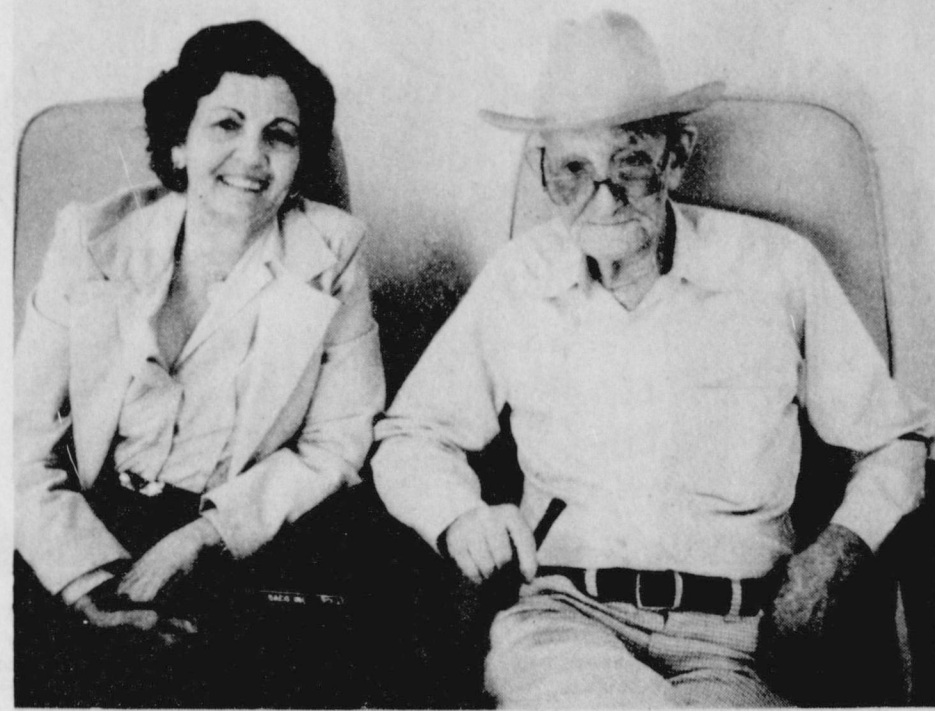

Incumbents returned to office

In elections Saturday, the incumbent mayor and city councilmen were returned to office while the victory for legalized bingo was only a margin of 179 of the 963 votes cast.

In school board voting, Kent Guthrie polled 555 votes and Mike Garnett, 557.

Spearman Mayor Ralph Blodgett won re-election with 382 votes to 256 for his nearest

challenger, Wilson McClellan. Bob Breeden polled 24 votes.

Incumbent Councilman Ed Garner was the champion "vote-getter" in the city election returning to his place on the board with 514 votes. He was followed closely by incumbent Ray Ingle with 480 votes. Challenger Dorothy Karns received 170 votes.

The plurality vote for incum-

bent city leaders indicates city citizens are satisfied with the "status quo." Post mortem arguments from supporters of the challengers maintain the total vote represented a small segment of qualified voters.

However, according to veteran political observers, the elections Saturday, represented an opportunity for ALL the quali-

fied voters to express themselves if they were dissatisfied. Of such statistics are political opinions formed.

Bingo was legalized by a vote of 571 for the move and 392 votes cast in opposition.

Votes were canvassed and the oath of office administered to the mayor and two councilmen at a city council meeting, Tuesday night.

April 1, when the first residents began moving into Hansford Manor, the extended care adjunct to Hansford Hospital, many thought it might be an April Fool prank, but . . .

As these tenants began arriving, both they and their loved ones helping them "settle in" saw the sunshine brightness of the yellows, beiges and browns -- and the soft bone that is a welcome contrast to the antiseptic white of hospital hall -- it immediately became a reality.

Administrator Ray Wasil -- as many-faceted and interesting as the unit he directs -- said opening day was planned with some concern for there was a waiting list of 42 for a 39 bed facility. Wasil explained, however, that many of the names registered well in advance of completion of Hansford Manor were there on an "in-case" basis and many were not ready to move in at this time.

He said that, because of reasons that sparked their interest and caused them to register, most of them would probably come in at a later date.

The administrator is not expecting a "full house" at the very beginning. The first residents received will be those private, self-paying persons needing the care and comfort of the extended care concept. Then, Monday and Tuesday, state inspectors will tour the facility and if they find it meeting all requirements, Medicaid patients can be accepted.

Wasil tries to soft-pedal the term "patient" in keeping with his philosophy of managing such a unit as Hansford Manor: "We plan to give good patient care but we plan to administer it to these people as residents making each feel he or she is a person, an individual with something to contribute to life here -- making them feel wanted."

"What our entire staff will try to provide is a happy home for these residents."

That staff includes a consulting registered nurse, a licensed vocational nurse (LVN) as a director of nursing, three other LVNs, 14 nurses' aides and three housekeepers. Hansford Manor will share a kitchen staff and maintenance personnel with the hospital.

Because Hansford Manor is an adjunct to the hospital located on the east side of that building, any facility of the hospital may be used as needed.

This is the concept that

makes Hansford Manor a bit more than the average nursing home -- this extended care from the proximity of the hospital.

Capacity of the facility is expressed in terms of beds even though the image hoped for is that of a residence. Of the 39 beds presently available, 13 are private rooms; 26 are semi-private. These rooms are the heart of the "at home" concept. But life at Hansford Manor will not be totally centered only in these rooms except for illness.

There are living, dining and recreation areas with little niceties for the comfort and convenience of the residents located at strategic points throughout the facility. An example: a "station" where tenants can obtain ice cubes or select nutritional snacks when those flashes of appetite peculiar to the elderly come upon them.

