ELECTION RESULTS

Following are the totals in both the Republican and Democratic primaries in the voting in Hansford County Saturday.

Verna Gail Keim, incumbent county treasurer was returned to her post by a margin of 452 votes to 359 for her opponent, Norma Jean Mackie.

In the County Commissioner Precinct 4 race, Gene Reynolds garnered 89 votes and J.W. Whitaker received 78 votes. Gene Reynolds will meet the

Republican candidate Val Winger in the November general election.

All other county officers were unopposed.

Allen Appointed To Advisory Group

Kenneth Allen has been appointed by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block to serve on an advisory committee. The appointment was confirmed this week, after Allen was cleared by government's stringent clearance program. The executive officer of the

Perryton Equity will serve on the Agricultural Technical Advisory Committee on Grain and Feed. The trade committee, which meets a couple of times a year, will give input to the Secretary on various farm programs and policies.

"At this point and time, I don't know a great deal about the committee's workings," said Allen. "I'm looking forward to seeing who I'll be serving with and get down to the issues."

And issues there are in American agriculture. Everything from "reciprocity" legislation to expanding new markets to the Russians' apparent cash problems and purchasing U.S. grain on credit.

"Hopefully, I can do something to benefit the farmer," said Allen. "That's my only purpose in serving on the committee."

Allen is now in his twenty-third year as general manager

of the Perryton Equity and is well-known in farm cooperative circles throughout the country. He is now serving on the board of directors of Farmland Industries, the nation's 240th largest corporation. He has been involved in state and national cooperatives and exchanges for many years and is a frequent visitor to Washington, D.C. to give testimony on the farm situation.

Texas Panhandle EMS System

The Panhandle of Texas is a 25-county area, 24,900 square miles, with a resident population of 343,000. The area is primarily rural (56%), with one urban area with one medical center—in Amarillo. The Panhandle EMS serves a catchment area of one-half million persons residing in the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma Panhandle, Eastern New Mexico and Western Oklahoma.

In 1975, EMS was initiated in the Texas Panhandle region with a DHEW grant and local government match funds. Three more years of grant funds totaling \$1,428,000 enabled the implementation of basic life support throughout the region; advanced life support was introduced in 1979, in the urban areas and some rural communities.

Prior to 1976, some 40 ambulance services provided transport. Few units had medical equipment or radios; the radios that did exist were low-band VHF. Virtually no trained personnel were available. Ambulance service was "swoop and scoop." Since the Fed, the Panhandle EMS System, Inc., a non-profit corporation, administers the Panhandle EMS System. The medical director, the director of the trauma center critical care services, is not salaried by Panhandle EMS but works with the executive director in maintaining medical direction and medical control. The Panhandle EMS Project Director, who is salaried, is responsible for continuing direction and development of all components of the EMS system to assure that the program continues to evolve and function at the peak of performance. Staff includes one part-time secretary, one part-time data collector, a communications center supervisor and six dispatchers. The 15-member Board of Directors from the entire region represents county governments, hospitals, EMT's, paramedics, nurses, physicians and industry.

Currently, 43 ambulance services provide prehospital care with 84 ambulances. Fifty-one percent of the ambulances are advanced life support paramedic units. The balance of the crews are trained as emergency care attendants and emergency medical technicians. All ambulances and hospitals have UHF medical communications; one trauma center provides medical control/direction.

Panhandle EMS, Inc., provides ECA, EMT, and paramedic courses. Ambulance services and rescue squads are also trained in crash management and extrication, ambulance driving, and handling hazardous materials. R.N. and physician training includes respiratory care of the high-risk infant, stabilization and transport of the high-risk infant and high-

risk mother, coronary care, advanced cardiac life support, and emergency department and burn care. CPR began in 1975 and is taught throughout the region to lay persons and medical personnel. Most high schools teach CPR as a required course.

Each ambulance service (90% volunteer) is funded through its local government, donations or by hospital subsidy.

Panhandle EMS provides toll-free physician consultation lines, centralized dispatch and communications coordination and disaster direction, as well as training, record keeping, evaluation, and of course, EMS coordination for the entire region.

