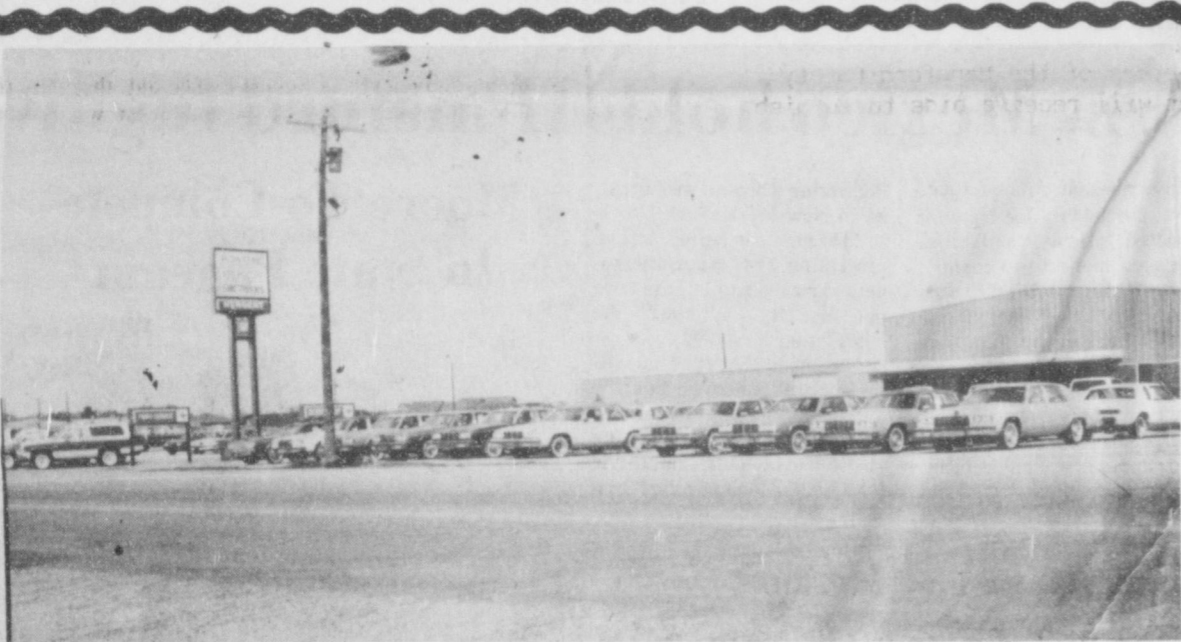
Special Revival Services Begin Sunday June 6

Doctor Talk

Harold B. Ligon, MD

Since spring, with its March winds, April showers, and May flowers, has been upon us for the past few weeks, we've talked about some of the seasonal allergies that accompany the beautiful spring weather. The last few articles have touched upon bronchial asthma, a widespread respiratory ailment usually related to allergies--and it's not necessarily confined to the spring season.

Another allergic disorder, again not necessarily confined to the spring season, is hay fever. It's also called allergic rhinitis or pollenitis--and it's often linked in an overlapping fashion to sinusitis, conjunctivitis, nasopharyngitis, otitis, etc. The reason for this association is that having hay fever involves (sometimes miserably) the nose, roof of the mouth, nasopharynx, eyes--and even sometimes the lungs. Reddened and swollen eyes and mucous membranes, with a watery nasal drainage comprise the main symptomatology. Sneezing and respiratory wheezing

may occur--as may severe headache and even mood alternations. As with most allergies, the best treatment is getting away from the allergens (pollens from trees, grasses, and weeds). Second best management is administration of drugs for decongestion and antihistaminic

action. Some effective antihistamines are benadryl, chlortrimeton, and pyribenzamine. Sometimes desensitization procedures are indicated. That means shots! Most often, victims just have to suffer through the season. Alas!

But, of course, that has already happened in the women's ranks and there the top player is a controversial character, as well as a top tennis pro.

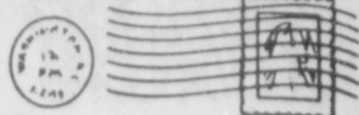
This is quite a far cry from the tennis picture of yesterday, when the U.S., Australia, or in earlier times Britain or France, regularly produced tennis' top performers.

Consumers In A Technological Society

Technology is changing the way consumers function in today's marketplace—so there are some "computer basics" to understand.

Today's bills and payments are processed by electronic funds transfer systems (EFTs). Inventories in retail outlets are maintained by computer. Household tasks are completed using electronically controlled devices. A majority of these processes affect the consumer indirectly, but as more and more families and individuals purchase their own microcomputer the impact will have a more direct affect.

While technology may simplify consumer transactions there are some rights and responsibilities which consumers must accept, too.

