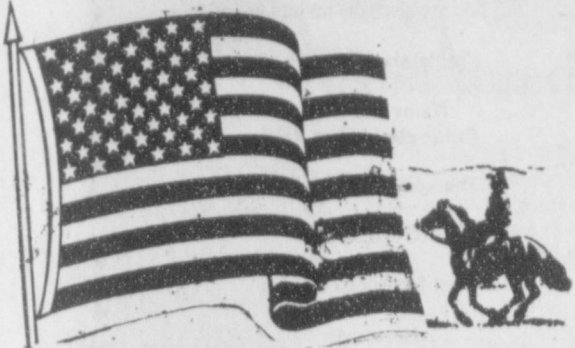

The new district governor is a self-employed insurance agent since 1949.

He is a member of the American Society of Chartered Life Underwriters and a past president of the Top-O-Texas Association of Life Underwriters. He is also a member of several other professional and civic associations and holds several Boy Scout awards for his work with that organization and is a sustaining member of the Yucca Girl Scout Council. He

has been a Rotarian since 1970.

Mr. John R. Collard, Jr. is one of 403 men from 157 countries of the Rotary world elected as a district governor for 1982-83 year. As governor of District 573, he will coordinate some Rotary clubs in his district.

A Rotarian since 1970, he is a member of the Rotary Club of Spearman Rotary, one of more than 19,500 such clubs around the world.

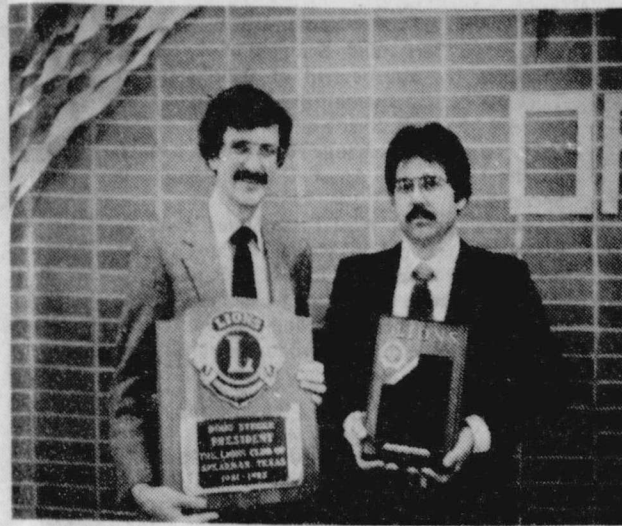
Rotary is an organization of business and professional men united worldwide, who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build good will and peace in the world.

## Andrea Archer To Enter Annual AJQHA World Championship Show

Quarter Horse enthusiast Andrea Archer will be representing the Texas Junior Quarter Horse Association at the Eleventh Annual AJQHA World Championship Show and Convention in Tulsa, Oklahoma, August 1-8.

Andrea is one of over 1,300 young horsemen and horsewomen, 18 and under, selected to participate in the show. Andrea will be competing with her registered American Quarter Horse in the Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, and Stake Racing at the show. The top ten youth

in the United States and Canada in each of the 28 events as well as two entries per event from each of the state junior associations will compete for awards valued at almost \$30,000. Winners of the 28 classes will receive a trophy belt buckle bearing the inscription "World Champion".

The AJQHA Convention will be held in conjunction with the show, with Youth Directors from each state and province meeting in various committee sessions to conduct the business of the largest youth horse association in the world. The 1982-1983 AJQHA judging teams will also be held.

A variety of other activities are scheduled for the seven day show, including a barbecue, two dances, and an awards banquet.

