The All-District Offense and Defense Teams were named by the District 1-AAA. The Spearman Lynx had at least one player make All-District or Honorable Mention in 10 of the 11 categories. # Steger, Schad named at awards dinner

Connie Steger was named Homemaker of the Year and Dorsey Schad was named Outstanding Conservationist at the twenty first annual Hansford Bankers Awards Banquet Friday night.

Connie, wife of Dr. Doug Steger, local optometrist, has worked five years in Extension Homemaker Club work, assuming responsibility as an executive officer of her club and as education committee chairman at the county level.

In other activities she has worked with bloodmobile visits, Veterans Day Program and as an adult leader in 4-H foods and nutrition project groups, as director of the youth choir and participates in the women's group at First United Methodist Church, Spearman.

In the spirit of conservation, she and her husband worked with both the Texas Agricultural Extension Landscape Horticulturist and the Soil Conservation Service to plant and irrigate a windbreak system for their country home.

Dorsey Schad operates several farms including the section on which he and his family live northwest of Gruver -- a section he recently purchased.

Once he assumed ownership, there were some changes he decided upon in the existing farming operation. With technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service via the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District, soil and water conservation problems were identified and goals established for their solution. Cost-share assistance for initiating conservation practices was sought through the development of a Great Plains Conservation Program contract.

level of irrigation water management.

With the choice of the center-pivot sprinkler system, Dorsey Schad planted field corners with a native grass mixture. This program will be carried to sloping areas of land in 1982.

A drip type irrigation system was installed to water the windbreaks of pines, cedar and juniper planted on the north and south borders of his farm.

Schad practices good conservation measures on all the farms he operates in Hansford County.

The awards dinner revealing the choices for Outstanding Homemaker and Conservationist for the year was served in the Gruver High School Cafeteria with Richie Fletcher of the Gruver State Bank as Master of Ceremonies.

Ray Ingle of the First State Bank, Spearman, delivered the welcome with a response from Willard McCloy.

Following this and the entertainment and introduction of guests, Patty Sheppard introduced the Homemaker of the Year and Elmo Dahl made the Outstanding Conservation award. It was received by Kenneth Irvin, Gruver, in the absence of the honoree, who was out of state on a business trip.

Bill Coplin was the featured speaker of the evening, introduced by Keith Lamb.

The event marked the start of the third decade the two Hansford county banks and the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District have presented the occasion of the program and the awards.

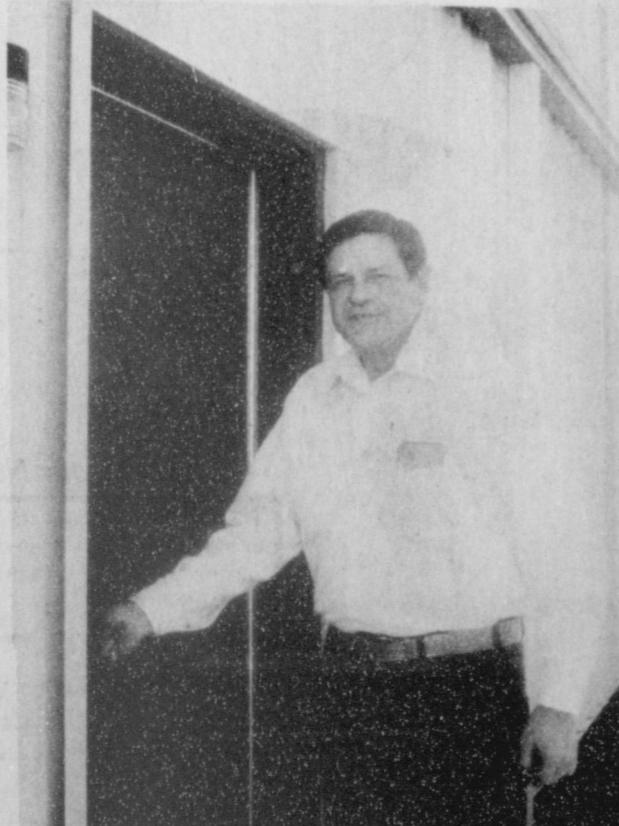
Two fire calls were answered Monday by the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department.

# Gruver's Harris is 'Top Hand' nominee

Outstanding agri-businessman and mayor of the city of Gruver, J. C. Harris was the Hansford County nominee for the sixth annual Top Hand Award established by Bill Davis of the Teepee Land Company and member of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce.

The prestigious award is presented at the annual Golden Spread Agri-Business Seminar and went this sixth year of the event to C.C. "Cy" Burnett, 67, Dumas.

Burnett, with J.C. Harris, was one of six nominees considered for the Top Hand designation at the seminar conducted at the Villa Inn at Amarillo.

Harris has been involved in farming and ranching for 40 years; currently a partner with his cousin, Les Barkley, in a cow-calf operation and helps Barkley who rents 2,240 acres of irrigated farm land from Harris.

The Hansford county nominee in turn rents 1,920 acres of

farm land for dry land wheat production.

Relieved of the burden of irrigated farming, J.C. Harris is still actively involved in agri-business with time for his numerous community activities.

Conservation has not been something for Harris to talk about. He is presently a member of the Palo Duro River Authority seeking to build a dam to assure Hansford County a water supply when the present aquifer is completely depleted as engineers predict. He has planted grass on his dry land to prevent soil erosion; has developed a waterway and three tailwater pits on his property and drained a lake providing more land for useful farming.

