Brother & sister receive Heroism Award

HOUSTON—Eleven-year-old Chris Wilhite and his ten-year-old sister Amy of Saltillo (Hopkins County) received the 1983 Rural Heroism Award here today for their role in saving the life of their father who severely mangled his right arm in a farm accident last June.

The presentation was made by Millard Shivers, awards chairman of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, during the annual meeting of the Texas/Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition. Ben Bullard, assistant director of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department, is the council president.

Two other nominees, Mrs. Paul Fox of Desdemona (Eastland County) and John Henshall of Beeville (Bee County), received honorable mention.

Mrs. Fox probably saved the life of her husband when she jumped on a runaway tractor and stopped it, after the man had been knocked unconscious by a tree he was pulling down with the tractor. Henshall used a front-end loader to lift a tractor which had overturned on a co-worker, Leroy Robbins, as the two were excavating dirt to build some terraces.

Last June 23, Steve Wilhite, 30, was working with a hay baler on his 160-acre dairy farm near Saltillo in northeast Texas when he slipped, pinning his right arm in the rollers of the baler.

Responding to Wilhite's cry for help, Chris and Amy came running from a nearby lake. Chris shut off the tractor's power takeoff and then lifted the tailgate of the baler, allowing the elder Wilhite to remove his severely mangled arm.

Accustomed to pasture driving but never highway traffic, Chris started the family pickup and Amy kept their ailing father awake so he could shift gears as Chris sped 75 miles per hour the eight-mile distance from their farm to Franklin County Hospital at Mount Vernon.

Emergency treatment was given to Wilhite, but hospital officials determined that the only chance Wilhite had of keeping his right arm would be to take him to a Dallas hospital.

J. W. McKay, who lives near Mount Vernon, has an agreement with the hospital there to use his helicopter to fly patients in need of more specialized care.

McKay flew Wilhite with his injured arm packed in ice to Parkland Hospital in 38 minutes. However, surgeons at Parkland could not save the badly mangled arm, because they said the bone had been twisted beyond repair.

Nevertheless, the quick action of the Wilhite youths has been attributed to possibly saving his life.

Playing hero was not the main concern of the two children at the time of the accident. Chris said his primary concern was "getting daddy to the hospital." Amy said her main interest was "keeping daddy alive."

Chris and Amy attended school at Mount Vernon, Chris being in the fifth grade and Amy in the fourth grade.

Both children help their parents with the farm chores. Chris helps with cleaning the milking parlor and raking the hay for baling. Amy helps feed the baby calves.

WHAT ARE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains exemptions.

A homestead exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of your residence homestead. Various types of homestead exemptions are available in Texas and, if you qualify, they can reduce your total property tax bill. Read on for details.

What Exemptions Are Available?
School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are disabled or over 65.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly.

Cities and other taxing districts may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All local taxing units offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property. Additionally, many taxing units offer a local option, percentage homestead exemption to resident homeowners.

How Do I Apply?
Applications for the disabled veterans' exemption must be filed annually with the county appraisal district office.

For other exemptions, if you received a residence homestead exemption on your present homestead in 1982, it will not be necessary for you to make a new application for 1983 in this appraisal district.

If you were 65 or disabled on January 1 and have not previously

filed for the over-65 or disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application this year.

Or, if you have never received a homestead exemption on your present home, an original application should be filed in 1983.

Applications should be made to the county appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available from the appraisal office.

Is There a Deadline?
For 1983, applications should be filed on or before May 2. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in certain instances, you can fully protect your rights by applying before the May 2 rendition deadline.

The State Property Tax Board has a pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, to help you understand your local property taxes. Get a free copy at the appraisal district office or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Swiss Wheat Trade Team To Visit Texas

A six-man wheat industry team composed of flour mill managers, grain trade merchandisers and government import officials will be in Texas April 25-28. They will be studying export facilities at Houston, the NASA based Foreign Crop Condition Assessment Activities, grain grading and quality maintenance in Amarillo and a tour of High Plains wheat production and agri-business operations, according to W.R. Moore, Jr., Munday, Chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, host of the group in Texas. They will also visit Fargo, North Dakota, Chicago Board of Trade and wheat export policy officials in Washington, D.C., as guests of other member-states of U.S. Wheat Associates, the producers international market development arm.

