### Area receives good rainfall

The Spearman-Gruver-Morse area was blessed with approximately .75 of an inch of precipitation as a cool rainy front moved into the area early Monday and lingered through Tuesday.

When the front swept into the area well before dawn Monday, it brought heavy downpours accompanied by thunder and lightning and moderately high winds. The downpour soon tailed off to a slow, steady rain that lasted throughout the day Monday.

Reports from various points throughout Hansford County indicated as much as .75 of an inch fell in these locales, and in some areas, total rainfall was heavier.

### Scoutmasters to help set up syndrome troop

Two Spearman Boy Scout adult leaders will play a major role in trying to set up a Scout troop for syndrome youngsters.

Wayne Cummings, assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 551 and Jim Beeson, Weeblo leader, will participate in a Syndrome Children's Day Camp at M.K. Brown Camp at Old Meobettie.

At the camp, Cummings and Beeson will be teaching a 22 rifle class, an archery class, woodcarving, knots and lashing and tent pitching to 12 children from the Child Satellite Center in Borger. They will team with Scout leaders from Borger and parents of the syndrome children at the day camp, which is being sponsored by Borger Kiwanis Club.

The youngsters will also be treated to a picnic for lunch and a weiner roast in the evening, Cummings said.

Cummings said, "The man who came up with the idea" was John Anders, district committeeman and the man in charge of M.K. Brown Camp.

Although the Scout involvement at present is just with syndrome children from Borger, it could be expanded to such children throughout the Dobie Walls District, under direction of District Executive Director Jim Guest, "if it catches on," Cummings said.

## Babe Ruth team edges Beaver Dusters, 13-12

A daring steal of home by Brett Davis with two outs in the last inning snapped a 12-12 deadlock as Spearman Junior Babe Ruth Leaguers edged the Beaver Dusters 13-12 in a wild scoring season opener here Friday.

After Steve Moore popped up to first to open the ending, Davis drew a base on balls. Will Black popped up to the Beaver first basemen for the second out, but Davis' base stealing antics got him around to third and from there he dashed home with the winning run.

Davis started on the mound for Spearman and got through the first inning without yielding a run, thanks to a couple of fielding gems by Scott Swan. The Beaver leadoff batter flied out to Scott. The next batter singled, but the third hit another fly ball to Swan who caught the ball and threw the runner out at second to end the inning.

In the bottom of the first, the Spearman Babe Ruthers, exploded for six runs to take a commanding lead. Allen Beeson, Spearman's swift leadoff man, was hit with a

pitched ball and took first base. The Beaver pitcher had trouble finding the range, walking Davis and Will Black. He then overthrew the catcher and Beeson raced home with Spearman's first run.

Bob Cook walked, then Davis came home when the Beaver pitcher again overthrew his catcher. Seconds later, Black came in when the Beaver pitcher committed a third wild pitch.

Justin Ooley kept the momentum rolling, collecting Spearman's first hit, a single to left field scoring Cook.

Jesse Moore singled to right, Tim Wooley lashed a two RBI single, plating Ooley and Moore.

After the shaky start, the Beaver pitcher got out of the inning with a flair, striking out in succession Kevin Nelson, Swan and Beeson, but not before Spearman had jumped out to a 6-0 lead.

Beaver got one of the runs back in the top of the second. Their first batter smashed a double. Swan caught a fly ball to retire the next batter, but the next singled, knock-

ing in a run. The Beaver baserunner tried to steal, but Swan tagged him out to end the inning.

Spearman came up with two runs in the bottom of the second.

With one out, Black and Cook drew back-to-back walks, and scored on a double by Moore. Wooley grounded out, pitched to first.

The first Beaver batter walked in the top of the third, but the next three batters were retired on a strike out, a fly to Black and a fly to the pitcher.

Beeson gave Beaver a scare in the third. After Nelson had grounded out pitcher to first and Swan struck out, Beeson walked and stole second then third. But he was left stranded as Davis struck out to end the threat.

Going into the top of the fourth Spearman owned a commanding 8-1 lead, but Beaver exploited timely hitting and fielding errors to score 8 runs that inning, rallying to a 9-8 lead.

The uprising by Beaver saw a single coupled with an error, a single with another error, a double, a single, a triple, a sacrifice fly,

another error and single, two consecutive walks and a double.

Ooley then came in on to pitch in relief. He got the next batter to sky out to Cook, but walked the next two forcing in two runs. Beeson, the Spearman catcher, was hit in the throat with the ball. He had to leave the game, but was able to walk off the field. Black took Beeson's place as catcher.