Through these conservation methods, J. C. Harris has developed his land to its fullest potential.

Even Harris' role as mayor of Gruver is not a nominal one. He has undertaken EMT training and is a volunteer for the local

ambulance service and is president of the local volunteer fire department. He is a member of the board of Gruver State Bank, the cemetery association and is an active member of Gruver United Methodist Church serving on the church's council on Ministries and Administration.

Even with all this, the first mention of J. C. Harris is any group is as a "top hand" at the business of farming and ranching.

The Golden Spread Agri-Business Seminar at which Harris was a contender for the annual award, began in 1976 with the late Jack Linkletter, television personality and agri-businessman as the first speaker.

Many of the predictions for agri-business made by Linkletter and ensuing speakers have been fulfilled but none predicted the problem agri-business would face in 1981: an administration that would -- by massive budget-cutting -- slow down or

completely stop monetary aid to agri-business as an industry.

The featured speaker for the seminar, Friday, was Randy Russell, special assistant, United States Department of Agriculture who spoke at the luncheon on the 1981 farm bill.

Other speakers were Dr. Kenneth Bader, chief executive officer of the American Soybean Association, on the subject of living without agriculture exports and Dr. Samuel Curl, dean of the Department of Agricultural Sciences, Texas Technological University on the subject of recent developments in agriculture research.

Agriculture radio personality Royce Bodford was moderator for the seminar and Dr. G. B. Thompson, chairman of the agri-business committee of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the seminar, was master of ceremonies at the luncheon.

# 352.4-million tax roll approved for Hansford

In an all-day session of commissioners court, Hansford county commissioners handled an agenda that included every thing from fixing fees and salaries to approval of the 1981 tax roll.

Before exemptions were calculated, Hansford county was looking at a tax base of \$355.7 million with an approved tax base of \$352.4 million after all the statutory exemptions were allowed. Commissioners -- after a close scrutiny for fairness -- approved this tax roll as the source of tax-producing reve-

nues for the operation of the county.

A part of the expense of that operation was illustrated by the cost of the county's participation with the city and the hospital district in the purchase of a new ambulance and with the need to purchase a two-ton truck for Precinct One.

Meeting with Spearman City Manager Jim Murray for a discussion of bids Murray's office had received for the new emergency vehicle, commissioners learned the most the total cost would be for the

county's participation was \$10,700 plus. Murray told the court session, Monday, that he was checking out an ambulance unit figuring in a lower bid to see if it met specifications. If so, the county's portion would be proportionately reduced.

Authorization to advertise for bids on the two-ton vehicle for Precinct One was voted by the commissioners.

In other money matters, the court set a salary for Rex Casdorff in Precinct Three, set certain fees involved in elections and approved the current

audit.

Among the routine items of transacting day-to-day county business was approval of an easement for Phillips Petroleum Company to cross a county road with a line.

Commissioners court sessions are conducted each second and fourth Monday of the month. Commissioners meet in the conference room of the County Judge's offices and the public is invited to attend these sessions.

Agenda items must be set well ahead of the court sessions

so that they can be published in advance as required by law. Those having business before the commissioners are urged to contact County Judge R. L. McClellan concerning procedures.

The Lynxettes did improve but still lost to the Phillips Blackhawkettes--65-50, by 15 points.

The first quarter of the game was a good quarter for the Lynxettes, they scored 12 points and let the Blackhawkettes score 13 points. So after 1 quarter, the Phillips Blackhawkettes were ahead by 1 point. The Lynxettes came firing back

in the second quarter, but the Blackhawkettes really outscored the Lynxettes in that quarter, 21-12 and took an early halftime lead of 24-34--ahead by 10.

## Nation's Adoptive Families Honored

"Adoption is a positive, loving way of building families," declared William E. McKay of Ft. Worth, Texas, "and I ought to know." McKay is chairman of the National Committee for Adoption and a strong supporter of NATIONAL ADOPTION WEEK, November 22-28. McKay is also the father of an adopted child and was himself an adopted child.

"We think of ourselves primarily as a strong, loving family rather than just an 'adoptive' one," said McKay. "I'm honored to represent a national organization that promotes the positive recognition of this method of family building."

Bill Pierce, president of the National Committee For Adoption, which is headquartered in Washington, D.C., said that the Committee joins other groups in promoting the recognition of

Thanksgiving Week as a time of family unity. He said it is a way of honoring the struggles and the triumphs of families of all sizes and origins.

"Frankly," said Pierce, "we also hope, through our national emphasis on family-building through adoption, to remind pregnant girls they have more than one option open to them if their pregnancy was unplanned. They can demonstrate love for their unborn child in a way that assures the child of family membership. It's a way, too, of bringing joy to one of hundreds of couples eager to adopt a child. Adoption is definitely a positive option for these young girls."


Here in Lubbock the Smith-lawn Maternity Home and Adoption Agency echoes the sentiments that making an

adoption plan is a positive, attractive alternative for resolving an unplanned pregnancy.

Howard Hulett, Director of Social Services, said that during the past calendar year 173 girls were in contact with this agency and of this number 79 were admitted to the Smithlawn program. Since the start of 1981 51 babies have been placed in adoptive homes.

McKay and Pierce agreed with Hulett that the choice of Thanksgiving Week each year was a satisfactory time to promote the family concept. They agreed this particular week not only has an already-achieved appreciation of family life factor, but it also is free from the distracting elements of some of our other annual holidays.
