## High School Enrollment is Up

It is really too early to tell, but it looks as if the high school enrollment will be up some 18 students over last year, and the elementary and junior high down by 19 which should balance out to about the same enrollment figure as last year, which was 1057. However, on Tuesday of this week, the total enrollment was up by some 3 students, 1060. Supt. James Cunningham is sure that the figure will go up after Labor Day.

This is just a general account of the Sheriff's Dept. activities in the past 23 days, it does not include the number of Civil Papers served in the last 23 days. Sheriff R. L. McFarlin would like to emphasize to the citizens of Hansford County that his department is on call 24 hours a day & does encourage anyone with a problem of any type to contact him or his office. ## \$832,000 To Spruce Up Local Homes

In Hansford County, as in many other areas of the country, homeowners are on a fix-up, spruce-up spree. They are spending a record amount of money on home improvements. And they are tackling much of the work themselves. The modernization boom goes in various directions. Some families are remodeling their bathrooms and kitchens. Some are replacing old heating systems or adding wings, porches and breezeways to their houses. Others, worried about fuel supplies and costs, are putting in storm windows and adding insulation to walls and attics. In the past year alone, it is estimated, Hansford County homeowners spent no less than \$832,000 on alterations, additions, repairs and replac-

ements. That is separate and distinct from their ordinary operating costs. The spending estimate is based upon a region-by-region survey made by the Department of Commerce as well as data from the National Home Improvement Council and others. The findings are that the average expenditure for residential upkeep and improvement in Hansford County's general area was \$402 per dwelling unit, compared with \$360 in the prior year. In general, throughout the united States, homeowners spent an average of \$459 per unit for such purposes. Some local residents—those who went in for major alterations and additions—had expenditures that were much greater than the average.

Others, who may have done considerable overhauling earlier, had less to do in 1975. All in all, it added up to a record outlay of \$25.2 billion nationally. That was \$4.1 billion more than in the previous year. How did Hansford County homeowners spend their portion of this total? A breakdown, based upon the overall figures, indicates that about 44 percent went for additions and alterations and 17 percent for major replacements. The remaining 39 percent was for painting, plumbing, roofing and other refurbishing and repairs. The decision of many people to fix up their present homes and stay put reflects the shortage of new housing at prices most families can afford.

## Irrigators Form National Organization



An umbrella organization for farm consumers of natural gas, tentatively named the National Federation of Irrigation Farmers, was launched at a Friday planning session in Amarillo. The effort to unite irrigators was headed by leaders of four regional gas groups which have worked separately in the past. Attending the meeting to form a national unity group were some 100 representatives of the North Plains Energy Consumers Association, Plains Gas Users, the Southwest Gas Users, and Southwest Kansas Gas Users Association. "The response we got at the meeting was strong, and we are hoping to get everybody together again in November to make our plans for the national group final," said Jim Dowty, President of North Plains Energy Consumers, the group which hosted the Amarillo meet. The National strategy session got support in brief speeches by two irrigation country political leaders, State Senator

Max Sherman of Amarillo, and Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon. Also addressing the farm group were John Aikin of Hereford, attorney for the Plains Gas Users Association, and Cameron Graham, of Albuquerque, New Mexico, Southwest Gas Users attorney. Graham, who has represented farmers before the Federal Power Commission, discussed the urgency of national organization. "There is an awful lot of demand for natural gas, and there's not much around. It's a simple as that, and if you want gas for your wells, farmers are going to have a fight for it," Graham declared. "It is absolutely essential that farmers all across the southwest organize so they can have an impact on federal energy policy. Our experience thus far has shown that irrigation farmers will have to wage this fight alone," he added. "It is not so today, but in 10 years we will have severe supply and price problems with electricity. So converting our wells is not the answer,"

he warned. Hereford attorney Aikin, a long-time irrigation spokesman, reported on the status of pricing policies adopted by the Texas Railroad Commission. "The Railroad Commission has practically given up its authority to regulate prices on natural gas, and irrigation gas will be going up about two cents per MCF every month for the rest of this year," he declared. "Our hopes cannot rest on getting the Railroad Commission to change its outlook. We've got to get gas regulation moved over to the jurisdiction of the new Texas Utilities Commission," Aikin urged. In committee sessions late Friday, the convention delegates voted to maintain regional organizations, which will support the national grouping with per-capita contributions. A financial committee report approved late Friday called for raising some \$25,000 in funds by November, when the National Federation of Irrigation Farmers will be formally chartered.