The third out came on a ground out Steve Moore to first base.

In the bottom of the fourth, Spearman forged back into the lead as Black singled and scored on a triple by Cook. Ooley doubled, plating Cook. Jesse Moore was thrown out at first but drove Ooley in with a third run. Wooley popped out, Nelson singled, stole second and third, but was left stranded as Swan struck out.

Beaver narrowed the margin to 11-10 Spearman in the top of the fifth, as the first batter hit a double, stole third and after a strikeout and a walk, scored on a single.

With two outs in the bottom of the fifth, Black walked, stole second and

third as Cook walked. But he was put out trying to steal home to end the inning.

Beaver went one run up in the top of the sixth, 12-11, but Spearman knotted the count 12-12 in the bottom of the inning.

Ooley was thrown out at first, but Moore bunted and reached first, then stole second, scooting home with the tying run on a single by Jeff

### Housing permits up in city

Home construction is booming in Spearman.

If building permits issued by City of Spearman are any indication, new homes have been going up throughout the city at a steady pace so far this year.

A total of 10 permits were issued for construction of new single family dwellings in Spearman from the first of January through the end of May, for an estimated \$782,000 in building costs.

In addition to the new dwelling permits, 15 other permits were issued for construction of additions,

storage facilities, car ports and the like, at an estimated value of \$79,750.

This brings the dollar value for residential-type construction in Spearman so far this year to \$861,750. This total does not include permits for commercial and industrial construction, which are pending.

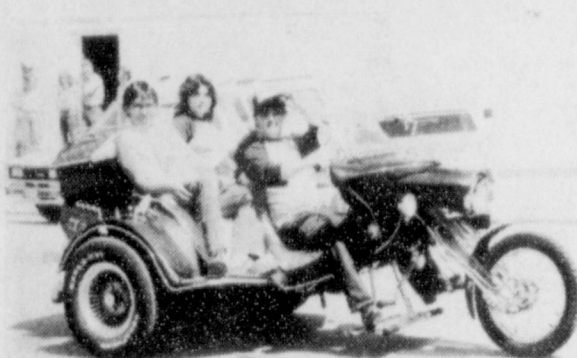

Under near perfect weather conditions, a large turnout converged on Spearman as the big annual Hansford County Roundup unwound here Saturday.

There was "something for everyone" as the crowds enjoyed a colorful parade, the hilarity and suspense of mechanical armadillo races, an old-timey fiddler's contest and a street talent show.

Thronges of people lined the streets well before the parade passed through the downtown business district. They were not disappointed, witnessing the pageantry and riot of colors of elaborate floats, and costumed figures, wagons, horseback riders, antique, sports and hot rod cars and motorcycles.

Winner of first place honors and the \$100 first prize in the float division was the Gladiola Flower Club's "Oktoberfest" entry. "Festivals of the Nations," the Xi Zeta Sorority entry, won second place and \$75. Spearman Study Club's "Chinese New Year" won third place and \$50 in the float competition.

The pre-school through first grade bicycle division was won by Kelly Cummings, first place, Kara Faries, second; and Ashley Baker, third.

In the second grade and up bicycle division of the parade,

the top three winners were Lisa Collins, first place; Cindy Riggs, second; and April Wilkerson, third. The first three place winners in the bicycle competitions won medals with ribbons.

Andrea Archer won first place in the horse riders' division, with Nancy Ivy placing second and Laura Umphress third.

J.W. Jines of Perryton won top honors in the wagon division.

J.B. Duckworth of Lefors won the Fiddler's contest, with James Sparks of Spearman placing second and Gene Meyers of Rolla, Kans. third.

The first three place winners in the fiddler's competition won trophies.

A real crowd pleaser, white bearded and colorful J.W. Jines of Perryton won the talent contest with his harmonica playing, earning the \$15 prize. Added to his wagon triumph in the parade, Jines' first place in the talent show made him a double winner.

Second place talent winner Ben Harris of Gruver played the piano and sang, while Dan and Peggy Reynard of Spearman took third place honors as Dana played the trombone accompanied by Peggy on the piano.

Among the biggest draws of the Roundup were the arma-

dillo races.

The First State Bank of Spearman team of Jim Shirley, Larry Trooper, Terry Curtiss and Jamie Bulls won the team armadillo race competition, as they guided their entry to a 23.50 seconds finish.

Atkins Pro Shop placed second, just four-tenths of a second slower at 23.54, and White House Lumber was a close third at 23.67.

The First State Bank men's team not only took the armadillo race championship but also won a side prize. By beating the two women's teams from the bank, they also won a breakfast to be prepared by members of the bank's two women's team.