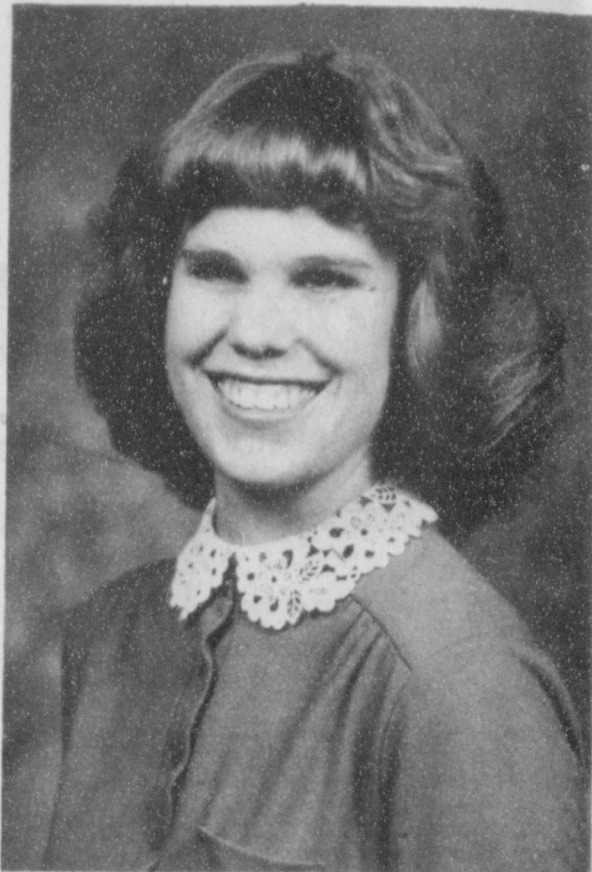

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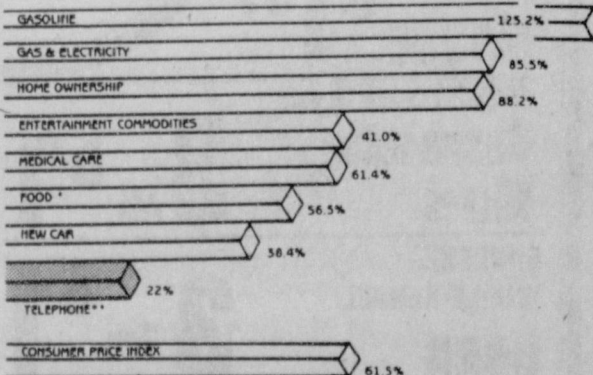

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# 13-15 Year Olds Can't Play

**NOTE FROM SPORTS DESK:** This is an update on the controversy of 15 year olds playing or not playing with the Women's League. It's pretty sad at times and at others it was time to cheer!! It is a TRUE story on behalf of Spearman, Texas. Have an open-mind when you read this story. It might open some closed eyes, and it could also close some eyes even more.

Since the Spearman YMCA has been in existence, there has never been a 13-15 Softball League. In all the other towns surrounding Spearman, the 13 and 14 year olds play with the 10 to 12 or whatever the age group is for Spearman's little girls' softball, while the 15 year olds play with the Women's League. In Spearman the controversy about 15 year olds playing with the women has been nonchalant. In the last three years there have been at least 6 players that have been "16". As the chairman put it, "There has never been a 13-15 year old League." Was there really an attempt, other than this year, to get a 13-15 year old League started? And if there was one desperately tried why was there not an official entry form or what have you in the local NEWSPAPERS--all 3? That's just one of the questions asked by some local parents whose kids wanted a league. Word doesn't travel as fast as a newspaper article or what have you.

Well, a 13-15 year old League couldn't get started because most of the ones old enough kept saying, "Playing softball at our age is boyish". While this was happening, all the 15 year olds wanted to play in the women's League. That's the sad part, they all were terminated by the Women's League firing squad!!

It started off with one player wanting to play softball, and

she was good enough, still is, to play in the Women's League. All of a sudden, all of the 15 year olds that were turned down by other teams were demised, so they "tattled" on the 15 year old that was playing excellently. IT FINALLY happened, she was massacred by the Women's League Firing Squad. She had played 1 game and had done an excellent job. There are still a few out there playing, there has to be, especially the ones that will be 16 in the next month or so. The chairman also said that there were lots of women who did not want to play with a bunch of 15 year olds. When these 15 year olds turn 16, some in just a month or so. They are then eligible to play in the Women's League, the only difference is that they are now 16, but yet they still look awful young, awful small, and yet are awfully good! I suppose the only difference is that they can't complain anymore in the League, although some do with their teammates.

There was another little comment that the chairman told the team with that one player--"She hurt the 13-15 LEAGUE." Did she really? I guess some folks will argue about that point for as long as they can, like some will say, "well, my little boy/girl, is just 9 months too young for Tee-Ball" or what have you. Did these people ever think that they were hurting the under-aged girl--by 6 months, chances of ever playing again? Were they just selfish enough to withstand hurting her chances? Well, at least now everyone on that new team will know that the chairman will have no right to spy on their team again!! When teams split up because of a coach or whatever, they usually will go to the lowest devices to make sure that their opponents who used to be their teammates will have no chance in beating them.