Electronic funds transfer is perhaps the most widely used electronic technology which affects today's consumer. Automated teller machines, 24-hour banking, pay-by-phone, direct deposit or withdrawal and point-of-sale transfers are all part of EFT.

RESOLVING PROBLEMS
Resolution of consumer problems is more tedious when using EFT.

Federal law gives the consumer no right to stop payment. It is up to the consumer to resolve the problem and get any money back. However, if the consumer arranged in advance for bills to be paid regularly out of his or her account, payment can be stopped by notifying the bank three business days before the scheduled transfer.

Written receipts are required at all automated teller machines. Periodic statements must also be issued. A consumer has 60 days from the date of a problem or error appears on the statement or receipt to notify the bank.

LOSS OF EFT CARD
Loss of an EFT card presents an additional problem for the consumer. A bank must be notified within two business days after discovering a lost or

stolen card. The consumer can lose no more than \$50 if someone else uses the card. However, if the bank is not notified within two business days, and the card is used, as much as \$500 can be charged against your account.

RECORDKEEPING IMPORTANT
Recordkeeping becomes of prime importance when using electronic transfer of funds. Up-to-date records checked against bank records will eliminate overdrafts and other problems.

Since there is no "float" with EFT, money is immediately debited from one account and credited to another.

Poor recordkeeping could ruin a shopping trip or vacation sometime in the future.

SCANNERS
Scanners are another technological change which is affecting consumer behavior. A main computer stores the prices of consumer goods and can be updated quickly. Individual pricing is being eliminated. Consumers must be alert to any discrepancies in charges with this system. If an item is on "special" and the main computer program has not been changed, the consumer is responsible for double checking the prices.

HOME COMPUTERS
Home Computer appliances will add another dimension to our consumer patterns as they become more popular and lower in cost.

Today, almost the entire world is accessible by computer connection. No longer do we deal with a local merchant only.

CONSUMERS TECHNOLOGY
Consumers will need to spend more time and effort in the near future seeking and acquiring information about the products and services they buy and use.

Consumers in a technological age must become sensitized to the potential and the problems that such change brings about.

Hightower Urges Federal Crop Insurance Reform

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Jack Hightower yesterday urged immediate reform of the Federal Crop Insurance Program, saying "what we need is a program that protects the farmers from events over which they have no control, with as little cost to the taxpayer as possible."

Hightower was testifying before the Senate Subcommittee on Agricultural Production, Marketing and Stabilization of Prices. The subcommittee was chaired by Senator Thad Cochran (D-Miss.) who was conducting oversight hearings on the nationwide program.

Hightower has long been critical of both the administration of the program and of misleading advertisements urging farmers to "expand your operation, borrow more money and sign up for federal crop insurance" during a time of extreme hardship for American agriculture.

Hightower and other key witnesses said that the present crop insurance program is wrongly administered and imposes additional economic hardships on the farmer when it ought to be helping him. Hightower has pointed out that the program, for example, collects premiums, not a harvest time, but early in the year before a crop is in, and that high interest of 18 percent is charged for overdue premiums. Hightower says these are just two of the things that make it extremely difficult for farmers to utilize the program effectively.

The Texas congressman has also pointed out that farmers tell him some insurance appraisers underestimate frequently the extent of crop losses and the farmer is again the loser.

"I felt that the disaster program would be better for the farmer than the expanded crop insurance program, but that's history," Hightower told the committee.

"The farmer must have a way to protect himself from the extremes of nature, and the Crop Insurance program is the only game in town at this time. I think it can, and it must, be administered in a proper way so as to protect both the farmer and the taxpayer," Hightower said.

Hightower went on to warn that "the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation should not forget that it is publicly chartered and has a responsibility that is far greater than that of a private company." Because of widespread disenchantment with the current program among farmers, some experts have estimated that the Texas participation rate is as low as 9 percent statewide. Over the past several months, Hightower has met with farmers, farm groups and crop insurance officials to press for specific improvement in the program.

So What?

Much ado is being made over the allegation that the youngster who shot President Reagan and others was insane at the time. Of course he was.

And ninety percent of all the others who shoot people are insane at the time they do it. That's why we have jails and execution chambers—which are for the people who go berserk and whom society cannot allow to move freely about.

Medical and psychological arguments about guilt and insanity often miss the main point. It doesn't matter to those killed, or who will be killed in the future by people who go berserk, perhaps stoned on drugs or alcohol, why the deed took place.

There are no excuses for premeditated shooting of fellow citizens. Whatever the cause, or excuse, the proper penalty is that these people should be put away so that they are unable to harm others.