Shawn English, whose armadillo finished the course with a 5.06 seconds clocking, placed first in the individual competition, winning the \$50 first prize. Rick Riggins' entry, with a 5.19, place second, winning a pair of armadillo shoes from Boyd's Shoes. Jamie Bulls' entry clocked at 5.29, won for him a brass armadillo from Sack's Third Avenue, and Larry Trooper's 'dillo, with a 5.36, took third place and won for him an armadillo egg.

Proceeds from the armadillo races will go toward purchase of fire works for the city's fourth of July celebration.

An estimated 1,000 people also enjoyed the barbecue and trimmings sold by the Spearman Jaycees. Jaycee Mike Cudd estimated some 1,200 pounds of barbecue were served to about 1,000 persons.

"We were well pleased with

the turnout, and from all the feedback we got back, it was the best they'd had in quite a while," Cudd remarked.

"The Jaycees would like to express our thanks to the Jaycee wives and to the Servers Club for cooking all the beans," he added.

## Bill Cope receives scholarship

WTSU-Bill Cope, a junior at West Texas State University from Spearman, has been selected as one of 12 Campus Service scholarship recipients for the 1983-84 academic year.

As one of 12 Campus Service Students, Cope will receive an \$800 scholarship and work four hours a week in the WTSU Development Office. The hosts and hostesses, who include six upperclass students and six 1983 high school graduates who will enter WTSU as beginning freshman students in the fall semester, will conduct campus tours and represent the university at campus activities.

This is the first year for upperclass students to serve in Campus Service.

"The upperclass students are familiar with campus and we wanted them to help the freshmen learn," said Cindy McCarley, WTSU admissions advisor in the Development Office.

About 100 students applied for the Campus Service scholarships. Recipients are selected on the basis of application, recommendations and personal interview.

accounting major. In high school he was involved in choir, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and First Baptist Church.

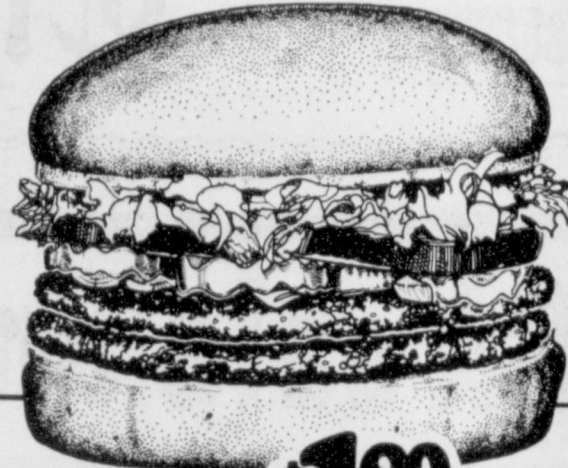

## Birth defects seminar planned

**HELP CHANGE THE FUTURE.....WHY?** A community is only as healthy as its children are, who will be the leaders of tomorrow.

The nation's most serious child health problem is birth defects, which every year strikes more than 250,000 babies. They suffer from mental retardation, deafness, blindness, missing limbs, defective blood cells or body chemistry disorders. A birth defect is an abnormality of prenatal origin in the body structure, function or metabolism. The causes of many birth defects are unknown. Some are inherited. Others thought to be caused by environmental influences. The majority probably result from a combination of both. About 15 million Americans have birth defects. This number includes babies with markedly low birth. Some 1.2 million infants, children and adults are hospitalized annually for treatment. Babies born prematurely probably have a better chance of survival in the U.S. than anywhere else in the world, thanks to enormous medical strides of past decades. 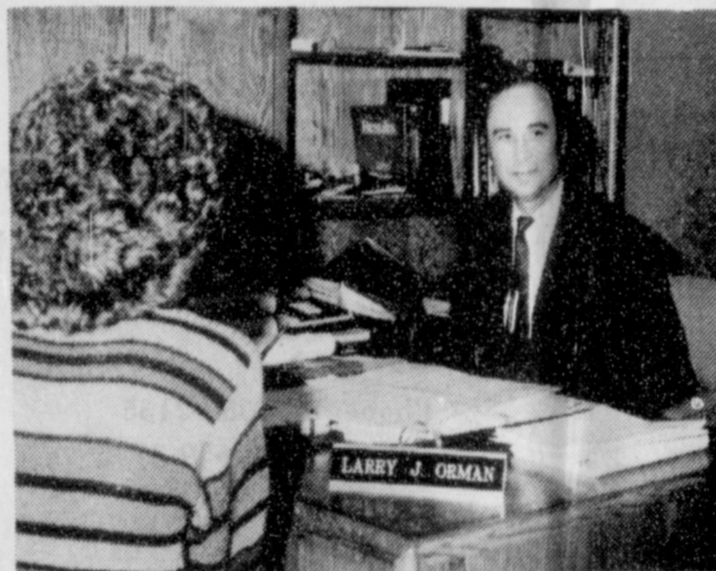