**Social Security**  
Tips can make a difference in your take-home pay. If you're a cab driver, a waitress, or have worked in one of the service trades, you know that tips can sometimes amount to as much or more than your regular wages.  
That's why tips are covered under social security. They can also make quite a difference in the amount of your family's social security check when you retire, or if you become disabled, or if you die.  
However, many people don't think of tips in terms of social security protection. Many still think of tips as "something extra" and may not report them for social security protection for that reason. Others may be more concerned about meeting today's rather than tomorrow's needs. Others may not realize that the social security law requires you to report your tips of \$20 or more in one month from one place of business.  
Most tips were not covered by social security until 1966. By then, it had become clear that many people who retired after a lifetime of working in the service trades were not receiving social security benefits that reflected their real earnings. The idea of social security is to help replace earnings that are lost when a person retires or becomes disabled--for the family and dependents in case of death. The amount of the social security check is based on the worker's average earnings over a period of years.  
Tips can be important. Let's take a look at how tips affect the social security benefits of a young worker who dies or becomes disabled this year. Tips were covered by social security during the working career involved, so it's easy to show the monthly payment increase based on salary and tips.  
Let's assume a man, age 30, worked as a waiter for the past 10 years and had average yearly earnings of \$5,000, including about 25 percent in tips. If he becomes disabled this year and has a wife and two children under 18, the monthly social security family payment would be \$561.90.  
But--if only his monthly wages had counted for social security, his average yearly earnings would have been about \$3,800 and the family social security check would have been \$430 a month--about 23 percent less.  
You must give your employer a written report of your tips when they amount to \$20 or

Peggy's Pointers

Take advantage of August bedding sales to buy sheets for decorative purposes as well as bed use.

Sheets are reduced seven to sixteen per cent, depending on the store and manufacturer.

Brighten up a bathroom with a colorful cloth shower curtain made from one flat sheet. This sheet, used with a plastic liner or an old clean plastic shower curtain, will make a tub-size curtain. Permanent pressed sheets make their care a breeze, but pre-wash before using for decorative purposes.

To make a shower curtain out of a sheet, first turn the bottom edge one-half inch to the wrong side, then fold up a three-inch hem and stitch. Pressing after each turn or fold of the sheet will assure an even hem.

If the sewing machine has a decorative stitch, use it for added appeal.

The second step is to turn the top edge one inch to the wrong side then turn it one inch again to form a double one-inch hem and stitch.

To hem the sides, turn each edge down one-half inch, then turn once more one inch and stitch.

Identify holes for hanging the fabric curtain by placing the plastic liner against the wrong side of the sheet with top edges even and mark. Make a three-eighths-inch button hole at each mark. Place hooks through the button holes in the curtain and then through holes in the liner. Hang on the rod with the liner on the inside of the tub and the fabric curtain on the outside. For a shower stall curtain, use one flat twin-size sheet to make the curtain. Measure width needed by the old shower curtain. Then follow above steps for construction. Left-over fabric can be used to cover trash cans or small boxes for bath linens.

Traffic Accidents Increase As School Begins

As nearly three million Texas students return to public, private, and parochial schools, the threat of traffic accidents has increased.

Ken Nevil, Administrator of the Office of Traffic Safety, said, "During 1975, 562 persons under the age of 18 were killed in traffic accidents. This represents an increase of nearly 5 percent over the previous year."

Nevil said many motorists are acutely aware of the dangers during the first few days of school but many then forget the hazards as time passes.

Calling attention to the impulsive attitudes by some drivers, Nevil said, "These school aged youngsters are in their prime and nearing the threshold of adulthood. But, the pathetic killing of these students removes their chances to be productive citizens."

To work toward reduction of school related accidents, Nevil said the Office of Traffic Safety would continue working with the Texas Education Agency, related associations, and the many schools across Texas to get teachers and students involved in traffic safety.

"We are continuing the Ranger Kit Program, which allows students to participate in about ten hours of instruction on traffic safety. Additionally, we are developing other classroom packages relating to bicycle, pedestrian, and passenger safety. By working with elem-

entary level students, we think we can develop attitudes that will remain positive during their formative years. We trust many of these behaviors will be carried with them as they begin to drive automobiles. Admittedly, our plan is long range, but we think education is the ultimate solution to the traffic safety problems of Texas," concluded Nevil.

## Pivot Irrigation Featured At Field Day

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Halfway will display an experimental pivot irrigation system featuring specially modified drop outlets for reducing evaporation loss during its upcoming annual field day, Sept. 14.

An expected crowd of over 1,000 will have the opportunity to view research developments at the station site, 14 miles west of Plainview on Highway 70.

Among the highlights of the event are cotton, sorghum, corn and sunflower research projects featuring crop variety studies, irrigation, soil fertility and other production-oriented research.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock is co-hosting the afternoon attraction.

Dr. Otto Wilke, TAES agricultural engineer, says the pivot irrigation system is on loan to the experiment station from Gifford Hill Inc.

The modified system, installed this summer on the 320-acre Halfway station site, is expected to reduce water and energy use. Wilke says the research project will take at least two years.