The homey atmosphere is further created in every facet of furnishings and finishing even to beautiful paintings generously decorating the walls.

Administrator Ray Wasil has been closely aligned with health care in some form ever since he strayed from his original field of Geology soon after graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Southern Illinois.

His first graduate work was in the field of micro-biology and he received his Master's Degree (MBA) from Loyola University of the North as Chicago. He immediately moved into cancer research specializing in work with viruses.

Soon he had moved to his first management level, directing a research laboratory. It was a short step from there into health care management but a long stride to his highly responsible post at Hansford Manor.

He received his basic nursing home training at the facility in Hillsboro, north of Waco. Upon completion of "boot" training, he soon moved into the administrator's position at Coon Memorial Hospital, Dalhart.

He comes to Spearman and Hansford Manor from Colgate, Okla., where he was administrator of a 75 bed nursing home. So, this man who inspires those about him to give him their confidence and gives a rare warmth and sincerity in return, is more than "The Boss."

Ray Wasil is a most fortunate addition to the medical community of the area.

IN the Academics Ann Sheets, Spearman Junior High was 1st, Mark Garnett, Spearman Junior High was 2nd, and

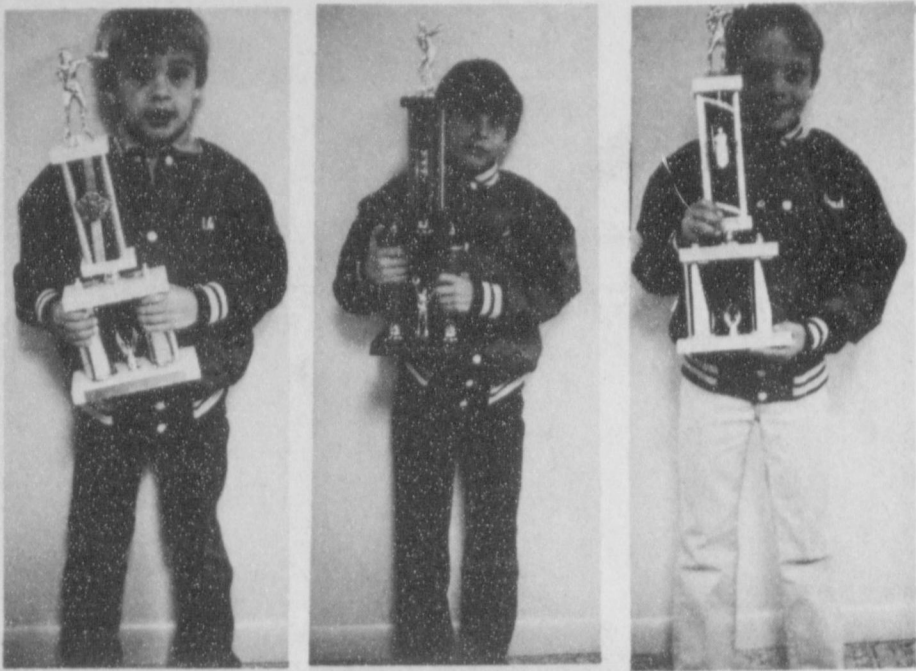

Easter, 1982

SARASOTA, FLA. -- The Chicago White Sox are pinning their pennant hopes on several key players, speed and young arms on the pitching mound.

Manager Tony LaRussa and pitching coach Ron Schueler think they have to do two things to have a successful season this year. "We've got to have the pitching--the young arms have got to come through for us," LaRussa said.

"And we've got to get LeFlore on base a lot. Then this will be an exciting ball club, and it has power." (Outfielders Greg Luzinski was hitting over .400 in spring games at this time and Steve Kemp over .300.)

Pitching is the key.

Schueler is high on young Lamarr Hoyt. "People forget that over the last two years Hoyt has been 18-6 for us," he says. "And last year he had ten saves."

Jerry Kosman says his arm feels better than in years. "Tony let me work out on my schedule," he explains. (LaRussa is 34 and Kosman 38.)

But the Sox also must count on Luzinski. Kemp and Carlton Fisk to hit the ball with authority. If they hit, and push LeFlore around the bases, the Sox will score plenty of runs. And if they have good, young pitching, as expected, the club could be the best Chicago team fans have seen in years.

Rise In Market Predicted By A Top Expert

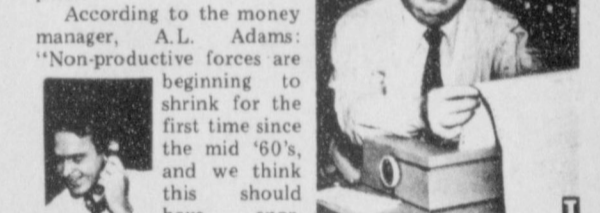
"We are rapidly coming to the end of the Bear Market." That encouraging forecast is from one of America's top financial experts.

According to the money manager, A.L. Adams: "Non-productive forces are beginning to shrink for the first time since the mid '60's, and we think this should have enormous positive implications for the capital markets, particularly common stocks." Adams is President of QSR Advisory Corporation in New York City.

The firm, which manages portfolios of \$500,000 and up for foreign and domestic investors, is starting to put the majority of its clients' liquid assets into common stocks for the first time in several years.

QSR's research shows many New York Stock Exchange Companies with excellent growth rates and sound balance sheets selling at levels below their Bear Market lows in 1974.

"The current recession is severe," says Adams, "but the worst is behind us. Weak stock and bond prices have been reflecting mis-

managed government policies and inflation-related problems for more than a decade; we are on a new track now, and since the stock market almost always moves before all the changes are apparent, better times for investors are ahead."

Adams says: "The country is on the threshold of dynamic, uninflated economic growth, much like the environment of the 1950's and early 1960's."

Productivity Valuation Of Agricultural Land

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property. According to Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the Hansford County Appraisal District, qualified landowners have the option of applying for agricultural or open-space land valuation on their property.