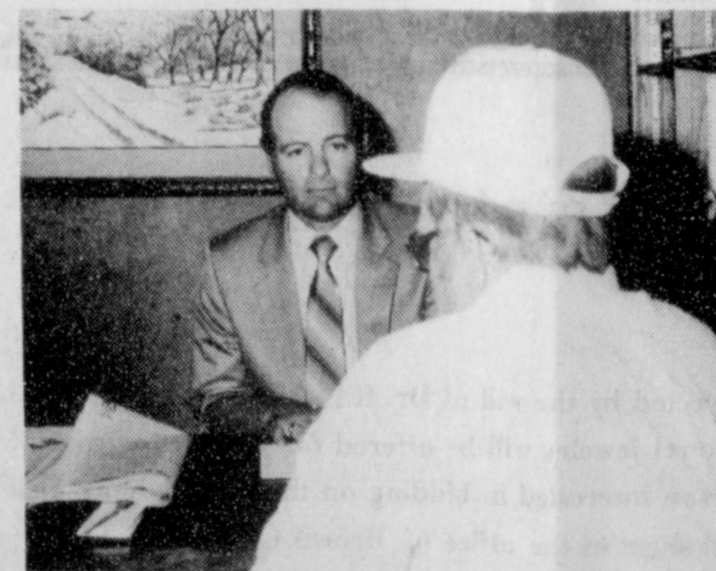

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### Grant for railroad rehabilitation approved

AUSTIN, Texas—A \$1.6 million grant agreement with the Federal Railroad Administration for the rehabilitation of 42 miles of track in the Texas Panhandle has been approved by the Railroad Commission.

Texas North Western Railway Co. will pay the balance of the rehabilitation project's \$2.3 million total cost.

The line to be rehabilitated runs from Etter Junction to Morse and includes track to Pringle and to Sheerin.

Major work to be done on the line includes the replacement of cross ties, ballast, and rails.

The Local Rail Service Assistance Act of 1978 allows federal financial assistance for rehabilitating certain rail

lines. Under the rail assistance program, each state is required to designate a state agency to prepare and implement a state rail plan.

The Railroad Commission, which is the Texas agency given the responsibility by the governor, completed the Texas State Rail Plan in 1979 and it was approved by the Federal Railroad Administration.

The federal act requires each state's plan to focus on light-density branch lines that are being abandoned or are in danger of abandonment. Once the plan is approved by the FRA, the state is eligible to apply for federal grant funds to upgrade the endangered lines.

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### Vaccinate horses for sleeping sickness, tetanus

Though sleeping sickness is no longer a major problem in the horse industry, it still exists and all equines should receive a protective vaccine each year.

A highly effective combination vaccine is available for horses, says Jim Smith, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. It protects against Eastern, Western, Venezuelan types of sleeping sickness as well as tetanus.

Losing horses to sleeping sickness is unnecessary, says Jim.

Last year cases of the disease were reported in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, and Alabama, probably due to an unusually high mosquito population during the summer months.

Equine encephalitis (sleeping sickness) is carried naturally by several species of birds. When most mosquitoes bite an infected bird, the disease can then be transmitted by the mosquitoes to other animals.

Early signs of the disease include fever, loss of appetite and depression. The animal is usually restless, may walk aimlessly in circles and be sensitive to sound and touch.

One common symptom is a horse that stands with his head hung low like he's sleeping. He doesn't fully chew hay or forage, and as the disease progresses, the tongue may actually hang out of the mouth, says Smith.

Once a horse is infected, treatment is generally unsuccessful. That's why proper immunization each year is so important.

The disease can also be transmitted to humans and some other animals. The virus

has been found in dogs, goats, pigs, and domestic birds.

All equines should be vaccinated each spring before mosquitoes become prevalent. This should give them the protection needed for another year.

Consult your veterinarian regarding available vaccines to combat sleeping sickness, suggests Jim Smith.

### WTSU Orientation sessions

WTSU-Five orientation sessions at West Texas State University in June and July will provide the opportunity for beginning freshman students to ask questions and to become acquainted with campus.

For the first freshman orientation session on Friday, June 10, 192 students who plan to enter WTSU as freshmen in the fall semester have registered, said Dr. Bob Stout, associate director of the University Counseling and Testing Center which sponsors the annual summer orientation sessions.