The annual Panhandle EMS budget is \$118,000. Funding is based on a "fee for services," an annual charge to each ambulance service based on number of ambulance runs. The United Way of Amarillo funds \$23,000 per year to defray some communication expense and the Amarillo Hospital District assists in partial funding.

The first and only volunteer medevac program is a product of Panhandle EMS. A surplus helicopter with volunteer pilots and volunteer R.N.-R.T.s trained for med-evac is used for inter-hospital transfer. Additionally, we have established a volunteer pool of corporation jets along with the trauma team, which is used for transfer of critical burn patients to Texas burn centers.

Statistical studies for the entire region indicate a reduction of mortality post-EMS (1978) versus prehospital (1975).

Neonatal. Mortality reduction of 44% (from 17.1/1,000 births to 9.6/1,000 births for Panhandle region).

Vehicular Accidents. Ratio of fatalities to injury regionwide reduced 17.3% (BLS only). Selected study of Amarillo ALS versus BLS, vehicular accident mortality reduced 44%. CNS (central nervous system) head injuries only, in Amarillo up to 55% discharged alive.

Myocardial Infarction (MI). Reduction for region (BLS only), 17.5%. Selected study of Amarillo only (BLS versus ALS implementation—increased hospital admissions for MIs 67%, with discharged alive increased 74%.

An EMS system can and must be implemented in every region of the United States. It is the author's conjecture that federal seed money is a must to assure regionalization and proper implementation. However, to assure continuation after the Fed, the EMS grantee must avoid at all costs the creation of a bureaucracy, establishing a political coordinating and effective lead group.

Quality Healthcare Worth Increased Costs

Health professionals here and throughout the Texas Panhandle believe hospitals are taking the brunt of criticism for high costs. And they believe the criticism is unjust.

"Good hospital care is the greatest value you can get for your money," said Albert La Rochelle, administrator at Hansford Hospital here. "I don't like the prices any more than anyone else, but hospital costs are like everything else. They keep going up."

He said that even though costs keep rising, the value received for the healthcare dollar today is better than it ever has been before.

"That isn't true with most products and services which cost several times as much today as when our parents and grandparents paid for the same things," said La Rochelle. "Take, for instance, the dozen eggs you pay \$1 for today. That is 300 or 400 percent more than eggs cost in the 1940s. But the quality of the eggs is no different. The cost of hospitalization went up too, but the quality of healthcare is better now—lots better."

Two big improvements he mentioned are the increased chances of survival in case of severe accident or disease and several added years to the expected life span now as compared with survival chances and life expectancy two generations ago. He said the quality of healthcare continues to improve every year, "and sometimes almost every day".

La Rochelle also pointed out the 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. schedule of most businesses does not exist in a hospital.

"Work in the hospital goes on 24 hours a day and for seven days a week," he said. "That's 8,760 hours a year this hospital is in operation—8,760 continuous hours without turning out all the lights. We have to keep a staff working 24 hours a day and pay utilities for constant use. There's no 'time out' at the hospital. Our staff has to be on the job when others are asleep or enjoying a holiday. We never shut down."

He also said the length of stay at a hospital now is a lot shorter than it used to be.

"For instance, a person who entered the hospital 20 years ago with appendicitis usually stayed about 14 days before his recovery from surgery was considered far enough along for discharge. Now it's about three or four days," he said.

La Rochelle said the size of the local hospital makes it possible to offer its patients a combination of personalized care and the finest in medical facilities.

"We don't brag about what we have to offer here very often," he said. "But we decided that Hospital Week May 9-15 should be used to let people know what they get for their healthcare dollar. You pay more, but you also get more."

Theme for Hospital Week is "You've Got A Friend In The Hospital."