She said that two constitutional amendments provide for the taxation of land on its agricultural use (or productivity) value. In other words, taxes would be assessed against the productivity value of the land instead of what the property would sell for in the open market.

Mrs. Peddy indicated that the legal basis for this valuation is found first in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d. He added that several criteria must be met in order to qualify under this section. Some include:

- The land must be owned by a natural person (does not include corporations, partnerships, agencies or organizations);
- The land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for at least three years prior to the year application is first made;
- Annual application is required of the owner;
- The owner must file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use;
- The chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and,
- The agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Mrs. Peddy said another form of alternate valuation available to qualified landowners is that of open-space land valuation. Effective since 1979, it provides for the valuation of agricultural and timberlands and ecological laboratories. He added that the legal basis for this form of land valuation is in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d-1.

Several conditions must be met in order to qualify under this section, including:

- The land must have been devoted principally to agricultural use for at least five of the last seven years;
 - The land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use;
 - The land must be used for agricultural purposes to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area, and,
 - The chief appraiser must approve the application.
- In 1982, once an application for 1-d-1 open-space valuation is filed with the chief appraiser

and approved, a landowner will not be required to submit another application so long as the land qualifies. The chief appraiser, however, may request that a new application be filed.

Mrs. Peddy said that under either form of valuation, the possibility of a rollback tax exists. He indicated this liability for additional tax is triggered under Sec. 1-d valuation by either the sale or change in the use of the land. Under Sec. 1-d-1 valuation, a change in the use of the land triggers a rollback tax. The change of use would be to a non-agricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation.

The additional tax is measured by the difference between the taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid at the market value, he added. The re-capture of lost taxes extends back three years under Sec. 1-d and five years under Sec. 1-d-1.

Additional information is available at the local appraisal district office. Personnel there will be able to assist with the data which will be necessary for determining qualifications for the program.

Application forms are available at the appraisal district office and should be filed after January 1 and before May 1 for the tax year.

For landowners whose property is located in an appraisal district that has postponed implementation, application would be made to each respective tax office, as in the past.

SS Recipients

People who received at least one Social Security check in 1981 and who earned more than the annual exempt amount last year have until April 15 to file an annual report of their 1981 earnings, Jim Talbot, Social Security district manager in Amarillo said recently.

The 1981 annual exempt amount was \$5,500 for people 65 or over and \$4,080 for people under 65 all of 1981. A person who was 72 or older all of 1981 does not have to make a report. Neither do people who receive benefits because of disability, since different rules apply.

A person who did not receive any checks in 1981 because of expected earnings does not have to make a report of his or her earnings. But, Talbot said, if those earnings were less than expected, it would be in that person's best interest to make a report.

This is because just \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 of earnings above the annual exempt amount. It could be that some benefits may be due. If they are, they will be paid after

the annual report is reviewed.

Most people who have to make a report of their 1981 earnings have already received a form for this purpose in the mail. Those who did not receive an annual report form or those who misplaced the one they did receive can get a copy at any Social Security office.

The people there will be glad to answer any questions about the annual report of earnings. The Amarillo Social Security Office is located at 3119 SW 27th and the telephone number is 376-2241.

discharged as a staff sergeant, and has been honored for his life saving work as an amateur radio operator.

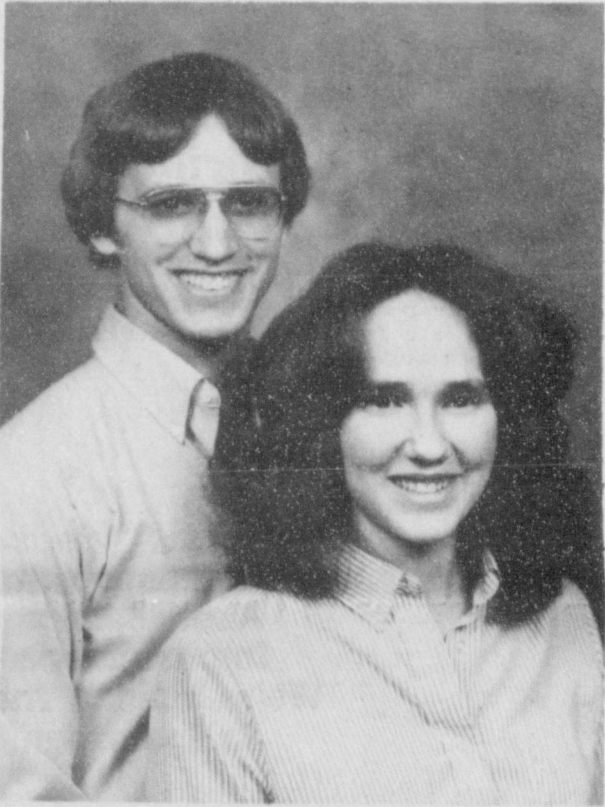

were Sidney R. Petersen, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Getty Oil Company, and Robert N. Miller, president and chief operating officer.