Other dates are Friday, June 24; Thursday, June 30; Saturday, July 9; and Monday, July 25.

At 8 a.m. in the Activities Center Ballroom, students will be introduced to WTSU through four sessions featuring administrators and staff members discussing student life, registration, academic regulations and costs, including financial aid. Parents also will attend and orientation session during the morning.

Following a lunch break, students will receive academic advisement at 1:15 p.m. at the Classroom Center where they will meet with faculty members in their areas of academic interest to plan a fall semester course schedule.

While the students participate in academic advisement, parents will tour the campus.

A Reception at 2:30 p.m. at the Activities Center will bring parents and students together again to visit with members of the WTSU administration, faculty and staff.

Before the orientation sessions, interested students may take College Level Examination Program tests to gain academic credit.

The CLEP tests will be administered at 8 a.m. in the Classroom Center on June 9, 23 and July 8. Credit is

available in English, math, biology, history and government. Students may take one to four tests at a cost of \$25 for the first test and \$22 for each additional test.

Students should be invited to orientation sessions by letter from the WTSU registrar's office after their records have been evaluated and they have been accepted to attend WTSU, said Stout. Interested students also must register in advance to take the CLEP exams.

The session on July 9 will be the first Saturday orientation session, said Stout.

"We wanted to see if we could attract more people who may work or may not be able to attend during our other times," said Stout.

Five orientation sessions in 1982 attracted 801 beginning freshmen students to campus which were among the largest group of pre-registered freshmen in seven years.

Additional information concerning the orientation program may be obtained from Stout at the University Counseling and Testing Center.

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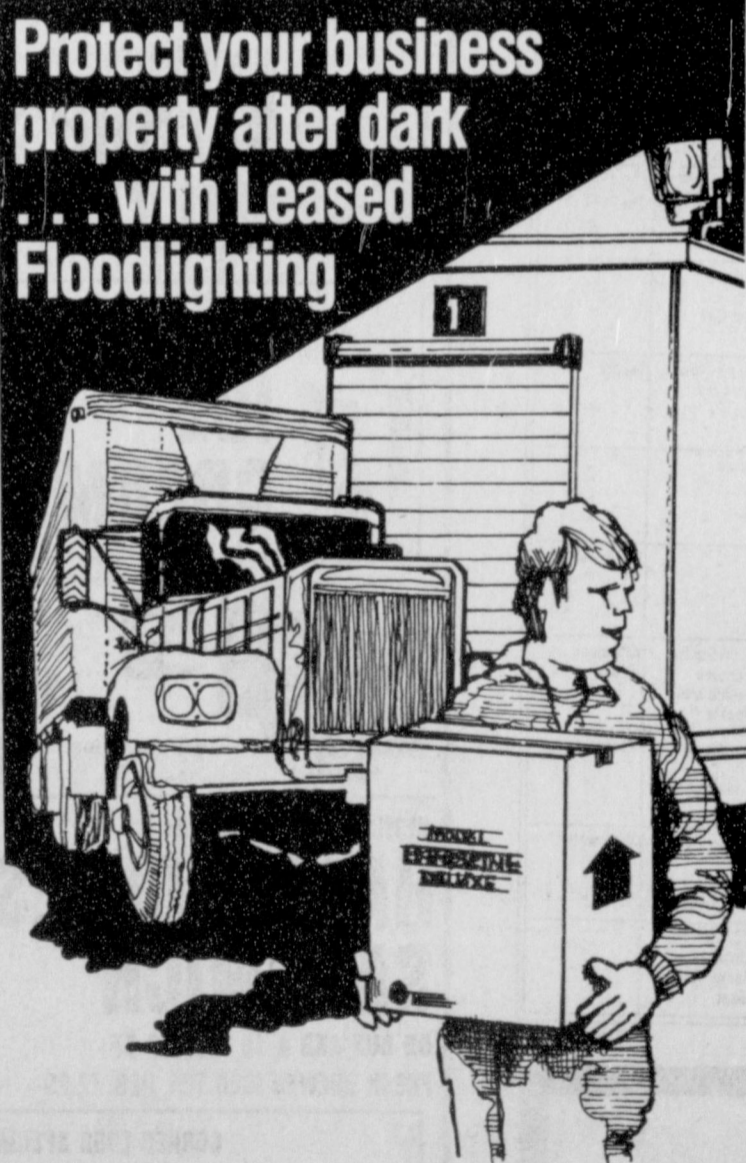

### Horse Judging team to state
