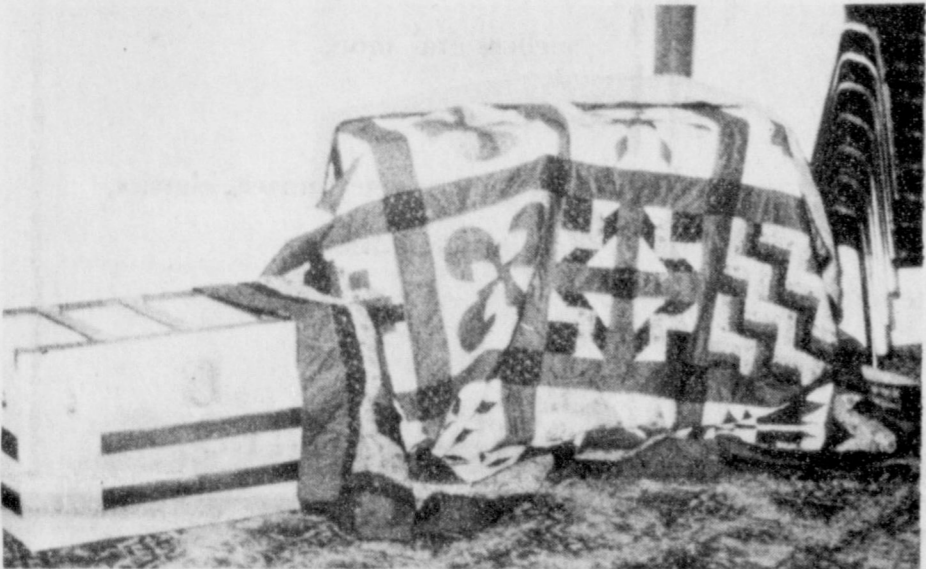

Waste dumps concern in Panhandle

Under heavy pressure from the nuclear industry, the Federal Government is determined to carve out a high-level nuclear waste repository deep underground by the mid-1990's. Two Texas farmers, Wylie Byrd and Delbert Devin, are at least as determined not to let the waste be buried in the Texas Panhandle. Byrd and Devin are men of advanced middle age, their faces ruddy from years in the sun. On a map, they showed me the 17,000 acres they farm between them. On those same 17,000 acres is one of the sites the Department of Energy is

considering for a repository.

To get down to the salt formations where the waste packages would be buried, DOE contractors would have to drill through the Ogallala aquifer, source of virtually all Panhandle water. And, above ground, they would heap tons of salt dug out of the repository, which would resemble a big underground mine. If the DOE thinks it can keep that salt from blowing across the Panhandle land and causing extensive and expensive damage, say the farmers, DOE doesn't know a thing about Panhandle winds.

The stigma attached to the products such as vegetables, grain food, fiber and pork as well as the millions of cattle fed in Swisher and Deaf Smith counties could lead to depressed prices.

A repository in the area could decrease the value of the land.

There is possibility of contamination of the underground as well as the surface water.

Lake Mackenzie, located in or near Swisher County will supply future drinking water for the towns of Floydada, Lockney, Silvertown and Tulsa.

The Ogallala aquifer is the

largest major aquifer in the nation. The repository represents a danger of contamination to this aquifer, which underlies South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle—the area known as the "breadbasket of America".

Many possible dangers are involved in the transporting high-level nuclear waste down our major highway and railway systems.

Hydrocarbons (oil and gas), which are associated with bedded salts, could be lost as future energy sources.

People would be forced to

leave land which, in many cases, has been in the family for three to four generations.

An estimated 20,000 acres of agricultural land would be restricted or eliminated from future production of needed food for hungry people of the world.

Other locations being studied are in Nevada, Mississippi, Washington, Utah and Louisiana. Residents in Utah and in Washington generally have supported getting a repository because of perceived economic benefits. In Nevada, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, opposition is mounting.

Potential health hazards from the repository could affect future generations for 100,000 years.

Water demands to build and operate the repository would

greatly decrease the water available for irrigation and human consumption. Estimates place the amount needed during the lifetime of the repository (35 - 40 years) at two million gallons per day.

Concerned citizens of the county and the Panhandle should write their state representatives, U.S. Representatives and U.S. Senators.