What will happen to the girl that was shot by the Women's League Firing Squad? Will she ever play again? If she didn't I wouldn't blame her a bit, I'd blame the vultures that literally ate her up while still alive. In my opinion, she should come back this next year, and prove to those prosecutors and prove to them that age doesn't make a difference, until a person is 35 and tired of playing, but won't play with anyone as young as 16, if they didn't have to, so that they could think they were still good.

The question is, "What will these girls that don't play this year do all Summer long? Will they ever trust a League or League Official to tell them the truth? Or will they have to wait 3 years before they finally start to deal with the real *muggero* of the Women's Softball League?" These questions can't be answered by me or even the chairman of the Women's Softball League, maybe it never will be answered.

Like one fan said, "If the girls that are 15 are good enough to beat out a person for a certain position, I'd say that's the only reason that they persecuted that young lady and all the rest when they get caught!" When the rest of the girls get caught, well then they just might not want to play in this Women's Softball League. Who could blame them? They shouldn't be the ones to be blamed.

Now, about the 13-15 year old League. There were 55 7th grade girls that could have made 5 teams themselves, but if there was such a desperate attempt as the chairman said. Why was there only 16 girls that showed up? There were only about 10 who said that softball was too boyish for girls their age, why not ask the 29 girls that were left in the 7th grade, or the 15 8th graders--if there was a real desperate attempt to

get a 13-15 year old League started?! There are lots of questions being asked by parents that have not been answered, and I doubt seriously ever will be answered!! That's what so sad about the 13-15 year old League. If the chairman really wanted to start a 13-15 year old League, why not have put something in the 3 local papers, or why not have asked all the girls about February or January even? Maybe next year, if they want a 13-15 year old League so badly, I hope that the chairman gets started in late January or early February, because late May isn't going to help matters and not even an article in the paper won't do much good. Think about it, there are lots of 13-15 year olds with not much to do? Thank goodness this isn't a big city like New York or the Bronx, because these fine young ladies would be in desperate trouble!!

Well, I'm a player myself, and I suppose since I'm just 21, too young to have any kind of say in the Women's League, averaging about 35 years of age, I couldn't do it myself. Having 7 teams in a League is alright, but not as competitive as a League should be. Maybe one of these years, when ladies my age get to be the age of the ladies that don't feel a 15 year old is "capable" of playing, will by then realize that they can and maybe even better. Now that all 15 year olds are banned from competing, maybe the Blue-Dot Softball will be next!!

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- The All-Star game, to be played in Canada this year, is less than a month away--July 13. The American League will be trying to win after ten losses.

The National League is favored for several reasons. Some feel it is a tougher league. The game is being played in a National League park that players in that league are familiar with.

Many American Leaguers have never played in Montreal. So the hometown fans, the park, and batting last are among the advantages National League players enjoy. But--American League players are overdue and have quite an incentive. They haven't won since Earl Weaver managed them to a 6-4 triumph in 1971.

Sparky Anderson lost that one (he won three after that, in 1973, 1976 and 1977) and this year should be helping the A.L. And Earl Weaver, in his last year as manager of the O's, should be there also.

National manager Tom Lasorda, by the way, has never lost an All-Star game, having won two in 1978 and 1979.

Two former Yankee managers won four each for the Americans--Joe McCarthy in 1937, 1939, 1942 and 1943 and Casey Stengel in 1954, 1957, 1958 and 1959.

But other than Weaver, no American League Manager has won since Ralph Houk won one of two in 1962. Two games were played for four years, 1959 through 1962.

**Chronic Bronchitis**

Summer is right around the corner, but you've already caught one of those "summer colds". You cough. You spit. You just can't shake its lingering effects. If you're also a heavy smoker, it could be chronic bronchitis.

Chronic bronchitis is nearly always associated with heavy cigarette smoking. It's likely to start in middle age and get worse as the years go on unless you seek help from a doctor early. About three times as many men get chronic bronchitis as women. People with chronic bronchitis often live in cities where air pollution is a problem.

