The movement grew and grew to such dimensions that Baden-Powell resigned from the Army and embarked upon his 'second life' as he calls it—his life of service to the world through scouting.

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



As federal agencies began put-ting into effect plans which were drafted at the request of the President to meet emergencies caused by the drouth that cov-ers large sections of the United States, attention is again direct-ed to the benefits which accrue from trench silos.

tions. Trench silos offer one of the most economical and practi-cal storage places for farmers who desire to keep one or more years' supply of feed on hand. In studying the present drouth situation which is becoming sev-ere in many parts of the South-ern Great Plains, L. H. Hauter, regional director of the Farm Security Administration. ern Great Plains, L. H. Hauter, regional director of the Farm Security Administration, said that farmers who have feed reserves carried over from last year in most instances will be the last to need assistance in the present emergency.

When advancing loans to farmers, the FSA encourages the construction of trench silos where possible, or some similar economical and adequate storage facility for feed reserve.

Mr. Haunter, cited a survey conducted by the FSA which shows that 50 per cent of the borrowers in Region 12 have adequate storage space. In 1 county alone, 52 percent of the

He asked all legislators to sign a proposed bill which he sent to them, but they declined. Prom best reports, only about 50 legislators would commit themselves in advance to support his consumers' tax program.