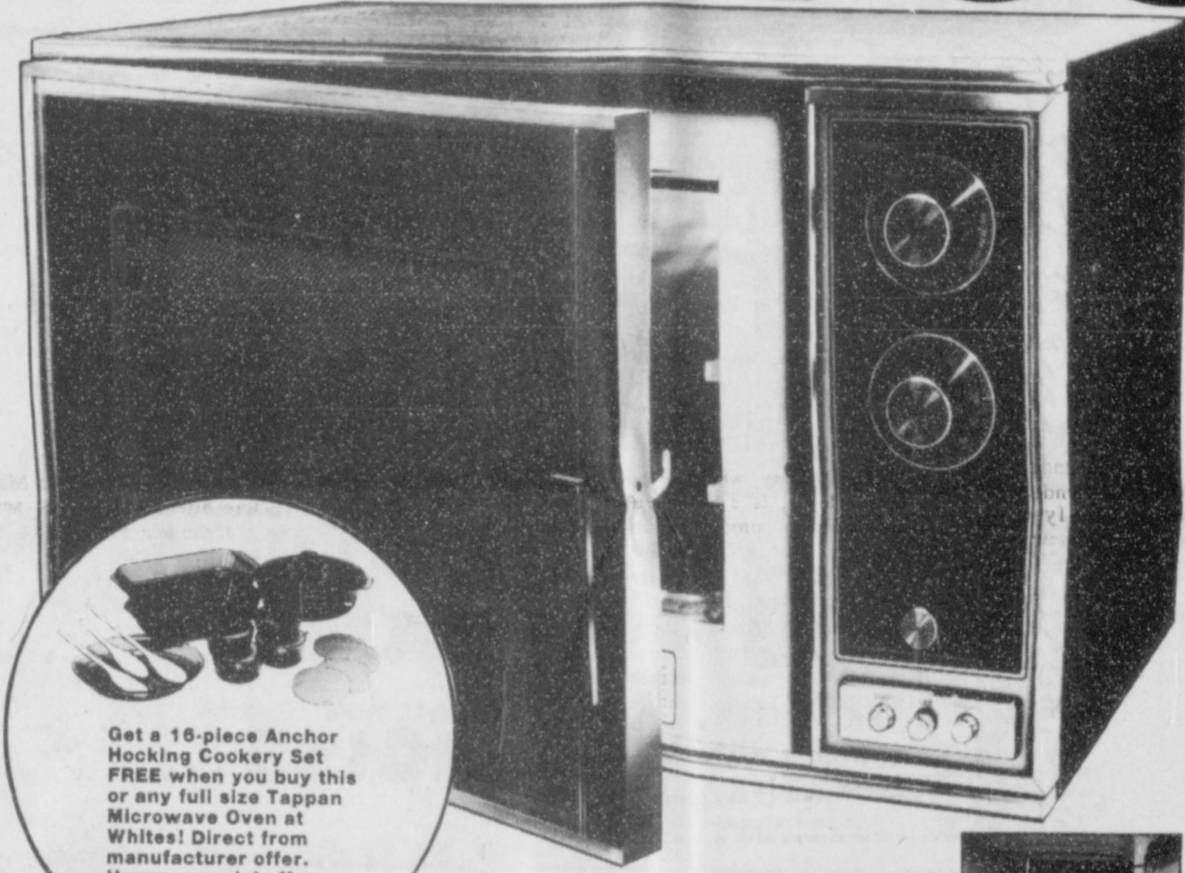

Comment On Sports

BASEBALL

TAMPA, FLA. -- Long-term contracts are proving a necessity for some Major League clubs to keep their star performers but there are pitfalls. One veteran club executive recently explained:

"Clubs want to keep their top players, if they have the money, for three or five years, but sometimes that results in a major injustice to the club--and very seldom to the player. Look at Dave Parker at Pittsburgh, who got a multi-year contract. He hasn't been the same since all that money was guaranteed. He doesn't seem to have the incentive, or is injured or something.

"Players can get hurt just enough to throttle their performance, or they can develop bad habits--lots of young

sters can't handle all that money. And the club can't get out of those huge salaries.

"Take a look at some overall figures of days played --by the star performers before they got long-term contracts, and afterward. You'd be surprised how much more playing they miss afterwards."

Thus Major League clubs must be careful in selecting the players to be offered multi-year contracts. Players without great self-discipline and pride, or any feeling of fan or club loyalty, are often poor bets. And sometimes it's better to let them go, as free agents, rather than risk losing perhaps a million dollars.