The American Lung Association of Texas says that because people don't consider chronic bronchitis a killing disease, it is

often neglected until it is in an advanced stage and there is serious damage to the lungs. But in 1981, about 7.1 million people suffered from chronic bronchitis. It brought death to about 3,900. Physicians report more than 330,000 new patients with chronic bronchitis every year. The Social Security Administration grants disability benefits to about 1,500 victims a year. Undoubtedly, chronic bronchitis is one of the nation's costliest diseases in terms of manpower, money and misery.

Since people who get chronic bronchitis are nearly always smokers, the cough is usually dismissed as only "smoker's cough." As time goes on, though, colds become more damaging. Coughing and spitting last longer after each cold.

Soon they're with the victim all the time—before colds, during colds, after colds. Generally the cough is worse in the morning and evening and in cold, damp weather.

If your summer cold lingers, see your doctor. He or she can help you enjoy the summer months.

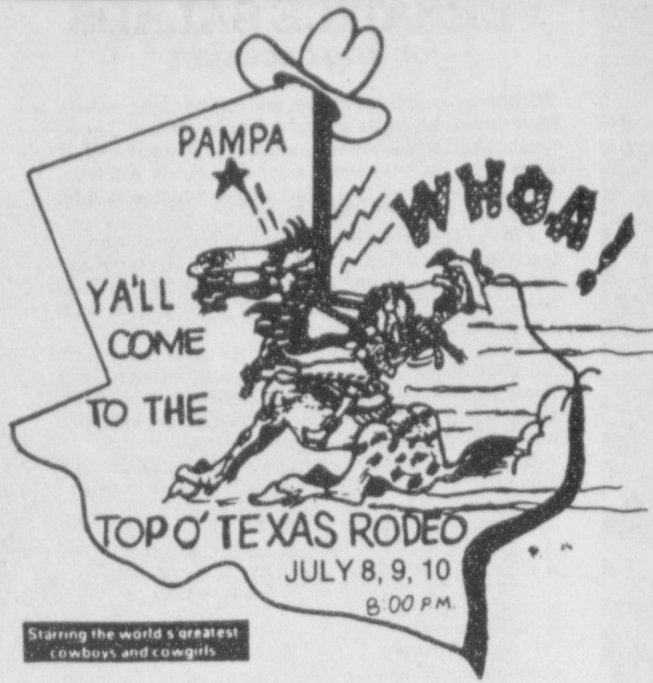

**Texas cattle feeders report 6 percent jump**

AUSTIN--Texas cattle feeders report a six percent increase over last year in the number of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter as of May 1 but a two percent drop from feedlot numbers a month ago, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. reports.

"There were 1,590,000 head of cattle on Texas feedlots as of May 1. Seventy-two percent of this total is located on feedlots in the Northern High Plains. That area of Texas is the largest cattle

producing area in the state as well as the nation," Brown said.

Feedlot placements made in April totaled 320,000 head, a 33 percent drop from placements made in March and 14 percent below placements made in April 1981.

Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service report an eight percent decline in cattle marketings from a year ago but a six percent increase over February marketings. The fed cattle marketings for the High

Plains area dropped three percent from March figures.

In a seven state area, a total of 7.07 million head of cattle and calves were on feed for slaughter as of May 1. This is a one percent increase over the number on feed during the same period a year ago and a three percent increase over May 1, 1980 figures. Fed cattle marketings for this seven state area increased two percent from last year, reaching 1.41 million head.

**A FISHY PROBLEM**

AUSTIN -- There aren't enough fish in Mackenzie Reservoir. Despite all the clean, blue water in that lake, the fishing could be better.

Some biologists from the Parks and Wildlife Department say the lake isn't fertile. That may be so, but it seems strange that there are plenty of shad (baitfish) in the lake.

The problem, according to the Parks and Wildlife Department, is that the lake is so clear and deep. The best habitat for most game fish is 15 feet deep or less, with lots of vegetation. Mackenzie is short on both these properties.

Even so, the state should not give up on this lake. The people who fish this lake buy the same fishing license all other Texans buy, and they are entitled to all the state services the other fishermen get.

Parks and Wildlife seems to agree. Since 1975, the department has put about 6 million fish into the lake, including smallmouth bass, rainbow trout, brown trout, channel catfish, walleyes, blue catfish, flathead catfish, hybrid stripers (bass) and Florida bass.

The agency has used a standard formula to stock the lake, stocking a certain number of fish per acre.