Moore indicated that the Swiss market is particularly interesting at this time, as the wheat crop there was short this year by some 250,000 tons of high quality bread wheat and 100,000 tons of durum for the pasta industry. Moore said that, "We intend to capture as much of that market for Texas and U.S. producers as possible." Moore went on to point out that "All the PIK wheat to be taken over by Texas producers from the loan and reserve programs must be exported if a market is to be available for it, as USDA has projected no increase in domestic use of wheat except a little increase in wheat feeding." The Texas Wheat Producers Board, supported by individual producers through a 1/2 cent per bushel assessment on farmer sales at local elevators, conduct market development activities in over ninety counties through its membership in U.S. Wheat Associates, which has twelve offices in strategic grain-short areas of the world. The visit of the Swiss Wheat Team is a part of that on-going effort.

Farm inputs to decline with PIK

COLLEGE STATION--The high level of farmer participation in the PIK (payment-in-kind) program will have a marked impact on agricultural production expenses, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Overall demand for farm production inputs should decline due to the high unanticipated levels of PIK participation," says Dr. Forrest Steg-

lin. "This will affect nearly all expenses associated with crop production, but especially fertilizer, seed, pesticides, fuels and energy, and operating credit."

Initial forecasts are that expenditures for farm inputs will decline 12 to 15 percent, notes the economist.

Use of pesticides and seed is expected to decline sharply since these are most closely tied to planted acreage. Total sales of both are expected to fall 14 to 20 percent because of

PIK. Fertilizer use is forecast to decline by 15 to 20 percent, but sales may decline even more due to large inventories and already soft prices.

Machinery purchases are expected to decline only 3 to 5 percent as these sales are closely tied to net farm income which is forecast to improve. Machinery repair expenses should drop 12 to 15 percent.

Fuel use may drop 8 to 10 percent, says Steglin.

Inputs needed for erosion and weed control on idled acres--seed, chemicals, fencing and other materials--are becoming more expensive as their demand increases.

"To avoid losing sales of big-ticket purchases such as tractors and combines, implement and equipment dealers may soon offer credit for large dollar purchases in exchange for PIK certificates," says Steglin. "The effect will be the same as using scale tickets at harvest for collateral."

While there are possible negative effects from PIK on farm supplies, USDA officials

believe the long-term benefits to agriculture will outweigh the costs to individual agribusinessmen, says the economist.

Deadline near for vets, survivors

Are you a veteran with a service-connected disability, or a surviving spouse or a minor child of a deceased disabled veteran or of a person who was killed while on active duty?

Someone who fits any one or more of these descriptions may be eligible for a property tax exemption which can amount to \$1,500 to \$3,000 or more, according to Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District.

"But an application has to be filed by May 2 with the appraisal office," Mrs. Peddy said, "for anyone to receive the exemption for this tax year."

The chief appraiser noted that the Texas Constitution permits the Legislature to provide a property tax exemption on property owned by a disabled veteran or surviving spouse or minor child of a deceased disabled veteran.

Those listed by Mrs. Peddy as eligible to qualify for the exemption are:

- a disabled veteran;
- a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried;
- a surviving child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried;
- a surviving spouse of a person who was killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at the time of application;
- a surviving minor child of a person who was killed while on active duty, if there is no surviving spouse and the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

Mrs. Peddy said that qualifications for each applicant are explained further in the Texas Property Tax Code and in pamphlets published by the State Property Tax Board. Appraisal district personnel can also provide information on specific qualifications.

In order to qualify, a person must be a Texas resident. The amount of the exemption, Mrs. Peddy said, is based on the percentage of the veteran's disability. An individual may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property owned on January 1 of the tax year.

The exemption may also be applied to any one piece of property which the applicant designates, such as a home, taxable personal property or any other property owned on January 1.

Mrs. Peddy emphasized that applications must be filed or a renewal signed each year with the chief appraiser; this year the application deadline is May 2. On the application,

the individual must designate the single piece of property which will receive the exemption.

The applicant may be required to present documents which state the percentage of service-connected disability which are provided by the Veteran's Administration or by a branch of the armed services. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death or age may also be required.

To obtain an application for the disabled veterans' and survivors' exemption or more information about specific qualifications, Mrs. Peddy urges taxpayers to contact the appraisal office at 13 West Kenneth Ave., Spearman, 659-5575 or 733-5139.

Confederates & Memorial Day

On April 26, 1865, Mrs. Sue Landon Vaughn, a descendant of John Adams, led a group of women to the cemetery in Vicksburg and decorated the graves of soldiers buried there. The day became a legal holiday in Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Florida--Confederate Memorial Day.