NEWS REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

The TV Networks-Their Critics-A Boycott-Congress Silent

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- A long-building struggle is now underway between three wealthy TV networks and citizens' groups fighting immoral influences in U.S. homes.

The White House is staying out of the fight, as is one organization which had been expected to participate--the Moral Majority.

Most members of Congress remain silent fearing networks that can make or break them. But the Parent Teachers Association and the Coalition For Better TV have begun to attack.

The PTA has set up a committee in California rating shows and films, to guide parents. These ratings may or may not be displayed by producers--since producers primarily see viewers (profits), who are traditionally attracted by shock, sex and violence.

The Coalition asks for a boycott. The first target is RCA. RCA owns NBC and the Coalition, after a study of programs on all networks, decided NBC was the most offensive.

Some had expected ABC to be the first target but Coalition spokesman and Methodist minister Donald

Wildmon told a press conference here NBC has been excluding "Christian values and Christian culture" from its programming.

NBC executives are fighting what they say are intimidation tactics.

Wildmon doesn't exonerate the other networks; at his press conference, he echoed sentiments of many critics, including Ted Turner, saying:

"Commercial television is, with some exceptions, a national disgrace and an insult to America's intelligence and integrity. No other national institution has so abused and misused the public trust. No other invention in this century has offered such great constructive potential only to be used for such selfish purposes."

The Coalition, as a result, is urging all Americans to refrain from buying RCA products--until the network cleans up its programming.

The two committees in Congress overseeing the Federal Communication Commission, and thus the networks, have consistently urged this boycott. Many of its members obviously having been influenced by the three networks.

When you need to send valuables or important papers through the mail, the Postal Service recommends you understand what Registered, Insured and Certified mail can do for you.

By becoming familiar with these service options offered by the Postal Service, your mail will receive the best handling and the most cost effective delivery. Registered, Insured and Certified all give you the customized services needed for mailing that special letter or package.

Registered Mail is the safest way to send valuables. It offers special handling for your letter or package mailed at the First-Class rates. You receive a receipt when you take the material to the post office. Then, the movement of that piece is monitored from the point of acceptance to delivery. All irreplaceable articles, regardless of value, and all items worth more than \$400 should be sent by Registered mail.

Jewelry, stocks and checks or money orders for large amounts are good candidates for Registered mail. This type of service provides protection against loss or damage. The full value of the mailing must be declared when mailed for security and insurance purposes. The registration fee includes insurance protection up to \$25,000 for domestic mail.

The fees for Registered mail depend upon the value of the material being mailed. For instance, if the value of the package is from \$101 to \$500, the cost is \$3.60.

A return receipt costs 60 cents extra, but it will allow the sender to have a written receipt of when and to whom the item was delivered. For a return receipt indicating to whom, the date and the address where the item was delivered, the fee is 70 cents.

Restricted delivery service is also available with Registered mail. It allows delivery only to the addressee, or to someone who is authorized in writing to

receive mail for the addressee.

Insured Mail is a good bet if you are sending birthday, wedding or other gifts or fragile items. First-Class Mail, Priority, Third and Fourth-Class mail may be insured. Insurance, available for merchandise only, can be purchased for materials mailed which are valued at less than \$400. Insurance rates, like Registered mail rates, vary according to the value of the material being sent. If articles are insured for more than \$15, a receipt of delivery is signed by the recipient and filed at the delivery post office. The insurance enables you to receive payment for domestic mail that has been lost, rifled or damaged. You may request a return receipt or restricted delivery when sending something insured for more than \$15.

Certified Mail is your best buy if you are sending important letters, insurance forms, contracts or bids for business contracts mailed at the First-Class rate. At 75 cents plus the

charge for postage, Certified mail costs less than Registered mail.

It should be used when the sender requires a receipt as proof of mailing. The coupon receipt is postmarked to establish the date of delivery. A record of the delivery is also kept at the addressee's post office for two years, but no record is kept at the office from which you mailed the material. You may request a return receipt or restricted delivery with Certified Mail.

Certified Mail service is provided only for First-Class or Priority Mail containing no intrinsic value, and insurance is not available.