If they need psychiatric treatment, drug treatment or treatment for alcoholism, they should get it—while serving their regular sentences just like everyone else. In the past, smart lawyers and medical experts have been utilized to enable some of the guilty to escape punishment.

All that jury verdicts about temporary insanity should provide is that the sentence, the same sentence any other citizen would get, will include free corrective treatment.

Elections Update

An amazing 76 percent of Texas' registered voters chose not to participate in the State's May 1 primary elections. Only 24 percent of Texas' 6.6 million registered voters voted in the May 1 statewide primary elections or some 1.5 million voters—1.3 million or 20 percent in the Democratic primary and 264,000 or four percent in the Republican primary. The statewide voter turnout in the 1982 primaries equals the statewide voter turnout in the 1956 primaries of 1.5 million voters which represented 65 percent of the state's registered voters at that time. More than a quarter of a century later, we have roughly three times the number of registered voters with a voter turnout of 1.5 million equaling a dismal 24 percent voter turnout statewide. An analysis of the primary elections is currently being conducted by my Office and will include an examination of the factors accounting for the voter apathy on May 1.

Primary runoff elections in Texas are scheduled for Saturday, June 5, 1982. In order to vote in the runoff elections, citizens must have been registered to vote by May 6, 1982. The absentee ballot period by personal appearance for the runoff elections begins May 26 and ends June 1. Requests for absentee ballots by mail can be made to the absentee voting clerk's office and completed absentee ballots must be received in the absentee voting clerk's office by 7:00 p.m. on June 5, 1982.

Voters may vote in the runoff election even if they did not vote in the May 1 elections, but if they voted in the primary elections, they must then vote in the same political party's runoff election.

The Farm Crisis

There are some who believe depressions begin with the ruin of our farmers. Among them is Chairman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss) of the House Appropriations Committee.

He has pointed out that the last great depression climaxed after many American farmers had been wiped out. They could no longer buy farm equipment, not to mention the luxuries and conveniences of life.

Farm equipment dealers, grocers, clothiers and other merchants and business men in the average small town and city went under when their customers disappeared—when conditions on the farms became so bad, buying power dried up.

The situation concerning our farms today is reminiscent of the grim days of fifty years ago. Farmers are going out of business, selling their equipment and land. So far this hasn't produced the impact on the economy it might otherwise have done, because in 1981 there were record harvests of many crops.

If the trend continues, however, it's certain to exert an increasing impact on the already sliding economy. Emergency measures are justified to increase U.S. farm markets, especially in Japan and western Europe, where tariffs often bar U.S. farm commodities.

A heavy blow, which U.S. farmers are still suffering from, was former President Jimmy Carter's idealistic action in stopping U.S. wheat sales to Russia. The Russians were our biggest buyers, and they got their wheat elsewhere when we cut off sales.

The net result of this protest over far-away Afghanistan was that U.S. farmers paid the price. President Reagan, who initially intended to retain the sales ban, changed his mind and rescinded it, noting that it hadn't accomplished anything except to depress U.S. grain prices.

Congress should act immediately to provide low-interest loans to distressed farmers being forced out of business. As interest rates come down, these loans can perhaps be transferred to private institutions. And the Reagan Administration, already moving vigorously in this direction, should push as hard as possible for new markets for U.S. farm products.

Congress could help by speedily enacting a compromise budget which would hasten the economic recovery, increase domestic demand. Too many in Congress play politics when quick action is the obvious urgent necessity of the hour.

Hart On Carriers

Senator Gary Hart (D-Col) believes the limited fighting around the Falklands proves the vulnerability of large aircraft carriers. He notes an Argentine cruiser and a British destroyer were sunk by missiles—and concludes any large ship today is sinkable with modern missiles.

The Russians obviously support this theory, and haven't concentrated on large carriers, though they have one. They have more submarines than the U.S. Navy and a growing number of missile ships.

Air Force spokesmen have long opposed multi-billion dollar carriers as obsolete, easily sinkable. The Navy challenges this concept. The critics claim most other U.S. Navy ships today are used to protect carriers even though this is an impossibility.

Navy spokesmen reply by posing the question how many airfields the Air Force brought back from Vietnam. They also say that stationary airfields are more easily knocked out than mobile carriers. Naval spokesmen also argue that a modern carrier force packs enough defensive firepower to destroy incoming missiles.

But doubt remains. Should we spend \$17 billion for each Nimitz-class carrier? Having thirteen at present, the Navy hopes to increase the number to 15 in the years immediately ahead.

It may be that the carriers can justify their cost if there is no major-power, nuclear war. They are indeed mobile air bases, to be stationed almost anywhere around the world.