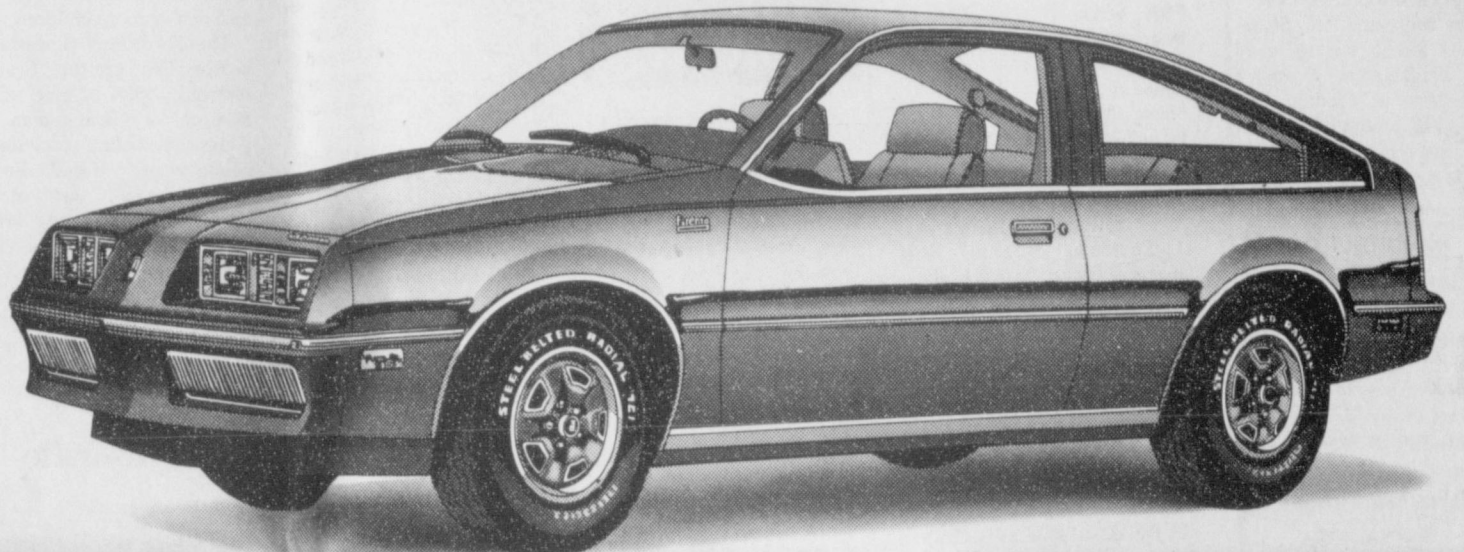

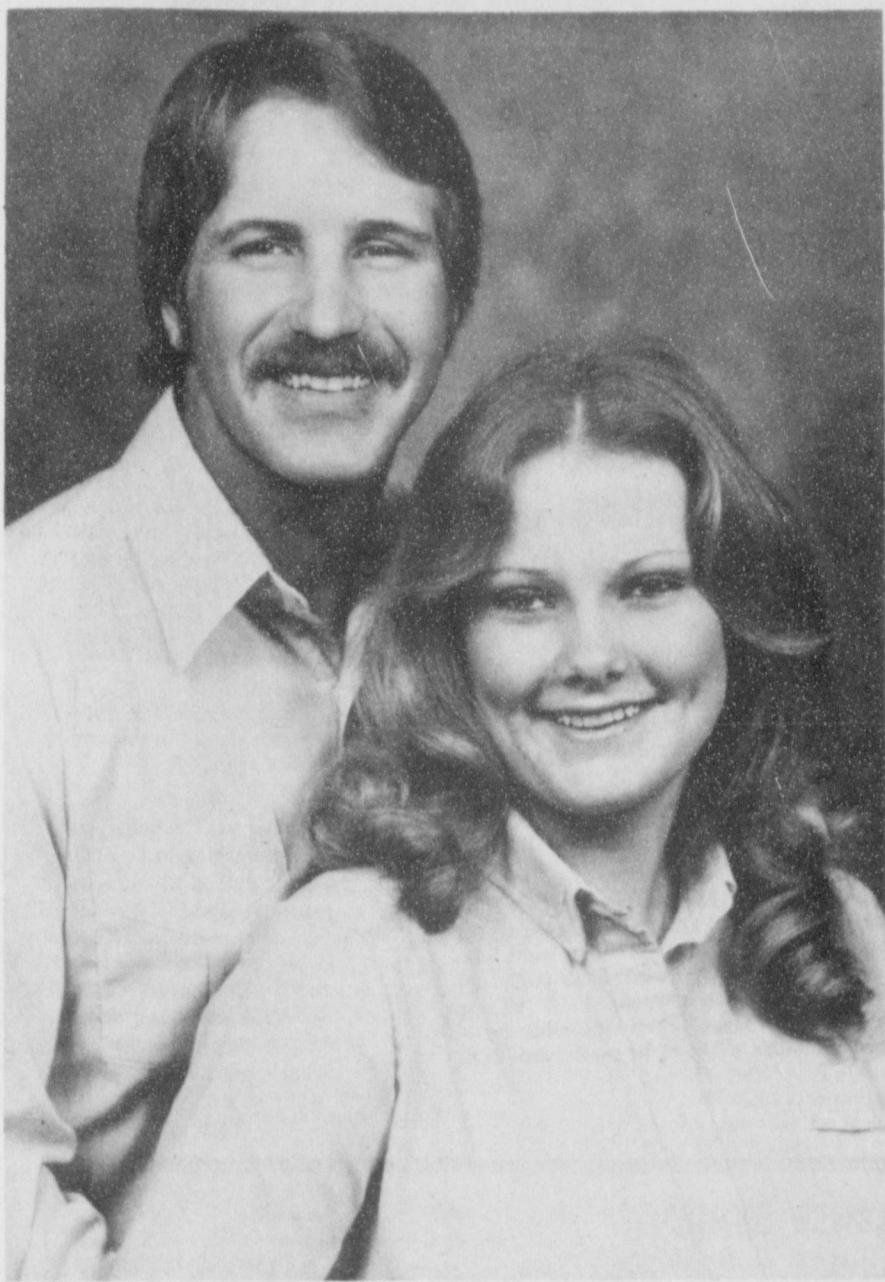

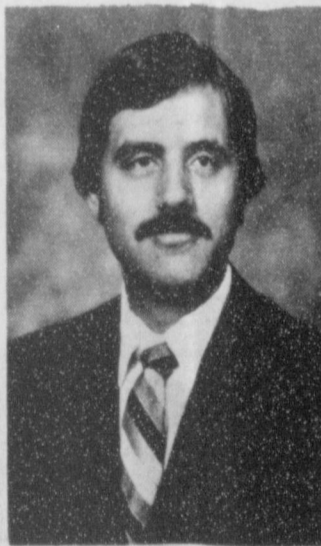

Sorghum Farmers To Receive Deficiency Payment

Grain sorghum farmers will receive deficiency checks of 48 cents per hundred pounds on their 1981 production. Commodity Credit Corporation will mail checks totalling approximately \$232 million. Texas sorghum producers will receive the largest share with \$71.5 million, while \$65.4 million will go to Kansas growers and \$44.8 million to Nebraska.