Other former Confederate States adopted other days to remember their dead--Kentucky, Tennessee and Louisiana on June 3. North and South Carolina on May 10, etc. But many have in recent years remembered all war dead on May 30, as Virginia has done, for example, for years.

The women of Virginia might have been responsible for General John A. Logan's order, in 1868, that at all U.S. Army posts graves were to be decorated on May 30. Logan issued the order while Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic. Three years earlier he had been in Petersburg, Virginia, and seen women decorating graves--on June 9, the local custom (at Winchester it was June 6). May 30 has since become Memorial Day.

Ag land tax relief deadline May 2

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District, landowners have the option of applying either for agricultural-use valuation or for open-space land valuation of their property.

Applications must be filed by May 2 this year for any property to receive agricultural-use valuation, or for open-space land valuation on property that did not receive that type of appraisal in 1982.

Two constitutional amendments permit taxation of land on its agricultural-use, productivity, value, Mrs. Peddy said. "This means that taxes would be assessed against the productive value of the land instead of what the land would sell for in the open market," she explained.

Mrs. Peddy noted that the legal basis for special land appraisal is found in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Secs. 1-d and 1-d-1. The two types of land and valuation are commonly called "ag-use" or "1-d" and "open-space" or "1-d-1", the chief appraiser added.

"The requirements for application and for qualification of both the land and the owner are different," Mrs. Peddy said.

For 1-d ag-use valuation, the owner must file an application with the chief appraiser each year. Some other requirements under this provision are that the land must be owned by "a natural person," not a corporation, partnership, agency or organization; the land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use

for at least three years before the year application is first made, and the agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Also, the chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and the owner has to file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use.

For the other type of land valuation, 1-d-1 open-space, the land may be owned by a corporation or partnership and so on, and the agricultural business need not be the principle business of the owners and ecological laboratories are eligible for 1-d-1 appraisal.

However, the land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area; it must have been devoted principally to a qualifying use for at least five of the past seven years, and, again, the chief appraiser must approve the application.

Once an application for 1-d-1 valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner is not required to submit another application as long as the land qualifies, unless the chief appraiser requests another application to confirm current qualification.

Mrs. Peddy also explained that the possibility for a "rollback tax" exists under either form of special land valuation. This liability for additional tax is created under

1-d valuation by either a change in ownership or a change in use of the land, and it extends back three years before the year of the change.

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered by change in use to a nonagricultural purpose that

would not qualify for productivity valuation. Taxes are recaptured for five years before the year of the change.

The additional tax is measured, Mrs. Peddy said, by the difference between taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value.

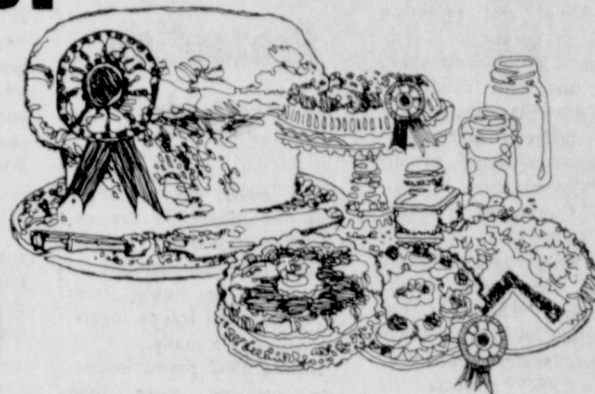
More information and application forms are available from the local appraisal office. Personnel there will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary for determining if their property qualifies for the program.

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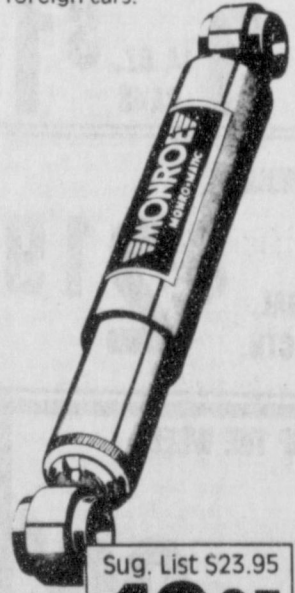
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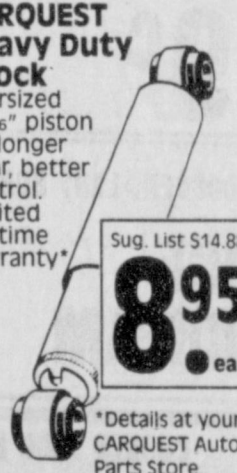
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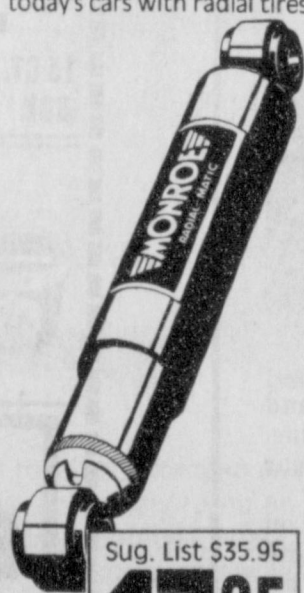