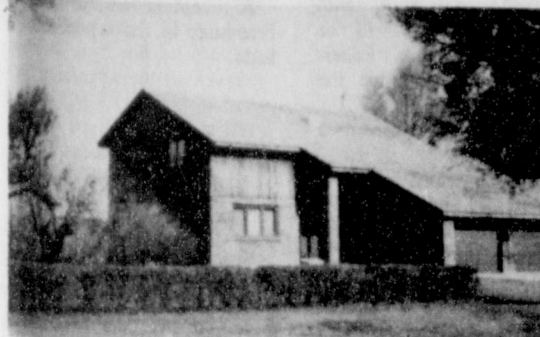

The Spearman Rodeo Club traveled to Canyon to compete in the Canyon Tri-State School Rodeo. After the first event was over, it seemed that it was going to be a long, long weekend for the Spearman Rodeo, because Hadley Reed, the best BAREBACK COWBOY, who usually wins 1st Place, tied for 4th. But after that Hadley, got into his regular swing and came home with one of the biggest and most important titles, the Boys Rodeo Club won the Team Trophy!!

Hadley tied with Stratford's Steve Dyess with a 58 in the BAREBACKS. The winner was Justin Swires of Canadian with a 64.

Ernest Newcomb receives Green Thumb award

Aspirin can be potentially dangerous. Especially so if taken with an alcoholic drink, even aspirin can be dangerous to those of an elderly age. The mixing of medications, including those prescribed by a physician, with any alcoholic drink was one point alcoholism discussed in the Green Thumb meeting held in Borger at the House of Friends on Tuesday, April 26. The program was conducted by Tim Kramer and Olene Blank from the Borger Family Services and Alcohol Counseling Center.

Alcoholism among the elderly is a growing problem and it does exist. A fact most of the public seems to overlook. As brought out in the program by Kramer alcoholism is a disease, and like many diseases can strike anyone, rich or poor, old or young. The reasons for

drinking for many elderly is loneliness caused by death of a spouse and/or no relatives living nearby. Alcoholism can and often does make any existing problem worse. It never solves a problem. The only real cure is prevention.

"Although the percentage of alcoholics in the elderly age group is small compared to the 30 to 40 year old age group which has the largest percentage, alcohol can be fatal or more harmful to the elderly because of the medications they take and the biological fact that the older we become the longer it takes our bodies to metabolize alcohol," stated Kramer. It was noted that some elderly may be taking two or more prescribed drugs that taken together may be doing more harm than good, let alone, taking them with an

alcoholic drink. "If one must drink and is taking any medication," said Ms. Blank, "he should either drink three hours before taking the drug or wait three more hours after the drug. But better yet, not drink at all."

As mentioned prevention is the only cure for alcoholism, but those who are already alcoholics, prevention is too late. However not all is lost. Alcoholics and the rest of the public need to know that alcoholics can recover and do. The first step to recovery is for the alcoholic to admit to himself that he is an alcoholic and be willing to get help. Doc Severinson of the "Tonight Show" and Ralph Waite of "The Waltons" both used to suffer from alcoholism and they are now much better lives after coming to grips with the

disease. It is possible to recover.

Green Thumb employs about 1000 persons aged 55 and over in community service project across the state and with that number there is bound to be some problems with alcoholism. Said Hale, "Although the number is very small, some Green Thumb enrollees have lost their jobs because of drinking, and for these people the future is dim, they've lost their income and their self-respect." The program was conducted to make this fact known and to stress prevention and the dangers of mixed medications.

The Green Thumbs also heard a program update from Area Supervisor, Derrell Hale of Plainview.

Green Thumber, Ernest Newcomb of Spearman, was awarded a certificate as an octogenarian. He was among more than 40 Green Thumbs state wide given the award for 80 years or more of age. Newcomb is museum aide in Spearman.

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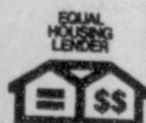

RAILROAD COMMISSION

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission is one of the state's oldest and most powerful regulatory agencies. The Commission, which consists of three elected officials, is responsible for regulating the oil and gas industry, the trucking industry and more. The Commission, which was created in 1891, was scheduled to go out of existence this fall, unless the Texas Legislature voted to re-create it.

The State Senate has voted to re-create the Commission and in doing so, made some far-reaching changes which will benefit the people of Texas. The changes approved in the Railroad Commission include limited regulation of agricultural trucking, new laws defining Commission authority over natural gas rates, and legislation dealing with the problem of underground water pollution.

Although the changes made in the area of agricultural trucking were not as strong as we hoped, we believe the changes made will help provide much needed relief for the shippers, producers and consumers of Texas. Under the legislation approved by the Senate, truck transportation used by a farmer or rancher to ship his crops or livestock to market anywhere in the state, would no longer come under economic regulation by the Railroad Commission of Texas. However, once a farmer, rancher or cooperative relinquishes ownership of the produce or livestock, trucks carrying such goods must be certified and regulated by the Commission. The change in the law came in an effort to help reduce actual farm and ranch costs. We feel this deregulation will provide healthier competition which will help drive down the price for shippers, producers and consumers.