Even if Mackenzie cannot support large quantities of gamefish right now, there are other ways to keep fish in the lake. One is the "put and take" method that works like inventory in a store. The department puts

in about as many fish as the fishermen take out. Parks and Wildlife has been using this method with hybrid stripers. The next stocking of the fish should be next year.

One of the unfortunate things about stocking fish is the time it takes for the fish to grow up after they are introduced into the lake. This long lead time makes it difficult to judge how well the new fish are doing in the lake. Despite the lead time required, Parks and Wildlife biologists are hopeful the hybrid stripers will flourish.

Long-term plans for the lake include some floating structures in the middle of the lake to give the fish some shade and protection. These structures will encourage the fish population.

Parks and Wildlife's position on Mackenzie Reservoir seems to be that it will not be easy to improve the fishing there, but it's worth a try. We will be encouraging Parks and Wildlife to try whatever it takes to give people who live near and visit Mackenzie Reservoir a good fishing lake. They deserve it.

We have many sportsmen in our district. Many of you probably have some ideas about how the Parks and Wildlife Department could improve hunting or fishing in your area. We would like to hear from you. **FARM FACTS**

If you see the TDA seal on the produce scales, you know that an inspector has been by to check the accuracy. All packaged cans and bottles are subject to inspection for compliance to label weights statements. Butterfat content in milk determines the value of the milk to the farmer, and TDA performs random testing to confirm the results of independent testers in the field.

Farmers store milk in tanks on their farms and are paid on the basis of volume as well as butterfat content. Tanks must be tested regularly by TDA and are certified to 10ths of a gallon on large tanks. At major terminals, a TDA inspector certifies scales that may measure fertilizer sand graal as it moves from the elevator to the transporting container.

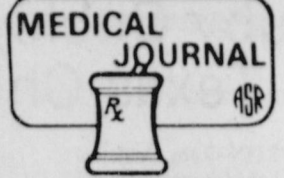

Research conducted following a measles outbreak in Buffalo, New York, has influenced many physicians to recommend that parents delay immunizing their children until after the infant's first birthday.

According to a recent broadcast sponsored by the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center and The Prudential Insurance Company, health officials in Buffalo found that the majority of the afflicted children studied had been immunized before their first birthday.

Dr. Richard Judelson, Erie County communicable disease control officer, said, "Children who receive the vaccine before 12 months of age were at a three-times greater risk of contracting measles. The ages between 13 and 14 months were gray areas. Our final conclusion, therefore, was to immunize children at 15 months of age."

Dr. Judelson explained that the blood of children less than a year old still contains measles antibodies passed on by the mother during pregnancy.

"Most women in the United States are protected against measles," said Dr. Judelson. "Those antibodies go into the baby and stay with the infant from six to as many as 15 months. If the mother's antibodies are still present in the child, the vaccine virus is neutralized. We recommend waiting to immunize for 15 months, so those antibodies will have fully disappeared."

### "BIRTHDAY HONORS" FOR PRINCESS DI

Seventeen nations in the British Commonwealth are planning a special gift to commemorate the 21st birthday of Diana H.R.H. The Princess of Wales. They will all issue an omnibus series of postage stamps—centered around the glamorous Princess who has captured the hearts of people around the world. Countries participating include such exotic places as Fiji, Mauritius and the Cayman Islands.

The stamps will be released on July 1, Diana's birthday, an event which is likely to be preceded by the birth of the Princess' first child, expected in June.

Highlighting the series is an as yet unpublished photograph of the lovely Diana, showing her new—and longer—sleek coiffure. This will be the high value stamp for each country.

The issue will also include stamps showing the coat of arms of each country with a birthday greeting. An informal picture of the Princess of Wales (different for each country) and a picture from the never to be forgotten Royal Wedding grace the other values.