Certified mail labels, which can be obtained from your local post office, must be completed by the customer for this type of mail.

Thus we should see--in our department stores--prices reflecting this sharp decrease in silver prices. In many cases, however, producers are attempting to hold prices up--at an artificial level. Some are not--and they are the ones who should be patronized.

COLLECTION?

City now enforcing insurance proof

The grace period for a show of proof of auto insurance coverage within the city of Spearman is over as of now.

According to Police Chief Ron Robinson, even as this is being read, city officers are asking for this proof at any time a driver is stopped for any other infraction.

"We are not going to practice 'spot' checks for this proof alone," Chief Robinson said. "If a driver is stopped for speeding, for running a traffic control sign or any of the offenses for which we stop a motorist, the officer is going to ask for proof of insurance coverage as routinely as asking to see a drivers license."

The chief noted that this may be about the only time a motorist would feel a special "drive" was on:

"Periodically, at different locations about the city, we do stop vehicles and make drivers license checks. The checking officer will also check on the proof of insurance coverage," he stated.

Chief Robinson also assured that city officers will be looking for only five things on that insurance coverage proof card: (1) the name of your insurance company, (2) your name as the insured, (3) the period covered by the policy in effect, (4) number of the policy, and (5) a statement that coverage is at least the minimum required by law.

Fine for the first offense can range from \$75 to \$200. The fine will be \$200 for every offense after the first.

"Enforcement of this compulsory insurance coverage passed by the last legislature was assigned to the Department

of Public Safety. We have on file and ready to display, a letter stating the only requirements are the five mentioned here and signed by the DPS Director. I know there have occurred within our general area a number of variances regarding what must be shown an officer asking for the proof. We are still going to go with the DPS Director's directive," Robinson assured.

What factor releases the moisture of the air, acquired by evaporation over the various areas of the earth, producing life and vegetation?

We know that millions of tons of water are absorbed by the air through evaporation every second. This gives the layer of gases above the surface of the earth (our weather) its moisture.

As this air rises, usually because of heating from the sun, it ascends into colder temperatures. In colder weather air condenses and its water capacity decreases.

When the dewpoint is reached, or when the moisture content becomes the absolute maximum, precipitation is finally triggered by a combination of altitude and low temperature.

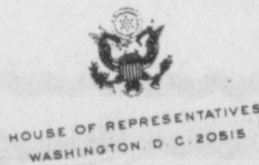

AUSTIN, Tex.: April 29, 1982
 The Texas Farmers Union has called on the Reagan Administration and the Congress to take emergency action to rectify the depression underway in rural America. The full board of the TFU, meeting in Austin on April 29, adopted an economic plan aimed at increasing the commodity prices which are at historically low levels and improving the overall economy in agriculture.

According to TFU President Mike Moeller, the organization of family farmers and ranchers wants the emergency program adopted as it will benefit all segments of the economy. "By raising price support levels on farm commodities we not only will establish a minimum floor price in our domestic markets, we will also set the same price in the international market. This will bring about a favorably balance of trade and get the U.S. out of red ink."

In addition to increasing Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loans to meet the current costs of production, the TFU also called on the Congress and the Reagan Administration to adopt the following measures:

- Reduce interest rate levels to single digit rates which reflect the current economic situation in the U.S.
- Cease all forced liquidations or foreclosures of family farm operations.
- Require the FHA to immediately release Economic Emergency Loan funds.
- Reinstate a nationwide farm storage facility program through the ASCS.
- Reject any further cuts in food and nutrition programs.

The TFU also called on the Texas Legislature to adopt a constitutional amendment which will abolish the state property tax and submit the measure to the voters. The special session of the legislature convenes on May 24 to adopt that measure.

The TFU also commended the local and national news media for its coverage of the current economic crisis in agriculture and rural America.