Another provision of the Commission calls for the creation of a separate gas utility regulatory act. The act would cover rate setting and regulation of intrastate gas utilities in Texas. Cities would still retain their original jurisdiction in setting gas rates, but would have to use uniform state standards under the new law. All appeals would be handled

by the Railroad Commission.

Another significant change provides for the creation of the office of the Public Utility Counsel. This provision will enable a city to request the participation of the Office of Public Counsel in representing its residential consumers before the Railroad Commission and during any subsequent judicial proceeding.

Although natural gas used for agricultural purposes will remain unregulated under the Railroad Commission, we feel the introduction of a bill calling for its regulation did help the farmers in district 31 who have been faced with escalating gas prices. For example, shortly after we introduced a bill calling for natural gas regulation for agricultural purposes, some farmers in the Panhandle reported isolated cases of gas rate reductions.

There have also been measures taken to address the problems of underground salt water pollution. We feel the concerns associated with underground water pollution have reached the appropriate people and we can look for necessary changes in the near future. We coauthored a bill that addresses the problems of underground water pollution. We feel that recognition of the problem by the Railroad Commission will lead to positive action in controlling salt water pollution which has been a problem in some areas of the state including West Texas.

The changes in the Railroad Commission were made to benefit the public. As a member of the Sunset Advisory Commission, I was able to see firsthand the changes that needed to be made. We feel that the Railroad Commission must keep its ears open to the people of Texas. I urge you to contact the Commission if you have any concerns that need the attention of the Railroad Commission. DPS records show that 58 persons died in traffic accidents on Texas streets and

highways during the Memorial Day weekend last year, and the DPS Commander pointed out that, "one drinking driver or speeding morotist has destroyed an entire family."

Cawthon said, "Holiday or vacation trips should be planned and a rest stop should be made every two hours to allow drivers and passengers a chance to get out and stretch to help eliminate stress and fatigue."

Major Cawthon added, "Drivers who think ahead, stay alert, wear their seat belt, avoid the use of alcohol while driving, and obey speed limits can have a safe trip and a great vacation."

Steer Evaluation Symposium Set

Performance characteristics of steers will receive major attention at the upcoming Steer Evaluation and Production Symposium at Texas A&M University, May 20-21.

The symposium will get under way in Texas A&M's new Animal Science Pavilion with registration from 7:30 to 9 a.m. the first day. Symposium headquarters is the Inn at Chimney Hill on University Drive East.

Performance characteristics, skeletal correctness, muscle correctness, carcass traits and other important judging qualities will be closely evaluated at the symposium.

Live steers will be evaluated visually by several nationally known beef cattle judges, and symposium participants also will have an opportunity to join in, says Jim Smith, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Performance characteristics and carcass traits are the principles used by a successful judge in selecting steers in the

show ring, notes Smith. Performance data such as average daily gain, frame size and feed efficiency will be discussed while using live show and feedlot steers to illustrate specific points.

A panel of experts representing breeders, feeders and packers will discuss breeding programs, feeder steers, slaughter steers and club steers using live cattle demonstrations.

The symposium is based on 46 steers representing 15 different breeds that were put on a feeding program last October. Some of the steers have been treated as show steers while the others have been treated as feedlot steers. Both groups have been maintained in the same locality and have received the same ration.

Details on pre-registering for the symposium are available at the county Extension office, says Smith.

As an older adult you should be aware of your body's nutritional needs to insure your continued good health. The nutritional needs of older adults actually differ only slightly from the needs of younger adults.

The primary difference is a reduced need for energy or calorie intake. Because you need less energy you may eat less in general. Be sure that the foods you eat provide the nutrients you need.

A diet that provides more energy than your body needs will result in putting on extra pounds. Obesity leads to an increased risk of heart and circulatory diseases and diabetes. So restrict yourself to consuming only the calories your body needs.

Although you may be counting your calories, don't skip breakfast. Skipping breakfast makes it difficult to get all of the day's nutrients requirements in other meals.

But do watch what you eat for snacks. Try to avoid snacks that interfere with regular meals by making sure the snacks are light. Milk, milk drinks or fruit and vegetable juices with a couple of crackers make a good light snack.

Here are some suggestions to help you maintain a healthy diet and the zest that goes with it:

- Drink water, eat raw fruits and vegetables and exercise to avoid constipation.
- Include plenty of fruits and vegetables in your diet to prevent vitamin and mineral deficiencies.
- Eat green vegetables, whole grain and enriched cereals and meat—especially liver—to avoid nutritional

anemia.