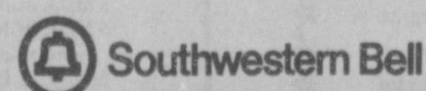

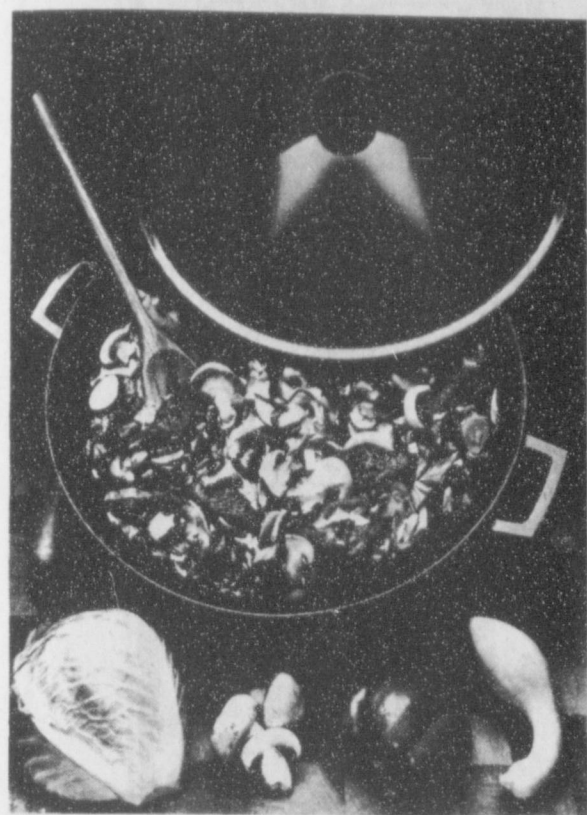

## From the TAP Kitchen



**STIR-FRY CABBAGE** is a quick and delightful summer treat for the entire family. Texas Department of Agriculture food specialists have combined Texas cabbage with mushrooms, squash, green peppes and sliced beef for a delicious all-in-one meal.

### BEEF 'N CABBAGE STIR FRY

- 2 or 3 T. peanut oil
- 1 1/2 lb. thinly sliced beef-top sirloin, round steak, or flank steak
- 1 med. onion
- 1 green pepper
- 2 C. shredded green cabbage
- 2 C. shredded red cabbage
- 1 yellow squash
- 1 zucchini squash
- 8 oz. mushrooms
- 1/4 C. soy sauce
- 2 T. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. salt or more to taste
- 1/2 tsp. pepper

Heat wok on high; pour in only enough oil to coat pan. Wok is ready for frying when chopsticks or wooden spoon sizzles in oil. Pour in beef and stir fry for about 5 minutes; remove onto warm platter. All vegetables should be sliced very thin diagonally so that all sides are exposed to the surface of the heat. Stir fry all vegetables two at a time in this order: onion, green pepper, green cabbage, red cabbage, yellow squash, zucchini squash and mushrooms. When all foods are cooked, warm all vegetables and meat in wok; add soy sauce, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper. Blend seasonings well and serve immediately. Serves 4-5.



### The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—With the condition of the economy today, it is unfortunate that some businesses have resorted to high pressure sales tactics to entice customers into purchasing goods or services. However, it is a fact that some salespeople are highly trained to manipulate the potential buyer into a sale. Surprisingly, many consumers may not realize that high pressure sales tactics are being used until it is too late.

The Consumer Protection Act provides relief for those persons who have been victims of high pressure sales tactics. Therefore, for the next two weeks, I will be pointing out some commonly used high pressure tactics.

1. The Guilt Trip: The idea of this tactic is to make you feel guilty if you don't buy. Example: "Do you want to deprive your children of the education and knowledge this encyclopedia could give them?"

2. Baffle You With Statistics: In many instances the salesperson will bombard you with statistics which in some cases are not accurate, or are given too quickly to comprehend. Example: The government surveyed thousands of people during their productive years and came up with some very accurate figures:

a) Out of 100 people who reach retirement ONLY ONE will be "well to do". That means that he will have sufficient money to enjoy life with no outside help.

b) Out of 100 people, 4 will have an income maybe from stock in their company or from rental property.

c) Out of 100 people, 3 will have to keep on working—next week, I will discuss techniques you as a consumer can use to avoid being pressured into a sale.

this: 92 out of 100 will either be dependent on their children, dead or dead broke. When we think of America being the land of opportunity it is a shame. That is why you should invest in this retirement plan TODAY!

3. Your Last Chance: A salesperson may convince you to make a hasty decision by saying to you, "this is the last one" or "this is the last time it will be offered at this price."

Example: "You'll get a \$500 discount tonight only. If you don't purchase this vacation plan tonight, the discount will never be offered again."

4. Jump On The Band Wagon: Often a salesperson will encourage you to buy because everyone else is.

Example: "Your neighbor just bought one" or "everybody" who's anybody is buying this product."