"USDA has informed us that the checks will be mailed on, or about, April 10," reported Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA). The payment is the difference between the national average loan rate and the sorghum target price.

The 48 cent payment is the maximum amount permitted by law because the average price to farmers during the first five months of the marketing year (Oct. 1, 1981 - Feb. 28, 1982) was below the loan level.

The payment is a result of a provision written and sponsored by GSPA in the 1977 farm bill. This provision sets sorghum target prices in relation to corn according to the relative cost of production.

Payments are determined by multiplying the rate (48 cent/cwt.) by the farm acreage by the farm yield. (48 cents x acres x cwt. per acre). A farm with a 1981 planted acreage of 100 acres and a yield of 6000 pounds per acre, would receive \$2,880.

There will be an allocation factor of 99% for those who planted more sorghum in 1981 than previous years. When the allocation factor is applied to the example above, the payment will be \$2,851.

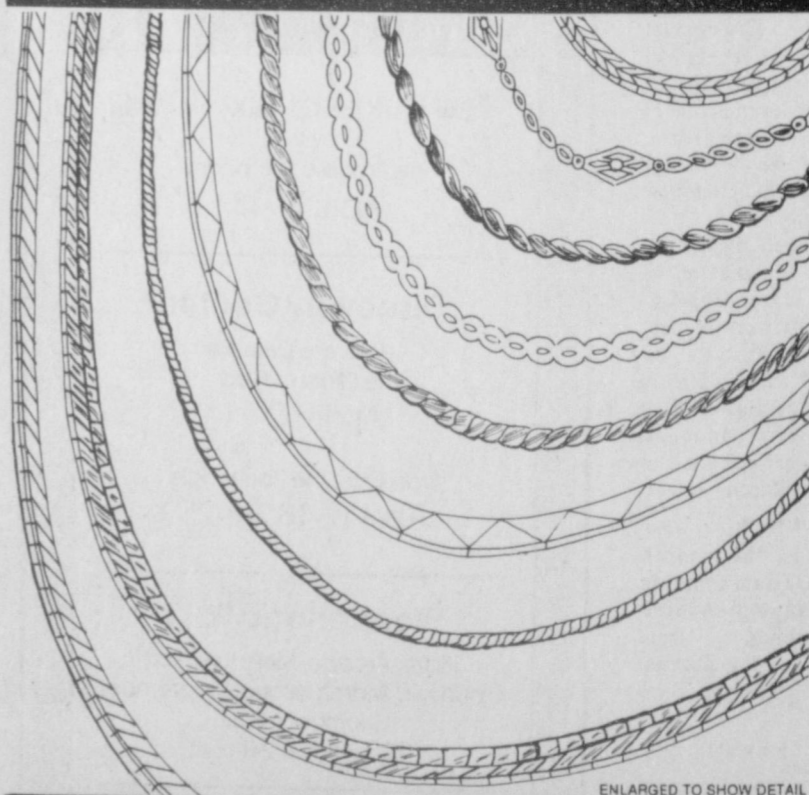

April 16 Deadline For ASCS Signup

"The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), both agencies of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, are providing cooperative as well as individual services to farm producers," says F.W. "Ted" Crouch, Jr., Field Operations Office for FCIC.

ASCS has announced an April 16 deadline for signup in the 1982 acreage reduction programs for wheat, barley and oats. Producers who have already reported planted acreage for All-Risk Crop Insurance can revise their acreage report by April 16 if they participate in the ASCS acreage reduction program.

According to the provisions of the new Farm Bill, ASCS disaster payments will not be available on acreage eligible for All-Risk Crop Insurance (including All-Risk Insurance issued by a private insurance company and reinsured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation).

All Risk Crop Insurance may now be available through an individual agreement with the

Federal Crop Insurance Corporation on cropland that was previously considered uninsurable. The request for coverage should be made through the local agent or service office before the sales closing date for the crop. The sales closing date for Cotton and Grain Sorghum is April 15.

In addition, FCIC has initiated an Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) program, which ultimately will permit policyholders to purchase insurance coverage based solely on their production records. An IYC participant must have verifiable acreage and yield records for at least the three most recent consecutive-planted crop years. Recorded yields may be used for up to 10 years, if available.

Crouch further states, "Those producers who were insured on a spring-planted crop for the 1981 crop year, but canceled their insurance, may reinstate their All-Risk coverage and maintain any premium discount they may have earned for good experience if they do so before April 15."

Bingo Operators Must Be Licensed By Comptroller

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Comptroller Bob Bullock today said "black-out" will be the name of the game for unlicensed bingo operators in many areas of the State after Saturday's election.

Voters in 161 Texas counties, cities and justice precincts went to the polls Saturday to decide whether charitable bingo would be legal in their communities.

Where the game is legalized, qualified non-profit organizations must be licensed by the Comptroller in order to conduct the games.

"I'll not let those conducting bingo games blink their eyes at the law," Bullock said, explaining his office will work closely with local authorities to make sure games are either licensed and conducted properly or shut down.