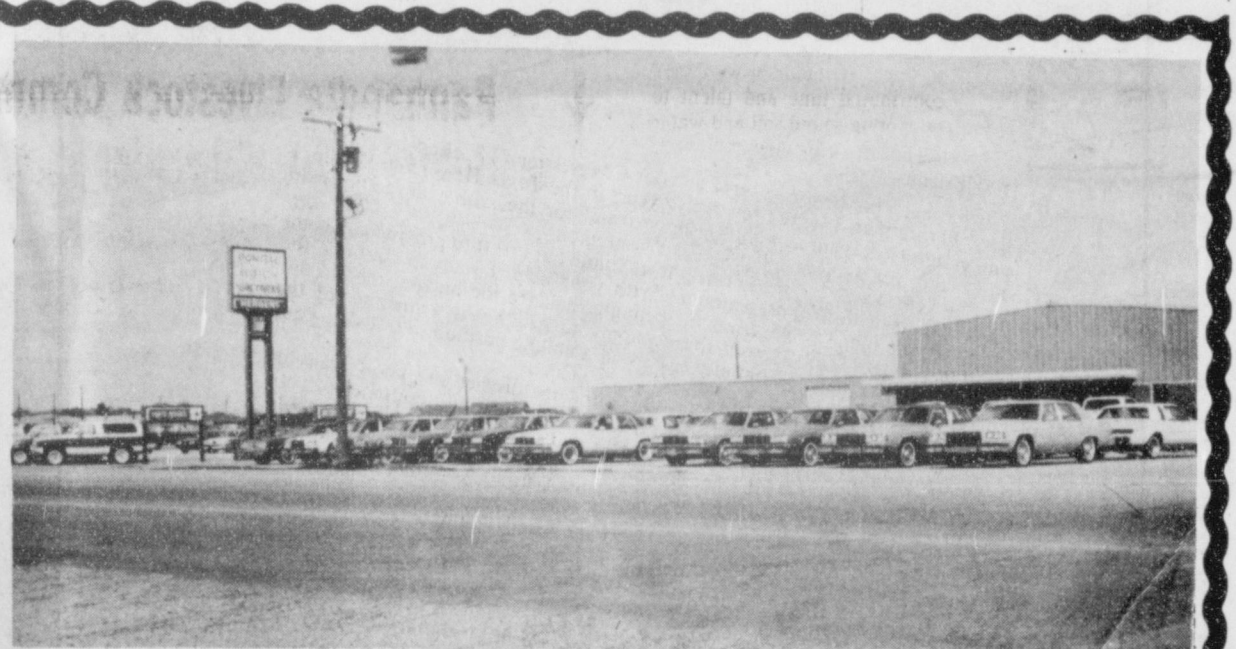

Area 1 Conservation Awards Program

TEMPLE -- Forty-eight soil and water conservation districts in the Panhandle and High Plains region of the state which covers a 51 county area will hold their fourth annual Region 1 Texas Conservation Awards Program in Canyon, Texas on May 7.

The purpose of the awards program which begins at 7 p.m. at West Texas State University is to acknowledge, recognize and honor individuals who have dedicated themselves to the conservation and wise use of renewable natural resources on their private lands or who have contributed time and talent to promoting sound soil and water conservation in their communities.

Receiving the award of "Outstanding Conservation District" for the most progressive conservation program during the past year is the Terry SWCD headquartered in Brownfield. Members of the board of directors of the honored district are: Bill Keese of Meadow, chairman; R.D. Jones, Jr. of Brownfield; Jessie Hartman of Wellman; Robert Luker of Brownfield and Herman Wheatley, Jr. of Brownfield.

The Terry SWCD which is a political subdivision of state government was established to assist farmers, ranchers, and local communities within the boundaries of the district solve soil, water and related resource conservation problems through local initiative and voluntary assistance programs.

F.L. Eicke of Hereford, Texas will receive the "Resident Conservation Farmer/Rancher" award for superior land management and conservation systems applied to his agricultural enterprise. To be eligible for this award the recipient must be a resident of the district and carry out his farming or ranching activities within the SWCD from which the entry was submitted. Eicke was nominated by the Tierra Blanca SWCD headquartered at Hereford.

An "Absentee Conservation Farmer/Rancher" award will be presented to James M. Johnston of Kress for outstanding land management and conservation systems applied on his land. The award is presented to individuals who do not actually reside on their land or within the SWCD submitting the nominee nor who depend fully upon their land for their livelihood. The Gray County SWCD headquartered in Pampa sponsored Johnston.