If, on the other hand, there is to be nuclear war, what will survive? Possibly not the carriers, but then just about everything else may be destroyed also. If the world can avoid a nuclear catastrophe, the carriers constitute a very mobile air arm, extending the range of U.S. airpower admirably.

And so the Reagan Administration continues to utilize these floating airbases, and the Navy to champion their potential. It is, in fact, extension of an argument dating to the 1920's. Perhaps only the next war, if there is one, will provide the final answer.

Due to the fact that the number of statewide Democratic runoff has decreased from six to four and the fact that there are no statewide Republican runoffs there will undoubtedly be a low—perhaps record low—statewide voter turnout in the June 5 runoff elections.

I urge all eligible voters to participate in the primary runoff elections and remind voters, candidates, and elections officials to call my office toll-free at 1-800-252-9602 on June 5, 1982 to report any observed election irregularities or to receive answers to their election questions.

Based on the extremely low voter turnout on May 1 and the nearly \$6 million cost to Texas taxpayers to finance each political parties' primary and runoff elections, the Secretary of State's Office is examining the merits of a unitary primary system for Texas. In a unitary primary system, all candidates for a particular office are placed on the primary ballot together, regardless of party affiliation. Thus, there are no separate Republican or Democratic primaries, but rather one primary. A candidate receiving a majority of the votes in a unitary primary is automatically declared the winner. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes, then the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes face each other in the general election—be they both Republicans or Democrats. An obvious advantage to the unitary system is the cost savings aspect, as each vote cast in the May 1 primary alone cost taxpayers approximately \$4.00, however, all pros and cons of the unitary primary will be examined.

Based on requests from state officials and the news media, the Secretary of State's Office is looking closely at the election return process to assess the desirability and feasibility of a State sponsored elections bureau within the Secretary of State's Office. Due to the fact that there is no state monitoring of election returns and the fact that in some primary races, final returns were not available until five days after the election, there may be advantages to both voters and candidates of placement of an election central function within the Secretary of State's Office. This year's high school and college graduate emerges into an economic world which challenges him or her to industriously seek a good job, work hard to retain it and advance by achievement.

High-paying jobs are not as plentiful as they were a few years ago and indeed some will have difficulty finding the job they prefer. But times have been worse, and those who have ability and are willing to work hard, and well, can usually find employment.

Others can start small businesses of their own. That is the American dream, and it can be done easier here than in any other country. Reliability and dependability are the passports to success in the private enterprise area. Graduates must remember that those bold enough to start out on their own enjoy certain advantages—and certain disadvantages.

First, they do not automatically have the pension plans and other benefits, such as health insurance, that employees of large corporations enjoy. But they are also their own boss, and they can make as much (or lose as much) as their talents dictate.

And, to many Americans, doing what one wants to do, when one wants to do it, and not having to punch a time clock, is the most important of considerations. That freedom, or independence of spirit, is ingrained in the American character.

Most needed of all traits among graduates starting out in today's world is a mental attitude toward hard work which includes a willingness to start at the bottom and learn. In recent years too many young people have assumed they could start at the top, with a fine salary, without experience and hard-earned knowhow.

This year's graduate has a great opportunity. It may not be as easy to get started as it has been in some years but this country is still the land of opportunity. For those who will work hard and who are dependable and sincere, the future is unlimited, still, in this blessed land.

The current U.S. dilemma over entertainment freedom could be solved by designating special zones for this—and not that.

Those who think they're too smart to be governed by the laws of their land are over-estimating their smartness.

One of the keys to old age is in knowing how to relax and break the tension which builds up while making a living.

Money multiplies the power of man, either for better or for worse.

Advertising is just another way of calling on customers.

Storable Commodities Protection

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller joined with other state presidents and National Farmers Union leaders in calling for protection for producers in the case of elevator bankruptcies. The farm leaders requested Congress to enact legislation which will prevent economic hardship and loss for producers who have commodities stored in facilities which declare bankruptcy.

Under current law, producers who have stored their commodity have no recourse other than to wait on a court decision while they may have their entire harvest, which is their annual income, tied up in a bankruptcy," Moeller stated.

The Farmers Union plan calls for the following steps to be implemented: Innocent party claims should be settled quickly in an elevator bankruptcy; Priority should be given to farmers who have sold grain for cash but have not been paid; and a warehouse receipt should be evidence of ownership of grain.

The plan also calls for the establishment of a federal storable commodities insurance corporation which will guarantee up to \$150,000 protection for each farmer who has stored, delivered or contracted his crop to licensed commodity dealers.

"A farmer who has his crop in an elevator is no different from a businessman who has his car being repaired in a garage. If the garage goes out of business, the owner should still get his car out as quickly as possible and not have to wait for years of litigation," Moeller remarked.