"Where there's play for pay, we'll be looking over their shoulders," Bullock said. "We're not going to be going after someone conducting a bingo game to entertain senior citizens in a retirement home."

"I'm going to do what the Legislature said it wants done and that means enforcing the law," Bullock said.

Games operated where there has been no election authorizing bingo are now illegal, Bullock said, noting that local authorities have already closed games in some areas of the state.

Saturday's election was the second opportunity local voters had to vote to legalize bingo in their towns and counties. Last January, voters approved the game in 17 cities, 21 counties and nine justice precincts. According to the bingo law, August 14 will be the last opportunity to vote on the issue in 1982. To call an election, local governments must receive a petition bearing signatures of 10 percent of the number of voters in the last gubernatorial election.

Where the local government imposes it, the Comptroller's Office will collect a 2 percent gross receipts tax that will be

returned to communities where the games are authorized.

The Comptroller sent letters to local authorities in all 161 communities explaining the steps needed to certify elections and, if they elect to, levy the tax.

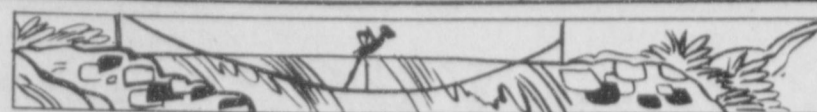

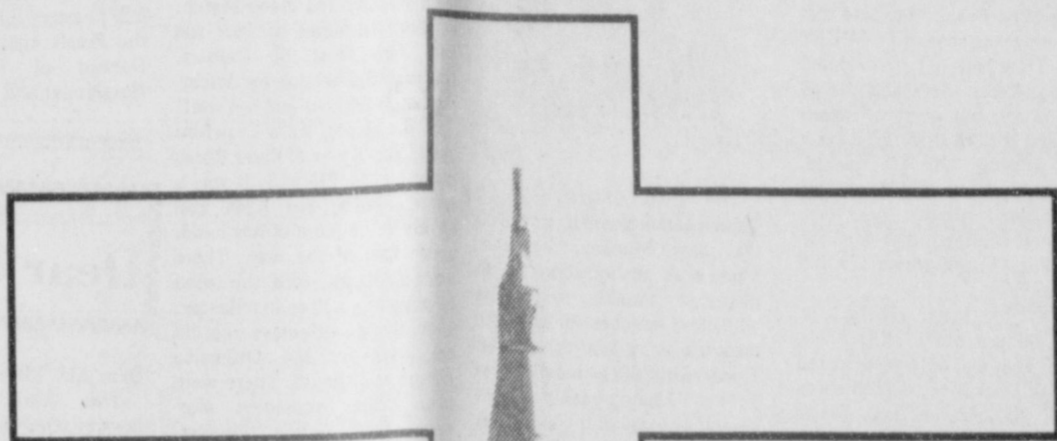

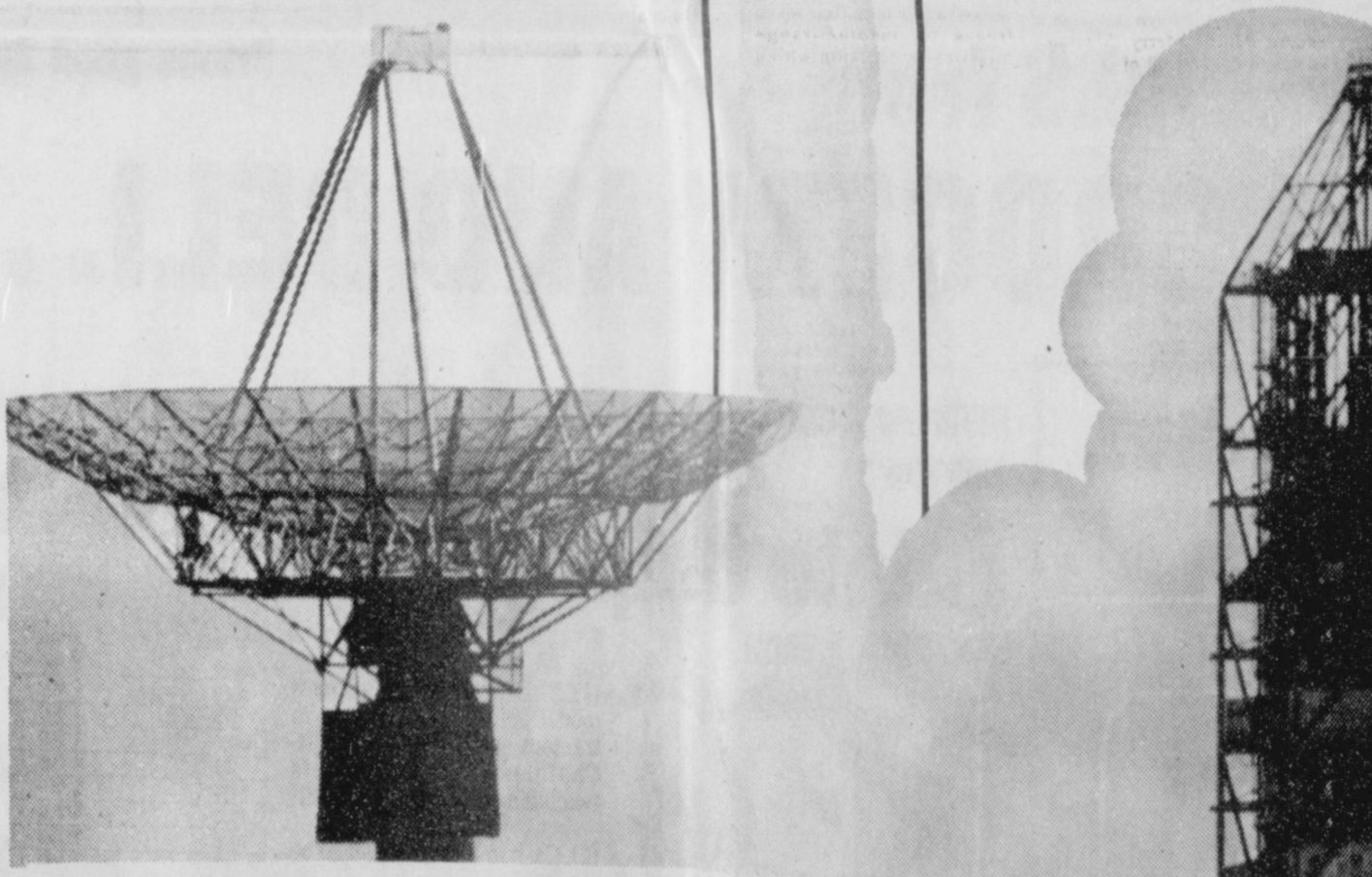

Dear Editor

Dear Mr. Miller:

The Anti-Crime/Anti-Drug laws enacted by the 67th Texas Legislature clearly established a high water mark for law and order legislation in Texas.

Texas' state leadership and Texas' citizens must not be complacent with this victory under their belts, and the war on crime must continue to be waged. Therefore, in September of last year, I sent a letter to Texas' criminal justice community urging them to identify areas of the criminal justice system which could be effectively corrected and addressed through legislation as part of my 1983 Anti-Crime Program. Their strong response was to toughen our laws on "driving-while-intoxicated."

At the very forefront of my 1983 Anti-Crime program will be legislation imposing tougher