□ Drink plenty of milk to maintain your intake of calcium and vitamin D. Calcium intake is especially important for older women since it may prevent Osteoporosis, or porous bones, which can lead to fractures.

Watch out for promoters who try to convince older persons that their nutritional needs are unique and cannot be met by ordinary foods. They may try to sell you special supplements and "health" foods, or get you to experiment with unbalanced diets. These will do you more harm than good.

Also, you will wind up spending much money—the money you need for ordinary food—on special foods with exaggerated promises of benefits.

There is no nutritional cure for aging, but there are nutritional requirements for good health at any age. Be sure that you are eating a diet nutritionally balanced for your age.

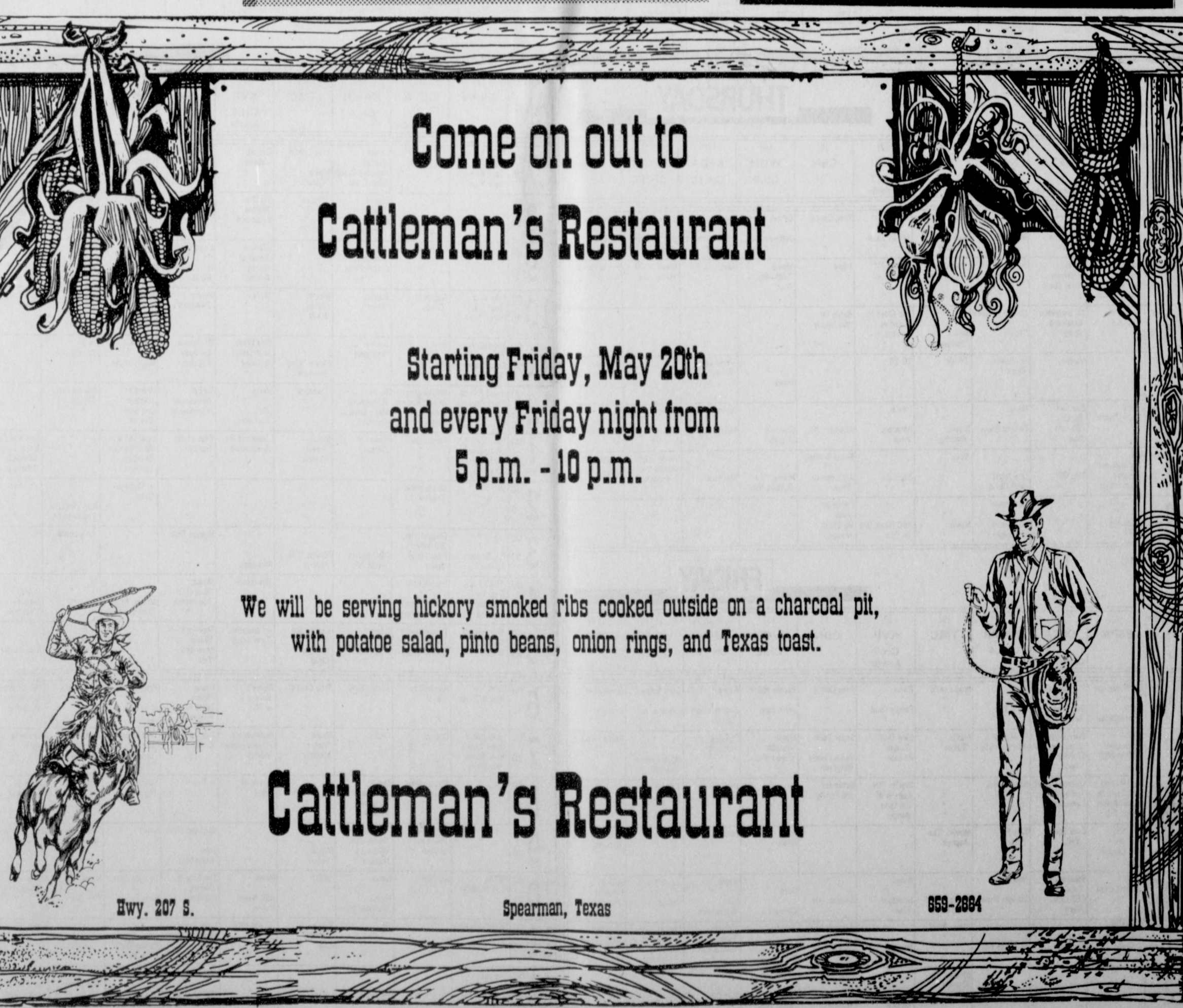