5. The Assumption: You may notice during a sales presentation that the salesperson talks as if you have already agreed to buy. Consequently, by relating to you in a positive manner, the salesperson attempts to manipulate you into signing a contract.

Example: After you complete what you thought was only a questionnaire and listening to a presentation, a slick salesperson may say, "Now if you will just approve this information as being complete and correct to the best of your knowledge we will get your plan started today."

These are just a few of the high pressure sales techniques used by some businesses. The salesperson who uses them is only interested in making a fast buck by saying whatever is necessary to get you to buy.

Next week, I will discuss techniques you as a consumer can use to avoid being pressured into a sale.



## A Made-in-Minutes Main Dish Salad

When the end of the week calls for a simple supper, main dish salads could fit the bill. This recipe from the Kraft Kitchens takes the flavor of favorite Tex-Mex dishes and combines them in a made-in-minutes entree.

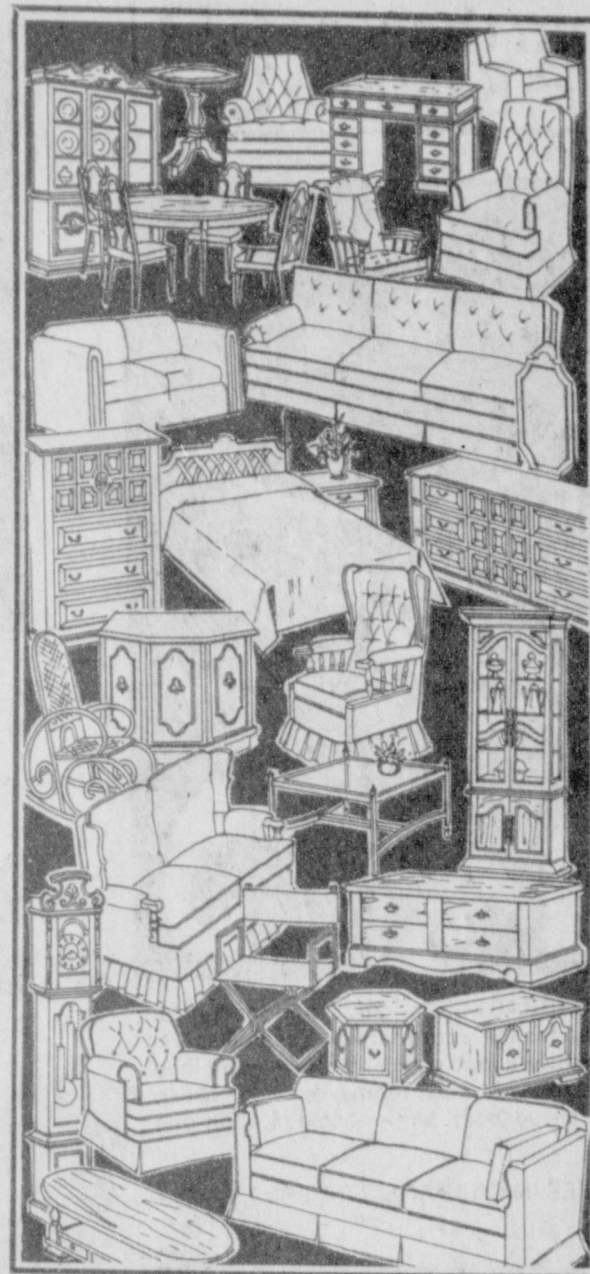

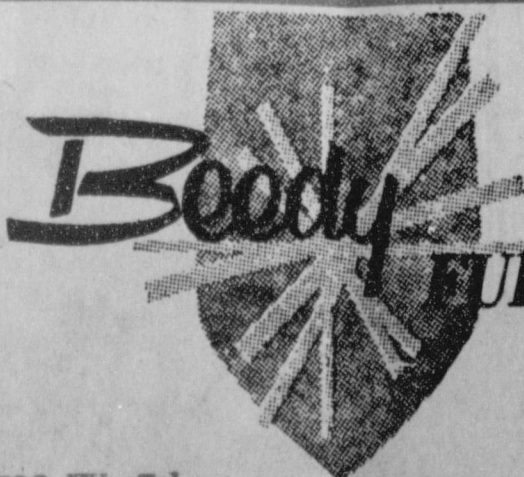