The electrical system for the one-tower span was put together by Gifford Hill. Wilke installed a switching tensiometer to trigger the irrigation unit. This tensiometer is a device placed in the soil to measure moisture availability, and automatically turns the unit on when soil moisture tension reaches a predetermined level.

Wilke says the biggest problem with pivot sprinklers is evaporation loss, because the water is sprayed into the air. By replacing the sprinkler with tube-like outlets, the water is allowed to drop directly into the furrows. The outlets are spaced 80 inches apart for irrigating alternate rows.

Other features at this year's field day include a large machinery display and special tours of field crop research. The event gets underway at 1:00 p.m.

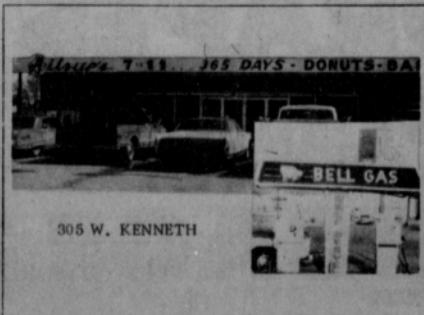

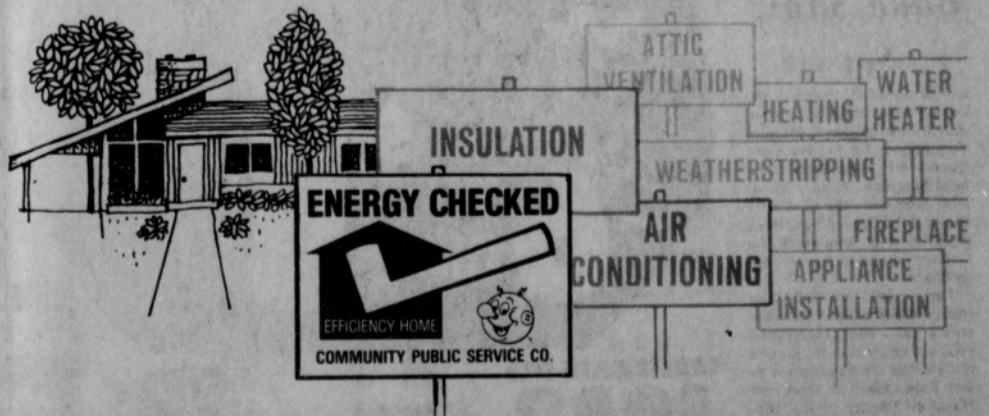

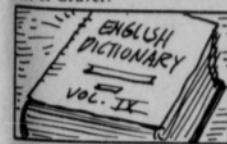

## Corn Maturity Dictates Irrigation

Experienced farmers will tell you they can look at a corn crop and tell whether the grain is ripe. But when it comes to the question of irrigating during late growth stages, event they may have to admit they're sometimes not sure.

Judging grain maturity in corn is a matter of micro-measurements, agriculturists say. And it all has to do with the "maturity line."

Leon New, irrigation specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says maturity stages determine whether further irrigation is profitable, and should be closely checked before irrigating. Corn kernels mature from

the outward tip inward toward the cob, he says. As kernel maturity progresses, a definite white-yellow color distinction can be seen. This color separation on each kernel is known as the maturity line, commonly referred to as the starch line.

"The outward portion of the kernel that is mature and has reached full weight is yellow and hard while the inner portion toward the cob is white, in the dough stage and yet to mature," New says. "In heavier clay soils such as Pullman silty clay loam, Acuff and Olton loam, growers should irrigate until they line has progressed to 1/3 to 1/2 the inward distance down the

kernel. "In other words, try to have a full profile of soil moisture at this stage of maturity," New advises. "This level of soil moisture is generally adequate for the unmature portion of the kernel to mature and to maintain stalk quality. On sandy soils, corn should be irrigated until the maturity line has progressed 1/2 to 2/3 the distance down the kernel. This will normally occur around Aug. 15 to 20 for corn planted in mid-April."

New says the maturity line is also visible on white corn kernels but it is not as distinct as in yellow kernels. To identify the maturity line, one should break a corn ear in two, and closely inspect the exposed full kernels.

There are two other methods of identifying corn maturity, both relating to the maturity line. One is denting and the other is the forming of the black layer.

Denting is the first stage of maturity. New says. It occurs as the maturity line forms and begins to move inward down the kernel. It can be identified by the small indentation in the outward or end tips of the kernel after removing the husks.

New says the formation of the black layer is a signal of full maturity, and is visible after the maturity line reaches the inward point of the kernel, near the point where the kernel attaches to the cob. A dark brown line first appears near this point and later turns black. It can be located by cutting into the tip of the grain.

"After the black layer forms, the kernel can no longer increase in weight," New says. "Irrigation after this stage is of no benefit except to maintain stalk quality."

The maturity line is the most exact identification of the stage of corn grain maturity, he adds, but the three maturity signals can be used together.