What do you do if you purchase a product that is unsafe?

Unless the product is new and can be returned to the store, most of us will simply throw it away and grumble to ourselves about the problem. But informed consumers will do more than grumble.

You can do yourself and other consumers a favor by understanding the role of the Consumer Product Safety Commission, and reporting unsafe products to them. Because if a toy with sharp edges cuts your child, for example, similar toys will cut other children, unless the product is reported to the Safety Commission.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission is one of several federal agencies which protect consumers in the marketplace. The CPSC has jurisdiction over more than 15,000 consumer products.

The CPSC protects the public from unreasonable risk of injury, aids in evaluating product safety, develops safety standards for products and investigates the causes and prevention of death, illness and injury related to consumer products.

The agency works closely and cooperatively with industry to improve the safety of products, to recall hazardous products and to educate and inform consumers. This cooperation between business and the Commission has produced many "creative, effective information and education programs" says Nancy Harvey Steerts, CPSC Chairperson.

For example, the CPSC and toy manufacturers successfully designed a holiday safety program to help consumers select toys appropriate for a child's age. A major public awareness program on smoke detectors also resulted from CPSC and industry cooperation.

As a consumer you can make use of the CPSC to improve product safety. You can get safety information or report hazardous products and resulting injuries by calling the CPSC toll-free hotline. The number is 800-638-CPSC. For hearing-impaired, the number is 800-638-8270.

Consumer Protection week

The Postal Service—especially its Inspection Service, Law Department and Judicial Officer—have responsibility for protecting the public from deceptions and frauds involving use of the mails.

During 1982 postal inspectors received more than 200,000 complaints of mail fraud or misrepresentation, completed more than 3,000 investigations and saw more than 900 swindlers convicted of mail fraud.

Some of those investigations resulted in administrative action by the Consumer Protection Division of the Postal Service's Law Department, preventing those misrepresenting products or services from receiving mail containing orders and money.

The device used to stop such practices—known legally as a "mail stop order"—provides quick protection for those who send in their hard-earned cash to a promoter who does not accurately represent what he or she is selling. The Postal Service's Judicial Officer issues such orders based on evidence presented by the agency's Consumer Protection Division.

Work-at-home swindlers have been around almost as long as the mail fraud statutes, and those dealers in disappointment have something up their sleeves whenever there's a recession to contend with.

The elderly are the prime targets of work-at-home schemes, just as they are with medical fraud.

A father and son team pled guilty last year to a work-at-home mail fraud scheme that took at least half-a-million dollars from more than 43,000 victims. Their deals centered on a series of envelope stuffing schemes, using nine bogus companies with 17 different addresses in six states. What they did for a \$12 to \$21 fee was to tell those who responded to place their own ads to solicit envelope stuffing and addressing.

Dealers in disappointment, the Postal Service has found out, shed names and places as easily as a snake sheds its skin.

The double-dealers who work their sleight of hand with medical fraud are no less a problem this year than in the past.

The next time you read an advertisement promising the "easy way to lose weight, grow thicker hair, or bring back youthful vigor," ask yourself this question: Is it realistic for me to believe this ad?

If the answer is no, make sure that you investigate before you invest. Learn something about the company making the offer.

You'll probably find that the only one who benefits from the promised simple solutions is the promoter who receives your money.

The mail-order business is an important part of our free enterprise system, providing tens of thousands of jobs for Americans. Most of those who take part in the mammoth industry are scrupulously honest, going out of their way to provide customer satisfaction. But the public must be aware of the occasional dealer in disappointment who will give you nothing more than a fast shuffle.

The dealers in disappointment have found the recent recession a boon for their sleight of hand—not all of it for those with thousands of dollars to invest, either. The Postal Service cautions that if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Investigate before investing.