penalties for those convicted of the DWI offense. Nation-wide, drunk drivers each year take thousands of lives and, in 1980, it was estimated that nearly one-half of Texas' traffic fatalities were alcohol-related. These statistics, coupled with the staggering property losses each year from DWI, clearly indicate that tougher laws are needed to make our streets and highways safer.

In December, 1981, I created a Task Force on Traffic Safety to study Texas' DWI-related traffic fatality problem and make recommendations on legislative actions to be taken to address this issue. In addition, I am pleased to announce that I endorse the goals of MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers), and my office is working with the Texas MADD Chapters to develop and fine tune necessary legislative solutions to Texas' DWI problem. When specific legislative proposals have been developed, they will be sent to you.

I am firmly committed to ensuring that tougher DWI laws are enacted in Texas in 1983,

out a successful attack on the drunk driving problem demands action by all Texans. I ask that you join with me in making the citizens of Texas aware of the magnitude of this problem and the need for strong DWI legislation and strict enforcement of DWI laws. Texas' highways are no place for drunk drivers, and we must do all we can to get them off the roads.

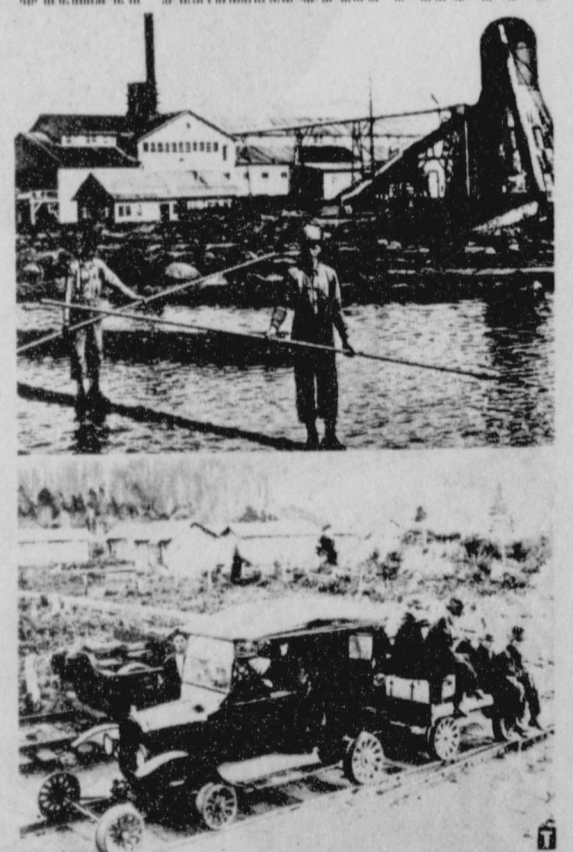

Crafty Ideas FOR EASY EASTER BUNNY ANYTHING GOES WITH STYROFOAM

Make this adorable bunny this Easter with STYROFOAM brand plastic foam. This furry creature is simple to make and the kids can help! To make the bunny's face, glue a 1" ball of Styrofoam 2" down from the top of a 6" x 4" egg, for the nose. (Use 1" chenille stem to hold in place.) For cheeks, glue 1" balls on each side, slightly below the nose. Use a file or palette knife to tuck a 3" square of nylon hose around the nose and cheeks. Tuck fabric by holding firmly with thumb and use a palette knife to tuck it into Styrofoam 1/4" or more around each shape. Tuck the edges completely into Styrofoam. Glue plastic eyes on each side of the face from cheek to cheek. To make the ears, fold a 6" white bump chenille in half with a 3" pink bump chenille in the middle, shape and push into the top of the head. Glue to hold. Repeat for other ear. Then tuck 4" x 5" white fur from back of ears down the back of the bunny. If material wrinkles, cut small darts to fit the shape of the egg. Tuck pieces of fur in front of the face.

