### WHY SOME PEOPLE FIND IT DIFFICULT TO READ

It was hard for me to think of anyone's finding it difficult to read, for to me, reading is one of the richest sources of entertainment. However, when I took myself to task and made a careful study of the non-readers, I found how it might be possible; a person to find reading for entertainment as well as for instruction to be tedious and trying.

Perhaps, in early life these non-readers were denied the association with books and throughout their most impressionable years had them so far removed they formed sorry opinions quite unjustly about printed matter; and with no corrective program set forth for the cultivation of learning to read for pleasure, they remained far in the background of this great field of learning.

I sincerely believe that many people find it a task to read because, innately they are not readers. They are more of the physical type: their make-up calls for action.

Others find reading extremely boring because of the type of literature forced on them, when their interests were in wholly different fields, and in youth they formed such dislikes for reading that they never tried to correct the perverse attitude. The child forced to read historical religious material when his heart called for the mysteries of the fairies is a typical example.

The lack of variety of books would make it difficult for a person to delve into reading with any degree of fervor. The vocabulary to which so many people limit themselves would not only make reading difficult but foreign.

I resent this deplorable fact, yet I know many lovely people who find reading a serious difficulty, and I can do nothing more than have compassion on them. I see them shy from the most satisfying and beneficial recreation known to man.

## DEPLORES BUREAUCACY BUT FAVORS FDR

(The following letter on the political situation in Colorado was received by a member of NEWSDOM's staff—Editor.)  
Denver, Colorado—Sept 28.

Dear Bob:  
The political situation out here is getting warm. I feel pretty sure that the state will go Democratic, but it will be pretty close I think. As a matter of fact, I think now that Roosevelt's election is not nearly as sure as it was three or four months ago. They don't seem to be getting very busy on their campaign. I think up to date that the Republicans have put on a much better campaign than the Democrats.

Personally I am in a quandary. I think Roosevelt has done some good things, but this bureaucratic deluge has about nullified all the good he has done. Perhaps I am prejudiced, because, being an income tax payer of some size, the constantly increasing taxes make me wonder whether there's going to be anything left, and then whether these stupendous inheritance taxes won't take it all in the end.

I guess, however, I'll vote for Roosevelt, because I notice that Landon's ideas seem to be based entirely on criticism. I can see no new constructive policies advocated. And it occurs to me that the next Congress can change the bills that Landon criticizes, probably easier than he can; and that Roosevelt not of course expecting a third term will be free to be hardboiled in changing them than Landon will. And it looks to me as though there was no comparison when it comes to brains between the two men.

I've got it pretty well thought out what I'd do if I were Roosevelt and with some facetiousness I might remark that his big mistake will probably be in not getting me down there to tell him how to do it.

I hope France's action in again devaluing the franc will lead to a form of world stabilization and it looks to me as though it might go a long way toward it. Personally, again, I am a believer in spreading among the people a great plenty of money; and I would like to see it basic money. In fact, I think our balanced dollar about which he wrote the circular three years ago, would be a wonderful thing for the world. The foundation principles upon which we based this treatise (which we printed in a pamphlet which I think you have) has proven to be along the right lines.

The weakness of our present system, I think, is that the money that's being spread around is credit money, and thus open to banking manipulations.