Texas receives share of Jobs Bill

LUBBOCK—Texas has been allocated \$2,409,900 as part of a new \$50 million nation-wide park and recreational development program, the U.S. Small Business Administration announced today.

Philip O'Jibway, district director of Lubbock's SBA office, said the program is part of the overall Jobs Bill signed into law by President Reagan on March 24. The \$50 million was voted "for the specific purpose of involving small business in providing jobs during a time of high unemployment to accomplish benefits of lasting value," O'Jibway explained.

The legislation authorizes SBA to make grants to the states for rehabilitation and improvements to public parks and other publicly controlled or owned lands. Landscaping of public lands, such as the planting of trees and shrubs, is intended to be accomplished in large measure by hiring unskilled workers.

The funds were allocated among the states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico on the basis of state unemployment in relation to the total national unemployment, the higher the grant.

O'Jibway said unemployment in Texas averaged 557,000 during October-December, 1982. "On the basis of this figure and the other unemployment averages, Texas has been allocated \$2,409,900," O'Jibway said.

Governors or their designated officials have until July 1 to apply for the funds. All projects must be completed by October 1, 1983.

States can do the tree and shrub planting directly or through qualified small businesses. Those businesses, according to SBA regulations published in the Federal Register, must have 70 or fewer employees.

Individuals employed on the projects, either directly by the states or through a small business contractor, must not have fulltime employment at any time and must not be drawing unemployment compensation at the time. Workers must be paid at least the Federal minimum wage of \$3.35 an hour.

Applications in the State of Texas will be channeled through the SBA regional office in Dallas.

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

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MAY BRING YOU TAX RELIEF ON YOUR PROPERTY TAXES



Under the Texas Property Tax Code, farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their agricultural land taxed on the basis of productivity rather than market value. Productivity valuation may lower the 1983 taxes on your agricultural or open-space land.

If you have never received open-space (1-d-1) valuation on your land, or if your land has been receiving agricultural (1-d) valuation, you must make application to the appraisal district office by May 2, 1983, to be entitled to tax relief this year.

If your land received open-space (1-d-1) valuation in 1982, there will be no requirement for you to reapply for 1983 in this appraisal district. Remember, however, that annual applications are required for agricultural (1-d) valuation.

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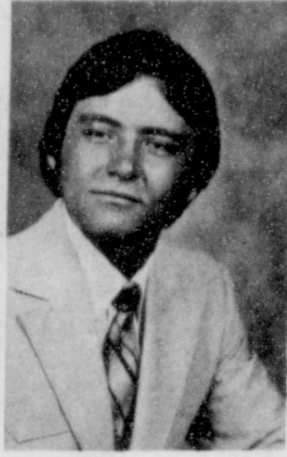

\$4,000 (on a joint return) into individual retirement accounts tax-free. Until this year, the individual limit was \$1500 and there was no doubling of the exemption for a couple.

As a result, millions have turned to IRA accounts to take advantage of this tax break. Retirement accounts are likely to sit inactive for years—since funds from an IRA can't be withdrawn until the saver is 59½ years old without payment of a penalty. They are not trading accounts and thus many feel stocks with long-term growth potential are the perfect thing for an IRA account.

This is not all theory. In both France and Sweden similar stock market booms took place after IRA systems were established. The French system went into effect in 1977 and the Swedish system in 1980.

In Belgium a similar reaction is taking place right now.

What does this mean for the market's future? It's the best possible source of funds, experts say,

because the stocks bought are not likely to be traded. They're bought for long-term gain and thus many see the IRA source of funds as one which will boost the market for years to come.

One banker in New York estimated recently that the IRA source of funds could keep the current bull market going for years, saying that \$50 billion a year is going into IRA's and that \$40 billion of this goes to buy stocks.

Know THE Weather

How do the "experts" make their long-range weather forecasts?

Weather forecasters study a number of things in determining what the weather will be, in the U.S., in a particular future period.

One of the things they watch closest is the buildup and movement of large polar air masses in the polar

regions. These air masses spill over and flow down over Canada and enter the United States. They often bring cold or stormy weather.

Their course can often be predicted. If fewer of these polar air masses are indicated, or if they seem weak, then it is likely that warm air masses will push upward and over the U.S.—or at least over a southerly part of it.

Taking these calculations under consideration, and other factors something more than a "guess" can be arrived at, although the "experts" still miss—something of a mystery.