Two educational categories, an essay contest and poster contest, have enabled students to demonstrate creative artistic and writing skills relative to the conservation of soil, water and related resources.

In the essay contest individuals 18 years and under demonstrated research and writing skills on the subject "Soil and Water Conservation". First, second and third place winners in respective order are: Lillian Polanco of Floydada; Joyce Schilling of Dimmitt and Treacia Kennedy of Pampa.

The poster contest which was

open to students 12 years and under enabled students to present impressions on the subject, "Resource Conservation." First, second and third place winners in respective order are: Traci Hill of Nazareth; Celia Ortega of Booker and Gail Jackson of Afton.

Other award categories for services rendered to advance conservation included "Business/Professional Man or Woman", "Wildlife Conservationist", "Public Media Award",

and "Conservation Home-maker".

Ollie Linder of Plainview, Texas who was sponsored by the Hale County SWCD headquartered at Plainview will receive the Business/Professional Award.

George Oliver and Mary Ann Jackson of Abertathy are Area 1's Wildlife Conservationists. They are sponsored by the Lubbock County SWCD headquartered in Lubbock.

The "Public Media Award"

which is presented to an individual in the print or broadcast media for efforts to promote soil and water conservation will be presented to Riley Kennedy, staff writer and columnist of the "Levelland-Hockley County News". Kennedy was nominated by the Hockley County SWCD headquartered in Levelland.

Ashton Thornhill, Assistant Professor of Telecommunications, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, will receive a special service award for his contributions in the research, development, and production of an educational filmed documentary and television public service programs to promote soil and water conservation in Texas. The award is being presented by Texas' 201 SWCDs.

Sponsors of the regional awards program are the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the 201 local SWCDs in Texas.

FARM PONDS

Ponds and reservoirs are bodies of water created by constructing an embankment across a water course.

Water is as important as the forage in the production of livestock. Adequate water will give a better distribution of grazing in a pasture.

A pond should be of a size that will meet the needs of all livestock that will use the surrounding grazing area. Ponds are also utilized by fish and wildlife.

Ponds that are constructed and managed properly may yield from 100 to 300 lbs. of fish annually for each surface acre. Ponds can provide recreation such as swimming and boating for the family and friends.

Farm ponds also help to prevent silting and pollution of streams and rivers by reducing erosion. For further information on farm ponds, contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Spearman.

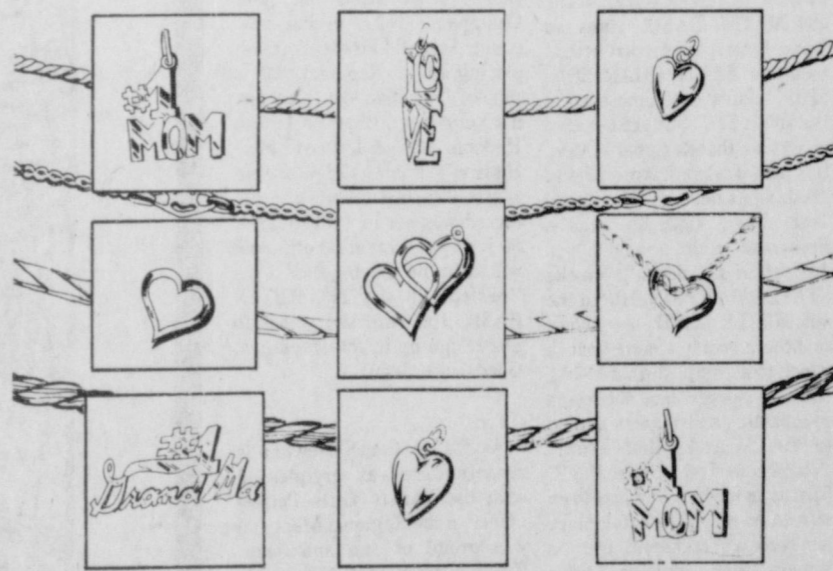