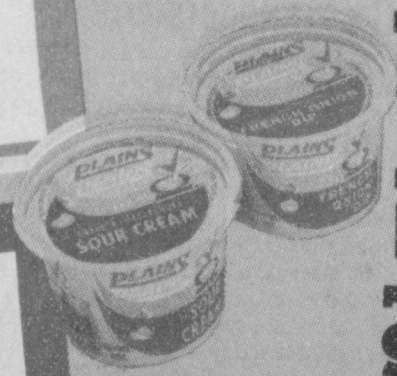

Court OKs Rock Island sale of tracks

Federal district Judge Frank McGarr of Chicago, Ill., has approved the sale of a 97.4-mile North Plains section of the defunct Rock Island Railroad, beginning at Etter, to a new Texas company, the Texas Northwestern Railway Company.

The Chicago court action moves along another step the long-negotiated sale of this part of the old Rock Island system, and enhances the prospect that Moore county grain and industrial shippers along the abandoned track will have rail service by summer and fall harvest times.

Bill Bailey of Abilene, president of the new TNRC, and William Gibbons, RI trustee in bankruptcy, both reported the court approval Friday to The News-Press. Closing of the sale still remains for the two principals.

Approval of the new railway company has been made by the Texas Railroad Commission and its parallel agency in Oklahoma, since the 97.4 miles of rail to be reactivated run into the Oklahoma Panhandle.

Gibbons has become a controversial figure in both Texas and Oklahoma over his tough trading of the RI properties. In Amarillo, recently, he sought to defend his tactics, notably one in which he will have tracks west of Amarillo ripped up and sold. The trustee turned down an effort by an Oldham county group to buy the rails and restore service. The trustees have followed a hard line on Rock Island trades for the several years since the company has been shut down by the bankruptcy.

The 97.4 miles of track being bought by TNRC starts at Etter and

runs northwest to Gruver and other points in Hansford county, then up into Oklahoma. The new rail company is a part of the Murchison financial system, based in Dallas.

"We are making every effort to close the sale," says TNWR president Bailey.

The sale amounts to \$2.4-million and includes 97.4 miles of railroad right-of-way, beginning at Etter and running east and north through Sunray and Capps Switch in Moore county to Hardesty, Okla.

In Moore county, the new railroad would serve the Phillips Chemical Company Cactus plant, the Continental Carbon plant, north east of Dumas, plus the Sunray Co-op elevator and Continental Grain company elevators at Sunray and Capps Switch.

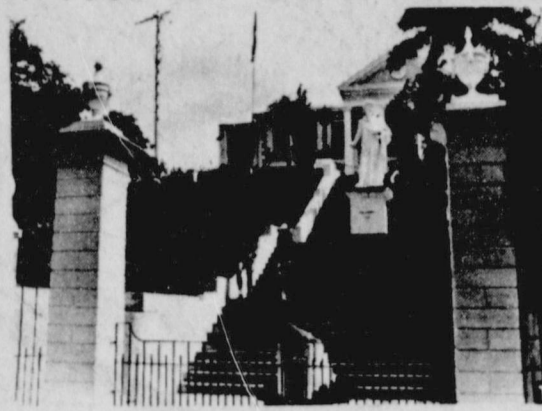
WALKING TOURS—A GOOD WAY TO KNOW NASSAU

Walking tours during a vacation in a city can be fun. And a leisurely stroll around the city of Nassau is one long to be remembered.

Perhaps the best place to begin is at Rawson Square, the hub of the city and the center of Nassau's straw market activity. Here you'll want to stop, look and listen to the sounds and sights of Nassau at work; tourist-laden horse surreys creating traffic jams here and there; smartly dressed traffic cops keeping motorists on their toes; blaring sirens from cruise ships warning wayfarers that sailing time is nigh and happy sidewalk vendors beckoning customers to bargain and buy.

From the square take a short walk down to the waterfront named after royalty—Prince George, where passenger liners are berthed, and where Family Island fleets arrive daily to unload their cargo of fresh produce and fish.

From the waterfront, officially called Woodes Rogers Walk to honor the first colonial governor of The Bahamas, you'll retrace your steps back to Rawson Square where you'll head south to Parliament Square. The three imposing Georgian structures house the Senate, the House of Assembly and the Supreme Court. A statue of Queen Victoria on her throne, gracefully guards the entrance. These buildings, put up in the early nineteenth century, were fashioned after a group of government buildings built in New Bern, North Carolina. At the rear and surrounded by well-kept gardens is an octagonal shaped structure. Two hundred years ago it served as the city jail. Now it is the Nassau Public Library with "cells" laden with memorabilia of the islands, together with stacks of modern masterpieces and first editions.



As you leave the library, take the exit on Shirley Street named after a colonial governor William Shirley whose remains now lie in a church in Boston. Here you'll be facing the Royal Victoria Hotel gardens. The hotel, built during the American Civil War, has since closed its doors, but the gardens with its green vegetation still remain. Here rest awhile or walk across Parliament Square to the Green Shutters Inn for lunch.

With lunch completed, start your walking tour afresh by leaving the pub and turning east along Shirley Street. Walk for a block past the Zion Baptist Church and turn south into a street known as "East." Head south for a block to Sands Road. At the end of Sands Road take a right turn and looming before you is the 102-foot high Queens Staircase. Its well-worn 66 steps were hewn out of solid rock

by slaves during the reign of Queen Victoria. Climb the staircase to reach Fort Fincastle at its top. This fort dates back to 1793 and like most of the forts on New Providence, never saw action.

For the most spectacular view of the island, however, walk a few extra steps from the fort to the Water Tower. Located atop Bennett's Hill, this 126-foot tower rises 216 feet above sea level, the highest point on the island. The entrance fee to the tower is 25 cents and well worth it for the panoramic view you get of the island. Use the elevator to reach the top where a guide will pinpoint every historic building in view.

To get you off on the right start, stop at any of the two downtown tourist information offices for a free walking tour map and other literature. Staffed by bi-lingual tourist information assistants, the centers are located on Prince George Wharf for the convenience of cruise passengers and at street level in Parliament Square. Above all, don a straw hat—and don't forget your camera.