The other extreme to shingles is the severely ill patient who takes weeks and weeks to recover. Occasionally, a post-herpetic neuritis sets in and can remain painful for many months!

Shingles is caused by, of all things, the same virus

that causes chicken pox! One case is supposed to cause immunity—but I've seen people have it more than once!

Let's consider the manner in which viruses are transmitted. There are two main categories of spread, i.e., viral diseases with their

natural cycle chiefly in man—person-to-person spread; and viral diseases transmitted from Nature to man.

All of our previous virus discussions have been confined to the better known person-to-person diseases (there are many) such as influenza A and B, infectious

mononucleosis, measles, mumps, chicken pox, poliomyelitis, smallpox, hepatitis A and B, etc., etc.

The viral diseases transmitted from Nature to man are called zoonoses. There are many serotypes with varied classifications and categories.

WHAT IS TAX RENDITION?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains the process.

Rendition is the method through which a taxpayer reports or lists the taxable property he owned or managed and controlled on January 1 of the current tax year. It is also the means by which a taxpayer is allowed to record his own opinion of what the value of that property should be.

Not every taxpayer is required to file a rendition, but there are important reasons why a taxpayer may wish to do so.

Renditions must be filed: (1) for all tangible personal property used for the production of income; or (2) on any other taxable property if required by the chief appraiser.

Renditions may be filed by any taxpayer who wishes to preserve certain valuable rights.

Even if you aren't required to prepare and file a rendition on your property, there are several good reasons why you should do so:

- As previously noted, by filing a rendition, you have placed into the record your own opinion as to the value of your property.
- You create a responsibility on the part of the chief appraiser and the appraisal review board to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property by any amount over what you have rendered. Further, you have the right to protest to the appraisal review board either the increase in value or any other decision affecting the taxability of your property.
- For property that is not rendered by the owner, the chief appraiser makes his own

decision on the property's value and places that value on the appraisal roll.

In addition to a rendition, you also may file a special report called a report of decreased value if the value of your property decreased during the preceding tax year for any reason other than normal depreciation. The appraisal office will view the property and verify any reported change in appraised value and its cause and nature.

Renditions and other property reports may ordinarily be filed with the county appraisal district office at any time from January 1 through April 30. This year, since April 30 falls on a Saturday, the deadline is extended by law to May 2, 1983.

Rendition forms for various types of property, as well as other property report forms, are available from the appraisal district office. Your appraisal district can also give you a free copy of the Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities pamphlet which explains exemptions, appeal rights, and other details of the local property tax system in Texas. Or, contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Campbell, One Of Rising House GOP Stars, Defends Reagan Programs

"Do you know what their budget, which they passed in the House three weeks ago, provides for? Keep in mind, I differentiate between liberal Democrats and Democrats. Many southern, conservative Democrats are among my supporters. They believe in fiscal responsibility. But they don't run the national party. The liberal Democrats run the national party, and control the House. Their budget--and this hasn't been adequately reported--calls for a \$30 billion increase in taxes. The increase would total \$265 billion over five years. We are for the third year of a tax cut this year and for tax indexing. Some Democrats demagogue on the question of tax indexing just like they did on social security last year in the election--and frightened many old people. Yet President Reagan has not reduced social security benefits to anyone, nor has anyone been cut off. He wanted correctly to limit some future increases. Indexing, which we favor, doesn't help the wealthy, as some claim. It helps working people. For a family of four earning \$30,000, it would mean a tax saving of \$3,500 over the next five years. For a family of four earning only \$10,000, it would mean a tax bill 63% lower over the next five years: So who cares about

the working people? The Democratic budget would also raise the budget deficit, already too high, by \$12 billion, because of increased domestic spending. "One must look at the Democratic budget to see what we are trying to do. We want to help people help themselves, to create private jobs and stimulate the private sector of the economy, the traditional American way. I recently got a list of 168 companies planning to expand and have contacted many of them about coming to my district. I'm even working with one in Hong Kong. "Our hope is that as business recovers and improves, the deficit will shrink as tax revenues increase, unemployment falls and the cost of entitlement programs is brought under control. That's the only sound way to rebuild the economy--not by more and more social and entitlement programs with automatic cost increases. "That's what happened to social security. The president forced the bi-partisan commission to reach a compromise and has in effect saved the system. I'm a member of the House Ways and Means Committee and we enacted the reform law. After all that demagoguery, and old people scared to death, the system has been made secure by the president's leadership and discipline."
